WORLD COMMERCE COMBINE WOULD ACQUIRE LANDS IN VENEZUELA OIL AREA

ASSISTANT SECRETARY OF COMMERCE HAS BEEN URGED FOR HEAD NOT CONFIRMED

But Huston Says He May Have An Announcement to Make

WASHINGTON, March 8.—C. H. Huston of Tennessee, Assistant secretary of commerce, is expected to resign in the near future to accept the presidency of the World Commerce Corporation, a new organization now being formed in New York and Pittsburgh for the purpose of acquiring control of oil lands in Venezuela and Central America and establishing a shipping service to market the product.

Huston would not confirm the reports today that he had actually signed a contract with the corporation, but indicated that he might have an announcement to make on the subject before the end of the week.

EXPORT TRADE IS INCREASING IN FARM CROPS

UNITED STATES MUST HAVE GREATER OUTLET, SAYS HOOVER

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Exporters of agricultural products and representatives of agricultural organizations are being asked by the commerce department, Secretary Hoover has announced, to serve on a special commission that will investigate the foreign trade outlook for farmers.

Under an appropriation of \$500,000 made by congress to investigate what combinations are in existence or in process of formation abroad to hold up the price of raw products, such as rubber, which are imported in the United States in large quantities and to consider whether new sources of supply can be developed on American soil, the department was also authorized to make a special study of the international trade situation with respect to agriculture. The commission now being formed whose membership will be announced shortly will plan and direct the investigation.

"Agriculture produces almost one half of our total exports," a department statement said. "During the last three years there has been an apparently slight over-production in the United States which seriously affected agricultural questions and the question arises as to how temporary this situation may be and what the future prospects are."

"During the ten years before 1923, our production did not keep up with our consumption and the increased consumption was reflected in a decreasing margin of exportable surplus to an average of about \$500,000 tons per annum just before the war. In the ten years since that time, production has steadily increased, not only sufficiently to provide for 13,000,000 increase in population but so that exports have increased to about 17,000,000 tons per annum. In the meantime the farmer population has not kept pace with the general population, there having been but little increase in the number of farmers.

"It is proposed that there should be an exhaustive investigation of the facts as to the proportion of exports to the total of each crop, those facts which bear upon the trend of increased production and increasing consumption at home, the gradual shifting in the world's demand for different foodstuffs, the tendency of agricultural production abroad, the finance of exports, the efforts of the various trade factors upon the whole question of marketing, the better preparation of produce for foreign markets and aids to export, the possibilities of shipment to destination instead of rehandling in foreign countries, and various factors in understanding of the changing character of market.

BONAR LAW STATED TODAY TREATY UNSUIT'D

IN MANY WAYS BUT THE GRAND NATIONAL ASSEMBLY GAVE AUTHORITY

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, March 8.—Prime Minister Bonar Law, in the House of Commons today stated an official statement from the Turkish authorities at Angora relayed by the British high commissioner at Constantinople was to the effect that the draft of the treaty presented at Lausanne was considered unsuitable but the grand national assembly by a great majority had given authority for continuance of peace negotiations.

Up to the time of going to press we have not obtained his statement and it is rumored that he has left the city and it is not known whether he will return and attempt to reside here or not.

RESERVE BANK STATEMENTS SHOW CITRUS MOVEMENT EXCEEDS 1922

Combined Figures Show Increase of 3,390 Cars for Season Through January—Groves Reported in Satisfactory Condition

ATLANTA, March 8.—The movement of both oranges and grapefruit from Florida this season has exceeded the movement a year ago, according to the monthly business review of the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta, which has just been made public. Combined figures show an increase of 3,390 cars for the season through January. The total movement of oranges this season has amounted to 13,663 cars, compared with 11,349 cars to the same date last year, and the movement of grapefruit has totalled 8,324 cars, as against 7,254 cars for the season through January, 1922. At 360 boxes to the car, this shows a movement of over 2,900,000 boxes this season, and estimates indicate that probably about 50 per cent of the crop has been moved. In some of the eastern markets prices are somewhat higher on oranges, the review says, notwithstanding the heavy movement. In the Middle West the trade is generally well supplied and prices are easier. Grapefruit prices are somewhat easier in some markets where excessive quantities have been offered.

Groves are reported to be in a very satisfactory condition, according to the review, and are not suffering for rain. The mild weather in January caused some apprehension, but the more recent cool weather has been generally beneficial, checking new growth on trees and lessening the danger from late cold.

Severance Granted For Middleton at Beginning of Case

WEST PALM BEACH, March 8.—The trial of J. C. Middleton, one of the three alleged bank robbers who are charged with holding up the Stuart Bank last May when more than \$8,000 was taken, bank officers say, was begun yesterday. A motion of the state attorney to sever this case from that of Hanford Mobley and Roy Matthews, the other two men indicted jointly with Middleton who escaped from the Broward county jail on Dec. 14, was granted.

Witnesses for the state included the two Stuart bank officials and a citizen who testified that they were in the bank at the time of the robbery and who identified Middleton as one of the three men connected with the robbery. Sheriff R. C. Baker of this county told the story of the capture of the men.

Police officers from Lakeland and Plant City related the story of the capture of the two men in Plant City alleged to have been Mobley and Middleton. The case was not concluded, only about half of the state's witnesses being examined and is expected to occupy most of the court session today. Middleton was represented by D. M. Gornito of Jacksonville.

Automobile Production Reached High Point Since Last August

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 8.—Automobile production in January increased to the highest point reached since last August, according to reports received by the Department of Commerce. The output of passenger-cars increased from 204,372 cars in December to 221,697 cars in January, while the output of trucks declined from 20,935 cars in December to 19,206 in January. Passenger car production was almost three times as large as in January, 1922, while truck production was more than double the January 1922 output.

French Government Will Ask for Vote on Armaenit Conference

(By The Associated Press) PARIS, March 7.—The French government will ask the Chamber of Deputies to vote on the ratification of the treaties signed at the Washington armaments conference, Minister of Marine told the chamber this morning when Vice Admiral Guepratte asked the status of the Washington treaties.

(By The Associated Press) BERLIN, March 7.—The coup d'etat planned to occur about the middle of March has been nipped in the bud by the arrest of fifteen persons at Munchich, according to authorities.

Charles Schwab Comes Home Ill, Abandoned Trip

(By The Associated Press) PARIS, March 7.—Charles M. Schwab has been compelled by the state of his health to abandon his trip to the Ruhr and unoccupied Germany and will sail for home on the Aquitania Saturday. Schwab was taken with an attack of grippe shortly after leaving New York and forced to remain in bed most of his stay in London.

Receivers Appointed for Steel Enterprise, Public Interested

Commission Accepts Vestel's Withdrawal; City Without Chief

ORLANDO, March 8.—Orlando today was without a chief of police. The resignation of Chief Vestel was accepted by the city council, Mayor Duckworth, however, refused to swear in E. P. Egerton, the choice of Commissioners Manuel and Sutherland. First Lieut. Davis was holding down the chief's desk yesterday. The commissioners have not stated yet just what steps will be taken to have Mr. Egerton sworn in.

Shortly after 1 o'clock following a conference, Commissioners Sutherland and Manuel announced Egerton would assume the duties of chief of police. He had been sworn in early in January by Commissioner Manuel but the chief's refusal to give up office prevented his taking over his duties. The commissioners claim, in such an emergency as has arisen, they have the power to swear in a chief of police over the protest of the mayor.

Reforestation Must Be Carried Out By U. S., Says Wallace

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 8.—A national policy to conserve and develop American timber supplies was urged yesterday by Secretary Wallace of a department of agriculture and Hugh B. Baker, executive secretary of the American Paper and Pulp Association, in opening hearings of the special senate committee on reforestation. The days of self-sustaining supplies of lumber have passed in the United States, the committee was told by Secretary Wallace, who declared that a scientific and economical program of conservation and reforestation must be prosecuted.

Fire protection and reduced taxes to stimulate forestry development were the principal measures proposed by the secretary and Mr. Baker. Mr. Wallace also suggested federal acquisition and development of a large part of the existing 81,000,000 acres of barren cut-over timber land. With an annual consumption of seven million tons of paper annually, with an embargo of paper annually, with an embargo on pulp wood threatened to increase and with constantly decreasing domestic supplies, Mr. Baker told the committee the reforestation was a vital problem to the paper industry.

ACQUITTED

Irwin, formerly pastor of a local church, was acquitted on a charge of arson in an instructed verdict rendered by a jury in district court here late yesterday. The charge grew out of a fire at Rev. Irwin's church on the night of April 22, 1922.

SO-CALLED TORTURE MACHINE WAS PART OF ROAD WORKING MACHINERY EXPERTS DECLARE

Bodies of Daniel and Richards Were Run Over and Crushed by Road Tractors

(By The Associated Press) BASTROP, La., March 8.—Persons who have examined carefully the report of pathologists on the condition of the mutilated bodies of Watt Daniel and T. F. Richard, found in Lake Lafourche last December and who are familiar with the mechanical devices declare they believe they identified the so-called torture machine as one of the many road or farm tractors in use throughout the parish. The bodies of the two men when found were crushed and broken in a methodical manner. One of the authorities has received numerous anonymous letters from plantation owners and farmers of the state suggesting that a tractor must have been used and arguments to sustain the theory are similar to those advanced here. Experiments with tractors have been made recently and it has been determined that a certain type would crush a body as those of Daniel and Richard were mutilated.

NEAR EAST SITUATION IS UNSETTLED

LAUSANNE TREATY NOT ACCEPTED—NEW ONE MUST BE MADE

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Administration officials are awaiting full information as to the situation relative to the Lausanne treaty between Turkey and the allied governments before reaching a decision as to what steps toward negotiation of a new treaty with Turkey will be undertaken. Official word was still lacking today as to the action of the Angora parliament in voting to reject the Lausanne peace pact. It was said officially that while restoration of peace between Turkey and the powers appeared to be a desirable condition precedent to negotiation of a new treaty, it was not essential. The United States has never been at war with Turkey and its situation is wholly different from that of European powers.

In sending Ambassador Child and his colleagues to Lausanne to participate in the treaty negotiations, however, the Washington government recognized that many of its problems as to Turkey were similar to those of those powers. It was hoped that a peace pact would be signed, worked out and ratified, that would form a good basis for the Turkish-American treaty.

Until the final determination of the Angora authorities as to the peace treaty, is definitely known here and the resulting situation can be scrutinized, there is little prospect that the state department will take up the matter of negotiation of a treaty with the present Turkish government. Officials are said to feel that nothing could be gained by haste or the initiation of negotiations until there is good reason to believe that the time is ripe and there is every reasonable prospect that a satisfactory treaty will result. They are described as watching developments in the Near East for the purpose of determining when that time has arrived.

PEACOCK DISQUALIFIED

(By The Associated Press) DE LAND, March 8.—County Judge Peacock was disqualified as a committing magistrate in the case of Charles Pent and Lea Rodgers by a decision handed down by Circuit Judge Perkins at noon yesterday. Pent and Rodgers were charged with assault with intent to murder following the resisting arrest after forcibly disarming two klanemen on the streets of Daytona on the night of a Klan parade.

Municipalities all over Florida are writing to City Manager Anton Schneider asking for information about Lakeland's municipal light, power and water plant, it having been noised abroad that Lakeland has "a good thing" in this particular department of public service.

Lakeland is willing to admit that all the rumors are true. The plant has been, now is and will continue to be, an asset to the city. The recent publication of the official audit showed that it has been earning large dividends on the investment and that its value is increasing year after year.

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DECISIONS BY THE SUPREME COURT

TALLAHASSEE, March 8.—The supreme court has affirmed the judgment of the criminal court of record for Escambia county in the case of the State ex rel T. L. Gant, plaintiff in error, vs. the County Commissioners of Escambia county, and clerk of the board of county commissioners, defendant in error.

The supreme court has reversed the judgment of the circuit court for Okeechobee county in the case of W. R. Gary and Alex Sloan, plaintiff in error vs. Klammee River Cattle Co., et al., defendants in error.

This was a proceeding in which the circuit court ordered the removal of Gary and Sloan as trustees of county bonds. The higher court holds the removal unjustified.

The supreme court has reversed the judgment of the circuit court for Jackson county in the case of E. C. Welch, as executor, plaintiff in error, vs. State of Florida ex rel Rosetta Johnson, defendant in error.

TALLAHASSEE, March 8.—The supreme court has handed down the following decisions: Affirmed: Decree of the Circuit court for Monroe county in the case of A. R. Livingston, appellant vs. Lorena Powers and Frank J. Powers, appellees.

Reversed: The decree of the Circuit court of Hillsborough county in the case of L. H. Meeks, plaintiff in error, vs. W. M. Johnston and Wills Mae Johnston, defendants in error.

Reversed: The decree of the Circuit court of Hillsborough county in the case of Walter R. Mize, appellant, vs. Lula Mize, appellee.

In the case of the city of Miami, et al., plaintiffs in error vs. Mary E. Firth, defendant in error, the supreme court has ordered that if within 30 days after the filing of the mandate in the trial court, the plaintiff remits \$2,500 of the damages awarded the judgment will stand affirmed.

Police officers from Lakeland and Plant City related the story of the capture of two men in Plant City, alleged to have been Mobley and Middleton. The case was not concluded yesterday, only about half of the state witnesses being examined and is expected to occupy most of the court session today.

Middleton was represented by D. M. Goronto, of Jacksonville.

TO INVESTIGATE BUREAU WASHINGTON, March 3.—Complete investigation of the veterans bureau after adjournment of congress was assured yesterday when the senate adopted a resolution providing for a special senate committee of three members to conduct the inquiry.

High Winds Hit Tallahassee Killed Five Cows

And Blew Milk to Jacksonville, Skimming It En Route

TALLAHASSEE, March 7.—High wind that swept this section last night prostrated wire communication and caused some damage, killing five cows belonging to a local dairy, it is reported. Wind blew down a barn and injured 21 head of stock belonging to a dairy.

Planning to Send American Negroes to Work in Ruhr

NEW YORK, March 8.—Harry V. Dougherty, arriving on the steamship Majestic yesterday, announced that he had perfected plans to transport between 2,500 and 5,000 American negro miners to the Ruhr to work the coal mines seized by the French government.

At least 500 non-union miners from the West Virginia coal fields will be sent on the Orleana, which sails on March 15, said Mr. Dougherty. "They will be followed by other shipments as fast as the men can be collected."

Mr. Dougherty said Ambassador Jusserand of France had received assurances in Washington that no international complications would ensue. The negroes will receive \$7.00 a day in addition to board and lodging, he said, and will receive compensation in event of injury.

Arab labor was given a trial by the French, but failed to prove hardy enough to withstand the gas and hard work, Mr. Dougherty said.

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Secretary Hughes authorized a statement last night that he had never heard of a plan to transport American negroes to Europe to work in the coal mines in the Ruhr. He did this after being informed that Harry V. Dougherty had announced he intended to carry out such a project, that Ambassador Jusserand of France, had discussed the matter with Mr. Hughes and that the secretary of state had given assurances that no international complications would result.

It was stated that no such proposition, or any of a similar nature, had been discussed with Mr. Hughes by Ambassador Jusserand or anyone else. At the French embassy it was declared that nothing was known of the Dougherty plan or of Dougherty. A statement was authorized that any announcement by Dougherty that the proposal had been laid before Secretary Hughes by the French ambassador was "pure fabrication."

STORM IN NEW YORK TAKES ITS TOLL OF LIVES

NEW YORK, March 8.—Three persons are dead, one dying and several injured is part of the toll enacted here by a snow storm which lasted from Tuesday forenoon until yesterday morning.

Two of the victims were found dead in snow banks. The third slipped from an icy platform and was killed by a train.

**To Abolish Convict Lease System in State, Rep. Stokes Has Bill**  
Also Has Good Ideas on Building the State Roads

**(By The Associated Press)**  
PANAMA CITY, Fla., March 8.—Representative J. Ed. Stokes, of Bay county, will introduce a measure in the coming legislature to abolish the county convict leasing system, he declared in a statement made public yesterday. Mr. Stokes, who is a candidate for speaker of the house, pointed out that he introduced a measure looking to this end in the 1921 session but that it was lost. He then put through a local bill abolishing the system so far as it applied to his county.

Although Mr. Stokes has not shaped up any definite legislative program he made known that he was interested in road building legislation and was giving the subject considerable study. He is confident, he said, that there needs to be a large amount of work in this connection and that the present system should be changed.

"We will never have a system of good roads in this state," he declared, "until the four trunk lines are completed and every county seat connected by a hard surfaced road with one of those main highways. All work and consideration should be in this direction."

Mr. Stokes said he would be favorable to legislation which would designate the work to be done on the main highways and providing for a system of county seat laterals. He would favor legislation that for this purpose would divide the state into four sections and split the road monies and construction forces between them in proportion to their mileage of the designated roads. The legislature under his plan would designate the work and kind of work to be done on the four main lines and the county seat laterals. Each of the four sections of the state—the congressional districts might be used, he said—would then receive a proportionate share of the money available for construction purposes and the road forces at the disposal of the state. Should any county have road forces of its own and desire to build its own road connecting the county seat with a trunk highway, the state would supervise the work and provide for the material.

A contingent fund should be set aside in the road budget, under this plan, he stated, to provide for bridges that ordinarily would absorb the entire allotment of its section.

The legislature in drawing up its program should designate, Mr. Stokes said, that the work on the trunk lines come up to the specifications required by the federal government in order that they would receive federal aid.

**Kill Them All, Said Hugh Willis, In Herrin Riots**  
Witness Points Out Willis in Crowded Court Room

MARION, Ill., March 8.—Hugh Willis, state board member of the Illinois Mine Workers, was pointed out from the witness stand at the second Herrin riots trial yesterday as the man who gave an order to "kill them all," after a mob had taken 18 non-union workers from the mine of the Southern Illinois Coal company last June. The accusation was made by Robert Tracy, a survivor of the riots. At the time of the outbreak, he testified, he was firing a locomotive at the mine and was a union man being a member of the International Brotherhood of Steamshovel Workers and Dredge Men.

"Don't kill these men on the public highway where there are women and children," he quoted Willis as saying. "Take them over into the woods and don't let one get away; kill them all."

The witness also picked out Otis Clark from among the six defendants charged with the murder of Antonio Malkovitch, former soldier, veteran of the Somme and Argonne and one of the victims of the tragedy.

Tracy testified he had seen Clark walk up to C. K. McDowell, crippled superintendent of a mine, and another victim of the riot, curse him and beat him over the head with the butt of a pistol. He said Clark told McDowell,

"I'm going to kill you and tear you into pieces for bait to catch fish with, you scab—"

Tracy testified that the unarmed prisoners were taken into the woods, after Willis had driven up in an automobile and said to "kill them all." He said one bullet struck him as he ran but that he escaped by swimming a small lake.

On cross examination Tracy said that after the firing on the men had started he got a gun and went to the top of one of the mine buildings and returned the fire.

"Who did you shoot at," he was asked.

"I shot at those who were firing at me."

John Shaffner, a clerk in a Herrin hardware store, testified some men had come into the store the morning of the riot and had asked for guns and ammunition, saying: "The local is good for it."

The witness said he refused to give them any guns without an order and that a little while later some one called him on the telephone and said: "This is Hugh Willis. The boys want some guns and ammunition to shoot birds. You let them have it. I will make it right."

## Two Drown When Seaplane Falls Into Delaware River

PHILADELPHIA, March 8.—Lieutenant Robert M. Farrar, a naval aviator and Stephen E. Sullivan, his mechanic, were drowned yesterday when their seaplane fell in the Delaware river off Gibbstown, N. J., seven miles south of the Philadelphia navy yard, from where they had started for Washington 19 minutes before.

Another seaplane was dispatched to the scene from the navy yard and with the assistance of a number of small boats the partly submerged machine was towed to the shore.

The aviators were found strapped in their seats. Their bodies were taken to the naval hospital here, awaiting word from relatives. Lieutenant Farrar, who resided in Washington, and his mechanic were stationed at the Anacosta naval air station at Washington. Sullivan enlisted from Chicago.

### Mrs. Saludes Found Guilty of Murder in the Second Degree

NEW YORK, March 8.—Mrs. Pauline Saludes, the second woman to be convicted of murder in this city within three weeks, made three unsuccessful attempts at suicide last night.

The jury, composed of men of "sound minds and good hearts," found Mrs. Saludes guilty of second degree murder, that carries a prison sentence of from twenty years to life. Less than three weeks ago a jury in Brooklyn returned a similar verdict against Mrs. Lillian Raizen for the slaying of Dr. Abraham Glickstein.

Mrs. Saludes shot Martelliere October 16 and on that day was prevented from ending her life when she attempted to leap from a window in her attorney's office.

It was here that she drew from her hiding place in her glove the little tin box that contained, police said, brass polish, but which looked like rouge. In this was believed to have been inserted a pellet of poison.

She tossed something down her throat and straightway crumpled in the arms of her attendant. Groaning and struggling with the deputies, Mrs. Saludes then tried to slash her throat with the brass hinge of the vanity box, but was prevented from doing herself serious injury. She was carried to the cell, where the prison physician hurried with a stomach pump, and despite her frantic attempts to prevent its use she was revived. It was then that she dashed herself against the wall of her cell, but again she was thwarted in her plan of self-destruction.

NASHVILLE, March 8.—Sam Haston, brother of the secretary of state, his mother, and sister and Tullus Trogen, a boy living on the Haston place and a fifth man were shot at the family home three miles from Spencer early this morning by Lewis Douglas, a negro paroled convict who also escaped after the shooting and is being sought by a posse. It is understood that the members of the Haston family were sitting up with Mrs. Sam Haston, who was seriously sick and who died this morning at 9 o'clock.

A report reached Nashville that Mrs. George Haston cannot live, and Sam Haston had both legs broken by the negro's shots. Secretary Haston left here at 8:30 this morning for Spencer taking bloodhounds with him. Douglas, the negro, was sent to prison in 1915 from Shelby county on a charge of arson and was sentenced to from five to twenty-one years.

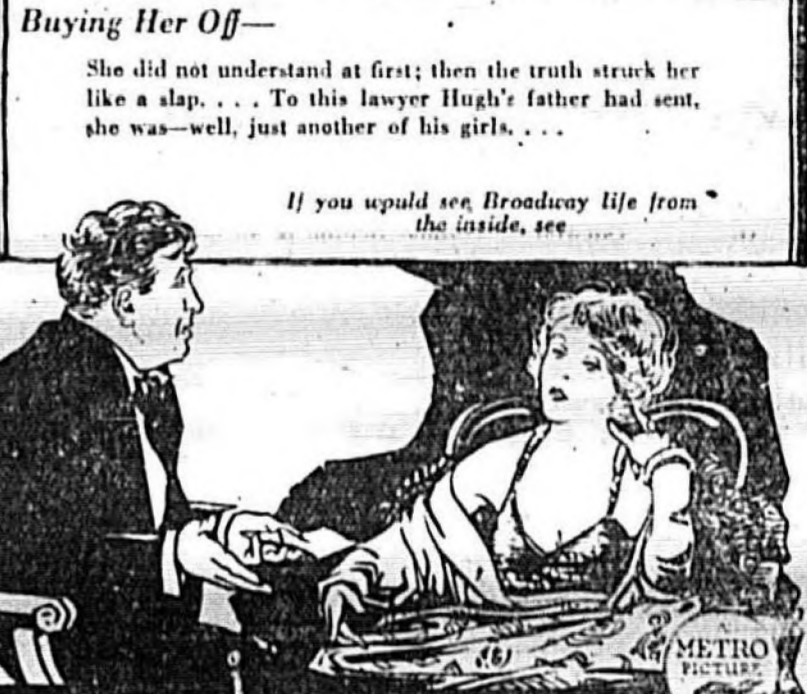
