

Ypsilanti Coeds Arm Selves After Fifth Slaying

YPSILANTI, Mich. (AP) — Fear gas devices designed to ward off an attacker. Most customers were coeds, she said. A number of coeds said they had been the object of prowling persons trying to pick them up, or knew coeds who had. "I found a man's hand on my window sill about 2 a.m. a couple months ago," said Judy Long, 18, of Bloomfield Hills, a dormitory resident at Eastern Michigan University. An electric cord was wrapped around her throat and eight-inch-long gas was carried on her chest and stomach.

"It's creepy—it's frightening," said Mary Burke, 19, of Howell, an Eastern Michigan freshman who lives in a dormitory at the 12,000-student school. Since August 1967, the bodies of two Eastern Michigan coeds, one University of Michigan coed, a 16-year-old girl and the Basom girl have been found within a radius of less than 10 miles north of Eastern Michigan University. An electric cord was wrapped around her throat and eight-inch-long gas was carried on her chest and stomach.

"My boyfriend gave me this switchblade," said Romi Friedman of Portland, Maine, a pre-med, 19-year-old blonde nursing student at the University of Michigan. "I carry it everywhere. It carries things on key chains."

She said "When you're scared you do these things. My friends all carry things on key chains."

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Kidd said he last saw her walking down the Penn Central Railroad tracks in a factory section of the city, toward her home. "I should have walked her all the way home," he said. A truck driver spotted her body at 6:30 a.m. the next day. An orange mohair sweater which Dawn had been wearing was found a mile away in the yard of an abandoned farm house. She apparently had not been raped, said Sheriff Douglas J. Harvey.

Last March 25, the nude body of 19-year-old Marjorie Skelton of Romulus was found in a secluded section of Ann Arbor near the University of Michigan campus. A garter belt was wrapped around her neck, she had been beaten severely about the face and she had been sexually violated. Miss Skelton had been stabbed to death and sexually molested.

Four days earlier, on March 21, the body of Jane Mixer, a 22-year-old Michigan law school student, was found in a cemetery near Detroit northeast of Ypsilanti. She had been shot several times in the head. Her body, lying on a tombstone, was fully clothed and she had not been raped.

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The series of slayings began in August 1967 when the body of Mary Fieszer, a 19-year-old Eastern Michigan coed, was discovered about a mile from the location of the Basom girl's body. Fieszer had been beaten, stabbed and sexually abused.

Gene Messinger, Republican candidate in last year's primary elections against Rep. E. Doye Bassett for a seat in the Florida House of Representatives, and husband of the president of the Sanford Women's Republican Club, today changed his party affiliation from the Grand Old Party to Democrat. 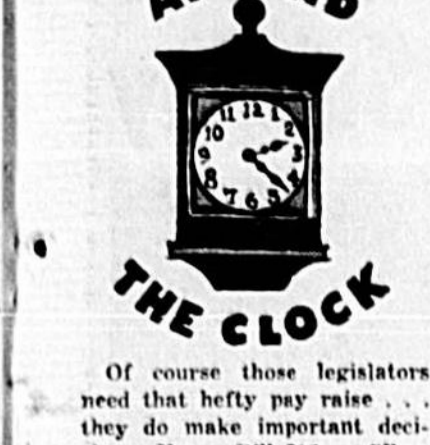

John Mercer, county school trustee, had drawn some fire from Allan P. Keith, school board member, over his being on the Melvinville Private School board of directors. Keith mentioned Mercer's situation after the special Thursday school board meeting.

School Mix Plan Delayed; Audience Opposes Program

The atmosphere was charged with emotion Thursday afternoon when the five members of the Seminole County School Board met to hear the 1968-70 desegregation plan as proposed by the administrative staff of the school system. The plan was directed by the board to prepare a plan using geographic zones and possibly the phasing in of certain schools in predominantly Negro neighborhoods.

The school plan as presented by Tom Richey, county administrative aide, did not call for the closing of any school, but did establish zones around the 27 county schools and called for the creation of a portable elementary facility named "Elementary B."

Package Hospital Cut Hurts Florida

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Concern over the fate of the funds for emergency hospitals may hit disaster-conscious Florida harder than other states, health officials said Thursday.

Florida has 46 of the 60,000 packaged hospital beds, most of them stored in or near the State Board of Health.

The packaged emergency hospital program arose this week after President Nixon, in cutting the 1973 budget, trimmed his predecessor's \$7.5 million recommendation to \$2.6 million.

In making the cutback, the administration said as much as \$5 million worth of drugs and other perishable equipment maintained in the stores would deteriorate annually.

In Florida, Hamlin said, community hospitals for the past 18 months have been dipping into the stored drugs and equipment on a regular basis. Material used by the community hospital is replaced with fresh goods.

The state also is replacing or updating older disaster hospitals with supplies being distributed by a government depot at Prairie, Miss., Hamlin said.

Suit Filed In Killing

MIAMI (AP) — Parents of a youth allegedly killed by a cellmate filed suit Tuesday against the inmate, Sheriff Wilson Purdy and Dade County.

Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Adams charged negligence on May 31, 1966, when Richard Lloyd Adams, 19, was strangled in his cell.

The suit named Raymond Rhome, 18, a convicted rapist sentenced to life imprisonment, as the killer and said he was "a highly dangerous sociopath and psychopath with homicidal and homicidal tendencies" and should have been in a solitary cell and under guard.

Rhyme is awaiting trial on charges that he strangled Adams and carved the letters "R-B-O-M-E" on his back.

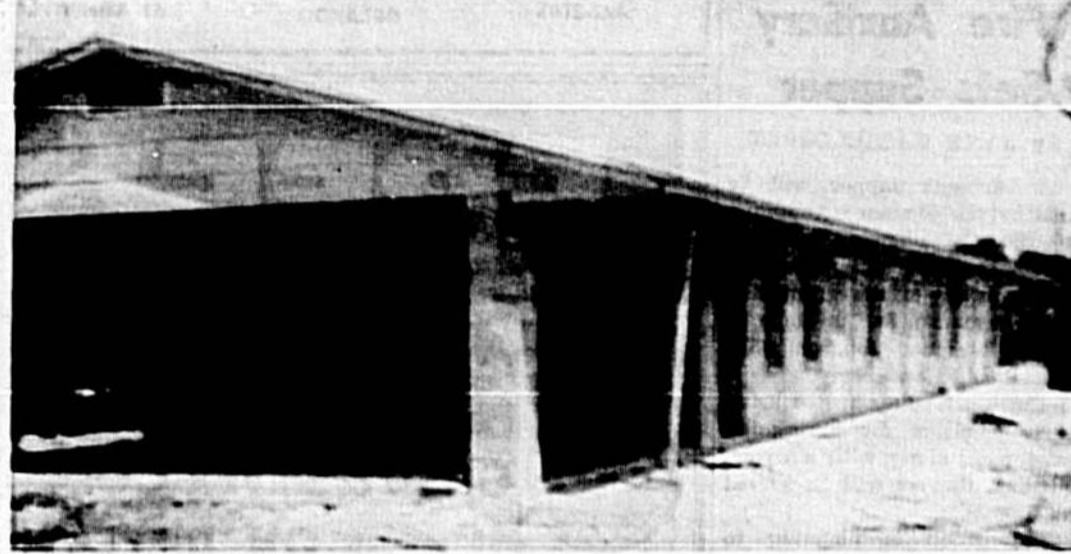

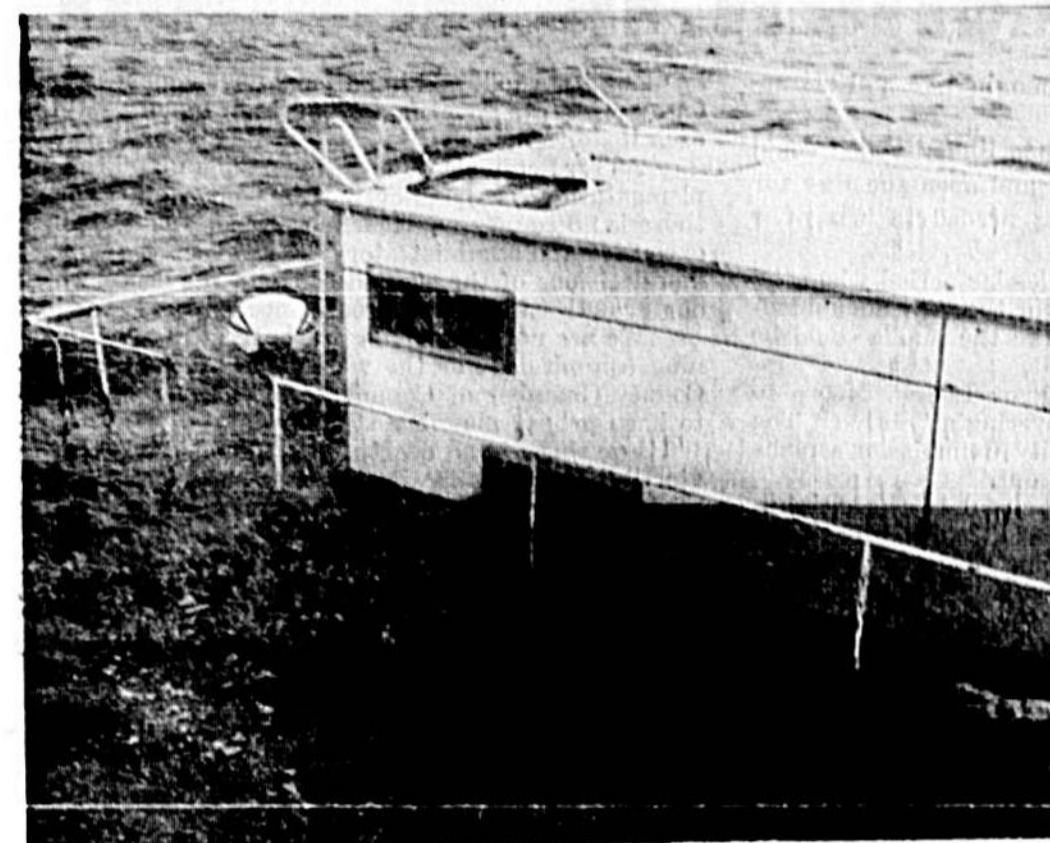

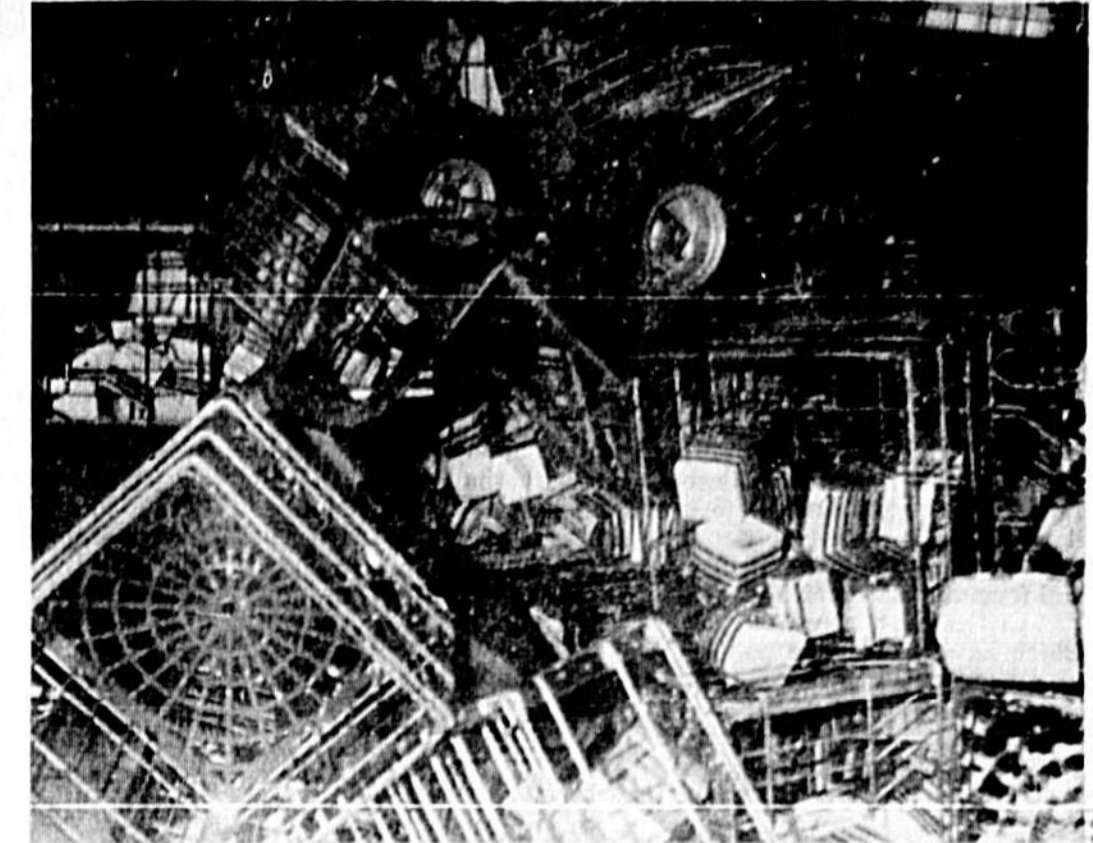

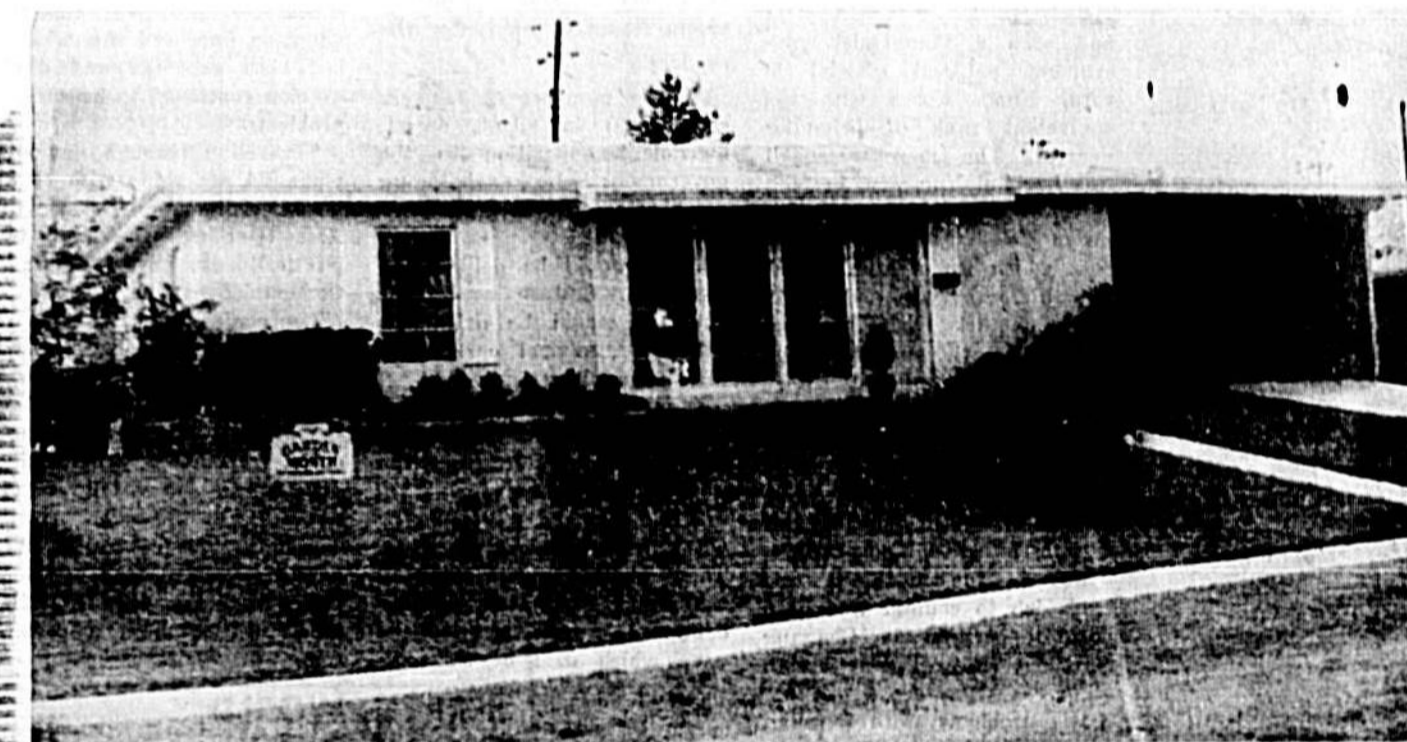
