

Sanford Residents Report Spout Of Water On St. Johns

A water spout that formed the St. Johns River near Mallet Lake Park at about 6:00 o'clock Wednesday evening and then disappeared when rain began to fall was seen by several persons fishing in the vicinity, including Dr. W. D. Gardiner, Sanford osteopath.

Near Lake Henney, A. M. Phillips reported that he saw the water spout reaching up into the clouds and supposed that the bottom of it was in Lake Monroe. It moved about at a rate of about 10 to 12 miles an hour, but caused no apparent damage.

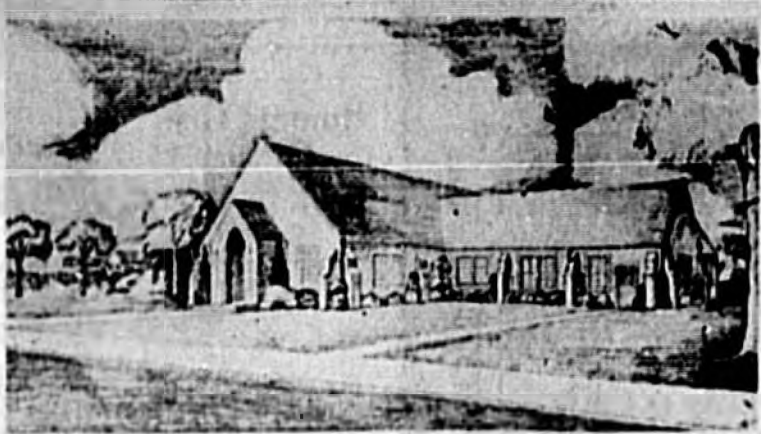

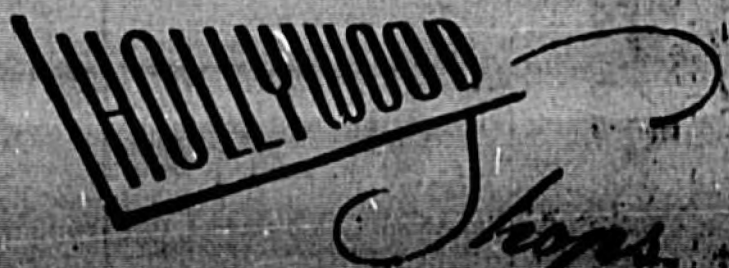

Brannan Advocates Farmers Store Up Grain For Future

WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Brannan today asked farmers to store on their farms a "substantial portion" of the huge grain crops they are producing this year.

Brannan said this would help: 1. Maintain prices of grain; 2. Relieve the jam at terminal markets; 3. Provide more orderly movement of grain.

The department has forecast a record corn crop and the second largest wheat crop in history, Brannan said.

"The pressure of fast-falling grain upon the markets has the effect of lowering prices received by farmers."

"This appeal (for farm storage) grows out of the pressure of grain upon commercial facilities which appear insufficient to accommodate the current large volume of grain that is overflowing the marketing channels."

"Transportation embargoes have had to be imposed to relieve the pressure, even though large shipments of grain are being exported under the foreign rehabilitation program."

The Secretary said this year's grain crops are the most expensive ever produced due to the high cost of materials. Farm storage, he said, would aid in protecting this investment.

(Continued from Page One) chairman, Reps. Priest (Tenn.), Kerwin (Ohio), and Mundock (Ark.), and Leslie Biffle, secretary to the Senate Democrats.

As the White House arranged the Democratic party, Republican leaders of the Senate and House majorities gathered this morning to discuss strategy for the session. They plan another meeting tomorrow after hearing Mr. Truman's program.

The Republican high command decided today to make no motions on a legislative program until President Truman puts his extra session recommendations before Congress tomorrow.

House Speaker Martin (Mass.) told newsmen after a meeting of Senate and House leaders that "no decisions" were made, Martin added.

"We want to hear what the President has to say tomorrow before making up our minds definitely."

"Like the boys at Hunter Hill, we are not going to fire until we see the whites of their eyes," Martin then walked into the House chamber and rapped to order the session summoned by Mr. Truman in the midst of the 1948 presidential and congressional campaigns.

The meeting of Republican chiefs, held in Martin's office was attended by Senators Taft (Ohio), Vandenberg (Mich.), Wherry (Neb.), and Millikin (Col.), and Reps. Hallock (Ind.), Brown (Ohio) and Avedis (Ill.). It lasted almost an hour and a half.

Vandenberg called the chamber to order after the GOP meeting. Sixty-five senators answered the roll call. The Senate remained in session only 11 minutes and quit until tomorrow.

Senator Wherry (Neb.), the acting majority leader, and Senator Taft (Ohio) both said no definite program of legislation will be agreed upon until after Mr. Truman's message is received.

Taft said there "is some sentiment to meet and adjourn" after the President's speech but that he doubts many congressmen favor this.

"I think we'll probably meet every day," Taft told a reporter. "That's what we're here for."

Other Republicans said the only part of Mr. Truman's expected program now ready for Senate action are three civil rights bills — anti-lynch, anti-poll tax and one to set up a fair employment practices commission.

Southerners have promised a filibuster if any attempt is made to bring these measures up. Senator Russell (Texas) said that Southern Democratic senators will confer on civil rights legislation later today or tomorrow.

Russell told reporters it would be for the purpose of "renewing our determination" to fight any effort to pass civil rights measures at the special session.

Farm Wage Rates Soar To New Highs

ALBANY, N. Y., July 24 (AP)—The hired hands' wages on farms in New York state now are more than four times those prevailing in the 1910-11 period, the State Agriculture Department said today.

Farm wage rates by the day on July 1 averaged \$5.30 with board and \$6.50 without board. The wage level was "nearly the same" as those a year ago, a joint federal-state report announced.

Monthly wages, in addition to board and lodging furnished by the farmer, averaged \$105, the report said.

The rates were nearly twice those reported at the peak of the 1930's after World War one and more than double, the July, 1941, rates, it said.

They stated that after investigation by their engineers and accountants of the figures as presented by the City, that they were substantiated, and declared that since the City Charter provides sufficient authority to borrow such an amount, there is no reason that the loan can not be made."

"The representatives of Sanford," Mr. Higgins declared, "secured the interview with the idea of preliminary talk with the RFC officials about the possibility of such a loan. However, the application was complete enough to merit its acceptance as a project, and their investigation will start immediately."
