THE SECOND CHOICE VOTE

CLEAR EXPOSITION OF PRIMARY LAW FOR BENEFIT OF VOTERS

So many voters have an erroneous idea of the second choice vote that in many counties the county executive committee have started a school of instruction for the benefit of the voters. Having recently noted a clear exposition of the second choice voting from the pen of C. O. Andrews, Asst. Attorney Gen. in the Stuart Messenger the same is reproduced and it would be well to cut this out and paste it up for future reference.

A great number of voters believe that they, weaker or less the chance of their first choice candidate by voting a second choice authorized by our present primary law.

This is indicated by the fact that the official state canvass of the primary election held in 1914 shows that only a little more than half of the voters expressed a second choice.

Under our method of tallying and canvassing it is impossible for a voter's second choice to lessen or militate against the chances of his first choice to any degree whatever.

Section 50 of the primary law provides as follows:

"If any candidate for an office shall receive a majority of first choice votes he shall be declared nominated for such office. If no candidate shall receive such a majority of first choice votes, then the nomination for such office shall be determined by excluding from further consideration the candidate who shall have received the greatest number of first choice votes, or the greatest and equal number of first choice votes, and by adding to such first choice votes of each of said two candidates the second choice votes cast for him by those voters whose first choice votes shall have been cast for any of the candidates excluded as herein provided."

The portion above seems to be the least understood of any part of the primary law. The two candidates receiving the highest number of votes go into what may be termed a "second primary." In fact, it was intended for and has the same results as a second primary as held under the primary law of this state prior to 1914.

We offer the following to sustain our assertion that the voter to accomplish most with his ballot should always vote a second choice.

If a voter's first choice candidate is eliminated, not being one of the highest first choice men, the second

choice voter of that voter must be counted when cast for either of the two men in the "second primary."

If a voter's first and second choice candidates are in the second primary, by reason of their being the two highest first choice men, his second choice vote cannot be counted, for the reason that this would permit one's second choice vote to cancel his first choice.

When this condition becomes well understood it will undoubtedly cause a better expression as to political preference to come from the voters. In fact, the lack of understanding this feature has caused a great number of voters to cast only a first choice, thinking that by so doing they helped their first choice candidate more than he would had he also voted a second choice.

He is in the same attitude as a voter was under the old primary law who didn't care to vote in the second primary because the man he was supporting in the first primary was defeated; he, in other words, is put in the attitude of not having any choice as between any two men left in the race, which the writer contends should be the isolated exception and not the rule even in a few instances.

The tally sheets used at the precincts are so arranged that an accurate tabulation and a return of the total number of all first choice votes is made to show for whom the same voters cast their second choice. For example, the certificate of return, where there are five candidates for one office, when correctly filled out, shows something like the following:

Two hundred electors voted 200 first choice votes for A.

And 34 second choice votes for B.

And 66 second choice votes for C.

And 42 second choice votes for D.

And 58 second choice votes for E.

Two hundred fourteen electors voted 214 first choice votes for B.

And 42 second choice votes for A.

And 53 second choice votes for C.

And 81 second choice votes for E.

Two hundred fifty four electors voted 254 first choice votes for C.

And 11 second choice votes for A.

And 185 second choice votes for B.

And 21 second choice votes for D.

And 31 second choice votes for E.

One hundred one electors voted 101 first choice votes for D.

And 30 second choice votes for A.

And 26 second choice votes for B.

And 26 second choice votes for C.

And 20 second choice votes for E.

One hundred thirty seven electors voted 137 first choice votes for E.

And 32 second choice votes for A.

And 25 second choice votes for B.

And 24 second choice votes for C.

And 56 second choice votes for D.

As shown above, B and C being the two highest candidates receiving the highest number of first choice votes, are required to go into the "second primary." This being determined, the canvassers first eliminate from consideration all the second choice votes mentioned in 2 and 3, as they are not to be counted, and then they must gather B's and C's second choice votes from 14, 1 and 5, which may be tabulated something like the following:

First choice from Second choice from Total

B 214 34 248

C 254 42 296

As shown above, B and C being the two highest candidates receiving the highest number of first choice votes, are required to go into the "second primary." This being determined, the canvassers first eliminate from consideration all the second choice votes mentioned in 2 and 3, as they are not to be counted, and then they must gather B's and C's second choice votes from 14, 1 and 5, which may be tabulated something like the following:

Section 8 of chapter 6874, acts of 1915, amending the Bryan primary law of 1914, reads as follows:

In addition to the sworn statement required by section 22 hereof, shall indicate therein the group in which he desires his name to appear on the ballot, and said groups shall be numerically designated. Provided, however, that candidates for delegates to national conventions shall not be nominated by groups, but by a plurality vote."

The above amendment to section 52 will simplify the canvass, as the voters in each group will be counted exactly as in the manner provided where only one candidate is to be nominated.

Keep the Soil Busy
An idle soil is a loafer. Unless it is producing something it is losing something. John M. Scott, animal industrialist to the University of Florida Experiment Station, would have the soil work. In some sections of the country and on some kinds of soil a period of rest is advantageous. In Florida it is unwise to allow land to rest in the ordinary way. If some profitable crop is not grown a crop of weeds will be. These weeds are usually burned the following season. Practically everything except the ash is lost in such methods.

Furthermore, open soils, like most Florida soils, lose considerable plant food from leaching. There are no plant roots to check the water and to use the food it contains. Land left bare is also subjected to the sun, which burns out the organic matter.

Now weeds can be turned under and will add some green manure, or organic matter if they are allowed to mature. But it is best to grow some cultivated crop which will add more organic matter and leave the soil in better condition for future crops. Weeds will infest the land year after year and necessitate more cultivation to keep them in check. Keep the land covered with some useful crop.

Mr. Scott advises farmers to plan a rotation, which will give a legume every second or third year. This may also grow a legume each year as a catch crop.

The velvet bean is one of the best legumes for Florida. It will supply an abundance of good feed a large amount of nitrogen and organic matter for the soil.

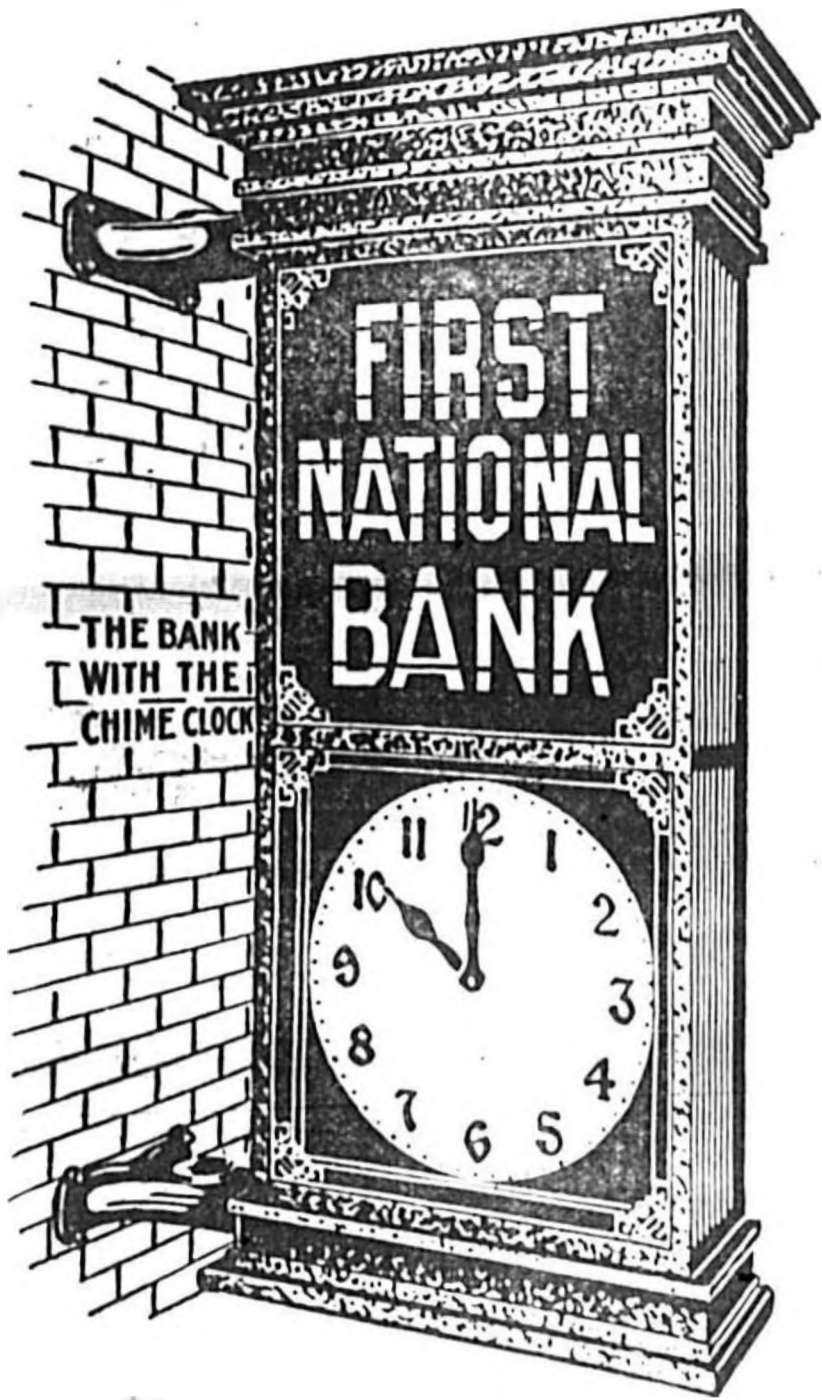

Told through this hour
By Thine own guide
So by Thy power
No foot shall slide."

Every one who has lived within sound of the bells of Westminster is familiar with the verse given above. The origin of the carillon has never been positively established. Some writers ascribe it to a Mr. Crouch, who was a pupil of Dr. Randall, Regius Professor of Music. This, however, is disputed by other writers who ascribe it to Dr. Randall's conception of the idea taken from a movement in the fifth bar of the opening of Haendel's Symphony, "I know that my Redeemer liveth." The chimes were first fitted to the clock, St. Mary's the Great, in Cambridge, but were not copied until they were reproduced on a very large scale in the Victoria clock tower of the House of Parliament.

At the quarter, half and three-quarter hour, these chimes will ring out in various musical combinations. At a quarter past the hour, four strokes Westminster; at half past the hour, eight strokes; Reveille, at three quarters past the hour, 12 strokes; Cathedral peal, and on the hour 16 strokes Westminster, followed by the striking of the full hour on a clear vibrant tone.

The most distinctive feature of the chimes will be their ability to play all our popular songs and hymns, and to play any piece of music which can be played on a piano.

Each day of the week the chimes will play their own special music. On Monday they will play the hymn, "God Save the King"; on Tuesday, "The Rose Tree"; on Wednesday, "The Rose Tree"; on Thursday, "The Rose Tree"; on Friday, "The Rose Tree"; on Saturday, "The Rose Tree"; on Sunday, "The Rose Tree".

The big clocks are operated by electricity from a master clock in the building in the same way as the other clocks in the city.

It is further ordered that the clerk of this board give notice by publication for three weeks in the Sanford Herald, a newspaper of general circulation, published in Sanford, Seminole county, Florida, of the date when this board will consider said petition, citing the reasons why it may be interested in said petition, and reasons why said petition should not be granted.

SIDE STEPPING TACTICS WILL NOT MISLEAD DEMOCRATS OF FLORIDA REGARDING SERIOUS ISSUES BEHIND THE "STURKIE RESOLUTION," SAYS PARK TRAMMELL, CANDIDATE FOR U. S. SENATOR.

In his letter of January 17th published in the Times-Union Senator Bryan unqualifiedly ENDORSED BOTH SECTIONS 4 AND 5 AND TOOK UP AN ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF BOTH SECTIONS.

In his letter of January 21st published in the Gainesville Sun HE SAID AT THE TIME THE RESOLUTION WAS OFFERED BEFORE THE COMMITTEE HE APPROVED OF THE SAME, AND THAT HE STILL APPROVED OF ITS PROVISIONS.

From the moment I first knew of Sections 4 and 5 of the Resolution I DENOUNCED THEM AS UNDEMOCRATIC AND UNAMERICAN AND AN INFRINGEMENT UPON THE RELIGIOUS LIBERTY, FREEDOM OF CONSCIENCE AND INDIVIDUAL LIBERTY OF THE DEMOCRATS OF FLORIDA, AND URGED THAT THEY BE REPEALED.

My position was in accord with Jefferson's idea of democracy and the American policy of allowing every citizen to enjoy his religious liberty and freedom of conscience.

SECTION 4 MADE NO REFERENCE WHATSOEVER TO SECRET ORGANIZATIONS BUT DEALT ENTIRELY WITH RELIGIOUS MATTERS. IT SOUGHT TO DISFRANCHISE THOUSANDS OF DEMOCRATS SOLELY ON ACCOUNT OF THEIR RELIGIOUS VIEWS. Section 5 made no reference to secret political societies, but referred only to "Secret Organizations" which attempts in any way to influence political action or results.

To better understand the purpose of Sections 4 and 5, let us turn to a simple, plain religious and political condition in Florida. The resolution was proposed by a close political friend of Senator Bryan. In the local political and religious differences in Jacksonville the gentleman who wrote the resolution has even named the Catholics' side. Throughout the State the Catholics have opposed the adoption of these new tests and claimed the tests would not bar them. They were and are now lined up almost solidly for Senator Bryan.

IT IS APPARENT THAT THE FEW ORIGINATING SECTIONS 4 AND 5 INTENDED THAT THOSE NEW TESTS SHOULD BE ANCHORS TO DISFRANCHISE THOUSANDS OF DEMOCRATS WHO ARE PROTESTANTS AND THAT THEY WERE INTENDED FOR THEM TO DISFRANCHISE A SINGLE DEMOCRAT WHO IS A CATHOLIC.

But any such discrimination, I believe in a "fair deal for all" Senator Bryan to try to restrict and narrow the issue to the issues of FAR GREATER IMPORTANCE THAN THOSE WHICH WERE INVOLVED. The Democrats of Florida will not forget the far reaching and more important issues arising out of Sections 4 and 5. They know religious liberty, freedom of conscience and individual liberty, were at stake.

I HAVE MADE NO FIGHT ON ANY RELIGIOUS DENOMINATION AND HAVE NOT TRIED TO DISFRANCHISE ANY DEMOCRAT. I want those of every religious faith to enjoy their religious liberty. I have only fought the attempt of the few to disfranchise thousands of Democrats in the State. The friends of Senator Bryan who were back of Sections 4 and 5 and the Senator himself by his approval of these provisions brought the issues into the campaign. I did not. I have only met them squarely and frankly.

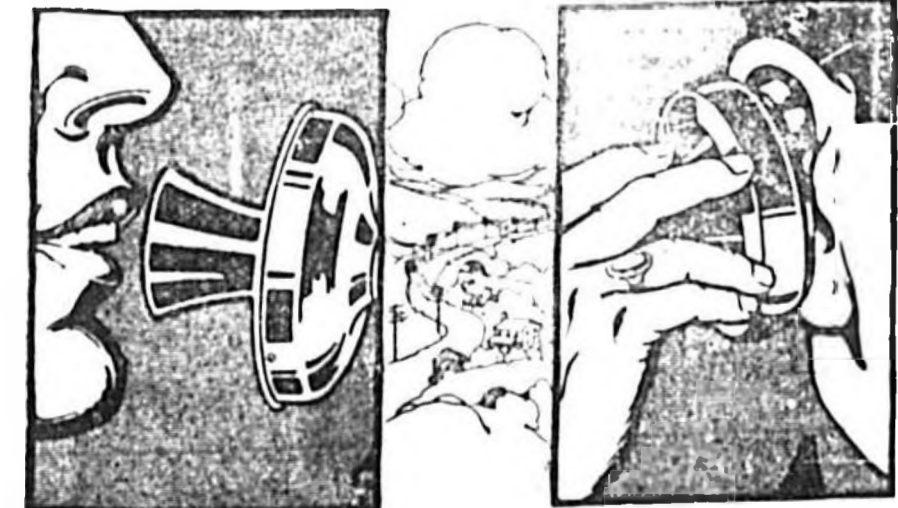

At Birmingham, Ala. sub-contracts are being awarded for the construction of a motor speedway that will cost about \$500,000.

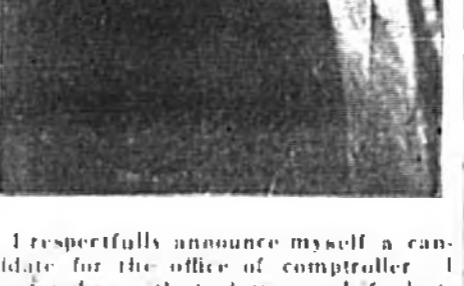

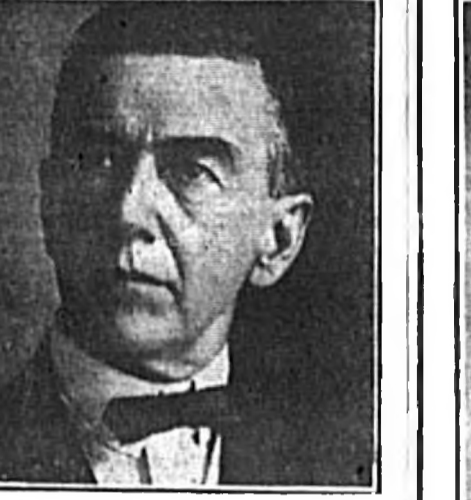

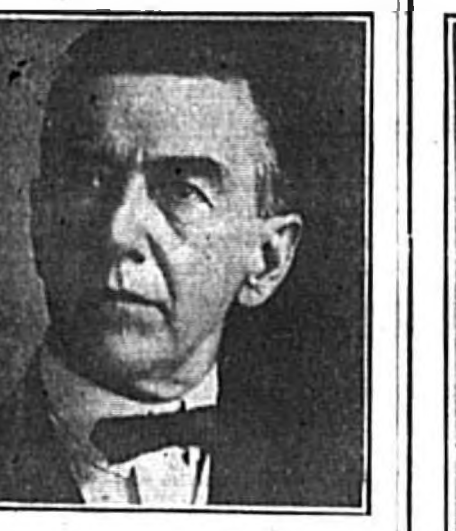

That the elephant bones found several months ago in the St. Johns river near here by the fishermen employed by J. E. Vincent and brought to The Herald office for exhibition

and afterward sent to the Florida University by C. M. Berry are an important find is true.

Not that they are worth any special amount of money to any one finding more of them but they are worth a great amount to science and in the interest of science there should be another search made for the remainder of this prehistoric monster. The finding of the bones and subsequent investigation has aroused much interest in scientific circles over the state and the fact that the bones were found in the St. Johns river farther south than these mastodons were supposed to roam gives rise to many stories and much speculation as to whether they roamed in this country at will or came this far and were lost or overcome by glaciers.

The following letter was received by Mr. Berry from the curator of the Florida State Museum of the State University:

Gainesville, Fla., Mar. 23, 1916. Mr. C. M. Berry, Sanford, Fla.:

Dear Mr. Berry: Yours of the 20th with data of the elephant bones just received; thanks. I have changed the record and enclose you a new receipt. I agree with you that it is quite probable that if not the entire skeleton, at least more bones can be found there. While it would hardly be worth the expense of any one going from here to do the work (and we have not the funds to do it with either) yet I would think that it might be possible to arouse sufficient local interest to do something towards it. If the water is not too deep, oyster tongs might be used to a good advantage or an iron pipe with drag hook attached, drag over the bottom behind the boat might locate them. Some teeth would be especially desirable as those are necessary to correctly determine the species.
