tract his attention, the committee said, the average American has no time to "meditate or to think for himself even by his own fireside."  
While the Bible remains the "best seller" among books, the committee said Americans did not have time, or did not take time, to read it and digest it as they should. This is the breach the denominational publications seek to fill, the report said.  
Churches and their organizations were asked not to "ride on annual passes on the Baptist newspaper train" but to pay their fares in order that the papers may have sufficient funds to meet their competition.  
The report has adopted without discussion.
