The city council has taken cognizance of the importance of this work and this week inspected the lake shore, even going in boats to take soundings and inventigate every phase of the work.

After an exhaustive investigation the council decided to have City Attorney ville. Trade dowditions Good.

According to Dun's Review encouraging reports of business conditions predominate, and the growth of confidence in the future is evidenced by increased preparations for fall and winter trade. All the leading markets continue to reflect the quietness to be expected at this season, yet in some instances the midsummer recession has been of shorter duration than is customary. The prevailing optimistic feeling was apparently not impaired by the reported change to the growing corn crop, and the agricultural situation on the whole, is still promining. Gradual recovery in spring wheat prospects is accompanied by splendid havesting returns from the southwest, where the enormous movement of new grain is taxing the capacity of the transporting companies. The possibility of a strike on the eastern railroads is now more remote, but financial settlement was somewhat disturbed by the reduction in the dividence of a prominent system, although such action was not entirely unexpected. The revenues of a few roads show a falling off, but in the agregate railway earnings continue to exceed the total of a year ago and also those of 1911, the gains in gross during the first three weeks of July being 18 and 8.2 mar cent respect tively. On the other hand, bank clearings this week were 3.6 per cent less than in 1911. !Favorable conditions have existed in the basic industries, as indicated by the statement of the leading iron and kteel producer for the last quarfer, the net earnings surpassing oll provious records for the period, with the single exception of 1907. An improved sentiment Di manifest in dry goods circles. but the period of adjust ment to new tariff conditions is at hand and price reductions in wholken extract considerable attention. Quotations hold steady on many staples for immediate and marks deliveries, yet where orders are sought for later deliveries concentura are offered. Labor difficulties in silk manufact turing centers have been mitted. Footwear buyers who recently visited the Boston market placed a fair volume of orders, and manufacturers feel, enquiraged over the outlook. There is a moderate business in shoe leathers and prices femain firm, the steady demand checking all accumulations. Strengthening of bank reserves at New York has imparted a still easier tone to the monetary situation, and the marketing of the crops will be facilitated by large deposits of government funds in the national banks of the west and south, official an-



THE GROWERS' PROBLEM; MARKETING FRUIT AT A PROF

Exchange Presents Interesting Figures.

Tampa, Florida, August 2, 1913.

The season of the year is fast approaching when growers of citrus fruits are considering now they than season market their fruit at a profit; therefore the Florida Citrus Exchange, which is your organization, operated solely by the growers and for the growers, wishes to present some figures for consideration, to show you the average increase in price from year to year that has taken place since the growers organized the Exchange.

The first season, 1909-10, when the citrus industry was at its lowest ebb, the Exchange average per box f. o. b. Florida was \$1.15; the following season, 1910-11, the price increased to \$1.51 per box, f. o. b. Florida. For the season 1911-12, the price increased to \$1.93 per box, f. o. b. Florida, and for the season 1912-13, just closed, the Exchange average per box, f. o. b. Florida, had increased to \$1.96.

The Growers of Florida shipped through the Exchange the past season 1,780,301 boxes of citrus fruits, which amounted to only 21 91-100 per cent. of the entire crop shipped out of the State. This is certainly a marvelous showing, considering that practically 78 per cent. of the fruit in the state was outside the Exchange, yet this wonderful showing was made notwithstand-

With the amount of fruit handled last season, it cost the grower actually less than twelve cents per box to sell his fruit, as fifty-five thousand dollars have already been returned to the growers, and another refund of thirty-five thousand dollars will be made about January 1st, provided that no disaster occurs to the citrus industry between now and that time. These rebates made to the growers represent the amount in excess of actual operating expenses that was assessed last year, as it is clearly understood that the Florida Citrus Exchange does not operate for profit, but handles all fruit strictly on a basis of the actual selling

With all of these facts before the growers of Florida, we do not see a single reason why by far the largest percentage of the fruit grown in the State should not be handled by the Florida Citrus Exchange; considering the fact that it was only organized in the interest of the grower and by the growers themselves, and it is a recognized fact that it has done more than any one single concern to advance the interest of Florida, both in the increase of price for fruit and the rise in real estate values.

As has been shown, there were over eight million boxes of citrus fruits shipped out of the State last year and there is not less this year, and it is an admitted fact that the crop is a light one, compared with the acreage and bearing trees capable of producing fruit. In another year to come, it is not only possible, but very probable, that the crop of Florida will reach twelve million boxes, and if by that time the growers are not more strongly organized, the question is: What will become of it?

These are questions that deserve serious consideration, and we think that after deliberating over them, you will reach the conclusion that the only thing to do is to put your fruit through this growers' organization. The Exchange is in position at the present time to successfully market four or five million boxes of fruit with the same facilities that it now has, and when this point is reached, the growers will be marketing their fruit for less than seven cents per box.



LAW ESTABLISHING A STANDARD FOR CITRUS FRUITS

Will Be Issued By State Printer Soon Inspectors to Be Appointed By Governor

The State Chemist advises this office that as soon as the State Printer prints it, the law enacted by the legislature establishing a standard for citrus fruits will be sent out for the information of

the public.
This law provides the following standards of maturity for citrus fruits. Oranges must contain less than 1.30 per cent. citric acid; grapefruit 1.75 per cent. citric acid, from September 1 until

It is assumed that there will be no oranges or grapefruit in this State that will analyze as low as 1.80 and 1.75 per cent. prior to

September 1.

This law provides that oranges or grapefruit that show one-half colored on the tree at the time of picking shall be exempt from this acid test. The law also provides that the Governor from may, at his discretion, appoint four inspectors to serve from September 1 to November 5, After November 5, all restrictions will be removed and any oranges or grapefruit may be ship-ped from the State without interference. It is made the duty of the Pure Food Department at Taliahasses to enforce this law, which carries an appropriation of twenty-nive hundred dollars annually for its enforcement. It is not the duty of the Florida Citrus Exchange or any of its Associations or Sub-Exchanges in the State, as organizations, to attempt to enforce this law. Every good citizen, whether affiliated with an Association or not, should, and probably will, make it his or her business to see that any violation of this law is brought to the attention of the proper persons, in order that the criminals may be punished.

It is assumed that these four inspectors will be located at convenient points in the orange belt, and that they will take the necessary steps to see that no injustice is done to anyone, and that the law-abiding are not imposed upon by those who may

be disposed to violate the law. Oranges that are one-half colored on the tree will, in all probability, be sufficiently mattire to satisfy the consumer. Grape-fruit that is one-half colored may or may not be sufficiently mature. As a matter of fact, grapefruit was received at this office last year fully colored that felt in the hand like a baseball and when cut was totally unfit for consumption, as the pulp was hard and juiceless, bitter in flavor and did not taste like grapefruit.

The original law, as presented to the legislature, made no provision for color, but was strictly an acid test.

The color test was put in as an amendment, and it remains to be seen whether or not it will be used by the unscrupulous in an effort to defeat the law.

The full text of the law will be published as soon as it is received from the hands of the State Printer, and all growers are urged to read this law in connection with the act of 1911, as it

was enacted to make the law of 1911 operative.
