





Although Representative Papy of Monroe County has lenied that he ever heard of such a thing as offering a bribe to anyone to vote against the "bookie" bill, residents of Seminole County who have long known Representative Bralley Odhum as an honest, honorable and upright young man will prefer to believe that the facts are exactly as Mr. Odham has stated in the House of Representatives.

This bill would have deprived book makers, those race-

track gamblers who operate outside the law in placing wagers on the races, from the use of telegraph facilities, something vital to their trade, and in so far as Florida tracks are concerned, would have wrecked what is well known to be a multimillion dollar but entirely illegal business operation. It stands to reason that these racketeers would have been ready to pay plenty to kill this bill.

Mr. Odham says he was at first offered \$200 to vote against this bill. Just before the vote was to be taken, he was approached again and the ante was raised to \$500 and a case of Scotch. Rep. Camp of Marion County says that he too was offered a bribe to vote against the bill. Victim's Innocence Or Guilt Not To Be Considered In Rendering Decision

By ROMNEY WHEELER GREENVILLE, S. C., May 21, P)— Circuit Judge J. Robert Martin, Jr., charged a Greenville county jury today "to see that a verdict is rendered that speaks the truth" in conviction or acquital of 28 white men who are accused of lynching a regro.

The judge began his 5,000 word charge at 2:30 P. M. (EST) after pending last night and today review of law involved.

"A court of law," Judge Martin told the jury, "recognizes no color an creed, Therefore, gentlemen, instruct you that under your oaths as jurers you are not to allow any so-called racial issue to enter into your deliberations in this case in any respect."
