

Buy Christmas Seals

Every citizen of Seminole County who is strong and healthy and has a regular job should do his part to com-bat the spread of tuberculosis by contributing at least one dollar for Christmas seals. All of the funds raised from the sale of seals throughout the country are used to provide facilities for properly caring for those unfortunate persons who have contracted tuberculosis.

Time was when any person with consumption or al-most any other form of tuberculosis was considered a hope ess case and left to die or perhaps to live on for a num ber of years spreading his disease among countless others.

ber of years spreading his disease among countless others. It was only about 36 or 40 years ago that a concerted effort was undertaken to provide for the sick and prevent the spread of disease.

That the effort has been largely successful is shown by the statistics revealing that in 1900 more than 200 persons out of every 100,000 people died of tuberculosis, while last year only 55 out of every 100,000 died in this manner. The death rate has thus been reduced nearly 75 percent in a little over 85 years. And the figures are sufficient to show that a continuation of the effort will reficient to show that a continuation of the effort will reduce the rate to the vanishing point.

That this effort must be made is further shown by

the fact that in spite of the great reduction in rate, more the fact that in spite of the great reduction in rate, more than 70,000 persons actually came to their death last year as a result of taberculosis. Sixty percent of these were between the ages of 15 and 45, the most productive period of their lives. And as is generally known any cessation in efforts would be sure to reflect itself in an immediate increase in the death rate.

Tuberculosis is no longer considered serious if taken in time and given proper treatment. However, millions of poor people who are generally under-nourished and need to continue work long after their disease is discovered, have and my very soul's at ease. 



SHANGHAI, Dec. 6.-(AP)—The vanguard of Japanese troops approached today within the sight of the ancient walls of Nanking. China's evacuated capital. (Dispatches to the Tokyo newspaper Asahi said the Japanese had captured Taka-hashi, Gate, two miles from the Nanking walls and that columns of smoke were visible for a great distance from fires within the capital,

A Japanese army apokeaman announced an advance tonight. He added that there probably would be fighting within the

A force of troops, he said, had carried Japan's "rising sun" banuer to within three miles of Nanking. He said the unit was advancing from Tanyong on the Grand Canal about

45 miles east of Nanking. He announced also that the Japanese had advanced toward Wuhu, a Yangtse River port about 60 miles south southwest of Nanking and toward Chinkians where the Grand Canal and the Yangtre merge about 40 miles

A British warship and four merchant vessels were bombed early today.

The whole Nanking area was in confusion. Americans sought refuge on the United States gunboat Pansy and other foreigners

The bombed British ships all were hit when Japanese planes raided the air field at Wuhu, about 50 miles south and slightwest of Nanking on the Yangtan River, in an effort to destroy Chinese communications and Soviet Russian planes which had been flown in over the Chinese-Russian air line from Siberia. H. M. S. Ladybird, anchored off Wuhu, was abowered with

bomb splinters. One report was that the Lady bird's commander, Lieut. Comdr. II. D. Barlow, was injured
