

Jim Tobin Homers But Loses 4 to 2 Contest To Phils

Old St Johnson Handcuffs Boston Club With Seven Blows

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 5. (AP)—The Philadelphia Phils made five hits off Jim Tobin and victory yesterday but it was losing pitcher Jim Tobin of the Boston Braves who stole the show as the Phils triumphed 4-2.

Tobin blasted a seventh-inning pitch into the upper left field stands for a home run, scoring Bibby Sisti ahead of him, and thereby tied the National League mark of season home runs for pitchers which Hal Schumacher of the New York Giants set in 1934. Yesterday's circuit-clout was Tobin's sixth of 1942.

Uncle Sisti Johnson, veteran hurler, went the route for the Phils, limiting the Braves to seven hits, to gain his first victory since July 5.

The Phils scored in the second on a walk to Nick Eiten, Ron Northey's single and Bobby Bragan's infield out. They added two more on a pair of hits and Tobin's wild throw in the fifth. In the fourth, Hudson reached first on an error, went to third on Case's double and scored on Stan Spence's long fly to center.

Army Engineers Build Town For Jap Evacuees

CODY, Wyo., Aug. 5. (WW)—In the sage country of northern Wyoming, Army engineers are finishing a town for 10,000 Japanese in just 60 days.

A barracks-type apartment building for six families is built from foundation to roof in 59 working minutes.

There'll be 486 of these apartment houses in the 19-block site of the Heart Mountain Japanese relocation center. The center is 12 miles north of Cody, familiar to American travelers as the eastern gateway into Yellowstone National park.

The Heart Mountain camp, complete with modern sewerage disposal plant and a water system with a million-gallon reservoir and filtration plant, will become Wyoming's fifth largest city, five times larger than Cody itself.

The first nail on the center project was pounded June 8, Japanese evacuees including millionaires industrialists, fishermen, farmers and laborers—will be moved in about Aug. 15, from crowded temporary assembly cen-

ters in California, Washington and Oregon.

Ten such camps now are mushrooming in the empty spaces of the mountain states and in Arkansas.

All are rush jobs because the western defense command wants the Japanese shifted as quickly as possible into interior areas where a saboteur can find little but wide open spaces to work on.

Mechanized Germans Develop New Pincers Threat To Stalingrad

Nazis' Sacrifice Of Lives Is Reported To Be Tremendous; Reds Lose Ground

(By Associated Press)

Germany's mechanized armies, fast closing an octopus-like stranglehold on the upper Caucasus, reported the fall of Tikhoretsk on the Caucasian railway 90 miles south of Rostov today and developed a new pincer threat to the great Volga River steel center Stalingrad.

Tikhoretsk is on the Stalingrad-Novorossiysk railway, terminating at the Black Sea just below the Kerch strait. Moscow said the Red army is taking new positions along a strong line east of the Don River, driving back a powerful German tank assault 95 miles southeast of Stalingrad.

A second big-scale battle is in progress in the Kletskaya sector, 80 miles northwest of Stalingrad. The Soviets are sending in carefully saved reserves as the battle flames on. The Reds said the upper claw of the Nazi pincer aimed at Stalingrad has been stopped dead.

Danger in the Caucasus mounted, however, as the Germans drove new wedges into Soviet lines as a great sacrifice of lives. In Egypt, British light bombers and fighters attacked Axis positions west of El Alamein today and blasted shipping off the North African coast. The activity is limited to patrol skirmishes and artillery exchanges.

German tanks charging in herds of up to 150 smashed through the Red army defenses around Belaya Glina, 50 miles northwest of Stalingrad, and the fighting below the city.

Hard fighting continued along the Caucasus front, where the Red army men in the Kuchevka zone 60 miles to the northwest were threatened with being cut off by the drive down the railroad toward Tikhoretsk, and evidently fell back to avoid the menace.

"South of Belaya Glina our troops fought tense battles with enemy tanks and motorized infantry," the high command said. "In another sector a large detachment of German riflemen penetrated to the rear of our unit. By rapid counter-measures the Germans were surrounded and completely annihilated."

South of Kuchevka, the command said, the hard-pressed Russians repulsed repeated German attacks. One unit destroyed six German tanks, four guns and 50 machine gun nests, and more than 600 enemy corpses were left on the battlefield.

Federal Court Jury Convicts William Pelley

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 6. (AP)—William Dudley Pelley, former leader of the Silver Shirts of America, was convicted by a Federal court jury last night on 11 counts of criminal sedition and conspiracy.

Pelley's two associates, Lawrence A. Brown and Miss Marian Agnes Henderson, who were tried with him, were convicted only on count 12 of the indictment, which charged conspiracy.

Judge Robert C. Ballou immediately set August 12 at 10:00 A.M. for pronouncement of sentences. Each count carries a maximum penalty of 30 years' imprisonment and a maximum fine of \$10,000.

Floyd G. Christian, one of Pelley's attorneys, said that a motion for a new trial would be filed. If it is denied, he said, the case would be carried to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals at Chicago.

Corp. John Hart May Be Prisoner

The Seminole County Chapter of the American Red Cross has been notified by a Red Cross official that the missing Corp. John C. Hart, who was reported killed in action, may be a prisoner of war.

The official said that the Red Cross is now working to locate Hart and that he is believed to be in the hands of the Germans.

Step Is Taken In Support Of Pipeline Plan

Gas Storage Tanks Are Offered For Use Upon Barges

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6. (AP)—Senator Pepper (D-Fla.) said Wednesday a group of oil companies have offered unused bulk gasoline storage tanks for installation upon a barge barge to offset the Eastern gasoline shortage.

E. T. Brooks of Jacksonville, Fla., and A. H. Philpott of Tampa, Fla., said the tanks would hold from 18,000 to 25,000 gallons of gasoline each and six tanks could be placed upon each wooden barge.

The barges, they said, can be built readily in Florida and in other parts of the country.

Brooks said that an experienced management group of skilled workers had been assembled to begin construction.

Details of the proposal, in which Richard E. Philpott of Tampa also is interested, have been presented to the Federal agencies, Pepper said.

James Jones, Secretary of Commerce, has announced that the Defense Plant Corporation in cooperation with the Army Corps of Engineers, Inland Waterways Corporation and smaller war plants corporation, has agreed to finance a program designed to provide additional barge facilities for the transportation of oil while maintaining and improving existing inland waterway transportation.

The program calls for the conversion of existing steel barges into tank barges, and the provision of additional barge facilities to be furnished by the Inland Waterways Corporation and privately owned carriers.

Equipment to replace the steel barges will consist of the boats, tanker barges and dry cargo barges with wooden hull.

Four Members Of Georgia Family Are Murdered

WAYCROSS, Ga., Aug. 6. (AP)—Nine .38 caliber pistol balls were pumped into the bodies of four members of a farm family near Mahan, 24 miles east of Waycross, Tuesday afternoon, it was revealed after an examination of the bodies at the Mincey Funeral Home here Wednesday.

Four men, including Sheriff T. E. Raulerson, though bloodhounds were following a trail described by authorities as "a possibility."

The dead are identified here as George Riley Strickland, 65, his wife, Mrs. Mandy Strickland, and two sons, Riley, 15, and Harvey, 9.

The bodies of Strickland and his two sons were found at the Strickland farm, several miles north of Mahan, late Tuesday afternoon, by Wiley Leonard Strickland, 12, another son, when returning home from the community school.

Mrs. Strickland's body was not found until this morning, a posse stumbled over her crumpled body in a dense pine thicket about a quarter of a mile from the house. Wiley Leonard, the middle son, is the only member of the family left alive.

A coroner's jury presided over by Judge E. Kiser at Mahan was returned a verdict of "death from gunshot wound by parties unknown."

County Citizens Receive \$108,236 From State Board

622 In Seminole Get Old Age Assistance During Fiscal Year

JACKSONVILLE, Aug. 6. (AP)—Each payments to Seminole County recipients of old age assistance for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1942, totaled \$108,236, according to an announcement today of the State Welfare Board, completed.

Of June this year, there were 622 recipients of old age assistance in Seminole County, receiving aid to the tune of \$108,236. The fiscal year of the State Welfare Board paid \$8,400 to Florida recipients of old age assistance, or more than the regular appropriation of \$7,500 annually for all purposes. The increased figure was due to the fact that the Legislature for the fiscal year of 1942 provided for old age assistance to dependent children.

At June 30, 1941, 613 persons were receiving old age assistance, 213 were receiving aid to the tune of \$108,236. Families were receiving aid to dependent children.

During the year, Florida's old age recipients received a fair retail value of \$108,236, through direct distribution to certified clients, to schools participating in the school lunch program, and to blue cross stamps issued in six counties where the food stamp plan has been set up. That made in WPA sewing room the value of \$440,793 was distributed by the welfare agency.

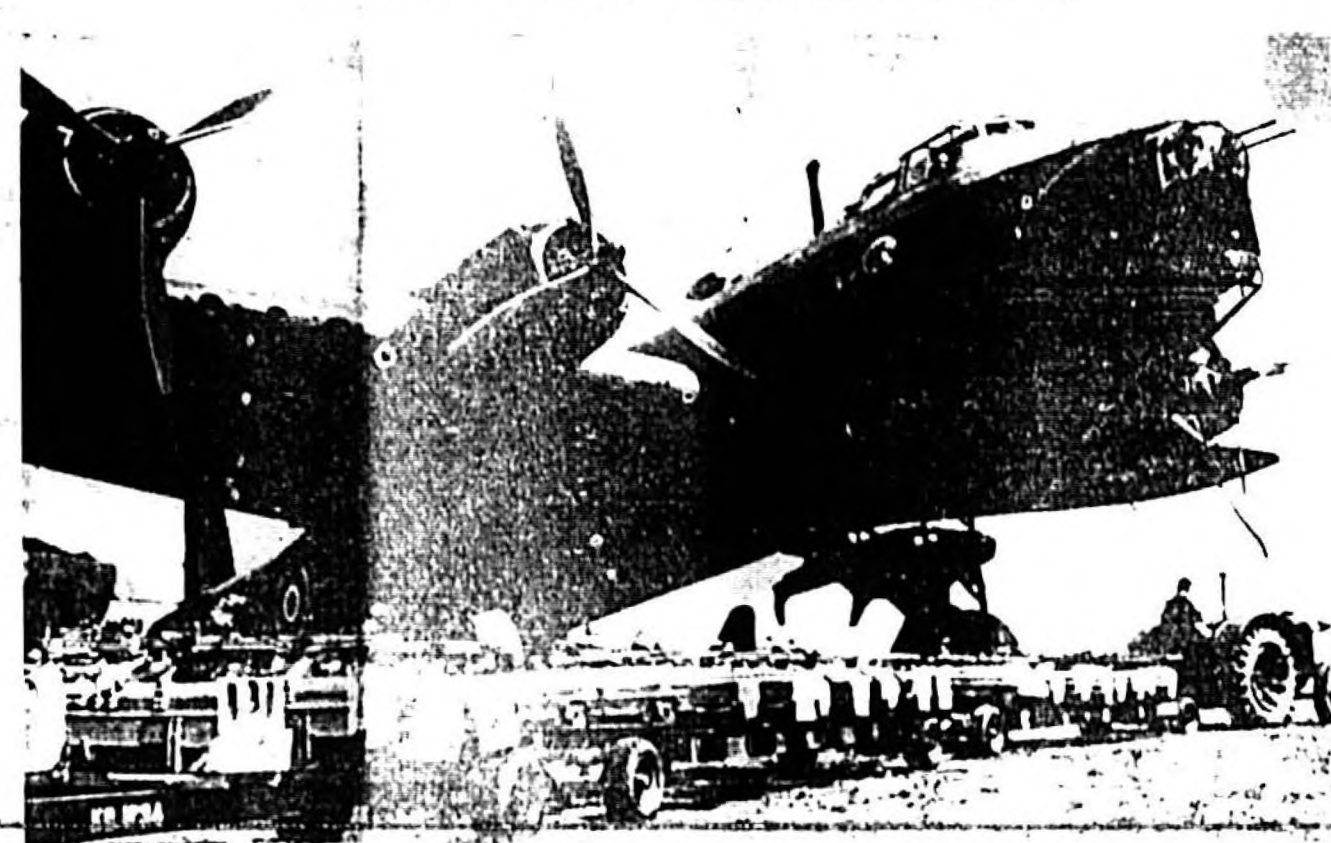

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Navy Chaplains Win Esteem For Fighting Spirit

NORFOLK, Va., Aug. 6.—"Praise the Lord and pass the ammunition! I got one of the so-and-sos!"

That line, shouted by a fighting Navy chaplain at Pearl Harbor, should go down in American history with Lawrence's "Don't give up the ship" and John Paul Jones' "I've not yet begun to fight."

Navy chaplains are no meek psalm-singers, but real men—men whom sailors respect. They have their battle station aboard ship with all the rest. Usually it is with the injured, but they are given basic training in the use of weapons and stand to a machine gun in a pinch.

It is not as fighting men, however, that Navy chaplains have really won the esteem and confidence of the men of Uncle Sam's fleet. It is because they understand the problems of homesick boys and of men who walk daily under the cloud of danger.

Here, under some trees on the grounds of the vast Norfolk Naval Operating Base, is a smallish frame building with a church-

like air—the Chaplains' School. A guest speaker was talking to the class as I arrived to visit Chaplain C. A. Neyman, head of the school, a Baptist minister who has served the Navy 24 years. The speaker was a prominent psychologist and theologian from "up north."

"I hope you can get away from the theology that I was taught," he was saying, "and translate a cold intellectual system into profound flesh and blood experiences."

A serious, spectacled man in his 30's raised his hand.

"Do you think we should use the Scriptures?" he asked.

"Yes, certainly," the speaker replied, "but your use of the Scriptures and of prayer should be determined by what the man needs."

Stranger though he was, this lecturer had hit on the principle to which the Navy educates its budding chaplains to make religion fit the Navy and its men.

"Even a minister of years' experience has to undergo a re-vamping of thinking before he can be a successful Navy chaplain," Chaplain Neyman told me. "In civilian life he would be dealing with both men and women of varying levels of society. In the Navy he is dealing with only one kind of person—fighting men, men whose lives may be hard and perilous and who have

Russian Venus Has Vital Job, Writer Reveals

MOSCOW, Aug. 6. (WW)—Upon the dainty feet of a 16-year-old Soviet girl depends at least for a couple of miles—the job of getting news of the gigantic Russian-German war to Associated Press newspapers.

Her name is Venus Nightingale, but she has the feet of Mercury.

Here is the task of running many times to and from the Associated Press office to press departments, then returning for review copy after censors in, then hoisting it through Moscow's streets in the telephone office.

Venus Nightingale runs fast for two reasons. She is loyal to The Associated Press and she likes to run.

She's just as good in snow as in sunshine.

She was hired last winter in this fashion:

"We need some one to run copy," I said to AP Secretary Sophia Tchijovy. "Try to find a boy."

"I know a girl who can out-run any boy in Moscow," said the secretary, who always was a feminist. "She's some sort of schoolgirl champion runner. Her name is Venus Nightingale in English," said Tchijovy.

Venus has competitors and they are crammed with professional jealousy. Her chief competitor is a Russianized man whose father is Italian, his mother French. He spent most of his life in China and Moscow. But he can't outrun Venus.

Recently during a hot news flash she already had beaten him
