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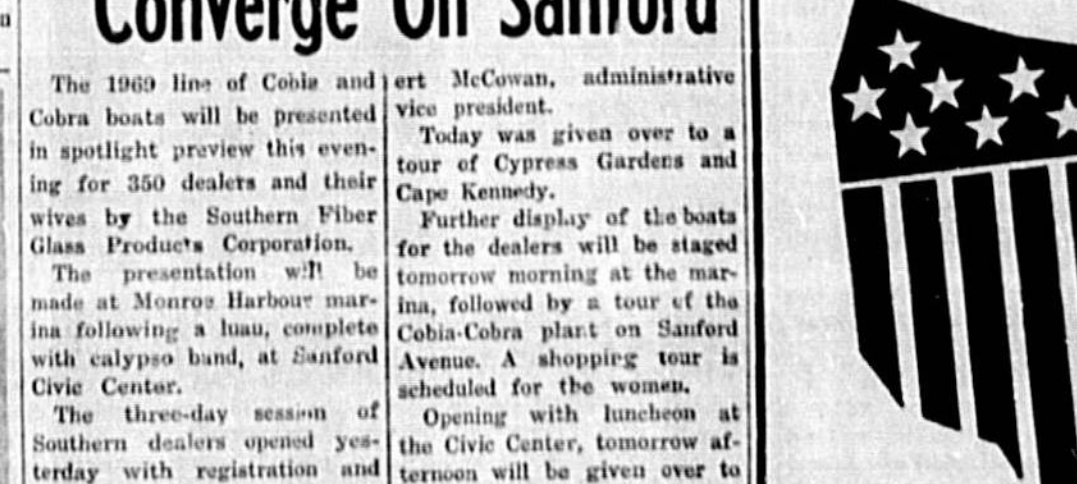

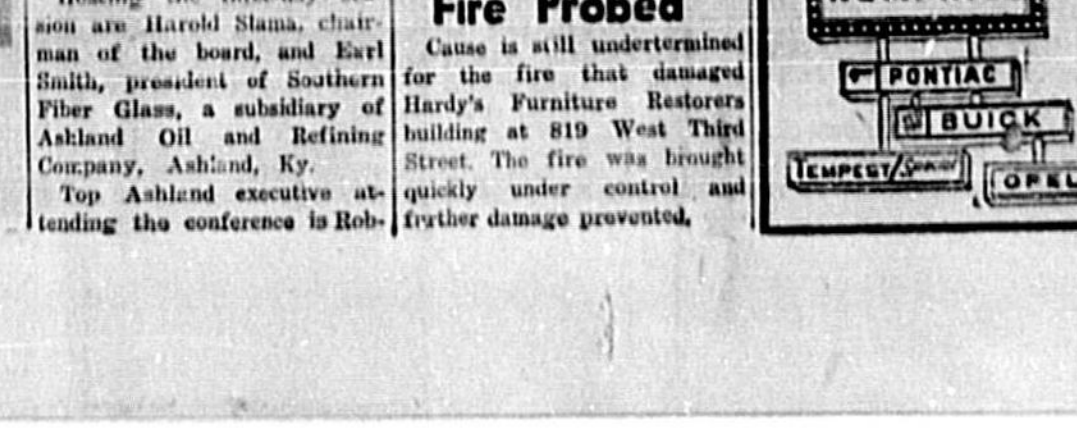

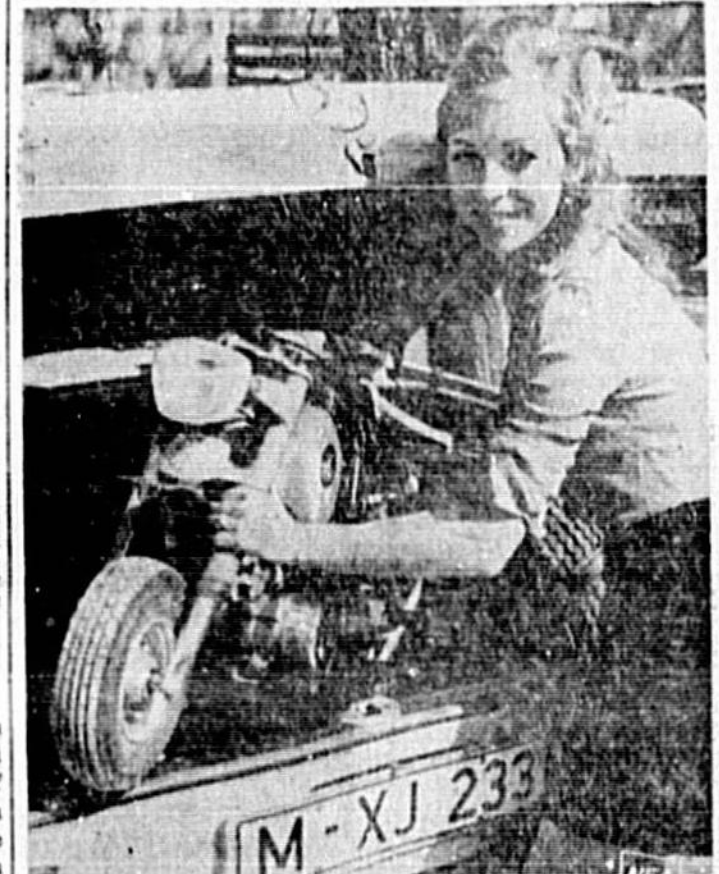

Vietnam - Johnson - Humphrey

By RICHARD WILSON WASHINGTON, D.C.—Those who have been accustomed to talking privately with Hubert H. Humphrey over a long period of time can find no reason to believe that he is wincing or shrinking when he speaks of Vietnam or U.S. policy in Southeast Asia. There is no perceptible difference between his view and that of President Johnson and that of Secretary of State Dean Rusk. Humphrey has not changed. He does not favor a Communist coalition government in South Vietnam. He does not favor stopping the bombing of North Vietnam. He does not favor some semantics like use of the word "peace" instead of "reciprocity." It all means the same thing. Anyone who has listened to both Humphrey and Secretary of State Dean Rusk will be hard put to find any real differences between them. So what about the Johnson policy? It is all about the frenetic desire of a minority around Humphrey and the left wing of the Democratic Party which has coalesced around Sen. Eugene McCarthy to shove Humphrey into what will sound like a referendum of the Johnson policy.

Czech Passive Resistance

By RAY CROMLEY WASHINGTON (UPI)—If the German occupation of Czechoslovakia is a precedent, the Soviet Union may be for some surprise.

The Russians, of course, have more than enough power to put down open opposition and armed revolts. They can remove Czechoslovakia's top men and put in Quislings of their own will. But in four centuries under foreign rule the Czechs have polished the techniques of quiet passive resistance.

Fear Is The Great Killer

By GEORGE W. CRANE, PH. D., M. D. CASE G-561. Ned T. aged 28, is a high school teacher. "Dr. Crane," she began, "I have a class in Hygiene and one of my students asked a puzzling question. 'Oh, go away from me at once,' shouted the merchant. 'For you have just killed 50,000 people back in Danasoc!' 'No so,' protested the stranger. 'For I killed only 3,000.' It was fear that killed the other 47,000.' Along this same line of thinking, Dr. Wolf reports as follows: 'Drowning victims often are found with no water in their lungs. 'The patients just died of a turned-off heart as a result of fear or panic.' Many drownings also occur because of an abnormal load on the heart, following a heavy meal. 'If your auto starts up a hill in high gear and you do not shift to a more powerful gear, you know that it may finally stop. So to lack of power in the cylinder. And that same thing can happen to your heart. Fear is a terrifically greater work load placed on your heart after you have eaten a 'hearty' meal. If you also have a much higher carbon monoxide content of your blood, due to cigarette smoking, and if you don't breathe evenly, because you are not an accomplished swimmer, then your heart may stop right in the middle of a contraction, as did your automobile on a hill. People with damaged hearts and thickened walls of their coronary arteries (which are the sole vessels that nourish the heart muscle), are doubly susceptible to death via drowning. In your auto while climbing a hill, you can shift to a lower, more powerful gear, but your heart does not have such a neat set of gears. It does have a margin of safety but when the load is too great, then it stops at once. Anybody who smokes, thus hampers his heart in these three ways: (a) by sooting the carbon monoxide in his blood; (b) by thickening the vessel walls, thus narrowing their diameter; and (c) by racing the heart, as much as 20 beats per minute! The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Nick A. Giammarco, were at the hospital when the child died.



Johnson Mum On Convention

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — President Johnson, hero of the 1964 Democratic National Convention, sat out the opening hours of the 1968 version of his Texas ranch today—giving no hint whether he'd show up in Chicago.

There were no announced-in-advance visitors to the LBJ Ranch at the start of the new work week, and no indication Johnson would be competing for headlines with his party's nominating convention.

Because Johnson will be 66 on Tuesday, there has been considerable speculation he might fly to Chicago for the occasion.

It is also known, however, that the chief executive is acutely conscious of the fact that few incumbent presidents ever show up at a national convention before the big nominating vote—and the one who did so most recently, Harry S. Truman, got little more than criticism for his effort.

Only one bit of prospective official business for convention week has been announced: In a summer commencement address Saturday at his own school, Southwest Texas State College in nearby San Marcos, Johnson said that Wilbur Cohen, secretary of health, education and welfare, would be visiting the ranch later and bringing him a series of reports.

Aides said Cohen's visit was not imminent. The Cabinet member apparently planned to be in Chicago for the first days of the convention.

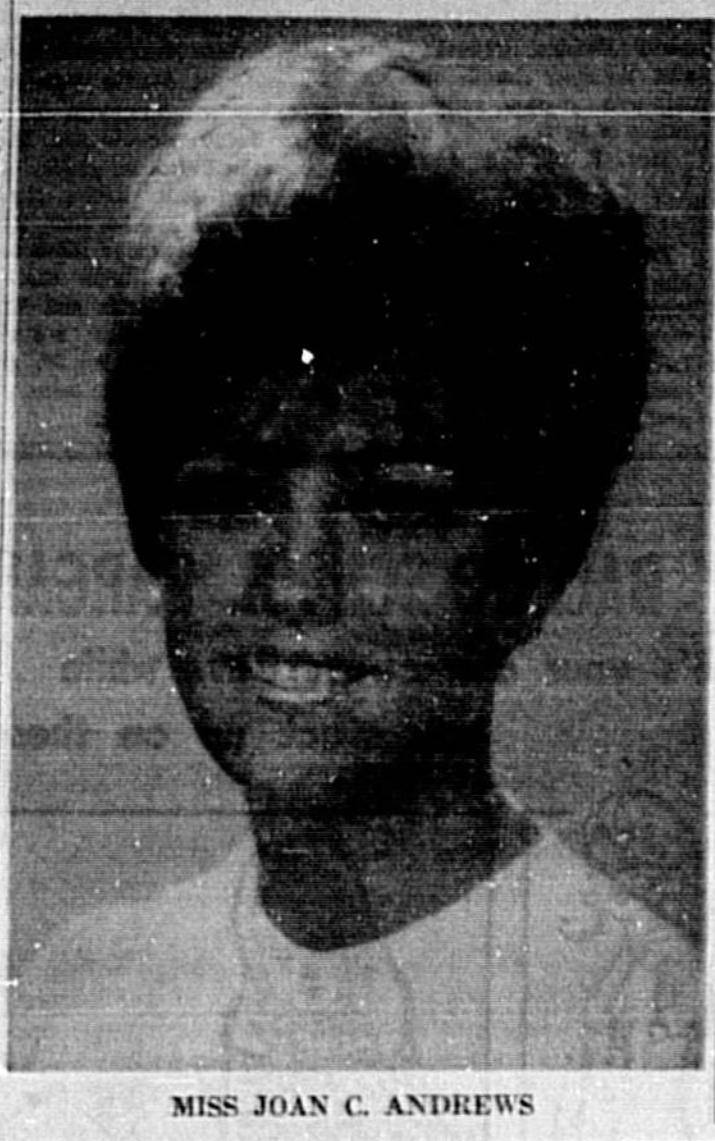

City 'Cool' To Montreal 9

Two important developments concerning the possibility of Sanford playing host to the new Montreal National League baseball team during that club's annual spring training in Florida have occurred in the past 10 hours.

First, at a regular meeting of the Sanford City Commission last night, however, interest in the proposal was evident on the part of the city fathers. Opposition to Warren Knowler, city manager, was obvious and in a later incident openly displayed his hostility to the effort to bring the St. Louis Cardinals to Sanford.

Earlier, the commission, with Earl Higginbotham acting as chairman in the absence of Mayor Vincent Roberts, heard an inquiry from Scott, who sought the feelings of the group on a proposal to invite the team to Sanford.

It was evident from questions aimed at Scott that some confusion was apparent in what is being sought.

Higginbotham admitted he thought at first, the proposal in question dealt with a farm team operation, such as the type that involved city several years ago when a Class D club operated here.

The commission was assured that no farm club operation was in prospect and that only the use of stadiums and housing for players would be needed.

Second major incident occurred early today when Mayor Vincent Roberts called The Herald from the Democratic National Convention in Chicago to endorse the proposal.

Roberts, who is an alternate to the political caucus, called to say, "I am for it 100 per cent. I would be delighted to see Montreal come to Sanford for spring training."

Milliot Loses Appeal

"I'm shocked! I would not have believed that the budget appeals board would not uphold my budget."

These were the words of Sheriff Peter Milliot just minutes after being notified that State Budget Appeals Board in Tallahassee had rejected his appeal of the county commission's \$217,722 cut made in Milliot's budget request for fiscal 1968-69 year.

Vividly shaken, the county's chief law enforcement officer revealed to a hastily called news conference that he had received a telephone call at 3 p. m. yesterday from an assistant in the office of Gov. Claude Kirk advising him that his appeal had been rejected.

The sheriff had submitted an amended budget of \$512,830 to the county commission for approval. The request, largest in history of county, was cut to an approved \$295,105 by the commissioners. This cut precipitated a row between the commission and sheriff with the result that Milliot sought relief from State Appeals Board of his original estimate of operation.

The Appeals Board heard the two sides a week ago and announced a decision yesterday. Milliot told assembled news media that the Appeals Board decision was final and there was no other agency to whom he could apply for relief. He said he could not believe that (Continued on Page 2A, Col. 6)
