



Railroads Losing Volusia County Money On Service Of Food And Drink

NEW YORK A The nation's railroads say they are losing mil lions of dollars by serving food and drink to passengers.

Many a dining car patron may raise an eyebrow at this, thinking that prices are so high the roads must be making money off of meals.

The Interstate Commerce Com mission backs them up. It says the combined dining and buffet revenues of the roads last year was 79 million dollars, while ex penses totalled 110 million dollars The roads blame the 31 million dollar loss on high costs of labor and food, and the licenses and tax es they pay in the states where they operate.

The Pennsylvania Railroad says that in June labor costs in the dining car took 70 cents of each dollar of revenue. Food costs too' 41 cents. Other costs added to the

Labor costs are higher in diners than in restaurants, they point out, because a waiter can serve fewer persons in a car than in a cafe, and because crews have to be car-ried idle for hours to be ready

Why Don't They Vote?

Why don't Americans vote? President Tr/man calls attention to the fact that in 1948 only 51 per cent of those eligible went to the polls, as against 75 per cent in Canada and France, 89 per cent in Italy and 90 per cent in Belgium. The situation is getting worse. In 1900, the second McKinley-Bryan contest, 73 per cent of the electors voted, and in 1880, when Garfield beat Hancock, 78 per cent. At this rate in another 20 years only one out of every three Americans will trouble to cast a ballot.

Various reasons might be alleged. The adoption of woman suffrage made eligible a new class of voters who had not been accustomed to the use of the ballot. After 30 years, however, this consideration must be less important. The automobile, the radio and television have complicated life, leaving less time for such duties of citizenship as following public affairs and voting intelligently.

Robert L. Smith, Middleburg, Pa., was married Monday night in the little chapes at Fort Lincoln Cemetery to Barbara Borm, a pretty 17-year-old brunette of Takoma Park, Md.


