Dr. Carl A. Meyer, staff physician, asserted that after a preliminary examination of the girl's mental processes that a thorough test was advisable.

Miss Hawley, who was discharged a week ago as a cabaret entertainer by Morston Grove, a suburb, said she took the tablets as a sedative Sunday after finding herself unable to sleep, and feeling dependent over remarks she said had been made to her on the streets since the bathtub incident.

MOODY LEADS 'MA' FERGUSON BY 109,000 VOTES

Returns From 238 Out Of 252 Counties Indicate Attorney General Will Have Majority Over Field Of 5 Candidates

Governor's Husband Still Maintains Hope

DALLAS, Texas, July 26.—(AP)—Dan Moody, attorney general, maintained a majority of 1,146 over the field in the Democratic gubernatorial race when returns from 238 of the 252 counties in the state, including 58 complete, had been tabulated this morning. The vote then stood: Moody, 341,091; Ferguson, 231,060; Davidson, 101,326; Williams, 3,688; Zimmerman, 2,109 and Johnston, 1,863.

Moody must maintain his majority to win the nomination, as the party shall be held if no candidate receives a clear majority in the first primary. Lynch Davidson, Houston business man, running third, had less than a third of Moody's total and less than half of Governor Ferguson's.

Moody's brightened prospects for uppositional nomination stimulated renewed conjecture today as to whether Mrs. Ferguson will execute her promise to resign if Moody leads her by one vote in the first primary. Her offer was contingent on Moody's agreement to resign as attorney general if she would lead him by 25,000 votes, and he accepted.

Gulf Hurricane Sideswipes Lower Florida East Coast But Slight Damage Is Done

MIAMI, July 26.—(AP)—A hurricane swept up out of the Caribbean Sea today, sideswiping the lower Florida East Coast with a heavy wind and traveling between 40 and 50 miles an hour. No damage has been reported. The storm was believed to be the tropical disturbance which originated in the southern part of the West Indies Friday.

This section of the coast felt the first blow soon after 8 o'clock when the wind increased about 300 miles an hour before 9 o'clock.

The United States weather bureau here at 1:10 o'clock this afternoon stated it had received a message from a steamer 17 miles east of Miami stating that the velocity of wind was 80 miles an hour from the northwest.

In The North One Of Most Delicious Dishes (On Menu) ...
FJORDE, Iceland, July 23.—A remote little island in the Far North is the home of a dish served by hundreds of miles from the North Atlantic ocean. It is a favorite of the natives and is being introduced to the rest of the world.

18-20 quarts of milk, well filtered, are put in a pot, boiled for a few minutes, then passed through a strainer. It is again cooked over a low fire until it reaches a temperature of about 112 degrees (26 degrees centigrade). The curd and whey are added. Then the pot is covered and left for 24 hours. The curd is then stirred in a bowl with two spoons. A quart of milk is added. Thoroughly mixed, it is served cold in a crystal glass with a "sauce" made of finely powdered sugar. The curd depends upon the curds used. They are made in many ways.

Four-Day Heat Wave And Storms Claim 160 Lives In New England

NEW YORK, July 23. (P)—A four-day heat wave in the New England and the middle-Atlantic states ameliorated Thursday by storms today had claimed nearly 160 lives.

Fifty deaths were added during the past 24 hours. There were 19 in New England, 10 in New Jersey, 9 in New York City and 4 in New York state.

Among the New York victims were Johnson Watson Dixon, lawyer and president of the Yale Club, and Harry Anson Moody, former official of the F. W. Woolworth Company. Showers in many localities yesterday lowered the temperature slightly but made the atmosphere more oppressive. The high mark in New York was 87, or ten degrees less than the maximum Thursday. Rumors of a possible water famine in New York were dispelled by the police and firemen who continued to give street urchins the benefit of water from hydrants.

MUCH PROGRESS SHOWN BY DADE IN PAST 5 YEARS

Compilation Shows Agricultural Acreage Has Decreased But Farms Have Increased; Valuation Shows Big Gain

MIAMI, Fla., July 26.—(AP)—Progress in Dade county during the period of 1920 to 1925 has shown a marked increase in all lines of endeavor, according to a compilation of figures made by the Miami chamber of commerce.

The survey shows that Dade county in 1925 had 95,013 acres of land devoted to farming as compared with 122,721 acres devoted to this purpose in 1920, but these lands were divided into 1,174 farms in 1925 and only 865 farms in 1920, according to the United States department of agriculture.

There are 1,133 white and 41 negro farmers in the county whereas in 1920 there were 784 white farmers and 71 negroes. These farms are operated by the owners in 887 cases, by managers in 27 cases and by tenants in 250. In 1920 there were 618 owners operating their farms, 51 managers and 189 tenants.

The value of farm lands and buildings in Dade county in 1925 amounted to \$27,042,675 as compared with \$11,428,115 in 1920. It is estimated that lands alone were worth \$25,030,805 and buildings \$2,011,870, a valuation of \$9,828,635 was placed on the county's farm lands and \$1,904,480 on the buildings.

Dade county has 2,155 farms devoted to citrus culture, distributed as follows: 222,347 orange trees, 757,522 grapefruit trees, 36,500 mango trees, 33,568 lime trees, 26,700 lemon trees and 2,128 kumquat trees, a total of 1,078,728 trees, according to J. S. Rainey, county agent. There are 15,112 acres set to citrus bearing trees in the county.

From this acreage was shipped during the season 1923-24, the last figures available, 2,411 carloads of grapefruit, and 244 carloads of oranges. There are 69 available figures on the other citrus products. The county agent estimates that the figures for grapefruit and oranges represent about 85 per cent of the present total but the other 15 per cent of the crops is shipped by express and consumed locally.

The greatest acreage devoted to tomatoes any one year was made from this acreage was 228,258 carloads of tomatoes which represented only about 25 per cent of the crop, the 15 per cent being consumed locally.

There are 2,097 acres planted in avocados in the county. This acreage is not all bearing but is estimated there were 10,000 from 30,000 crates of avocados last year.
