

### Clippings From Old Tampa Papers Show Some Interesting Florida Facts

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Jan. 29.—Sixteen years ago one Florida county was considered greater in resources than two of the smaller states of the east, according to old newspaper clippings, dug up here after they had reposed harmlessly in a corner, concealed in a box.

The one county, De Soto, was regarded so highly in the sunshine state that one of the daily newspapers of the commonwealth went so far as to publish a special edition on the subject, an edition consisting of a voluminous bulk of 42 pages.

The paper publishing the 42-page edition, the Tampa Morning Tribune, received the congratulations of a number of other publications of the state.

A 42-page edition 16 years ago was considered considerable of a feat by workers of the Fourth Estate. Now, however, with Florida in the midst of a great development era, the newspapers are measured by sections, with ten of them to an issue almost an everyday thing.

Here are some of the other things found during the bygone days of Florida, unearthed from the box of clippings:

June, 1907.—C. H. and H. Hallway completed to Boca Grande.

October, 1907.—The Putnam county commissioners let the contract for a highway bridge across the river at Palatka, which is to be the longest and most expensive highway bridge in the state, and the only one on the St. Johns river. The contract price was \$54,000.

April, 1908.—Several prominent citizens of Toconoco, Ga., were planning to build winter homes in Anburdale.

May, 1908.—The first train was run on the Florida Central railroad, connecting Thomasville, Ga., and Franklaw, Fla. (It was acquired by the Atlantic Coast Line a year or two later).

July, 1908.—The city council of Kissimmee passed an ordinance regulating airships. (At that time probably no airplane had ever been seen in Florida, and the first flight across the English channel was not made until about a year later).

October, 1908.—Heavy rains in the Everglades caused a flood at Fort Lauderdale, and considerable damage to crops.

October, 1908.—Carrabelle was swept by a disastrous fire.

December, 1908.—Another large sale of state land in the Everglades was negotiated by Governor Brown.

December, 1908.—Palatka's union station was completed.

January, 1909.—Oysters are reported so abundant on the gulf coast, south of Tallahassee, that hundreds of people were shovelling them up into wagons at low tide.

### Realty Operations Increase In South Florida Districts

JACKSONVILLE, Jan. 29.—More capital has been invested in real estate in South Florida and on the East Coast during the last ten days than in the previous two months, according to reports received by the Florida State Chamber of Commerce, which declares that developers and other operators attribute the increased purchases to a restoration of confidence in Florida through the national newspaper advertising campaign being conducted by the State Chamber.

Dr. Harry R. McKee, Director of Finance and Extension for the State Chamber, who has just completed a tour of the peninsula from Sarasota to West Palm Beach, and who conferred with business men in those districts, through the Ridge section and up the East Coast, learned that a marked increase was apparent everywhere. One of the most certain evidences was the increasing number of abstracts being examined by attorneys while another was the marked increase in the number of papers being filed for recording.

"There is a difference in the manner in which investments are being made, however," said Dr. McKee: "Until a few weeks ago people bought land almost sight unseen, anything satisfied them so long as it was in Florida. It is

evident now, however, that buyers are proceeding carefully and that their money is being invested only after painstaking investigation. The time when an operator can sell land from a blueprint has almost passed and unless a dealer gives the purchaser his money's worth he is wasting his time trying to dispose of what he desires to sell.

"In every section I was told by developers and business men that the only thing responsible for the assumption of business on the scale it has attained during the last few days is the Truth About Florida advertising campaign in newspapers throughout the North sponsored by the State Chamber of Commerce. This is borne out by letters being received from prospective investors by the various developers, who declare that the effort of the State Chamber to place the solid facts about Florida before the people of the country has resulted in restoring a confidence which had been shattered by the anti-Florida propaganda.

"It has been only a few days since a special correspondent of the New York Times in a dispatch to his paper declared that the wave of Florida land buying now only had not ceased but that it was beginning to increase, with every indication that it would rival the stampede of last summer and fall."

DEATH TOLL IN ALABAMA MINE EXPLOSION IS 27

Blast Late Last Night Entraps Forty-Five Men, 17 Are Saved After Six Are Hurt

All Of The Victims Are Identified

Flood Of Water Pours Into Mine, Hindering All Rescue Efforts

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Jan. 30. (AP)—Daybreak brought to the little mining camp at Mossboro, Shelby county, doleful word that 27 of its workers had been killed in an explosion in the Premier Coal Company's pit late yesterday...

After a night of suspension, women and children at dawn turned away from the slope in sorrow and despair when final word had come: "All below are dead."

Hope was held out for hours that perhaps some of the men below might have escaped the treacherous gas by barricading themselves in the fastest of the pits. Fresh air was constantly poured into the debris by exploratory workers...

The disaster was not without its fruits. A mine in entry four was found at Overton mine number two having killed 53 miners on Dec. 11. The explosion occurred at what miners call "shooting time," each day when the miners are ready to quit work several "shots" are made to loosen coal for the next day's work...

The explosion occurred half way down the slope. The mine had been in operation five years and was rated non-gasous.

Rescue Work Is Difficult

The slope is in an isolated part of Shelby county, and very hard to reach. This made rescue work difficult. It was several hours before trained crews reached the scene. Volunteer crews headed by G. W. Postal, owner of the mine, and Chas. Hines, went into the mine and brought out many who were not injured, but were unable to reach the surface.

Many stories of horror were told by those who were ready to quit work several "shots" are made to loosen coal for the next day's work. One of these shots hit a pocket of gas and the explosion followed.

The mine was of a single slope and had 12 entries, six on each side. The explosion occurred half way down the slope. The mine had been in operation five years and was rated non-gasous.

The Herald doesn't know just what would be the most effective way of handling some of the road hogs that infest our roads. It does know that with narrow highways the danger from this source is a great one, that should have the attention of the authorities.

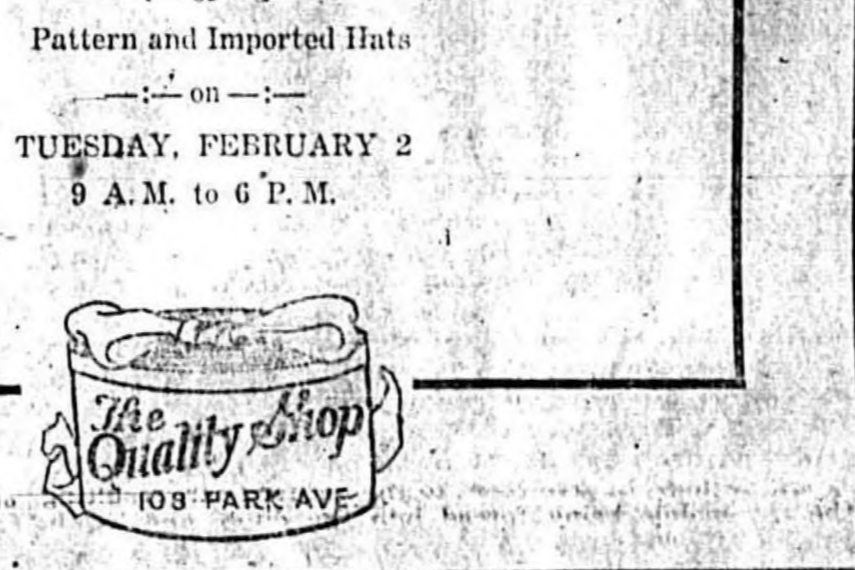

BY CYNTHIA GREY The old needle-in-wool discussion of "is it right for a married woman to work outside the home?" seems to still draw ire and huzzas from both male and female of the sex.

We chortled lustily over a recent article on the subject, and yelled "Atta girl!" loudly at its author, Ruby A. Black, writing in "Nation."

List to some of Ruby A. Black's words, and yell "Atta girl!" with me.

"The American male bread winner has received a grievous blow in the pocketbook. As a result he

has set up a plaintive, but clamorous cry concerning pains in his altruism, his sympathy, his hope for the future, his love for the home, and various other of what he chooses to call his finer feelings.

"With the help of the Women's Bureau of the United States Department of Labor he has seized upon a new kind of gas bomb with which he may attack the camps of the encroaching female wage-earner. He and the Women's Bureau have given out this interview:

"Women cannot stand the strain of business, hustle and business as men. Thousands of the young women break down every

year."

Then Miss Black cleverly and shrewdly points out that the gentlemen and the Women's Bureau designate as jobs perilous to women only those jobs which the men themselves want.

They say that women can stand the dust and clamor and fumes of factory work, but not the speed and tension of office work.

Add when it comes to the professional—law, journalism, medicine—why women cannot endure these at all.

"No mention is made," says Miss Black, "of teaching in the public schools, which involves a greater nervous strain than either journalism or law. Men do not care to teach in the public schools, so that's all right."

Some figures are trotted out to prove female workers are encroaching upon the male occupational balliwick, after which Miss Black summarizes:

"No wonder men view with alarm! The ungrateful females whom they brought into business and industry to perform the less remunerative tasks have, with utter lack of class and business ethics, invaded the branches of work which the men had always meant to keep for themselves! So it is not good for the woman's health! Anybody could see that, except an illogical woman!"

THOUGHTS-WISE AND OTHERWISE

We like an occasional slice of ham at our house, but we don't care particularly for the ordinary broiled ham. It seems often dry and hard. It may be that we don't know how to cook it. At all events we seldom have broiled ham, and we have collected quite a few recipes for cooking sliced ham in other ways.

Here is one recipe. Soak a slice of ham half an inch thick in cold water for an hour. Then drain it for five minutes on a plate. On another plate put a mixture of a cup of granulated sugar and two tablespoons of mustard. Rub this over both sides of the ham, until it is all gone. If it won't all stick pour the rest on the ham after you have laid it in the bottom of a casserole or covered cooking pan. Add half a cup of vinegar mixed with a cup of hot water. Cover tightly and cook in a slow oven for an hour and a half. Watch it to see that it is moist enough and add a little more hot water if necessary. When the ham is done the gravy should be thick and brown but not burned. And the meat is so tender, if the cooking is long and slow, that it fairly melts on your tongue.

Another way calls for covering the slice of ham, in a buttered casserole, with a cup of brown sugar, then with a cup of milk, and then cooking, covered, slowly until tender. It must be watched not to burn and a little water may be added during the cooking.

Here is a third delicious way. Cut the ham in individual pieces before cooking and on each lay half a slice of pineapple. Add hot water, cover, and cook slowly. These methods of cooking all add individual and delicious flavor to the ham.

### European Women

After the National Council of French Women, Mme. Leon Brunschvicg, president of the French Union for Women's Suffrage, Mme. Maria Verone, head of the French League for Women's Rights, and Mme. Elizabeth Fosseque, president of the Society for the Betterment of the Condition of Women.

The policy is one of constructive aggression, the members having adopted the attitude of mothers who peacefully but firmly administer castor oil to unwilling children. In this case, the child is the French Senate, which has not yet ratified the bill, granting women equal rights with men, passed in 1919 by the Chamber of Deputies.

Mme. Avril de la Saint Croix, who also heads the Affiliated Women's Clubs of France, is well known in America, having lectured there. She was prominent in war work and holds the Croix de Guerre in addition to being a Chevalier of the Legion of Honor.

**FROM RUSSIA**

MOSCOW, Jan. 30. (AP)—Crisis-colored lips and artificially tanned complexion are popular among fashionable Russian women.

They have become tired of the conventional red-rouged lips worn by American and French women in America, having lectured there. The sunburned appearance is obtained through the use of brown pomades and powders.

This complexion, however, has a drawback. It disappears overnight and the process has to be repeated each morning.

American tanshanters also are in vogue, having virtually displaced trimmed hats, turbans and toques. They are flashy in color, warm and cheap.

While Russian boots may be popular among women in Europe and America, they are not worn at all by the native women, who regard them as detracting from "femininity."

The Russian women, however,

are not unappreciative of the American demand for boots. They are seeking the pointed-toe shoes of the American style. Thus, far, the stores here have not been able to supply the demand for these shoes, as much as Russian-made footwear.

There is an acute scarcity of women in the new Turcoman Soviet Socialist republic. The men outnumber the women nearly two to one, and in consequence, the price of marriage has increased from \$300 to \$1,000.

Where real currency is not available, the parents of a girl of marriageable age accept camels. Girls ranging from ten to sixteen years old, from five to fifty camels, depending upon the means of the prospective bridegroom and his family.

In this primitive, backward country, camels form the principal medium of currency. A Turcoman with 1,000 camels is considered wealthy, while one with 5,000 is looked upon as a millionaire.

**From Germany**

BERLIN, Jan. 30. (AP)—Blonde and blue-eyed German mannequins are peeved because the black, bobbed hair rests on the crown of model queen rests on the year old lass, Sonja Jovanowitch.

Although a German citizen, Sonja is not a typical German beauty, the frauleins coveting over the criticism, for the award, which was made by five German artists at the first annual mannequin ball, has brought her fame and a contract with the German edition of the "Follies."

With her father, court apothecary to the late czar, and her mother, a native of Serbia, Sonja fled from Russia during the first revolution and settled in Berlin.

PARIS LETTER

PARIS, Jan. 30.—(AP)—The Paris dress-making world refused to have its equality disturbed by reports that its New York brethren have decreed that skirts must be longer.

"If New York failed in the desperate attempt it made during the World war when we were handicapped in a thousand ways, to usurp the position of Paris, we see no reason to fear the present offensive," said one authority, "neither do we, the Parisienne will remain the queen of fashion."

One Paris newspaper characterizes the alleged attempt of New York modistes to assume the dictatorship as "an act of outrageousness" and the dictionary describes the word as "audacity, presumption, overweening."

Suzanne Lenglen, although greatly vexed by what she terms the "wild reports" published about her from time to time, especially the latest, alleging that she was suffering from nervous breakdown, displays a sense of humor nearly as well developed as her proficiency with the racquet.

Two days after the published report that she had been ordered two months' rest by her doctors, Suzanne, paired with Jacques Brugnon, won three matches in two days without the loss of a single set. After the close of another tournament, a few days ago, Suzanne, surrounded by sports writers, said with mock interest, "I shall never speak to newspapermen again."

Then she added confidentially, "I am having handbills printed for denials and will give them to you any time a silly story is printed about me. I am getting a large stock."

"I AM NOT," in huge capitals printed in the extreme upper left corner, are the only three words in the bill. Then there is a dotted line extending to the right of the sheet to be filled by hand according to the occasion. "Engaged to be married," "suffering from nervous breakdown," "contemplating becoming a mannequin," "afraid to meet Miss Wills," are some of the phrases which Mile. Lenglen expects she will have to fill in.

The church and state in France may be separated beyond hope of reconciliation but the church and state seem to be growing closer together. Recent works have seen the formation of two Catholic associations for the uplift of the theatre and important members of France's leading theatre, the Comedie Francaise, are active in each.

The first association, known as the "Brotherhood of Saint Genest," was formed to group Catholic theatre workers of all classes, and the second, the "Federation for the Artistic and Moral Defense of the French Stage," is to react against indecency on the stage.

The two associations joined in a mass celebrated on the anniversary of Moliere's death, and they have received a letter from Cardinal Dubois, archbishop of Paris, asking them to hold another ceremony when he can preside over it in person.

The world's gayest capital is getting gayier. If increases in the number of public places for amusement be a true indication. Theatres, music halls and circuses all are growing more noticeable in Paris and the Seine department, there being 567 at the end of 1925 as against 545 at the close of the preceding year. Besides these,

there are 180 halls where occasional performances are given and in which 3,000 balls and concerts were held last year. Many bars and winelands also provide amusement other than alcoholic, and in these there were 3,011 conjuring shows, 460 balls, 338 instrumental concerts and 1,070 gramophone or other mechanical concerts. These statistics were furnished by the prefecture of police.

Americans, especially American women, are the subject of many more or less sarcastic comment in the French press. Here are two from daily papers of good standing, quoted merely as specimens of what is printed, without guarantee of their having any other foundation than the imagination of the writers.

"What American! A fine blonde woman, wrapped in costliest furs enters a fashionable grocery store in the Etolle district and orders a well known pick-me-up of high alcoholic strength. 'Yes, madame, a bottle?' 'No 25 bottles.' 'Ah, then it is for a bar?' 'Oh, no, just for myself. I am going away for 25 days this month.'"

The scene of the second was a much frequented Russian cabaret in Monte Marte, one of Paris' most admired matinee idols was there with some woman friends, said the newspaper, when an unknown lady with an accent that showed her trans-Atlantic origin came over and asked him to dance with her. When he refused, she took out a five-hundred franc bill and thrust it on the young actor. This annoyed the girls with him, the story goes, and it was not merely the bill that was thrown into the undiscerning American face.

GIANT YAMS

HOMESTEAD, Jan. 30.—Florida soil may be worthless, as the anti-Florida propagandists claim, but Donald Bowie, of this city, has presented to the Redlands District Chamber of Commerce eight yams with a combined weight of 23 1-2 pounds dug out of one hill. The smallest weight 3 1-4 pounds, and the largest 9 3-4. The hill was planted in August and dug up last week.

### U.S. Navy To Spend \$14,000,000 For Air Craft Development

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Navy plans for expenditure of \$14,000,000 over a five year period for lighter than air craft development were disclosed today by Rear Admiral William A. Moffet, naval air chief, before the house naval committee.

The money would be used for these purposes:

- Two dirigibles of 6,000,000 cubic feet capacity at a cost of \$4,000,000 each.
- A training dirigible to cost \$1,500,000.
- Establishment of a lighter than air base on the Pacific coast at a cost of \$4,500,000.

The Admiral also proposed to expend \$1,650,000 annually for maintenance of existing lighter than air facilities. Of this amount, \$1,000,000 would be for continuance of the Lakehurst air station; \$500,000 for co-operation with the bureau of mines in helium production, and \$150,000 for experimental work.

### IOWA MAN HAS NEW CROP PLAN ON PRODUCTION

Urges Placing Farmer On Same Basis As Manufacturer With Regard To Price He Is To Be Given For Produce

DES MOINES, Ia., Jan. 30.—A plan for the stabilization of farm production prices, through price-fixing at crop planting time, will be submitted by E. T. Meredith, formerly secretary of agriculture, to the Corn Belt Farm Belt Relief Conference meeting here tomorrow.

Mr. Meredith urges the placing of the farmer on the same basis as the manufacturer, with regard to the price he is to be given for the article he is expected to produce.

No other producer, he urges, would contract a year's output of his plant at a price to be established a year hence, nor should the farmer be compelled to operate under such a condition.

"My proposal," he said, "is to interpret the law of supply and demand through the medium of price, telling the farmers what the minimum price will be for their next year's production and then guaranteeing that price for their farm products."

The prices for five or six standard farm products—wheat, corn, cotton, wool, sugar and perhaps butter—should be fixed, said Mr. Meredith, "only high enough to produce the quantity of crop desired and low enough so that the crop may not be so profitable it will cause the farmer to produce a surplus, above the quantity demanded by consumers."

Could Decline Sale  
The plan would enable the farmer to decline to sell his wheat at any price lower than the government fixed sum, thus causing a market activity which would bring the price up to or over the minimum. At the end of the crop year, the year following, the gov-

Government would purchase what, if any, of the crop was left in the farmers' hands and dispose of it at the best possible price.

Even if the government had to spend \$100,000,000 in disposing of the carry-over, said Mr. Meredith, that sum would be only one-twenty-fifth of the tariff tax and only \$1 per person in return for the six and a half bushels of wheat which each person in America expects the farmer to raise for him. After two or three years' experience in setting the minimum figures for the crops, the prices could be so closely adjusted that farmers unable to produce a certain crop at that price would be forced into other lines more suited to their situation, bringing about a much needed diversification.

### Many Acres Being Planted To Melons

OKIECHOBEE, Jan. 30.—Approximately 2,000 acres in Okiechobee county are being planted in watermelons which will be ready for the market by May 1, according to agricultural experts here. The Okiechobee soil produces from one to two cars per acre and it has been determined that one man can cultivate and harvest twenty acres. Average returns run from \$200 to \$800 per car, and if the production should average only one car per acre, and the minimum price of \$200 per car be received by the shippers, the crop will bring \$400,000 into the county during the season. Large land owners are giving farmers land free of cost to encourage production.

### Governor Martin Is First Guest At The Hotel Dixie-Pelican

STUART, Fla., Jan. 30 — (Special).—All the brilliancy and New grace and beauty of the Old South was again revived here yesterday when the Hotel Dixie-Pelican, the first link in the Dixie chain of southern hotels to be operated under the direction of Griner Hotels, incorporated, of Jacksonville, Florida, was formally opened to the public.

Beautifully gowned women from all over the state, military uniforms and the presence of the governor and first lady of Florida, all combined to lend an air of distinction to the opening ceremonies.

The formal ceremonies incidental to the opening of the hotel began on the morning of Jan. 27, when a formal inspection of the property was had by stockholders, contractors, architects and newspaper men under the personal guidance of the resident manager, Mrs. Mary A. Ross, who explained every detail of the house to the visitors. The inspection was followed by the serving of a light buffet luncheon.

The Osages are dying—dying amid untold wealth that they do not know how to use—dying half a century after the romance and color of their race flickered out. The end of the trail finds only a fat, stolid burgher, well-fed, but dull.

And still, on a dark winter night, you drive to the top of a hill outside the town and listen as the night wind sweeps in from the treeless prairie; and it seems that you can hear, distantly, the far thud of hoofs on turf and the wild yells of an unseen hunting party as the last of the oldtime Redskins whirl over the rise—not bothered with the useless wealth of the modern Indian, but gloriously magnificently free.

Then you turn back. The cement roadway is lighted by the glare of auto headlights. A huge sedan whirs past, with a fat, stupid Indian lolling in the back seat.

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And while the squabble over Barnett's fortune goes on, the phantom figure of the aboriginal red man gallop across the scene, visible only to the imagination and symbolizing the freedom and color that are dead.
