GAINESVILLE, Dec. 1, (Special)—Proper sanitation, an important part of successful turkey management, takes on new importance this year as Florida turkey growers plan for increased production, according to A. W. O'Steen, assistant poulty specialist with the State Agricultural Extension Service.

With a shortage of "red" meats in sight, due to heavy demands by the armed forces and a hard-working civilian army, the turkey grower by controlling and preventing flock diseases can produce and market more meat.

"By keeping turkeys for breeding purposes entirely separate from poults and poultry of all types the grower can help curb disease," Mr. O'Steen ags. "It is desirable to have all equipment for handling breeders age." It is desirable to have all equipment for handling breeders as shelters, roosts, feeders, and watering devices constructed so it can be moved easily to clean ground to avoid soil contamination or to help combat a disease outbreak."






