## 'MA' FERGUSON FAILS TO QUIT TEXAS TICKET

**Governor's Name Is Certified  
With That Of Moody In The  
Run-Off Primary Aug. 28;  
No Action Taken On Charges**

**Jim and "Ma" Decline  
To Make Statements**

**Committee's Report On Primary  
Shows Moody Failed  
Of Majority By 1,700 Votes**

DALLAS, Texas, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Certification of Governor Miriam A. Ferguson as a candidate to oppose Attorney General Dan A. Moody in the run-off primary Aug. 28 for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination has created an atmosphere of uncertainty in party affairs pending a definite announcement by the governor as to her plans, members of the Democratic state executive committee declare.

Mrs. Ferguson's name was ordered certified with Moody's by the committee yesterday when she failed to submit a formal withdrawal, as she previously announced she planned to do. As second-ranking candidate in the field of five in the first primary, she was entitled to a place on the run-off ballot unless she filed a formal withdrawal.

Without taking formal acknowledgment of the governor's previous statement that she would withdraw from the primary, thus making Moody the party nominee, executive committee members stated certification did not necessarily mean that she must continue as a candidate. Governor Ferguson and her husband, James E. Ferguson, last night declined to comment.

The committee certified Mrs. Ferguson and Moody's names after refusing to pass on a petition submitted by counsel for the governor alleging that Moody had received campaign contributions from two other candidates. Receipt of such contributions is forbidden by law which specifies a candidate accepting funds from such a source may have his name barred from the ballot.

The certification was ordered when the committee found that Moody lacked more than 1,700 votes of having a majority in the five-cornered July primary race.

A debate on the petition followed between leaders of the Ferguson and Moody factions, the governor's supporters charging other irregularities while the attorney general's adherents claimed similar discrepancies.

The plaintiff will contend in her suit, to be filed if the claim is disallowed by the executor, that the two distributions of profits and increments amounting to about \$800,000 for James G. Scripps, were made during the two years immediately following the agreement, but that no distributions were made thereafter. The agreement, however, Mrs. Scripps, contends never was terminated.

The plaintiff will allege that during James G. Scripps' administrations of the properties their value and profits were increased approximately \$25,000,000, exclusive of the two distributions. It is said that he did not avail himself of this provision until years after the alleged agreement became effective.

**Boy Is Injured When  
Dynamite Explodes**

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., Aug. 10.—(AP)—Edward Chartier, 17, of Lake Worth, is in Good Samaritan Hospital here in a serious condition with four fingers of his right hand blown off and his eyesight threatened as a result of an explosion of dynamite caps with which he and two other lads were playing Monday night.

Chartier's two companions, a boy named Lord and another lad whose name was not learned, were less seriously hurt, although the Lord boy was injured by a shower of shot from the exploding caps.

Sir James Cantle, the well-known surgeon who died recently in London, declared that when nightcaps were worn men kept their hair to an old age. A nightcap, he said, was as necessary in a damp climate as clothing.

**Highways Must Be Built With View

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Highways of the United States must be constructed in the future with a view to protecting lives and not merely to provide a temporary means of transportation, Secretary Hoover declared today in a statement made public by the American Road-Builders' Association.

**CALLES ATTACKS  
CATHOLIC CLERGY  
TO U. S. MISSION**

Mexican President Gives His  
Hittest Charges, Charging  
Ministers With Seeking  
Wealth, Political Power

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 10.—(AP)—The situation arising from the government's religious regulations and their rejection by the Catholics today became more tense and more complicated.

President Calles issued his bitterest broadside against the Catholic clergy in a statement to an American "good will mission." He charged the clergy with seeking wealth and political power, causing revolutions and bloodshed and using their pulpits for sedition speeches, while keeping the masses of the people ignorant.

The Catholic Episcopate continued unyielding in its refusal to accept the government's regulations; there was no move to return the priests to the churches, and the deadlock was apparently absolute, with no prospects of loosening.

One of the chief developments is a movement of depression in business. The economic situation was already bad before the religious regulations went into effect, and to this now has been added the effects of the economic boycott fostered by the League for the Defense of Religion.

**Longood, Oviedo  
Papers Purchased  
By Two Local Men**

The Longwood News and the Oviedo Observer, weekly newspapers published in Seminole county, have been purchased by Arthur R. Curnick and Henry Wulborn of Sanford. The two papers were bought from H. J. Rigby and T. R. Dienger.

Mr. Curnick is publisher of "This Week in Sanford," a weekly magazine. Mr. Wulborn received his newspaper training on the Charleston, S. C., News Courier. The former owners of the two papers will move to Miami.

**Noted Bandit Makes  
Last Effort To Escape  
Execution On Friday**

BALTIMORE, Aug. 10.—(AP)—A last bare chance of life was before Richard Reese Whittemore today. The man who is scheduled to die on the gallows Friday for the murder of Robert H. Holtman, a Maryland Penitentiary guard, took little stock in it, however, and appeared resigned to the end.

Whittemore signed the necessary papers for an application for a writ of habeas corpus, expressing his opinion it would do no good. With only 36 hours between the hearing on the writ and the time set for Whittemore's execution, G. L. Pendleton, attorney for Whittemore, announced his intention of seeking a stay from the governor.

**225,000 Votes Are  
Expected To Be Cast  
In Arkansas Primary**

LITTLE ROCK, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Democratic voters in Arkansas went to the primary polls today in what appeared to be record-breaking number, prepared to give assurance of office to their favorites.

Favorable weather and political enthusiasm were counted on to bring the ballot total to 225,000.

With the veteran Democratic senator, T. H. Caraway, unopposed for re-nomination and only two United States representatives required to make a fight, interest centered in the state offices, particularly those of Governor and highway commissioner, while some of the bitterest local campaigns in the history of the state reached their climaxes.

Though powerful organizations such as the American Legion and the Ku Klux Klan maintained a "hands off" policy, the Anti-Saloon League, in the opinion of many, failed to measure up to its proclaimed neutrality.

Planes of United States Air Mail flew a total distance of 2,500,000 miles during the last fiscal year, with only two fatalities.

## CANAL HEARING IS BROUGHT TO CLOSE MONDAY

Court Session In Mandamus  
Suit Ends After Lawyers  
Debate For 3 Days; Judge  
Wright Withholds Decision

**Rebuttal Testimony  
Given By DeCottes**

County Attorney Says Bill  
Is Illegal For Not Giving  
Privileges Of Taxpayers

County Attorney George A. DeCottes brought the Upper St. Johns River Navigation District mandamus hearing to a close at 5 o'clock Monday afternoon with a brief rebuttal of the case presented by opposing counsel. The hearing was in progress three full days.

Judge W. W. Wright announced he would take the case under advisement, and make his decision this week. He indicated he would not have his decision ready within the next two days. The presiding judge asked that certain law books from which important court decisions were quoted by counsel be left with him in addition to the usual documents.

Judge Wright, it is said, will make one of two possible decisions: He will make the writ of mandamus asked for by the navigation district commissioners absolute, or he will quash the alternative writ as pleaded for by counsel for the Seminole County Commissioners and Tax Assessor, Alexander Vaughn, the respondents.

**Brings Complete Presentation**  
The hearing in the mandamus petition brought out the most complete presentation of the constitutionality of laws on the Florida statute books in the Seminole county courthouse in years, according to Sanford lawyers.

County Attorney DeCottes, representing the County Commissioners, presented a large and orderly array of authorities in giving his grounds for demurrer to the mandamus petition. Assisting Mr. DeCottes was Cary D. Landis of De Land, authority on corporation law.

Opposed to Mr. DeCottes was P. A. Vans Agnew of Winter Park, chief counsel for the navigation commissioners, author of the petition and consideration and an authority on Florida drainage acts. Assisting Mr. Vans Agnew was E. F. Housholder of Sanford, who pleaded for more than four hours Monday to make the writ absolute.

Bill Is Declared Illegal  
The alleged failure of the navigation act to have a provision that would give the taxpayer the opportunity to go before an equalization board after the assessment had been made by the district commissioners was again cited by Mr. DeCottes in concluding his case. The failure to "give notice" according to counsel, made the act illegal.

"One of the most vital points of law has been slumped over, slurred over and passed over," he said. He cited the case of Reiman vs. Kyle with regard to the legal matter.

**Three Sets Of Dock  
Plans Presented To  
City Commissioners**

J. E. Craig, consulting engineer of Jacksonville, this afternoon presented three sets of tentative plans for Sanford's proposed municipal docks to the City Commissioners.

A plan that calls for the construction of piers out into the water on Lake Monroe will probably be adopted, it was indicated.

The pier system would include two dredged areas, 400 feet long and 100 feet wide; a warehouse, 400 feet long and 100 feet wide, between the two dredged areas. An additional pier to be built when the need for it arises is provided for in the plans.

Mr. Craig, who is consulting engineer for the city's utilities department, explained the three sets of plans in detail.

**Disorderly Conduct  
Chief Offense Last  
Month In City Court**

Disorderly conduct was the chief offense in Sanford in July, according to the Police Department's monthly report presented to the City Commission this afternoon.

There were 59 persons charged with this offense. Traffic violations were next in number, there being 33. Drunkenness was third with 10 defendants.

The department made 174 arrests in all. The presiding judge of Municipal Court dismissed 29 defendants, and transferred 17 cases to other courts. A total of \$1,902.50 in fines and costs was collected.

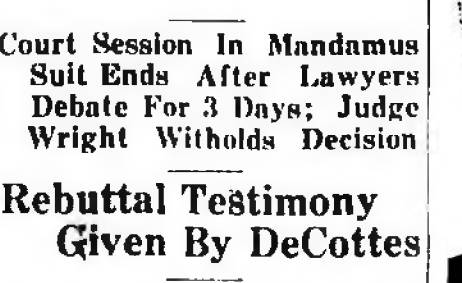

**FAST BOAT TO BE  
PLACED ON RIVER  
RUN IN OCTOBER**

New Jersey Man Planning To  
Begin Passenger Service  
About Oct. 1, Making Trips  
By Daylight To Jacksonville

fast passenger boat, will be put in fast passenger boat, will be put in service between Jacksonville and Sanford on the St. Johns River, Oct. 1, according to an announcement by the owner, E. Henry Deakyme of Perth Amboy, N. J.

The steamer has a carrying capacity of 400 passengers, and will make day light runs between here and Jacksonville, it was said. The boat makes 18 knots per hour, and is built especially for passenger service.

The owner is overhauling the steamer and equipping it for the requirements of the St. Johns River. Light express and baggage will be carried in addition to passengers. The boat service will be arranged to appeal to tourists, Mr. Deakyme said.

Passengers will be landed at the Municipal Pier if the city's permission is secured.

Mr. Deakyme on his visit to Florida last winter surveyed the possibilities of tourist business. He concluded that fast passenger service between Jacksonville and Sanford was desired by tourists and other travelers.

**Dempsey Refused  
License To Meet  
Tunney For Crown**

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Jack Dempsey today was temporarily refused a license to fight Gene Tunney for the world's heavyweight championship at the Yankee Stadium Sept. 16.

Col. Jmf. J. Phelan, chairman of the commission, said that Dempsey's application had been deferred pending his compliance with the rules of the New York State Athletic Commission relative to six months after winning or defending a title.

The decision came after the committee had been in session for nearly two hours and after the situation had been presented them by Dempsey, Gene Tunney, the challenger, and also Harry Witt, the negro who has been clamoring for a match with Dempsey. Dempsey, Tunney and the negro all individually appeared before the committee.

The sudden action of the committee in refusing to grant a license to Dempsey threw Tex Rickard's plan for promoting the fight up in the air. Rickard had hoped to stage it in the Yankee Stadium on Sept. 16. He had arranged to place seats on sale immediately and also had decided to appear before the commission and ask for permission to charge \$50 as ton price.

**Waterfront Blaze  
At Portland, Maine  
Causes Big Damage**

PORTLAND, Maine, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Breaking out in the New England Grains Company's plant at the end of Brown's wharf early this morning, flames swept through the large three-story frame structure, jumped across the wharf to another wharf building and also set fire to the steamer Baccarat.

The fire, the most spectacular and disastrous that has visited Portland's waterfront in years, is believed to have done damage totaling \$300,000.

So intense was the heat that the fire jumped across the wharf and destroyed the historic Portland Yacht Club, on Merchants Wharf.

Tied above the steamer Baccarat was the shipping vessel, which was after sustaining great damage. Captain D. A. Dwyer, who was asleep aboard the schooner, James C. Hannon, was tied alongside the Baccarat's plant was saved to the vessel. Flames and smoke tore pulled the Baccarat to the reach of the flames.

The old Baccarat and vessel was destroyed, hundreds of persons perishing in the flames.

**Command Guard Boat Returns  
After Meeting  
Cutter 201 With Captured  
Liquor Runner**

**Tale Of Hi-Jacking  
Related By Crew**

**Captain And Cook Of  
Schooner Sent To St.  
Augustine Hospital**

JACKSONVILLE, Aug. 10.—(AP)—With her commander missing and her crew giving startling accounts of the capture of an alleged rum-running schooner, thought to be the Hazel E. Herman, reported earlier as the Hazel Lee, the United States coast guard cutter 202 docked this morning in Jacksonville harbor and immediately reported to authorities here in order that search might be instituted for the skipper.

Boatswain T. L. Cokely, commander of the ship, went up in a government airplane, piloted by Capt. George Gay yesterday, on Fernandez. Members of the crew claim that Boatswain Cokely declared that he would return in a short while. The plane headed in a northerly direction and has not been heard from since. Crew members believe that the machine developed engine trouble and was forced down off the coast.

The cutter got under way for Jacksonville at midnight last night. Enroute they found cutter number 201 with the captured Hazel E. Herman. Members of the Herman's crew reported that they had been attacked late yesterday by three alleged hi-jackers in a fast whale boat.

The captain of the schooner and the cook were put off at St. Augustine in order that medical attention might be given them.

Crew members of cutter 201 said that the deck of the schooner were covered with blood. Cutter No. 201 was towing her to Savannah, the coast guard terminal. It was said that she had been captured about a mile off the St. John's light.

It was said aboard the cutter number 202 today they had sighted the Hazel E. Herman yesterday about thirty miles off the coast. They followed her until she scurried further to sea and then gave up the chase. The ship was loaded with rum and alcohol, coast guardsmen reported.

Reports were that she was of British registry. When captured the ship was sailing without lights and without distress signals.

This accounts for mysterious lights seen at sea from aboard the pilot boat yesterday. It is believed, Authorities in Jacksonville were notified of the lights and sheriff W. H. Dawling, accompanied by county deputies Fred King and other officials hurried to the bar to capture the schooner.

Upon arrival of officials at the bar the ship could not be sighted, though lights could be seen 10 to 15 miles off shore, it was said. The sheriff's party returned to Jacksonville early this morning to await further reports from the coast.

Residents of Jacksonville Beach late yesterday afternoon saw three vessels and a seaplane apparently engaged in a running battle, it was reported. The vessels appeared to be an auxiliary schooner.

 of giving notice. "It will be let the case stand or fall on its merits," he declared. "The machinery must be set up for equalization and for complaints to be heard."  
 The County Attorney insisted that there is no grammatical connection between the much disputed phrase, "There is hereby levied," and the context that is found in section 14 of the act.  
**Close Other Defects of Bill**  
 "What relief has the taxpayer after his name has been extended on the county roll?" he said.  
 In addition to the alleged violation of the constitution of the United States and Florida, "one of the most salient defects of the act is the performance of the condition precedent," he said.  
 "They have not attempted to meet it. Before they may go ahead with a navigation project they must get the authority of the secretary of war and approval of Congress. This is an imposition upon the people of this district when there is no assurance that Congress would approve it."  
**Belittles Youngberg's Approval**  
 The approval of Maj. Youngberg, army engineer who has made surveys, and which was cited by Youngberg, counsel for the navigation commissioners has "nothing to do with the approval by the Secretary of War," he said. "What has he to do with it when the War Department has three times disapproved the project," he said.  
 "It was not the purpose of the framers of the act to confine the improvement to the taxing area, he declared, because the work can be done beyond the taxing district by the provisions of the act. The bill is silent that any lands are specially benefited by the project, he said.

## Regulations On Awarding Scholarships To State Schools Adopted By Board

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Aug. 10. (AP)—The following regulations governing the awarding of scholarships in the University of Florida and in the Florida State College for Women, under the act of the legislature of 1925, were approved and adopted by the State Board of Education.

1. Every applicant for a scholarship is required to stand an examination whether he or she has completed or not.

2. The question for the examinations shall be based on the following: Four years of work in high school algebra, general history, and American history and constitution. The competitor for a scholarship who makes the highest average grade on the examinations in the above named subjects shall be awarded said scholarship, provided that no person shall be awarded a scholarship who does not make an average grade of 70 per cent on all subjects with a minimum on the subject below 50 per cent.

3. Examination for scholarships shall be held on the first Thursday in May and the first Thursday in August each year at the county seat of each county, under the supervision of the county superintendent, upon questions prepared in the office of the state superintendent of public instruction.

4. Students failing for two consecutive months in half of the subjects taken at the institutions of higher learning shall forfeit the scholarship and be required to return the amount of the fund used for the stipulated expenses.

5. Every holder of a scholarship must register either in the Teachers' College of the University of Florida or in the School of Education of the Florida State College for Women, and no change of registration will be allowed until after the full amount of money previously used for the holder from the scholarship fund shall have been refunded.

6. The institutions of higher learning shall make quarterly reports to the state superintendent of public instruction on each scholarship student to show the scholastic standing and quality of work of said student.

"Back to the Farm" has been a beautiful sounding slogan. For years it has sent a thrill into every crowd that has stopped to listen to a patriotic gentlemen speaking for their favorite candidates.

The city man likes to think of the joys of farm life. He longs especially for fresh, crisp vegetables and luscious fruit, and rich, sweet milk.

Once in a long while, too, the city man makes a break for the country. And sometimes he even makes a go of farm life. But he makes a success only because of his having some sort of equipment for the new work.

And it is probably something along this line of thought that was back of the call to the National Farm School conference held last month in New York.

The object of the organization is to encourage city boys to take up agriculture as their life work. A school founded at Doylestown, Pennsylvania, twenty five years ago by Dr. Joseph Kraushopf, of Philadelphia, is to be enlarged until it can offer training opportunities to boys and girls from all parts of the United States.

Judging from the names of the delegates to the conference, the National Farm School is a Jewish enterprise, which means that it will flourish. "Back to the Farm" as its slogan will mean trained workers for the farm.

"Back to the Farm," then, is a great slogan, when it represents plans of effective leaders who have the means of helping to make a success of farm work, and farm life.

Sweden Shows Its Good Sense Again

In its effort to make everybody in Sweden know how to swim, the Swedish government announces that school teachers who do not know how to swim will not be employed in the public schools.

Those measures sound rather drastic, but Sweden has done some big things in the educational world. Sweden's people, too, have always held an enviable place in good health records.

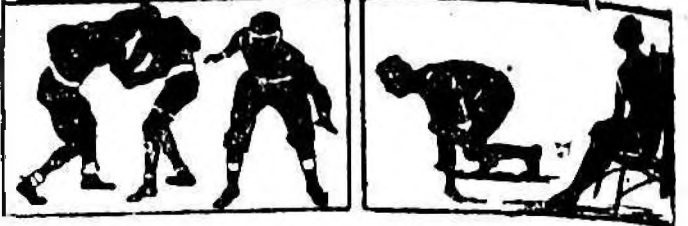

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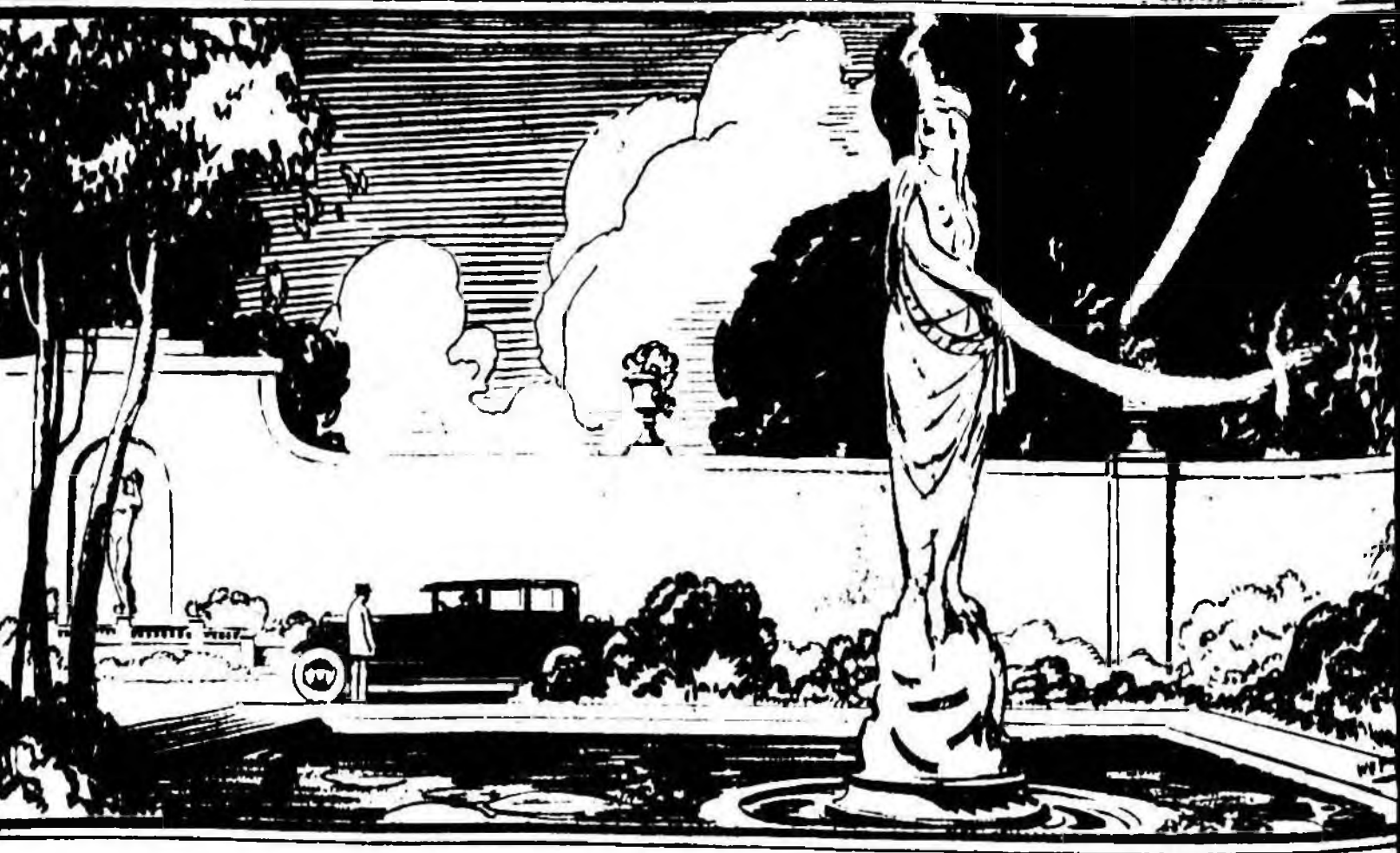
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
