

Her 'Lover' Charged

Man's Wife Sought In Murder

Police have issued a nationwide alert for the "harem suspect" wife of a murdered Coast Guardman. She is sought in connection with his murder, according to police, who said she may have plotted with her lover to murder her husband for \$4,000 in insurance money. Charles Ira Hackett, 34, of Fern Park and Langwood, is in Duval County jail charged with first degree murder following a grand jury indictment on the charge Thursday. Hackett was being held in the jail for a variety of crimes

including failure to appear, burglary and grand larceny. On Monday Hackett pleaded guilty to the burglary charge and in return the remaining charges were dropped by the state attorney's office, according to records. Hackett is the alleged lover of Jacqueline McCann Dancy, 26, of 823 Prairie Lake Drive, Fern Park. Her husband, Edward Dancy, 35, was found murdered in a ditch on South Sanford Avenue, half mile south of Sanford. He had been shot in the throat with a shotgun and his hands and feet were bound and his body wrapped in a blanket. Police investigators said he was on leave from Governor Island, N.Y. to attend a birthday party for his

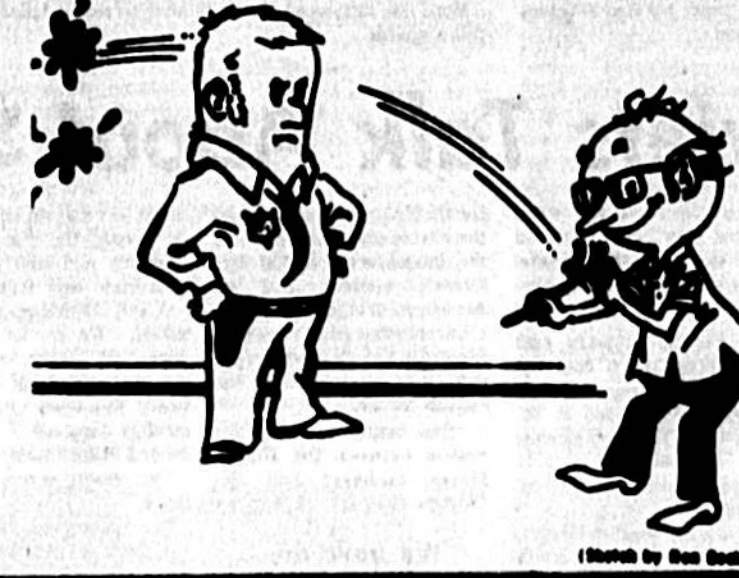
wife and was murdered shortly after the party on Dec. 28, 1977. The body was found Jan. 1 by two Sanford men walking in the area. A national indictment in the murder remains unfiled pending an arrest. The nationwide alert indicates Mrs. Dancy may be riding a motorcycle. She is said to possibly be carrying a gun or knife and has "knowledge of heroin," the report indicates. In addition to the \$4,000 insurance money which police believe may have been a motive, the state man had been subpoenaed to testify against Hackett in a burglary trial, according to police records.

\$6.07 Billion Budget - Biggest Ever - Wins Nod Of Senate Panel

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The Senate Appropriations Committee approved a \$6.07 billion budget Thursday night, the biggest ever, and will send \$20 million for emergency — a sign the Florida economy is healthy again. The massive spending plan, voted out by Sen. Phil Lewis' committee, goes before the full Senate next Thursday. The House is about a week behind in its budget work. Lewis, D-West Palm Beach, says he will be satisfied if he can keep legislators from dipping any

money through the House Appropriations Committee, and similar in total spending to Gov. Reubin Askew's plan.

Senators, in effect, are saving the \$60 million picked up when state and legislative reports earlier this week revised their estimate of money to be available during the 1970-71 fiscal year. House members are choosing to spend most of the windfall on schools. The money wasn't available when Askew wrote his \$5.98 billion budget.

The split over the reserve fund and the increase in the required local effort is still in the air. The Senate floor probably will be the first big trouble spot when House and Senate conferees begin final work on the spending plan in early May.

Big city senators on the Appropriations Committee last 5-7 Thursday night in a bid to leave the required local effort at 4 mills. The increase to 6.5 mills in the budget now means that \$11 million available only to the property-rich, big counties this year, will be distributed among all 97 counties.

Miami Sen. Kenneth Myers is leading a coalition of senators from Duval, Brevard, Duval, Hillsborough and Pinellas counties who will make another run on the floor. He predicts it will be successful.

The House and Senate have their differences on educational funding, Myers said, but it's not as bad as last year when a deadlock on the budget and taxes forced 18 days of special sessions. The tentative House budget has only about \$7

million more for schools than the Senate proposal. The two houses have about the same amount for universities and the Senate has \$2.5 million more for community colleges than the House.

"It doesn't sound as bad as it did last year. It looks like we're fairly close," he said.

The Lewis committee pushed into the budget \$40,000 for the statewide grand jury, given Askew the \$200,000 total he requested; \$20,000 to hire private lawyers to represent Florida in its suit

against the federal government on vocational rehabilitation programs; and \$2.5 million to allow judges to qualify for aid in families with dependent children payments when pregnant with their first child.

Also added in the last-minute amendment process were \$200,000 to refurbish living quarters in the four major state mental hospitals; \$1.1 million to renovate living quarters at the Sanford center; \$120,000 to eliminate safety hazards at the Stephen Foster Memorial Center; and a \$1.5 million increase in funding for public libraries.

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — Heavyweight boxer Leon Spinks, victor over champion Muhammad Ali, was arrested early today and booked, suspected of possession of cocaine and marijuana. At 10:30 a.m. today a police department spokesman said Spinks had been released on bail, but "that's all I can tell you about it."

Spinks, who shares the heavyweight crown with Ken Norton, was stopped about 4 a.m. in St. Louis. He was charged with driving without headlights. St. Francis County, Mo. also has charged Spinks with possession of marijuana and a handgun.

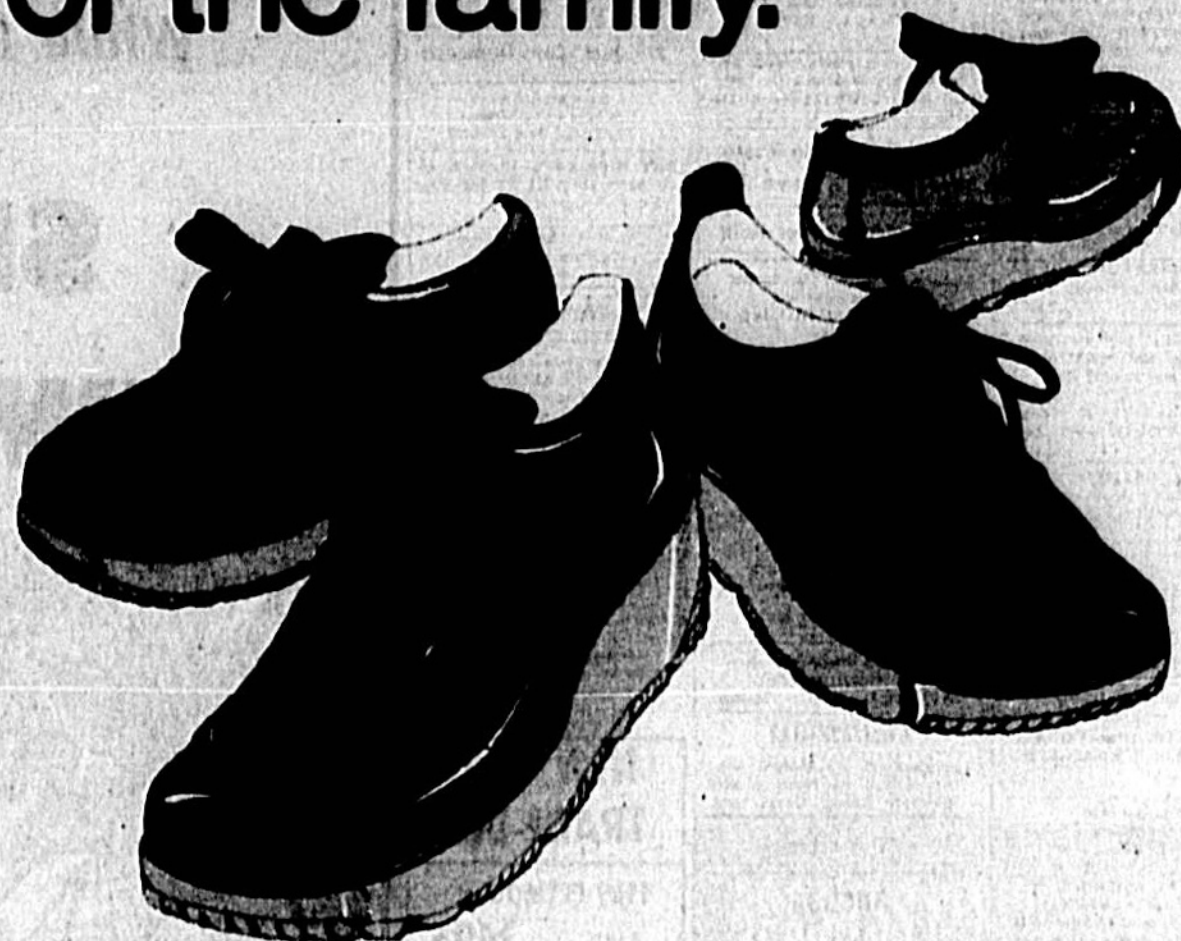

New Rebel Letter Outlines Moro-Prisoners' Swap

MANILA (UPI) — Being Christian Democrats Party officials said today a new handwritten letter had been received from insurgent commander Abu Basma outlining details of a prisoner swap demanded by the Red Brigades in return for his life.

The latest message asked further continuation to the crucial issue of whether the final 45-year-old prisoner of the Christian Democrats, who earlier was reported to have been "executed" by "rebels," was even alive.

The three messages from Basma contained with the first public appeal by his wife for the Christian Democrats to state what terms they would accept for the release of the five-time prisoner.

The U.S. Embassy in Moscow said it also asked the Soviet Ministry of Foreign Affairs to provide information on the plane and its passengers and crew but had received no official response.

U.S., Soviets Talk About Seized Airliner

The Council sponsored James Earl Ray and his ill-fated attempt to assassinate Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in 1968.

Created during the early months of World War II to support a domestic propaganda campaign on behalf of the nation's war effort, the Ad Council today serves as a clearing house for organizations seeking free assistance from advertising agencies.

Reporting groups — ranging from the American Red Cross and the United Negro College Fund to numerous government agencies — each pay \$250,000 to \$500,000 for media materials and distribution, but in return they receive a total of more than \$600 million annually worth of free advertising.

But in recent years there has emerged considerable criticism of the Council's unwillingness to deal with politically sensitive contemporary issues of fundamental importance.

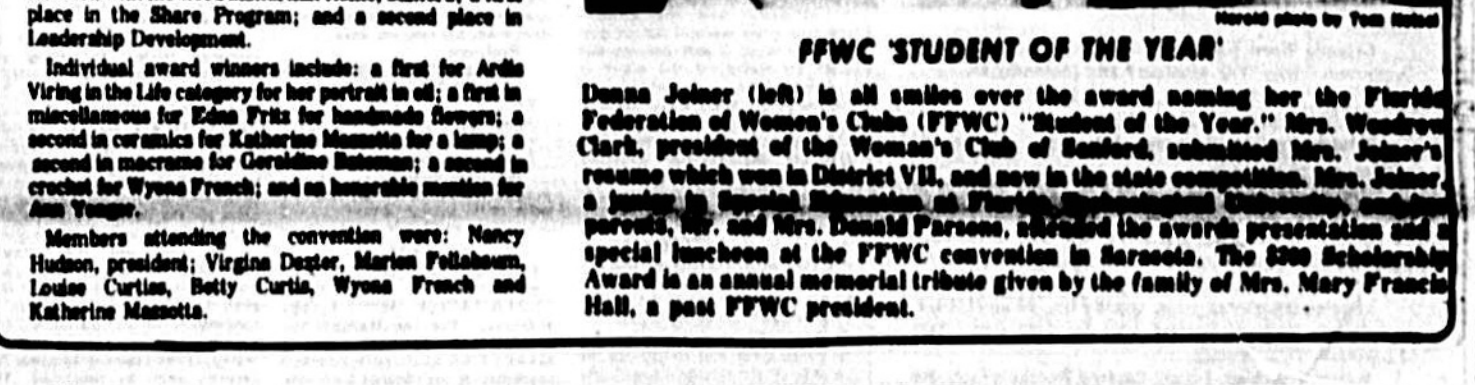

CANOE TRAFFIC IS HEAVIEST SUNDAYS ON WEKIVA RIVER

There are 35 state designated canoe trails in Florida and the 25-mile long Wekiva River is one of them.

Being designated a canoe trail doesn't mean traffic is closed to all but canoes, however it does indicate ideal conditions for the recreation.

In the case of the Wekiva River, it begins at Wekiva Springs in the 6,400-acre Wekiva Springs State Park at the southwest corner of Seminole County.

From here, a trip down the Wekiva will bring a canoeist in contact with some of Florida's most scenic areas as well as wading birds, alligators, raccoons and others.

Canoes can be rented for about \$1.50 an hour at the park or at two commercial rental establishments further up the river.

Once you're off and canoeing, here are some tips to keep in mind:

CARRY SAFETY EQUIPMENT
Floatation gear (Florida Law requires a Coast Guard approved floatation device for each person.)
First Aid Kit
Extra paddle
Bow and stern lines
Flashlight

ALLOW SUFFICIENT TIME
Allow 3 miles per hour canoeing time on the river under normal conditions.

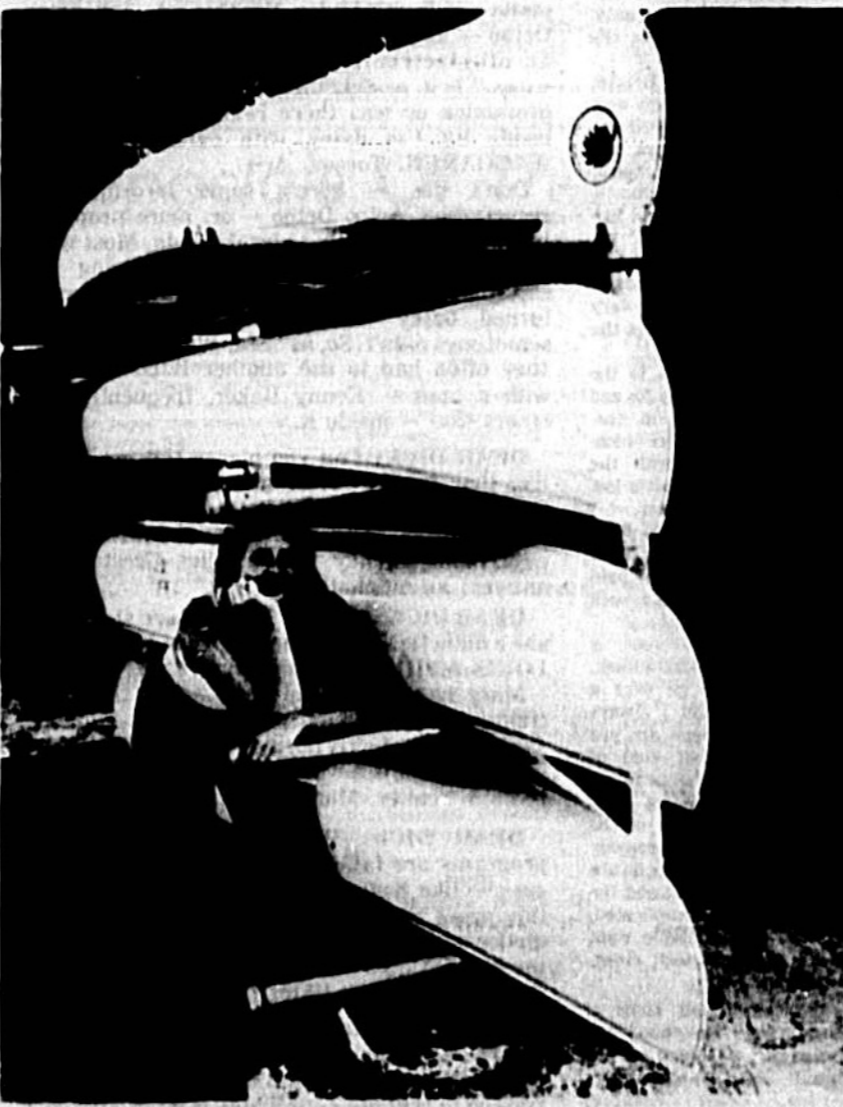
Don't forget driving time is extra. Remember, it is better to finish earlier than planned than to try to finish after dark.

KNOW THE WATER
Ask area residents about river conditions: Flooded? Normal? Low?

Check recent and predicted weather conditions.

A flooded river is dangerous and should not be canoed.

A low river usually exposes many logs, stumps or rocks and will require may lift-overs or portages, thus causing a difficult, slow trip.

CBS To FCC: Sorry; Won't Do It Again

NEW YORK (UPI) — Yankee Manager Billy Martin complains lack of discipline among state legislators today in terms of the size of their salaries.

AFC's U.S. Football Championship barred out to have more players than a franchise team.

CBS' Heavyweight Championship of Thailand was held in a 15-minute bout of 15 rounds, only to have it torn out the hour after the game.

They CBS has sent a 21-page response to the Federal Communications Commission, explaining how it happened to do wrong in promoting the same games, what it has done to correct public misstatements, and what it is doing to see that it won't all happen again.

The letter, signed by John D. Bantz, president and chief executive officer of CBS, and Gene F. Jankowski, president of the CBS Broadcast Group, outlines a comprehensive plan of corporate responsibility to prevent the network sports promoters from lying to the public.

"We share the commission's view that misrepresentations about televised sports events are wholly unacceptable," they said, and hoped the FCC would not speak CBS too hard since it promised never to do it again.

Nelson mentions the real make in the back garden of televised sports — money. There is an average amount of \$500,000 available to promote for television rights from martial arts to basketball.

Maybe the two sports should be restricted to smaller events played only before live audiences, and the televised events could get a new name.

From 1930 To Today: 4 Paintings A Week

By NORMAN HABEL, Herald Services NAPLES—It is possible to collect too much fine art too fast! That's always a danger, which is why collecting is traditionally a slow, careful process. But, there have been those men and women who bought paintings and sculpture as if there were no tomorrow, yet people like speed with which they made their acquisitions, they chose surprisingly steadily.

Did It Make

On The Kids?

(Now, if at all, did this week's TV showing of "Holocaust" affect Seminole County's school children? What impact, if any, did the show have on them? To find out, Herald staff writer Jane Cassellberry and correspondent Joan Maddison talked with youngsters from three high schools and two middle schools in the county...)

"I thought it was a real TV show. I had a lot of friends and family members who watched it with me. Lyman High School sophomore, who watched all of the "Holocaust" series. They knew Jews were killed, but not how they were tortured. I think it's about time they showed it.

"The Nazis thought the Jews were an inferior race and thought they were doing the world a favor by exterminating them."

"Since I am Jewish," Rob continued, "I've seen worse films than that in more depth when I was attending Hebrew High and at the Temple, so I really didn't learn anything new."

"In my German class, we discussed what went on and the class felt the Nazis did a terrible thing and it should not be allowed to happen again," Rob said.

"I think it was like "Raid"—nobody really knew until they saw it on TV. I had heard about it, but had never really seen it," said Lisa Pellegrini, Lyman High senior.

"I had seen pictures, but seeing it in a movie makes it more realistic. We did not discuss it in class, but we got

extra credit for watching it and writing a critique on it. I watched it all and think the reason the Germans tried to exterminate the Jews was that Hitler hated them. He made the vulnerable ones believe in what they were doing and the others did it to stay important. Like they were revenging for Christ's death," Lisa said.

"We discussed it in social studies class," added Lisa. "I think it could happen again if someone like Hitler took over again — look how Castro took over. It all depends on the country and people involved."

"I have a lot about it because I had taken courses, but I didn't realize how much hatred the Germans had for the Jews, the tortures they were put through," said Leslie Silverman, Milrose Middle School student, who watched all of "The Holocaust."

"The Germans did it because the Jews were not as perfect as they were — at least that's how they made it sound," she said. "I think it was a terrible event and I'm glad the Jews finally fought back. My friends were saying 'Damn Jews' but they finally fought back. They didn't fight at first because they didn't know what was going on, but in the long run, they would get killed even if they fought back."

Milrose Seventh Grader Pam Stambaugh watched all of the series. "I don't know why the Germans did it. I guess they did not like the Jews' religion. They thought they were mean, so they killed them. I don't know about the exterminations or how mean the Germans were toward

Pope Plads For Moro's Life As Deadline Passes

ROME (UPI) — The Italian government Saturday let pass a deadline set by Red Brigades terrorists as an ultimatum on Premier Aldo Moro's life, refusing to negotiate his exchange for jailed terrorists.

Moro's Red Brigades kidnappers, who threatened to kill Moro by 3 p.m. (8 a.m. EST) Saturday unless the government agreed to negotiate their demands, also let the time elapse without making any further known contact.

Human Catholic church officials and a constant staff at the Interior Ministry reported no new signals from the terrorists who seized Moro March 16 after killing his five police guards.

Before the ultimatum ran out, Pope Paul VI made an extraordinary handwritten last moment appeal for Moro to be spared.

"I ask you on bended knee to free Aldo Moro, simply, without conditions, not so much because of my humble and loving love," the pope said.

The pope's hand-written letter, inscribed on three pages topped by the papal coat of arms, said: "I write to you, man of the Red Brigades; Red Brigades Aldo Moro is freedom to his family, to civilized life."

The papal statement was released by the Rev. Nunzio Procaccini, Vatican spokesman, at 11:30 a.m. (2:30 a.m. EST) on the last hours of the terrorist's 48-hour ultimatum clock.

The terrorists have demanded the government give a clear answer by 4 p.m. today (8 a.m. EST) whether it is ready to negotiate exchanging jailed Red Brigades prisoners for Moro.

The pope said that he had received "no mandate" regarding Moro, "nor am I bound by any private interests concerning him."

"Red I love him as a member of the great human family, as a brother in Christ, and in a particularly special way, as a brother of the faith and a son of the church of Christ."

"And it is to that supreme name of Christ that I turn to you, to whom he is certainly not unknown, to you, unknown and respectable advocates of this worthy and innocent man."

It was the first time since Moro was seized March 16 that the pope had referred to the Red Brigades by name. It was also occasioned for the pope to

write or speak in the first person singular, rather than using the papal "we."
After nearly two days of crisis debate, Christian Democratic leaders issued a statement Friday night saying: "They eventually suggested by Caritas International in connection with today's appeal by the Moro family moves the need for identifying possible ways to induce Moro's kidnappers to free him."

The Red Brigades, who abducted the 61-year-old Moro and guarded him in five police cars in a March 18 ambush, did not indicate immediately if they were willing to postpone their death sentence.

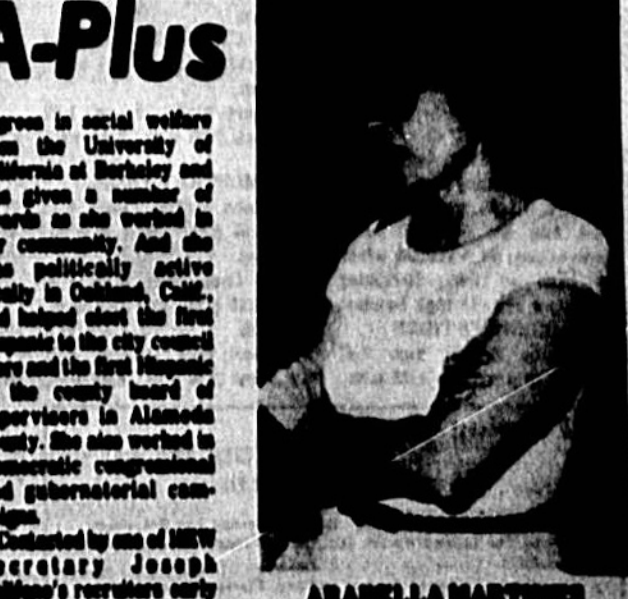
