WASHINGTON, Mar. 1.—(AP)—A British ultimatum to Bulgaria, the first of the kind since the outbreak of the war, was formally signed today.

The ultimatum, which was signed by the British ambassador in Sofia, demands that Bulgaria take sides with the Axis powers.

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Senator Asks G-Men To Quiz Demonstrators

Glass Deplores Acts
Of Sit-Down Group
Opposing Passage
Of Lease-Lend Bill

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1.—(AP)—Senator Glass of Virginia said yesterday he had asked the Federal Bureau of Investigation to determine who was financing "the unpleasant visit" of a group of women, headed by Mrs. Elizabeth Dilling, who staged a "sit-down" demonstration in front of his office yesterday morning.

Mrs. Dilling, author of the widely known book, "The Red Network," has been in the capital fighting the lease-lend bill, which is sponsored by Glass. Police broke up the demonstration yesterday morning and arrested Mrs. Dilling, who was released in \$25 bail for a disorderly conduct charge.

FBI officials said they had received a letter from Glass and had referred it to Attorney General Jackson for instructions.

Glass asserted that the group had "created at my office a noisy disorder of which any self-respecting fish-wife would be ashamed."

"It is my understanding," he added in a statement, "that they have taken up their abode in Washington for several weeks and have consistently made themselves offensive in the capital buildings."

"Therefore, I have asked the Federal Bureau of Investigation to determine who is financing their unpleasant visit, and whether they have complied with our laws regarding the registration of foreign agents."

"I likewise believe that it would be pertinent to inquire whether they are mothers. For the sake of the race, I devoutly hope not."

Fillbuster Charged In Aid Bill Debate

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1.—(AP)—An angry charge that the opposition to the lend-lease bill was resorting to a fillbuster was flung into the Senate debate Friday by Senator George of Georgia, chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, and was quickly denied by Senator Wheeler, Democrat, Montana.

The two had fallen into a furious argument as to whether President Roosevelt could arbitrarily underwrite existing military equipment to keep it from going to England within a \$1,300,000,000 limitation prescribed by the bill.

Standing a few feet apart, both talking at once, Wheeler maintained that the President could; George that he could not.

Residence Ruling For Divorce Cited

TALLAHASSEE, Mar. 1.—(AP)—Those who may seek quick divorces through Florida's 90-day residence law were warned Friday by the State Supreme Court that they must establish bona fide residences.

Since the 90-day residence law was enacted four years ago, Miami has surpassed Reno, as the divorce capital of the United States.

"The taking up of abode in Florida for the sole purpose of prosecuting a divorce suit is not establishment of a bona fide residence," the Supreme Court said.

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Blizzard In North Heads Out To Sea

17 Lives Lost During
Severe Snowstorm;
Communications In
New England Down

ATHENS, Mar. 1.—(AP)—Northern Greece was shaken by a destructive earthquake today, and early reports indicated that casualties would prove heavy. At Larissa a town of about 30,000, authorities telegraphed for tents for 15,000 homeless.

A snowstorm of blizzard proportions abruptly rushed out to sea today after taking 17 lives along the Atlantic seaboard, disrupting land, sea and air traffic, and depositing a near-record fall of 11 inches in New Jersey.

Philadelphia reported the worst attack of winter, and southern New Jersey had its most severe storm in 20 years.

In New England, electric and communication lines were blown down, leaving several Rhode Island towns without light.

On the Pacific Coast, squalls and sudden wind-gusts ripped roofs from sheds and buildings, uprooted hundreds of trees and toppled power lines.

More than a dozen persons were injured. California was lashed by the worst gale in years, with rains dropping farmlands already saturated after the wettest season in 15 years.

The South continued in the grip of the cold with freezing temperatures pushing southward well into Florida. Sub-freezing temperatures were reported through Georgia.

The storm, winter's farewell party for February, centered in midday over New Jersey and Delaware, but appeared to be moving rapidly toward New England.

Forecasters said snowfall would be heavy and temperatures lower from Block Island, R. I., to Cape Cod, with an exception of parts of Vermont and Connecticut.

Although the storm centered in the east, other parts of the country, especially the South, did some places and the occasion was marked by heavy squalls.

Snow fell Friday night as far south as Valdosta, Ga., 18 miles from the Florida line, although a bright sun soon cleared the ground.

Tennessee reported up to 23 inches at Nashville, while the fall in Alabama ranged up to three inches in the northern part of the state.

The entire Delaware peninsula reported near-blizzard conditions which threatened to isolate communities. Sussex county of that state was especially hard hit. So heavy was the fall over the entire peninsula, however, that 300 workers sent out by the highway department were unable to keep all roads open.

Drifts in the Rehoboth Beach section measured five feet in some places and the occasion was whipped by strong north to northeast winds battered the beach and reached dangerously near the boardwalk. The driving snow reduced visibility to about 20 feet inches along the sea coast. The snow over the state as a whole reached a depth of from three to five inches.

Celery And Citrus Escape Injury As Mercury Drops

High Winds Prevent
Formation Of Frost;
Warmup In Seen

Though temperatures dropped to the freezing point early this morning, a high wind prevented the formation of frost, and apparently no damage was done to celery and citrus in Seminole County, a check of the Farmers' Market, Chase and Co., and the American Fruit Growers showed today.

J. J. Lehman, manager of the State Market, said the mercury registered 34 on the platform about 7:30 o'clock this morning, and that he had heard no reports of damage.

A. Leffler at Chase and Co. explained that though the extreme cold would hold back the growth of produce to a certain extent, the wind held off the frost and "as far as I know there was no harm done to any growing things in the county."

At the American Fruit Growers office, J. E. Wathen said that while tender crops might have been injured, celery escaped unscathed. Workers were kept out of the fields by the cold, Mr. Wathen explained, and hence the fruit company probably would be able to ship only one car of celery instead of the five or six planned. Mr. Wathen said several good orders would have to remain unfilled.

On the west side the temperature dropped to 35, which was probably the coldest place in the county, Mr. Wathen said. In many places, particularly the low fields, ice formed.

At Lakeland, the frost forecast service predicted that a gradual warmup should begin Sunday morning, with no frost danger Monday and Tuesday.

In the north, a violent snowstorm accompanied by high winds and sub-freezing temperatures forced schools to close and brought out storm warnings for ocean-going craft. The storm was the worst of the year in southern New Jersey, where drifts piled three feet high in places.

In Washington, motorists were advised not to leave the city because of a 17-hour storm that covered streets and highways with more than an inch of snow and ice.

Gayda Views Action Of Bulgarians As Throwing Off British Influence

German Soldiers
Arrive In Sofia

Mist And Winds Re- duce Aerial Bat- tles Over Channel

ROME, Mar. 1.—(AP)—Virginia Gayda, the editor who frequently speaks for the Fascist Regime, asserted today that Bulgaria's adherence to the Berlin-Rome-Tokyo alliance was a "further step toward driving British influence completely out of Europe"—and should be a warning to the United States.

He declared the signing of the pact today "should, above all, warn the more responsible men of Washington who would like to assume the attitude of arbitrators of European destiny."

German troops wearing regulation battle dress drove into Sofia today in gray armored cars. Wearing steel helmets, the Germans carried rifles, gas masks, and heavy packs of battle gear. Their entry into the city came shortly after Bulgaria formally signed the Berlin-Rome-Tokyo military and economic alliance.

Swarms of German fighter planes winged over the city. Next transport planes to Greek numbers landed at the Sofia airport. Police cleared the main squares, indicating heavy troop transport outside the city.

Bulgarians officially reported that Yarna, Black Sea port, was being occupied by the Nazis. Thick mists and high winds over the English Channel restricted overnight air activities between Britain and Germany.

The Greeks, under German pressure to make peace with Mussolini, continued to hound the hard-pressed Italians on the Albanian front.

The warring Balkans were near an explosion early today with both Germany and Great Britain moving into position for the possibility of war on a new battlefield.

The key to a series of grave and portentous developments which may reach their climax within a few days, perhaps even hours, is small, poverty-stricken Bulgaria.

Frantic diplomatic and military struggle was under way between Germany and Britain for advantages in the Balkan theater.

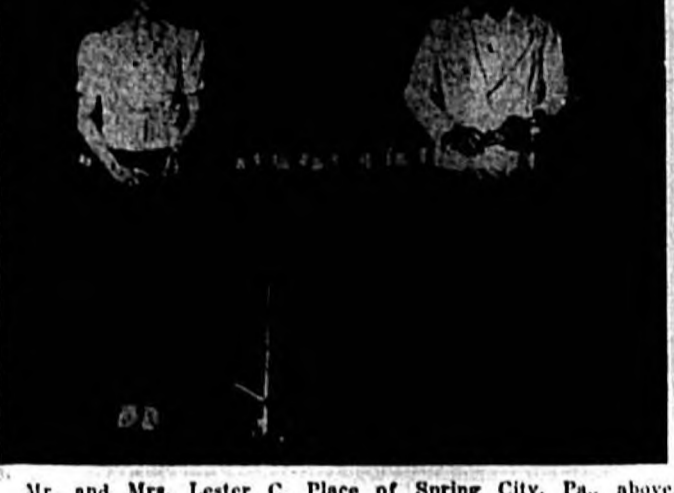

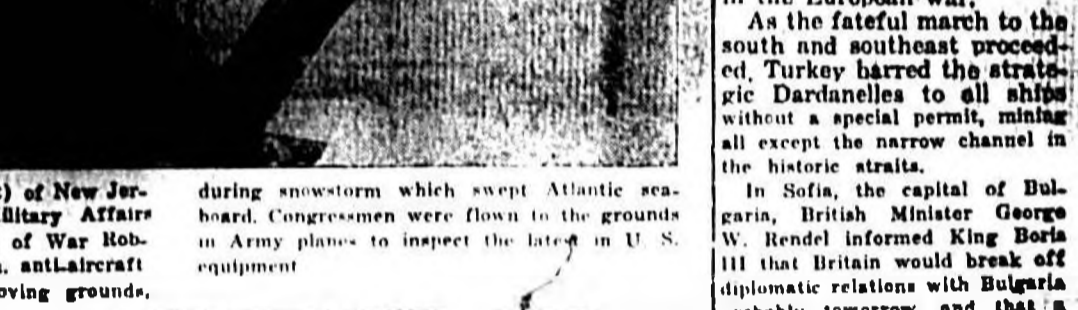

British Report Raids On Brest

Yugoslavia Reported Ready To Sign As Minor Axis Power

Adolf Hitler's mechanized legions rolled across Bulgaria toward the Greek and Turkish frontiers today, threatening to create a new front in the European war.

As the fateful march to the south and southeast proceeded, Turkey barred the strategic Dardanelles to all ships without a special permit, mining all except the narrow channel in the historic straits.

In Sofia, the capital of Bulgaria, British Minister George W. Rendel informed King Boris III that Britain would break off diplomatic relations with Bulgaria probably tomorrow, and that a state of war "undoubtedly" would follow.

Yugoslavia, the largest power in the Balkans, was described authoritatively as ready to sign the Berlin-Rome-Tokyo Axis as the fifth minor power to join the Axis, following the Balkans of Rumania, Slovakia, Hungary and Bulgaria.

In Athens, the arrival of British Foreign Secretary John G. Dill, chief of the British imperial general staff, heightened British expressions of confidence that "full preparations" had been made to meet the crisis.

Reports from Bulgarian sources said the entire country was being overrun by the Nazis. The Turkish press unanimously predicted that Bulgaria soon would become a satellite of the Axis.

On the western front, the British reported new overnight raids on the German-held naval base at Brest and on German-occupied straits.

Mechanized Unit Leaves Blanding

CAMP BLANDING, Mar. 3—A 16-mile long mechanized column that left here Thursday morning on a 70-mile trip to Cecilville, National Forest near Lake City, made the trip for the express purpose of running into traffic trouble, as Maj. Gen. John C. Parsons, 31st Division commander, said Thursday night.

He said the 850 vehicles, carrying 4,000 officers and men of three regiments of the 5th field artillery brigade, were to be dispersed along regular highways meeting average traffic to get into trouble and out again in the easiest fashion.

U.S. Citizen Is Held In Bucharest

BUCHAREST, Mar. 3—(AP)—The private secretary of the United States military attaché and 14 Britons were among 160 men and women arrested in Bucharest yesterday and sent immediately to a concentration camp at Turgu-Jiu.

Several of the Britons seized in the roundup are of Rumanian origin and among the 160 prisoners were a number of Greek, Belgian and the Rumanian head barman of the Metropolitan Club.

Strike Called At Army's Camp Davis

HOLLYRIDGE, N. C., Mar. 3—(AP)—Skilled A. F. L. workmen went on a strike at the Army's \$15,000,000 Camp Davis here today.
