## TRACTIONLINE WEST TO EAST IN FLORIDA

### TROLLEY STARTS FROM TAMPA TO COAST VIA SANFORD

Again we hear of the "Holly Dream" coming true in regard to a trolley line from the east coast to the west coast via Sanford and this time the line starts from Tampa. The following is copied from Tampa Times.

That the ultimate destination of the interurban railway between Tampa and Lakeland is the east coast, was given out today by E. J. Binford, who is handling the local end of the northern capitalists interested. The trolley system crossing the state, striking the Atlantic possibly at Daytona or St. Augustine. More than a year ago Mr. Binford and engineers for the interurban interests went over the ground between Tampa and Sanford.

The project at present in hand is the interurban between Tampa and Lakeland with lines running out of Lakeland, one connecting with Bartow, and others radiating from Plant City for short distances. Wells & Nelson, engineers from Chicago and New York are in the field and have been for ten days. Yesterday the line was staked out as far as Six Mile Creek. By nightfall, Judge Binford said this morning the engineers will have reached Mango with the preliminary line. Later levels will be ascertained.

Judge Binford said this morning that it is the intention of the men with whom he is associated in the project to build from Tampa to Lakeland first. Later the line to Bartow will be constructed. Other lines will be built through Auburndale, Lake Alfred, Haines City, Kissimmee, Orlando and Sanford. The link connecting the lines with the coast are indeterminate, and might be by way of Palatka, or by Deland. It is not improbable that other interests might build some of the intermediate lines, forming the complete system eventually.

#### Forecasts Trunk Line Through State

The development of a trunk line through Florida, formed by the existing interurban trolleys is predicted by Judge Binford as a matter of comparatively few years. The steps will be identical with the building up of an interurban system in Indiana. Fifteen years ago the interurban business was in its infancy in that state and Judge Binford and the men associated with him were selected by Indiana men as practical. The announcement that a trolley would be built from Indianapolis to Richmond, Ind., a distance of seventy miles was considered amazing.

"They said it could never be done," Judge Binford said this morning reminiscing. "Today that line through Greensfield is the cream of the Terre Haute, Indianapolis and Eastern. It is paying a return on \$150,000 per mile, and is the best section of the consolidated lines in Indiana. But when I asked the franchise in the Indiana counties people told me they would never be used. They were given me and every one was used."

Indianapolis is connected by trolley with Dayton, Columbus, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Toledo and other Ohio points; with Pittsburgh, Pa.; Detroit, Mich.; Chicago, Ill., and St. Louis, Mo. Practically all this development has taken place within the last fifteen to twenty years."

Judge Binford, who up to the time he came to Tampa in 1913 to regain his health, was associated as an officer and as counsel for the traction interests, in and about Indianapolis, and at the time the project was launched for the Greenfield interurban—and in other instances secured the franchises in his own name just as he is doing now.

We know exactly what can be depended upon in the way of business and development," he said today. "While we realize that the country is not built up and that there will have to be considerable development before the business will meet the expenses, we are prepared to assist in the populating of the country. I have already obtained a survey of the land for four miles

on each side of the Tampa Plant City road, and the interurban experts will be able to say what can be produced in that section with a certain degree of positiveness.

## THE SECOND CHOICE VOTE

### CLEAR EXPOSITION OF PRIMARY LAW FOR BENEFIT OF VOTERS

So many voters have an erroneous idea of the second choice vote that in many counties the county executive committee have started a school of instruction for the benefit of the voters. Having recently noted a clear exposition of the second choice voting from the pen of C. O. Andrews, Asst. Attorney Gen. in the Stuart Messenger, the same is reproduced and it would well be worth this out and paste it up for future reference.

A great number of voters believe that they weaken or lessen the chance of their first choice candidate by voting a second choice authorized by our present primary law.

This is indicated by the fact that the official state canvass of the primary election held in 1914 shows that only a little more than half of the voters expressed a second choice.

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Section 50 of the primary law provides as follows:

"If any candidate for an office shall receive a majority of first choice votes, he shall be declared nominated for such office. If no first choice count. However, there is nothing new in this fact for one often lost his first and second choice candidates under the old primary law.

Under our method of tallying and canvassing it is impossible for a voter's second choice to lessen the chances of his first choice against the chances of his first choice to any degree whatever.

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# CHIMES STRIKE EVERY HOUR



Every one who has lived within sound of the bells of Westminster is familiar with the verse given above. The origin of the carillon has never been positively established. Some writers credit it to a Mr. Crouch, who was a pupil of Dr. Randall, Regius Professor of Music. This, however, is disputed by other writers who credit it to Dr. Randall's conception of the idea taken from a movement in the fifth bar of the opening of Haendel's Symphony, "I know that my Redeemer liveth." The chimes were first fitted to the clock, St. Mary's Great, in Cambridge, but were not copied until they were reproduced on a very large scale in the Victoria clock tower of the House of Parliament.

"At the quarter, half and three-quarter hour, these chimes will ring out in various musical combinations. At a quarter past the hour, four strokes Westminster; at half past the hour, eight strokes Reveille; at three-quarters past the hour, 12 strokes Cathedral peal, and on the hour, 16 strokes Westminster followed by the striking of the full hour on their vibration tone.

My dear friends, these chimes will ring out to all of our neighbors, telling them how times have changed. The time was when we were told that the world was round, and that the sun revolved around the earth. Now, on this glorious day, a new epoch in our civilization for

every day of the week the First National Bank will be sending their messages of good will to all men for it is now known throughout the land that the world is round.

## Editor Prevatt Dead

### THE ELEPHANT BONES

#### Found in the St. Johns River Should Receive Farther Attention

That the elephant bones found several months ago in the St. Johns river near here by the fishermen employed by J. E. Vincent and brought to The Herald office for exhibition

and afterward sent to the Florida University by C. M. Berry are an important find is true.

Not that they are worth any special amount of money to any one finding more of them but they are worth a great amount to science and in the interest of science there should be another search made for the remainder of this prehistoric monster. The finding of the bones and subsequent investigation has aroused much interest in scientific circles over the state and the fact that the bones were found in the St. Johns river farther south than these mastodons were supposed to roam gives rise to many stories and much speculation as to whether they roamed in this country at will or came this far and were lost or overcome by glaciers.

Dear Mr. Berry:

Yours of the 20th with data of the elephant bones just received; thanks. I have changed the record and enclose you a new receipt. I agree with you that it is quite probable that if not the entire skeleton, at least more bones can be found there. While it would hardly be worth the expense of any one going from here to do the work (and we have not the funds to do it with either) yet I would think that it might be possible to arouse sufficient local interest to do something towards it. If the water is not too deep, oyster tongs might be used to a good advantage or an iron pipe with drag hook attached, drug over the bottom behind the boat might locate them. Some teeth would be especially desirable, as those are necessary to correctly determine the species.


