

Cards Divide Double-Header With Phils To Take First Place In National League

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 14, 1942.—The St. Louis Cardinals came within a hot breath of sweeping a double-header from the poor Phils, and failed, but even though they had to be content with winning one out of two they roared into exclusive possession of first place in the National League by a still game.

The Cards were over-anxious in the opening tussle and gave the Phils two runs in the ninth inning to lose 2 to 1, but they came back like champions in the second game and won 4 to 2 to profit by the Brooklyn Dodgers' double loss against the Cincinnati Reds.

The big show brought out a crowd of 20,000 fans.

Jolmy Beatty, the Cards' great rookie who had won 11 games and ardently hoped for his 20th, pitched eight shutout innings.

But when victory came over the Cards grabbed the victory. With one out in the ninth inning Danny Littwiler raised a short fly near the right-field foul line and three Cards ran to take it. Second Baseman Jimmy Brown fell down after getting his hands on the ball. The result was a double.

Nick Hill lifted a pop out.

But Bill Burch tried a single to center and Littwiler did home.

This was bad enough for short-ship Martin Maroon, usual faultless, fumbled on a roller by Danny Mortaugh and Tommy Livingston followed with

Dodgers Defeated By Reds To Lose Lead In Loop

BROOKLYN, Sept. 14, 1942.—Bucky Walters and Ray Starr pitched the Cincinnati Reds to a double victory over the skidding Dodgers, 6-3 and 4-1, at Ebbets field Sunday, knocking Brooklyn out of the National League leadership as the St. Louis Cardinals divided a doubleheader with the Phils.

Starr, after allowing the Dodgers three hits and then losing in the second inning of the night cap, tightened up and gave up only one more safety in the last seven innings.

The Reds sewed up the second game in the fifth inning when they scored two unearned runs off the veteran Curt Davis, mainly because of three errors in rapid succession by the Dodgers. Brooklyn inflicted its own defeat in the fifth when double by Max Marshall and a single by Ray Lammiano.

The Dodgers' only hope in the sixth came when they scored a run on a double by Ed Stiles, but a double batted by Starr's pitcher beat out the runner. Lammiano's glove also made that attempt were null.

The Reds fell on Bill Seay in the first run in the first inning of the second game. Seay's error behind Bucky Walters' error drove in three runs. Walters, with a base clearing double, hit the ball.

The final attendance of 14,142 fans at the Ebbets field stadium over the two nights was the largest in the history of the stadium.

British Force Raids German Supply Base

Admiralty Says Blow Damaged Tobruk; Artillery Duels Prevail In Egypt

ROME, Sept. 15. (AP)—A Rome radio broadcast an official statement today that an American newspaperman—unnamed—was captured in the British Commando raid on Tobruk Sunday night. There is a strong possibility it was Larry Allen, Associated Press Pulitzer winner.

The London Admiralty announced today that seaborne British forces struck a damaging blow in a raid Sunday night against Rommel's supply base at Tobruk in North Africa.

On the nearby Egyptian front, quiet prevailed except artillery duels and night patrol sorties.

Backing up the British assault on Tobruk, United States bombers executed one of the most extensive operations in the middle-east campaign Sunday night, focused primarily on waterfront and airfield targets.

British columns progressing steadily into Madagascar were reported Monday to have accomplished more than half of their march and to have advanced to within 100 miles of Tananarive, inland capital of the big French island.

Thus far opposition along the roads converging upon the capital had been light and confined mostly to wrecking bridges than to armed resistance, but on the 4000-foot plateau around Tananarive the French were reported to put up whatever real fight they may intend.

Apparently forcing closest to the capital was the column moving southeast from the port of Mahajanga one of three landings the British made last Thursday. The French were reported to have captured Masatanana, 150 miles by road northwest of the capital. It is 200 miles by air from Mahajanga to Tananarive, but the road twists a longer course through the forest along the valley of the Betanoka river and up to the plateau.

Information reaching some military circles here indicated that forces from this column had moved to within 20 miles of the road Masatanana. A communiqué said one force was moving across the mountains to the southeast toward Ondra, 125 miles north of the capital on another road.

Cadet Describes Importance Of Learning To Swim

ATHENS, Ga., Sept. 15. (Special)—"Believe me, I'll never go back to sea again without knowing how to swim," declared a cadet in the United States Navy Pre-Flight School here. He had been in the Pacific with the fleet before he enrolled as an aviation cadet. His ship had been torpedoed and he remained afloat for 11 hours before he was picked up. It was only his good fortune that he had on his "Mae West" —callers term for a lifejacket—when he had to go overboard.

Reds Yielding At West Gates Of Stalingrad

Nazi Claims Of Shock Troops In Streets, Captured Railways, Still Unconfirmed

LONDON, Sept. 16, (AP)—The BBC's Monitoring Service is reported today to have picked up a Tokyo broadcast quoting General Shunroku Hata, Japan's commander-in-chief in China, as saying, "The East Asia war is about to take an important step in co-operation with the European war."

LONDON, Sept. 16, (AP)—The Mideastec radio today announced that French authorities are asking the British to end hostilities on the island and open negotiations.

Russia's armies yielded fresh ground at the bloody western gates to Stalingrad today but after 24 hours there was still no confirmation of Nazi claims that German shock troops were fighting in the city's streets, and that they had captured the main Stalingrad railway station.

Elsewhere slowly contracting arc of defense, the Russians declared to be holding firmly against the avalanche of battle-stained Nazi veterans and reserves.

Around the Volga industrial center the Germans claimed considerable additional ground gained and said the Russians were attacking in force at Rishew and Voznesensk.

West of Stalingrad "repeated attacks" by fresh German troops and tank forces also were reported, the communists said, and one Russian unit which fought for one isolated locality, "destroyed three German tanks, five guns, and wiped out more than 150 enemy officers and men."

In the Mordok area of the Caucasian foothills the Russians also announced successful German offensives, and said they had destroyed eight German tanks and four armored cars, dined the enemy from two populated places, and captured a train carrying German officers and troops.

SIO DE JANEIRO, Sept. 16, (AP)—President Getulio Vargas today ordered a general mobilization throughout Brazil.

BAGHDAD, Iraq, Sept. 16, (AP)—(Delayed)—The British and American navies today announced they had captured a large number of German submarines.

Indications Show Allied Planes Active

Central Europe Radio Stations Go Off; Egypt Aerial Activity Increases

Australian patrols in the forests of Oran, Stanley Mountains appeared to have wrested the initiative from the Japs but delayed reports showed the enemy probably had concentrated considerable forces for the push that carried him over the peaks toward Port Moresby.

Radio stations went off the air for 10 minutes as the active Central Europe last night indicated Russian bombers were active again or Axis defense authorities are becoming increasingly nervous about the two-way Anglo-Soviet night bombing schedule.

In Egypt, aerial activity increased over the 35-mile El Alamein sector but the land front remained quiet.

The Budapest radio went off the air for 10 minutes as the Hungarian capital underwent an air raid alarm.

Later the radios at Bratislava, then in Luxembourg, Bremen, Breslau, Kalundborg and Calcutta all faded, while the Rumanian radio closed down earlier than usual.

An air ministry communique said Boston Douglas bombers with strong fighter escort made a daylight attack on shipping in the port of Cherbourg, France, and that other fighters made channel sweeps and attacked railroad freight yards, factories, and other targets in northern France. All planes returned safely.

The Budapest radio went off the air at 9 P.M. after a warning that enemy aircraft could be expected from the northeast. It was assumed in London that the Russians must be making another raid, but within 10 minutes the radio resumed operation.

A Berlin dispatch from a German radio said a British bomber force, believed to be British and American, last night bombed parts of Bulgaria. Details were lacking.

The RAF's "aerial traffic" found the ends of the offensive reversed, with the great naval base of Wilhelmshaven "smoking" and strewn with wreckage from bombs by a strong RAF force and British skies cleared of Nazi planes.

Just two years ago, on Sept. 15, 1940, the RAF, although lacking plane reserves, combined with anti-aircraft guns to knock down at least 185 hostile planes and convince the Germans that their all-out daylight attacks could not be maintained.

The RAF's part in that climactic turn in the battle of Britain was later saluted by Prime Minister Churchill "Never did so many owe so much to so few."
