

## Airport numbers continue ascent

### Sanford facility one of few in nation experiencing growth

**SANFORD** — For the third straight month, domestic passenger traffic at Orlando Sanford International Airport increased.

Airport officials released official passenger counts for February and said preliminary numbers for March indicate domestic traffic will continue to surpass previous benchmarks.

"Are overall numbers continue to grow, led by the domestic travelers," said Victor

White, vice president of OSIA. "We're one of the few airports in the nation that continue to grow. The numbers for Orlando International are off considerably."

For February, 32,473 domestic passengers traveled through OSIA, a 48 percent increase compared with the same month in 2001 (21,947). International travelers were down almost 17 percent, but overall passenger traf-

fic was up 8.86 percent, 60,223 to 55,223, compared with February 2001.

Larry Gouldthorpe, president of the Sanford division of TBI Airport Management, said early data for March shows a 24 percent increase in passenger traffic over March 2001. Gouldthorpe estimates about 95,000 passengers traveled through Sanford, 47,000 of those on domes-

tic flights.

"A lot of that growth is due to the Vacation Express business which began in December," Gouldthorpe said. "Vacation Express had about 30,000 passengers, about a 50-50 split between domestic and international passengers. Pan Am was responsible for another 28,251 domestic passengers."

Gouldthorpe said Vacation Express's flights average a 90 percent load factor. In recent weeks, the flights have sold out, in part because of a strong Spring Break season.

### Sheriff's deputies once again searching for Cherenfant

Deputies from the Seminole County Sheriff's Office are again on the lookout for 17-year-old Rony Cherenfant.

In the summer of 1999, Cherenfant tried to flee from authorities in a pick-up truck before getting caught in the Tampa area. He had also burglarized numerous homes in the Weathersfield area of Seminole County. For the past two years, he's been in a Department of Juvenile Justice, level eight, program. He was sent there for burglary and for not meeting the terms of his juvenile probation.

Last week, he was released from the level eight juvenile program and was granted conditional release, which means he is subject to supervision by the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

Last night, it was discovered that Cherenfant had left his home at 571 Lynchfield Avenue, Altamonte Springs, in violation of the terms of his release. It is feared that he may be returning to his life of crime. He is a known gang member. There is some concern Cherenfant could be armed, since a past burglary involved a firearm.

If anybody knows of Rony Cherenfant's whereabouts, they are asked to call the Seminole County Sheriff's Office at 665-6600 and ask for Sgt. Tracey Fortenberry, or Juvenile Probation Officer Anthony Bourne. They may also call Crime Line at 1-800-423-TIPS.

## Changing numbers should make traveling easier for motorists

**SANFORD** — It's no April Fool's joke. Exit numbers on Interstate 4 are changing.

Crews from the Florida Department of Transportation began changing the exit numbers in Daytona Monday, April 1. The numbers of all exits on the state's interstate system will be renumbered to correspond with the milepost numbers, making it easier, FDOT officials hope, for local residents and out-of-state travelers to navigate Florida's highways.

"Even though we just started Monday, it's going well," said Amy Scales, spokeswoman for FDOT. "The goal is to try to do one interchange every day and a half. Not only do the crews have to change the green signs, we also have to change the blue signs indicating exits for gas, food and lodging."

At the current pace, Scales said she expects crews to be in Seminole County in about two

weeks. The conversion for all I-4 exits is estimated to take two months at a cost of \$447,000.

State transportation officials realize the renumbering may cause confusion for local motorists. For example, under the old number system if you got off I-4 at Exit 48, you were on State Road 436 in Altamonte Springs. With the new exit numbers, Exit 48 will put you on County Road 557 in Polk County.

The state hopes to prevent that confusion with a transition period. For two years, both the old number and the new number will be displayed on exit signs.

Scales said things have gone smoothly in North Florida, where renumbering along Interstate 10 has already been completed. Changes to many of the interstate signs mounted on overhead trusses will require lane closures, which FDOT officials say will occur overnight.

Work also will begin this month to change the numbers for

## Seminole's museum of history undergoing extensive renovation

**SANFORD** — Things may seem a bit out of place at the Seminole County Museum of History, but there's a good reason for the disarray.

Renovations for the museum's interior started a few weeks ago with the packing and relocating of the facility's artifacts. Work will soon begin on the lighting, ceiling and walls inside the building — updating the building for the 21st century.

The museum's facelift is part of a \$250,000 state grant, Museum Specialists Karen Jacobs said. About two years ago, county officials visited Tallahassee to ask for state funds. Upon approval, the county agreed to match the grant with an additional \$250,000.

"It's amazing — the state said

'yes' to us on the first try," Jacobs said.

The interior changes follow renovations to the museum's exterior, including a new roof, windows and restoration of the pebble-dash side of the building. The floors, which are still the originals from when the structure was built, will also be refurbished.

The building that contains so much of Seminole's history has a past of its own. Built in 1924, the structure was the first building in the county's Five-Points complex, which also included a convict camp.

According to Jacobs, the museum was originally Seminole's Old Folks Home. It became the residence for people who would otherwise not have had a place to live.

"At that time, every county had

## Jones seeks answer to backyard mystery

For the past 23 years, Bob Jones has been looking for an answer to a backyard mystery.

The enigma is a pyramid shaped object made of red bricks and cement located just a few feet from the back of Jones' house on Orange Boulevard. Hoping that it is remnants of an old well, he now is searching for clues to what the object is.

"A neighbor of mine said it may be an old well," Jones said. "I need more water for my nursery, so I hope he is right."

"Another friend of mine, who is 96 years old, doesn't know what it is."

Jones discovered the pyramid-shaped cement block when he moved into his house 23 years ago. He became curious and excavated the site, unearthing the red bricks that create the bottom of the object. The bricks, also arranged in the shape of a pyramid, are stacked in seven rows.

Many of Jones' neighbors in the Paola community have suggested various things — remains of a foundation to an old saw mill or an old cane maker — however, no one has given him a definitive answer.

"I've received a lot of suggestions, but I am still not sure what it is," he said. "I just really want to find out."

Jones believes his house, locat-

ed in what was once a community of large fruit groves, is more than 100 years old. According to a land abstract, the property was first sold to Moses J. Taylor Jr., in 1874. However, it does not give an exact date of when the structure was built.

Karen Jacobs, Museum of Seminole County History specialist, believes the object is probably a cornerstone or foundation to an old building.

"It could have been an extension to the house, which was eventually torn down," Jacobs said. "Back then, what started as a small house became a big house as extensions were added to it."

## JHJ Communications celebrates 10th anniversary

JHJ Communications, Inc., a real estate public relations specialist that has been associated with some of Central Florida's largest developments and homebuilding firms, recently achieved a major milestone with the celebration of its 10th anniversary.

The niche company, started in 1992 by veteran public relations and communications professional John H. Jolinski, has emerged as one of the area's leading public relations firms specializing in the marketing of residential and commercial real estate.

The company's current roster of clients includes the Florida operations of Fidelity National Title Insurance of New York, part of the nation's largest family of title insurance companies which posted a record \$4 billion in revenues last year; the Orlando Division of national homebuild-

ing giant Centex Homes; Lockheed Martin Corporation's Orlando Central Park; leading production builder Engineered Homes; the upscale residential community of Windsong in Winter Park; and the Central Florida operations of Renar Homes which is developing 4,500-acre LPGA International in Daytona Beach.

who has been a part of the local business scene since 1978. "This growth has created a gold rush of PR professionals — large and small — who have set up shop and tapped in to one of the area's strongest economic staples."

Jolinski, who has provided Public Relations services over the years for the likes of Senator Bob Graham (when he was running for Florida Governor in the late 1970s) and drug store czar Jack Eckerd, says when he first came to Orlando in 1978 there were less than a handful of Public Relations counselors. Today there are close to 50. Most of that growth has occurred since the early-90s, hastened not just by real estate but also by the area's thriving tourism and high tech industries.

Over the years he has repre-

sented artists looking to increase their exposure, restaurants, law firms, the Adam Walsh Foundation, those running for political office and various sporting events, including the Citrus Sailing Regatta (mid 1980s) and the Greater Orlando Tennis Association (which he does as a volunteer). The lion's share of his business comes primarily from real estate arena: developers, builders, title insurance companies and mortgage companies.

"It would be like Barry Bonds all of a sudden deciding to take up golf as a living," Jolinski says. "He excels with a baseball bat — not a 5-iron. I know what my strengths and weaknesses are and I direct everything to my strengths."

Before starting his own firm, Jolinski cultivated his Public Relations expertise in the private sector working for several large Public Relations and Advertising firms, as well as heading up the

Florida Public Relations operations for a major national homebuilder for nearly seven years. Before entering the public relations field, he was an award-winning sports journalist for eight years with the Fort Lauderdale Sun-Sentinel, the last

four of those years covering the Miami Dolphins (1972-1976).

"I'm pleased with what JHJ Communications has accomplished during its first decade but feel the journey is just beginning," Jolinski says. "There are still PR challenges to be met."

"They had a mix of college students and family Spring Break travelers," Gouldthorpe said. "The trips to Cancun were almost all college students."

The success of the Vacation Express operation is expected to open up additional destinations in St. Martin and Key West. Those flights could begin in the summer, but Gouldthorpe said no plans have been finalized.

Pan Am also continues to add flights in Sanford, Gouldthorpe said. Starting April 24, the airline will provide intrastate flights to St. Petersburg and Naples.

"We anticipate they will follow very shortly with service to Marathon and Tallahassee," Gouldthorpe said.

Pan Am is dropping its Allentown, Pa., and Worcester, Mass., service to and from Sanford. In its place the airline is adding a third daily flight to San Juan, Puerto Rico, and service to Freeport, Bahamas three times a week beginning May 15.

"Their demand is unbelievable for the Puerto Rico service," Gouldthorpe said. "They'll be flying three times a day, six days a week."

Airport officials are also negotiating with Pan Am to link Sanford with Miami and Newark, N.J. The airline is considering originating flights in those cities to link to Pan Am's new Latin American subsidiary.

"We think the market is there. What we have to do is convince Pan Am that this is the best use of the aircraft," Gouldthorpe said.

Overall, Gouldthorpe said he is pleased with the growth occurring at the airport. Domestic travelers continue to post substantial gains each month and boost overall passenger counts despite a decline in international passengers. The British numbers are "very soft," he concedes, primarily because of economic swings between Great Britain and the U.S.

"There are a lot of factors, Sept. 11 and anthrax scares being part of it," Gouldthorpe said. "However, we were getting this indications even before those events. The British charters are purchased so far in advance the declines were already there."

Gouldthorpe said the British haven't stop traveling, they're just not traveling to the States at the moment.

"A lot of our competitor desti-

nations have seen a big upswing in their business," he said. "My feeling is that 2003 will come back with a vengeance. I think we'll see some very big numbers."

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

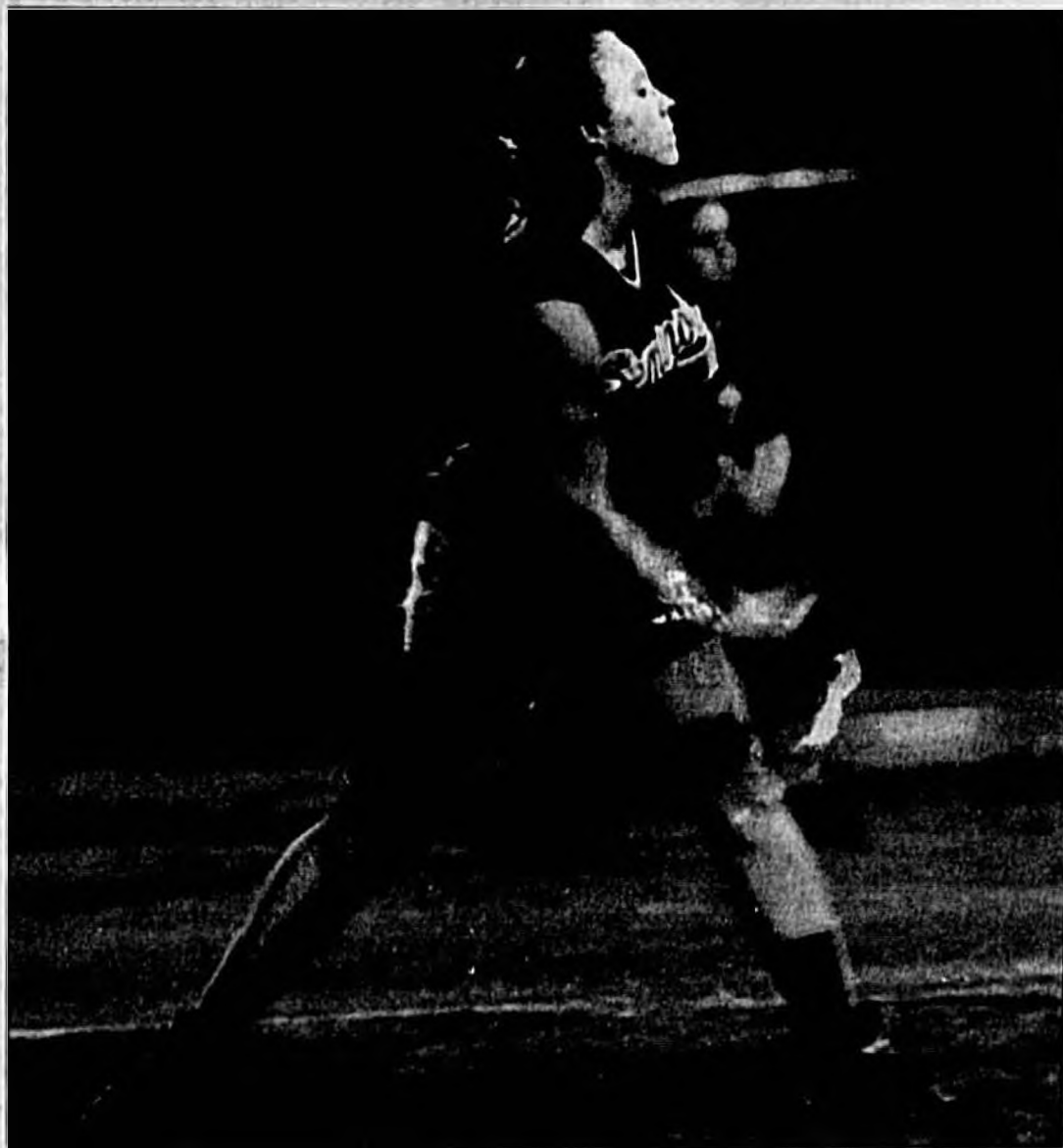

### First full scrimmage pleases Kruczek

**ORLANDO** — University of Central Florida quarterback Ryan Schneider completed 26 of 38 attempts for 280 yards, including a nine-yard touchdown to Doug Gabriel, in a two-hour scrimmage Saturday morning. It was UCF's first full scrimmage and marked the mid-point of spring drills for the Golden Knights. The scrimmage didn't start the way he wanted when the defense took a bite out of his offense, but by the time the final whistle blew UCF coach Mike Kruczek was pleased with what he saw. "It was our best practice of the spring," Kruczek said. "I was impressed with the defense. I thought they did some good things. I was very disappointed in the turnovers and lack of execution initially on offense, but overall, I was pleased." Early in the scrimmage defensive end Rashad Jeanty stormed into the backfield and sacked Schneider, forcing a fumble. The next possession resulted in a 35-yard interception return for touchdown by cornerback Asante Samuel. Later in the scrimmage the defense got on the board again when linebacker Lemec Bernard sacked Jon Rivera and returned the resulting fumble 25 yards for a touchdown. The defense registered seven sacks and two interceptions as well as four fumble recoveries during the session. "We need to make sure we get back to talking about ball security because as we know from our past that's the fastest way to get beat," Kruczek said. ## Raiders ready for stretch run

**WINTER HAVEN** — With a tough stretch of road games and the Spring Break out of the way, the Seminole Community College softball team can now get down to the business of making it to the state tournament. The Raiders started the 11-game stretch, seven of which were on the road, with a four-game sweep of a trip to South Florida that featured freshman Lacey Swarthout's fifth no-hitter of the season and a three-run rally for a victory. SCC then came home to sweep a Mid-Florida Conference doubleheader from St. Johns River Community College and split a conference doubleheader with No. 1 state ranked Lake City Community College, winning 2-0 and losing 2-1. With that split the Raiders finish the season 2-2 with the perennial national championship contenders. Coach Courtney Miller's squad then traveled to Polk Community College in Winter Haven and were very impressive in sweeping a doubleheader from NCAA Division II Fairmont State College from West Virginia before dropping a game to the

host Vikings. Heading into a crucial M-FC doubleheader at Daytona Beach Community College last night (Tuesday), SCC was 31-11 overall and ranked No. 8 in the state. In the conference, the Raiders are tied for third place with DBCC at 11-5. Lake City and Florida Community College at Jacksonville are tied for the M-FC lead with 13-3 records. Last Thursday, Daytona Beach also split a doubleheader with Santa Fe Community College of Gainesville, winning 3-2 before dropping a 3-0 decision to the Saints. Central Florida Community College from Ocala also split a doubleheader, besting St. Johns River, 10-7, before losing 3-2 in nine innings. FCC-J won four conference games last weekend, blanking Lake-Sumter Community College of Leesburg, 6-0 and 2-0, on Thursday and then also posting a doubleheader shutout, 5-0 and 11-0, over SJRCC on Friday. Trailing the top four in the conference standings are Santa Fe (6-10), St. Johns River and Central Florida (both 5-11) and Lake-Sumter (0-16). 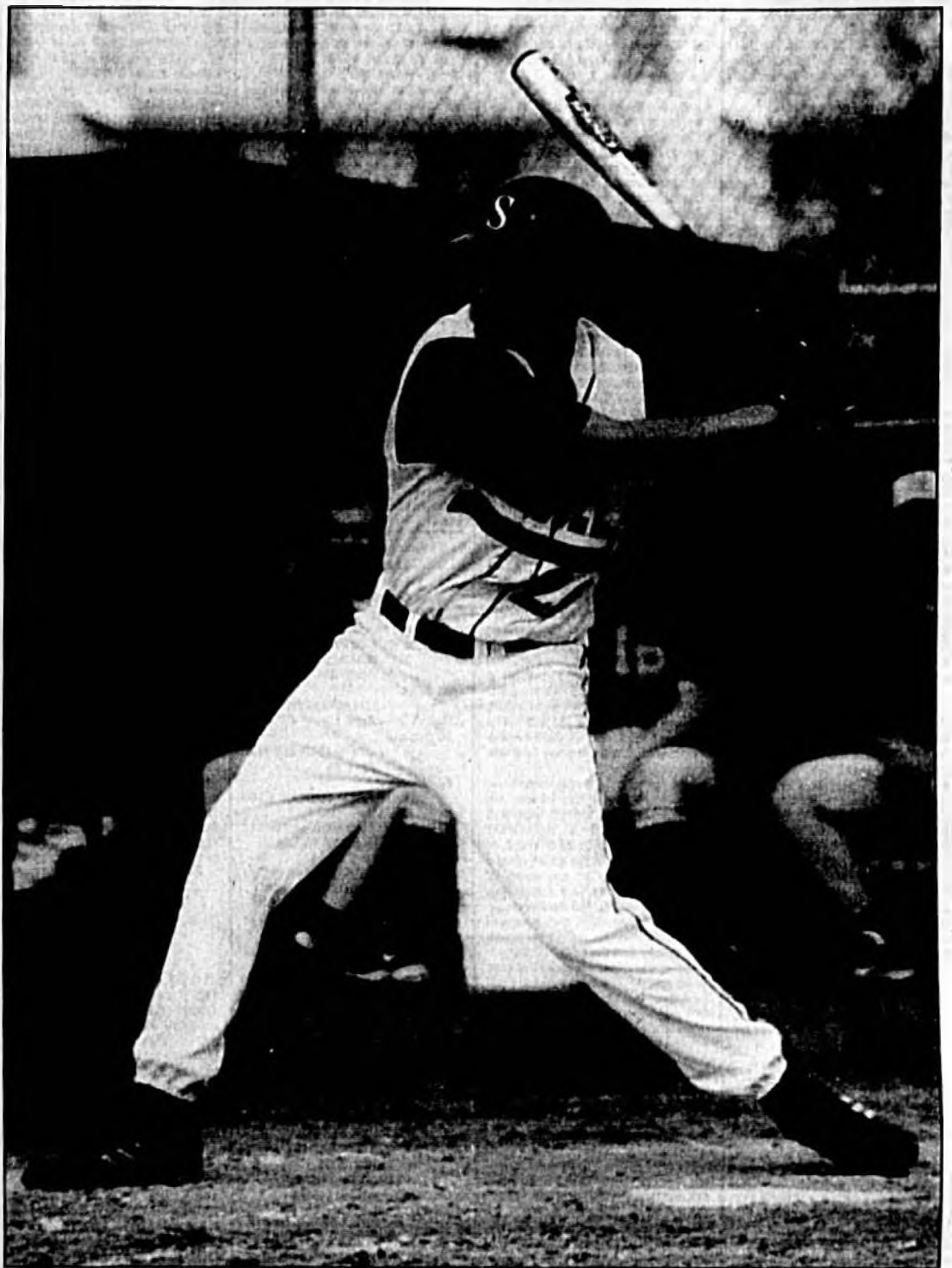

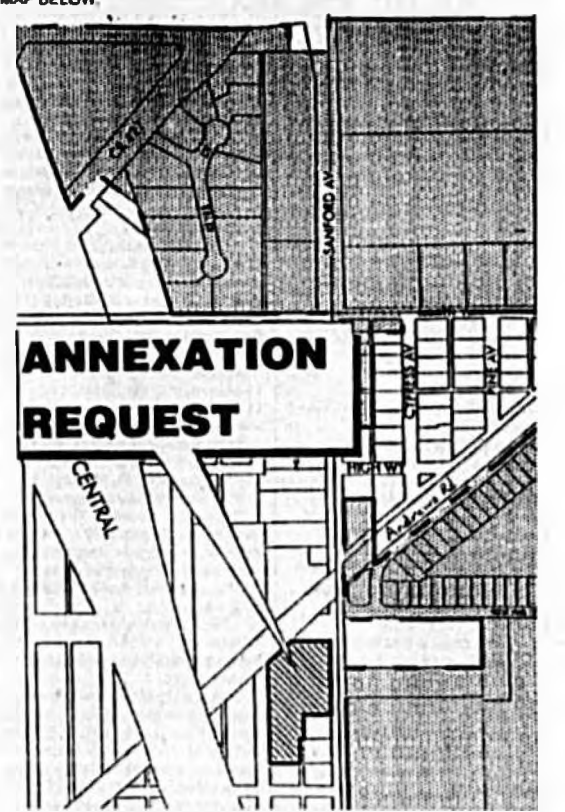

41 children interviewed in foster care case

LAKE MARY — Allegations of sexual assault in a local foster home appear to be limited to four children.

Investigators with the Lake Mary Police Department have interviewed more than 40 children assigned to the foster home of Marie Jasmin.

Jasmin, 55, was arrested last

month on charges of neglecting to report that her 18-year-old son, Jacques, was sexually assaulting children in her foster care.

The arrests followed allegations from two foster children, who were released back to their family

earlier this year, of sexual assault while under Jasmin's care. The children were interviewed by authorities, who believe Jacques molested at least four foster children within the Jasmin household.

In a public statement, Marie Jasmin has denied the allegations. Since Marie Jasmin became a certified foster parent in 1996, the

Home owners look for answers from sunrooms CEO

LAKE MARY — A group of home owners who have spent thousands of dollars for construction work that has yet to be completed job are beginning to see a shimmer of hope.

At least a dozen complaints have been filed with Four Seasons Sunrooms Inc. of New York about nonperformance of a local franchise owner.

Customers say the owner, Josh Perrotta, and his company Sunrooms of Florida have been paid an estimated \$500,000 in deposits to build sunrooms.

David Ewing, CEO of Four Seasons Sunrooms, was in Central Florida Thursday to discuss the situation with unhappy customers.

and Orlando — explained their troubles with Perrotta and discussed a palatable resolution.

As many as four dozen customers could be effected, and a statewide investigation is under way into Perrotta's business practices.

Todd Doane of Pinellas County is one of those who has filed suit.

Doane agreed to have Perrotta build a sunroom in August 2001. He paid \$17,000 as a deposit, roughly half of the contract's balance.

On March 22, Doane filed a suit for \$20,000. His anger, however, doesn't stop with Perrotta.

He bought a Four Seasons product while living in Utah and said the

Team Pain receives OK to build city's skate park

LAKE MARY — With only a slight hesitation about the company's name, City Commission Thursday gave Team Pain the go ahead to build the city's skate park.

The approval authorizes City Attorney Clay Simmons to prepare contract documents with Team Pain Enterprises Inc., for the construction of the park.

"It's normal to go to bid with a project like this," City Manager John Litton said. "But, we have the right under city code to do what is in the best interest of the city. We believe Team Pain is the best for this job."

Team Pain, based in Winter Springs, is owned by Tim Payne.

Other employees at the company include skaters with extensive design and building experience in skate structures.

Team Pain is the only concrete skate park designer on the East Coast recognized by the Skate Park Association of the United States, and Payne serves on the group's design and safety board.

"Mr. Payne was chosen as a sole source based on his extensive experience and interviews with municipal directors," Litton said.

According to Litton, the city will piggyback on the city of Deltona's contract with Team Pain, which will establish the

Authorities suspect professional thieves targeting Seminole County

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is investigating two separate reports of large thefts that indicate professional thieves are in the area.

A report from March 22 indicates one suspected location is the Interstate 4 business corridor. The sheriff's office and the Lake Mary Police Department are investigating the theft of numerous laptop computers from businesses located in Heathrow and the Primera office parks.

Suspects are two black males, early 20s, medium build and

wearing baseball caps. The suspects also may have operated a blue SUV as a get-a-way car. In one particular case at Mitsubishi Power Systems at 100 Colonial Center Parkway, approximately 18 laptop computers were stolen.

"It seems as if in these cases what we have is professional thieves with shopping lists," said sheriff's office spokesman Steve Olson.

What investigators found Wednesday is lending them to believe the stolen merchandise eventually makes it way to Miami and possibly a cargo ship.

Agency moves forward with 1st Street lights

SANFORD — A decision by the Downtown Community Redevelopment Agency appears to have flipped the switch for improved lighting on 1st Street.

Board members agreed to enter contract negotiations with the Downtown Business Association to conduct events beneficial to downtown. The contract would fund the DBA up to \$25,000, and negotiations would begin once DBA obtains and submits to the city building easements for an electrical system the organization helped improve along 1st Street.

The DBA's president, Tom Winterheimer, and founder, Sara

Jacobson, approached City Commission in January for funding and offered to give the city the electrical system in exchange for \$25,000.

That proposal stalled after disputes arose over who owned the electrical improvements. Local businesses who donated thousands of dollars in parts and labor for the

improvements claimed they made the donations to the city, not DBA. In their proposal to the CRA, Winterheimer and Jacobson said they weren't asking for payment for the electrical system.

"Call the \$25,000 whatever you want, we're seeking money to put in our treasury to produce activities that benefit downtown," Jacobson said.

Board members agreed the electrical system would provide an infrastructure to improve lighting downtown, but wanted to avoid possible legal pitfalls.

"It's a win-win situation, but it needs to be a clear win-win," said CRA board member Tom Ball.
