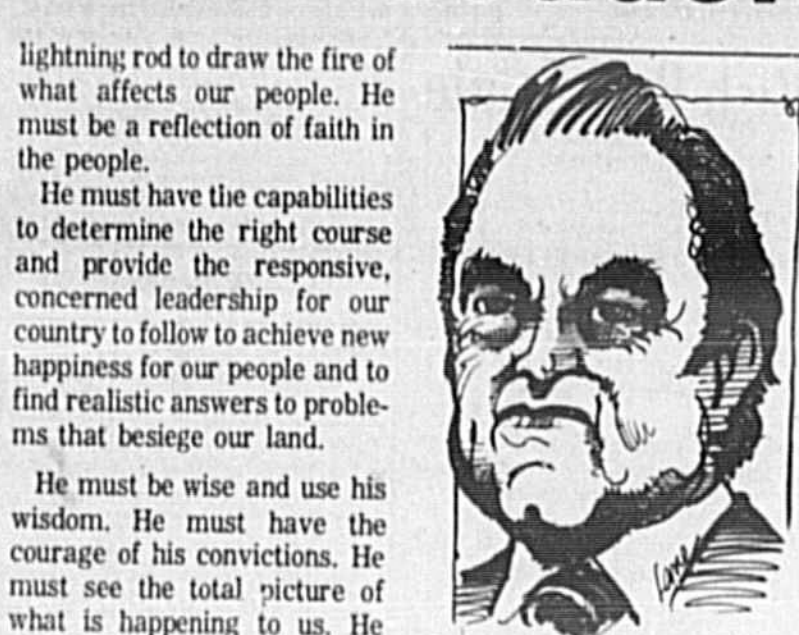

We have reached a time when we must have new leadership determined to place what the people think ahead of all other considerations. The people want to believe. They want trust. Crises, both foreign and domestic, demand this new leadership. Our problems are grave. They demand answers. Our people cry out for these answers. They do not want to continue to feel their lives are in suspension.

There is a new mood among the people that they want to know where they are going. They want strength and



lightning rod to draw the fire of what affects our people. He must be a reflection of faith in the people.

He must have the capabilities to determine the right course and provide the responsive, concerned leadership for our country to follow to achieve new happiness for our people and to find realistic answers to problems that beset our land.

He must be wise and use his wisdom. He must have the courage of his convictions. He must see the total picture of what is happening to us. He must see what the courts are doing in destroying the happiness of our people. He must be prepared to overhaul our government. He must be willing to pay the price in high taxes and government interference in every part of their lives. He must understand the economic downturn that inflation is creating, particularly among young marrieds and large families and other citizens, and

George Corley Wallace, governor of Alabama, was born Aug. 15, 1919, the son of Alabama farmers. He was graduated from the University of Alabama Law School in 1942, and served in the Army Air Force in World War II. He was assistant legislator, 1947-53. Elected governor in 1963, he tried the next year to block desegregation of the University of Alabama. Wallace garnered nearly 10 million popular votes and 45 electoral votes, campaigning against Vietnam War protesters, liberals, integrationists and Washington "bureaucrats." He was reelected governor in 1970 and 1974. During the 1972 campaign for the Democratic nomination, Wallace piled up strong wins in the Midwest and Southern primaries, but was shot and partially paralyzed May 15. He then withdrew from the race. Wallace remarried after his wife's death; he has four children.

Sunshine Law Violations? Seminole County Officials Slated For March Trials

Jury trials have been scheduled for the week of March 21 in County Court at Sanford for three county officials accused of conspiracy and violation of the state Sunshine Law.

The trials were scheduled today after attorneys for County Attorney Thomas G. Freeman and County Commissioners Harry Kwiatkowski and Michael Hattaway agreed Judge Harold Johnson at arraignment in which written pleas of innocent and waivers of

appearance were filed for their clients.

In December a Seminole County Grand Jury indicted Freeman for solicitation of an unlawful compensation, a felony, in connection with an aborted county \$37,000 purchase of a 100-acre tract in south Seminole for use as a clay pit. A circuit court judge threw out the indictment and State Atty. Abbott Herring is now appealing that decision to the Fourth District Court of Appeals, West Palm Beach.

Freeman, Hattaway and Kwiatkowski were indicted on misdemeanor charges of Sunshine Law violations and conspiracy concerning alleged non-public meetings in which the clay pit deal was discussed and its abortion decided.

The misdemeanor indictments were dismissed in County Court and Herring's office then filed direct information on the charges now pending and scheduled for jury trials the week of March 21.

Defense attorneys today were given 15 days in which to file pre-trial motions attacking the direct information.

Kwiatkowski's attorney, Newman Brock, today filed motions seeking the list of prospective jurors for the March 21 trials, demanding a speedy trial and asking the court to compel Herring's office to comply with court rules and procedure.

Brock said demands for discovery in the cases were filed Dec. 16 and Herring's office has failed to comply in furnishing information on the allegations charged.

The direct information charges Freeman, Kwiatkowski and Hattaway with three counts of conspiracy.

Another Sunshine Law violation court alleges the trio met Jan. 12, 1974, in the vicinity of 115 Mary Blvd., Longwood, to secure the nomination and election of Freeman as county attorney.

One Sunshine Law violation court claims the three met Dec. 31, 1974 at the CNA Building in Orlando to discuss selection of Freeman as county attorney.

The following January, the information alleges, Kwiatkowski and Hattaway voted to select Freeman.

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Water Worries Lake Mary

LAKE MARY — The city council found Thursday night that problems even more complicated and larger than gaining federal money for its planned expansion, extension and improvement of the city water system loom ahead before the project can be accomplished.

With approval from the U.S. Federal Home Admin. of \$54,000 in a federal loan for the project, councilmen were told that a special election may have to be held, approvals may have to be obtained from the local health department, dental and medical society, an ordinance must be adopted and interim financing must be obtained from a local banking institution.

In addition, a member of the city council — Martin Bacon Sr. — told colleagues he is not happy with the plan, which is part of the overall project, to buy water from the City of Sanford rather than creating additional sources of water supply within the city.

Bacon, saying the plan to go to Sanford for water appears to be unwise both in the long-term sense and because Lake Mary would "be tied up with another city that is hostile to us."

He said he may take the issue to the people if this course is pursued.

At the same meeting called to determine from which banking institution interim financing would be acquired, council found only two bids from the 10 banks contacted — one from Combank Longwood and the other Southeast First National of Maitland.

The Maitland bank proposal did not include an interest rate, while the Combank proposal included a provision that the city shift all its primary accounts to the Longwood facility.

Currently the city has its major bank accounts at the Maitland bank.

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Comptroller Issue Brings New Charges

Two top county government officers came to grips Thursday over the comptroller issue after Circuit Court Clerk Arthur Beckwith, Jr. charged a split of his duties could result in a "Watersgate" in Seminole County.

County Commission Chairman Michael Hattaway responded to Beckwith's allegations by charging the clerk with an attempt to react emotionally.

Beckwith said it is not uncommon at present to have county commissioners call and say they want certain things left in and certain things left out of minutes of county commission meetings.

"Can you imagine what would happen in a grand jury investigation?" Beckwith asked.

He pointed out that during a recent grand jury probe of alleged wrongdoing in county government, investigators from the state attorney's office were "in and out" of his office researching records and minutes of county commission meetings.

Hattaway responded to Beckwith's charges by saying the clerk is "trying to make an emotional issue, and I'm not surprised at anything he says."

Seminole County voters will determine the issue — which is to split Beckwith's duties by creation of a comptroller — in a March 9 referendum.

Lawyers last year approved a comptroller for Seminole County, but left the final decision up to the voters by specifying a referendum.

Hattaway says the board's purpose is to obtain a financial officer. "We don't have a financial adviser."

Concerning fiscal auditing, Hattaway says the board "gets no input."

The board is a comptroller to be chosen and serve as a financial officer. "If the position is okay by the voters — can be used only for cause and not because of disagreement with it," the county commissioners' Philanthropically, Beckwith says he opposes the bill because it would strip his office of all recording functions as provided for in the Florida Constitution.

Hattaway's answer is that creation of a comptroller is the "only way to go" and represents a modernization of county government. To view it any other way, he says, is "to make an emotional issue not based on the facts."

"Anybody can be a bookkeeper, but a comptroller would act as a financial adviser," the chairman noted.

Beckwith also attacked a memo from Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski which asked department chiefs at a Monday work shop session to submit their pros and cons concerning the issue.

State Declines To File Charges Against Benner

County Court Judge Harold Johnson ordered a 25-year-old Seminole County recreation department employee released from jail after State Atty. Abbott Herring's office declined to file formal felony charges.

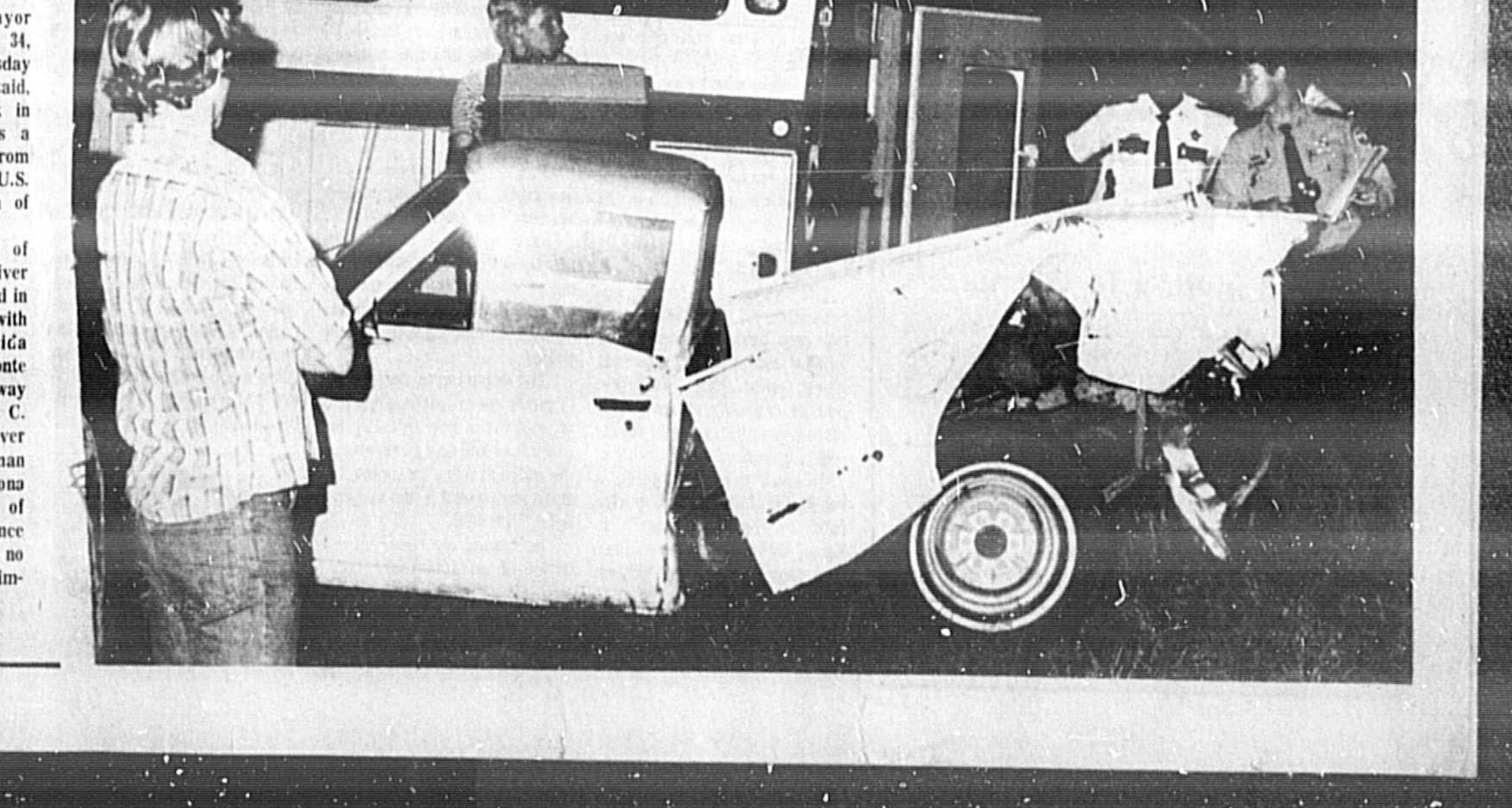
George Mike Benner, 25, of 525 SR-436, Fern Park, had been arrested by Longwood Police early Monday on charges of felony marijuana possession, assault and battery, resisting an officer with violence to his person and escape.

Police said they stopped an auto on U.S. 17-92 at Big Tree Road after a high speed chase from SR-434. The driver was arrested on traffic charges and police reported they chased Benner on foot for 100 yards down the median of the divided highway, struggled with him and then apprehended him in a wooded area after a warning shot was fired into the air.

Longwood Patrolman Roy Burfield, who arrested Benner, said he had no knowledge that the state had declined to prosecute the school's playground supervisor when he was told by a reporter Thursday that Benner had been released by the court.

Bill Would Cut State Employees

The chairman of the Seminole Legislative Delegation has prefaced a bill which would limit the number of state employees to Florida's population.

State Senator John Vogt, D-Cocoa Beach, said his bill would limit the number of fulltime state workers at any one time to one per cent of the total population.

Vogt said the spiraling number of state workers since 1966, jumped 100 per cent in 1966, would reduce the number of state employees represented only one-half per cent of the total population.

Vogt pointed out that percentage has swelled to full per cent today.

Vogt said the state employs between 90,000 and 95,000 workers compared to a total state population of approximately 8 1/2 million persons.

"This constitutional amendment does not imply limiting the number of employees will limit services," Vogt said.

He said he began researching the issue after "more and more people became concerned" about the increase in the number of state workers.

"We need to get a firm grip on government before it gets a grip on us," Vogt added.

The advent of collective bargaining also spurred Vogt's decision to prefer Senate Joint Resolution 266. Vogt has seven co-sponsors for his resolution.

The senator said collective bargaining will limit the state's ability to hold down the number of government workers.

Powerful unions credit lawmakers for government work force efforts to limit the number of state employees.

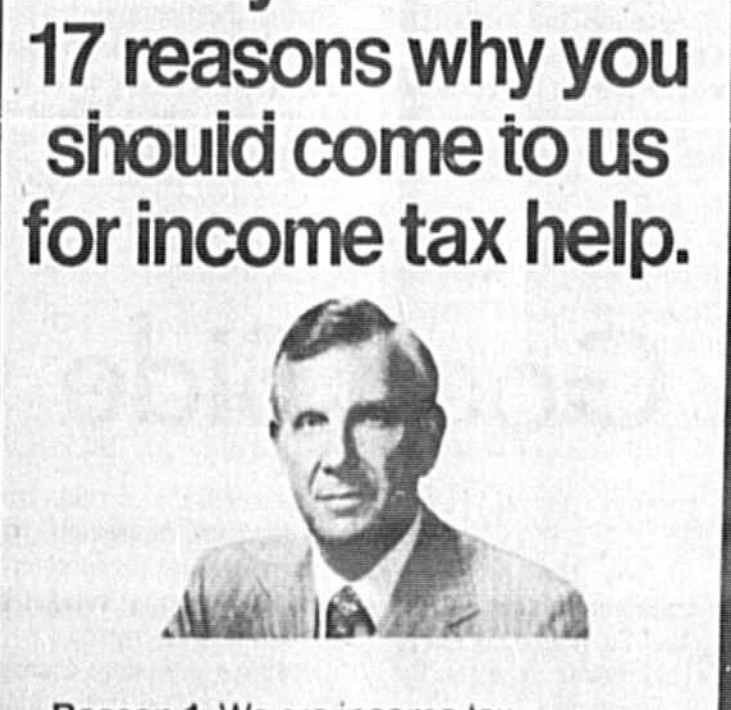

U.N. Fails On Mideast

The debate on the Middle East in the United Nations Security Council has been climaxed in a way that could have been anticipated. With the Palestine Liberation Organization taking part, and with Israel boycotting the session, the council came up with a resolution so weighted in favor of the PLO concept of where justice lies that the United States could only veto it.

The United States tried and failed to advance the idea that Palestinian national interests could be made compatible with the continued existence of Israel. The PLO refused to bend in its demand for support of a new "independent state in Palestine" based on "inalienable national rights" of Palestinians, coupled with a demand for Israeli withdrawal from all Arab territories occupied since the 1967 war.

Since nations supporting the PLO know that such a position is wholly unacceptable to Israel, and could never serve as a basis for negotiations, we have to assume that they offered the resolution primarily for propaganda purposes. The Arab strategy at this point appears to be one of trying to endow the PLO and its ambition to dismember the Israeli state as much as possible in its defense of Israel.

Whatever gains the PLO might have made in the way the Security Council exercise unfolded were surely diminished by what was happening at the same time in Lebanon. By losing his troops to help the Lebanese Muslims fight the Christian Phalangists in that war of religious and political rivalry, the PLO gave no stirring example of how Palestinians and Jews might be able to share power in the kind of non-sectarian Palestinian state the PLO likes to talk about.

While the Lebanese crisis seems to have cooled for the time being, that touch-and-go situation in Israel's northern border only demonstrates how easily a general Middle East war could be reignited. The Security Council did nothing to make peace in Lebanon and, as it turned out, has done nothing to bring Israel and the Palestinians closer to an understanding.

It is in the familiar atmosphere of no-war, no-peace that Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin began a U.S. visit that will serve to reemphasize U.S.-Israeli ties, while President Ford hints at a forthcoming trip to the Middle East. The enigma still confronting all parties is how to bridge the barrier that now prevents any fruitful discussion about the fate of displaced Palestinians in which both Israeli and Arab interests are given equal weight. Diplomacy at the presidential level may offer the only hope of breaking the dangerous stalemate which the Security Council has failed to break.

The Last Word?

The death penalty supposedly was wiped out by a 1972 decision of the U. S. Supreme Court, but the language of the ruling was less than positive. And 35 states have enacted new laws conforming to what the majority believes the justices said. The 1972 ruling stated that the existing capital punishment laws gave judges and juries too much latitude in determining which individuals would die and which would live. Subsequent laws make the death penalty mandatory for specific crimes or set guidelines to be followed in consideration of mitigating circumstances.

The new laws remain intact, although more than 400 men and women are now on death row with appeals in various stages of the legal process. The Supreme Court will hear arguments in late March on appeals from five states involving six convicted murderers. This year, presumably, the final word will be handed down on whether the death penalty is cruel and unusual punishment or a justified deterrent to wanton violence.

There is no question that in the kind of world we live in, the U.S. must maintain an effective, dependable — and secure — intelligence system. But while the Congress, the administration and the CIA ponder just how this is to be accomplished, while at the same time giving the people, through their representatives, better oversight and control over the secret undertakings of their government than they have hitherto had, it is essential that we keep this whole matter of intelligence in perspective.

The best intelligence apparatus in the world is utterly useless if those empowered to act upon the information it provides fail to do so, or wish it away, or distort it to make it conform to desired policy or preconceived notions.

Our own recent history provides more than a few examples of this. Before World War II, the U.S. possessed that dream of espionage agents, the ability to read the enemy's diplomatic code; in this case the potential enemy was Japan.

Yet during the latter days of 1941, when it was obvious that the Japanese were planning an attack this knowledge was ignored or disbelieved.

Again, in the Vietnam war, the U.S. had abundant and reliable forwarding of the Communist Tet offensive of 1967. But this information was suppressed because it ran counter to what some people wanted to believe, or wanted the public to believe. And again the penalty was the unnecessary loss of many American, as well as Vietnamese, lives.

For all the reputed billions of the Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara and others directing the war, the nation could have been just as well, or as ill, served if someone had simply stood blindfolded and thrown darts at a list of options.

We must also make the distinction between intelligence gathering, which is absolutely vital and not in dispute in the current discussion, and covert activities aimed at changing certain realities we don't like.

Despite all the soul-searching in Washington these days, the question facing Americans is not really that of how a democracy can have an accountable, effective intelligence system, without running the risk of constant, damaging leaks of secret information.

Rather, the question, as it has been throughout history, is the use or misuse to which a nation puts its intelligence establishment and the military and political information it acquires. And that, of course, ultimately depends upon the wisdom and integrity, nay, decency, of its leaders.

That requirement alone is enough to give us serious causes for concern about the safety of this Republic. In exposing J. Edgar Hoover's peccadilloes and his trespasses on Constitutional rights, it has been easy to ignore his other side: capable, industrious and often brave and decent.

To be sure, we have disclosed many of the old FBI autocrater's wrongdoings. Long before Hoover's death in 1972 made him fair game for a timid media, Drew Pearson was detailing both his fine points and his foibles.

In 1934, for instance, Pearson wrote of Hoover's stubborn insistence on being provided with an armored Pierce-Arrow just like the President's. But he also told of Hoover's unrelenting effort to mold his young agency into a team of talented crimebusters.

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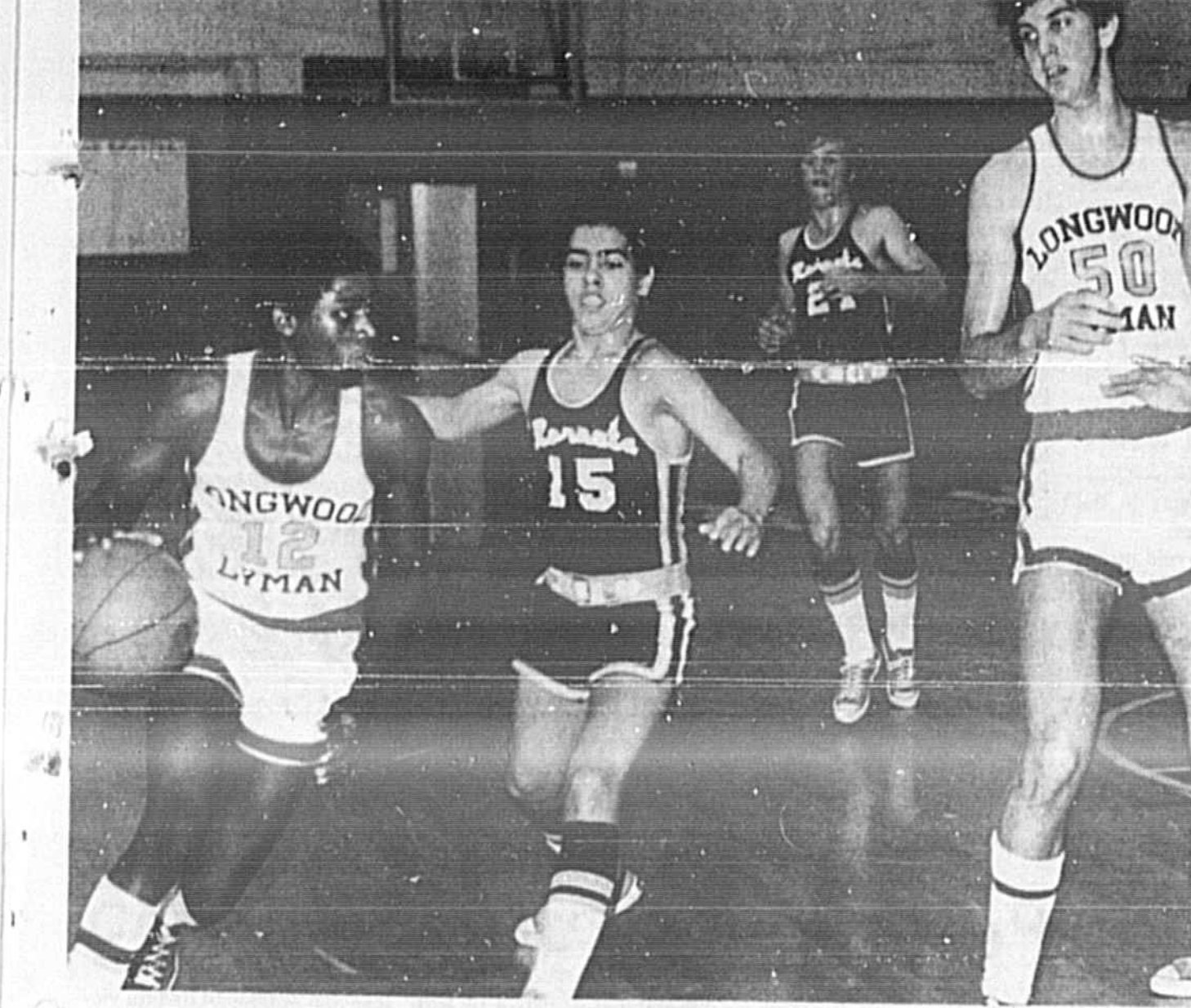
