



## **Cost Of Municipal Government Shows** Signs Of Increase WASHINGTON, July 11.-(AP)

WASHINGTON, July 11.-(AP) -The cost of governing American cities mounted \$39,000,000 in 1929, driving the municipal debt \$304,-000,000 upwards. That is what the census bureau reported in making public yester-day 1929 financial statistics for 250 cities having a population of over 80,000. The total net munici-pal debt was \$6,130,289,500, a 5 percent increase over 1928 and over one-third the public debt of the federal government. Mubicipar payments on costs of government the bureau said, were two-thirds greater than similar payments on the federal govern-ment for the fiscal year 1929." 
