Sheriff seeks more officers

SANFORD — Seminole County Sheriff Don Eslinger has requested \$2,029,014 from the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, in Washington, D.C.

The money would be used to hire an additional 25 deputies over the next three years. If approved, the deputies would be assigned to Community Policing units, which would serve specific areas in the county.

Sheriff Eslinger expects to hear a decision on the grant request from the Justice Department by January.

Girls buy toys with prize \$\$

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Two Jewish girls won a Christmas essay contest and used the prize money to go Christmas shopping for less fortunate youngsters.

Twin sisters Becca and Shira Easley won \$250 in the "Your Best Christmas Ever" contest and, true to the pledge in their essay, shopped for toys and gave them away.

Students' special needs

State backs psychological tests, district will adjust

SANFORD — The state has concluded that Seminole County school psychologists' complaints are justified and that any students with a suspected disability should be tested.

Earlier this week, a report put out by the state education department stated that the district psychologist should test children with disabilities for all suspected problems.

They should also make a greater effort to inform parents of students with disabilities about their rights.

The psychologists had filed a complaint with the state when the district changed their policy on testing.

The district said it wanted fewer students to be subjected to expensive testing that often proved unnecessary because it was found that students See Test, Page 7A

Temperatures dip, but not below freezing

SANFORD — Central Floridians may not have to break out seldom worn mufflers and mittens for the Christmas weekend. It will be cool, but temperatures are not expected to be as low as had been predicted.

The only sign of snow and frost in the Sanford and Lake Mary area may be sprayed window decorations.

The Weather Service in Orlando this morning said temperatures in Seminole County may be in the mid to upper 40s tonight, rather than the high 20s and low 30s as had originally been estimated.

Skies are expected to be cloudy tonight, and there is a possibility of

SANFORD — Excited children hugging Santa made it difficult for him to unload his pack. Grateful parents thanked him for certificates to buy food. Those were some of the heart-warming moments Sanford Optimist Club members provided for four Sanford families Thursday evening.

SANFORD — Marcie King of Lake Mary didn't really want to talk about it.

"After all, it's pretty embarrassing," she said, sotto voce, looking nervously around the parking lot outside the Kmart-Food Lion Plaza on U.S. Highway 17-92 and Airport Boulevard. "What are people going to say about me?"

King's embarrassing problem is one shared by others on this Christmas Eve morning.

Huddled in sweats and warm coats, they'd gotten up while the rest of the family slept in on a much-deserved day off and made one final trip to the store.

"I just needed a few more things," she said, carefully slipping the sixth and final bag out of her shopping cart into the trunk of her car. "I had to get some stocking stuffers for my husband and I just found the tape my son has been asking for and I haven't had much time before this."

Johnna Davis of Sanford echoed the feelings of others who were trying to beat the "real procrastinators" who would be crowding into the stores late in the afternoon today.

"It's kinda hard to be a good Santa when you've got a full time job and you're trying to work overtime to be able to pay for Christmas," Davis said. "For the first time in a decade I think I made enough money to get everyone on my list

Tampa votes for teen curfew

TAMPA — The Tampa City Council voted for a teen curfew, barring unsupervised juveniles aged 16 and under from the streets after 11 p.m. on weekdays and midnight on weekends.

Tampa Mayor Sandy Freedman said she will veto the ordinance based on recommendations from the city legal department and the police department. The city's legal department earlier said the measure is unconstitutional and the police department called it a logistical nightmare.

Meanwhile, State Attorney General Bob Butterworth is proposing a statewide curfew of 10 p.m. weeknights and 11 p.m. weekends for youths 16 and under who aren't on their way to work, school, church or civic events.

That proposal likely will go before the state Legislature during the February session.

Before the vote Thursday, Police Chief Bennie Holder told the council while it may be a good idea to help curb crime, it would be difficult to enforce without turning crime-fighting officers into baby sitters.

"I don't want to turn my police department into a babysitting service," Holder said. "The curfew law cannot be used to replace what parents should be doing."

Lion 'acted naturally' in attack

WEST PALM BEACH — A safari park employee whose jugular vein was slashed in a lion attack left the hospital, and he has no doubt the big cat was trying to kill her.

Katrina Dillon, 27, almost bled to death when the 450-pound lion Helmut pushed through an unlocked door and attacked her as she cleaned his cage at Lion Country Safari on Dec. 12.

She was admitted to St. Mary's Hospital in critical condition with a severed jugular vein and both lungs collapsed by puncture wounds.

Dillon recovered, however, and was released from St. Mary's on Thursday. She talked to the media for the first time about the lion attack.

"At first I think he was very curious," she said. "But when he got for my throat, I honestly and truly believed in my heart that he was done playing and he wanted to end it."

He let her go several times, she said, but then grabbed her again by the arm or leg when she tried to escape. She said she did not think the lion targeted her out of anger.

"He was just doing what a lion does," said Dillon. "It was something new, something he wanted to check out — and then he was done playing."

The lion treated her, she said, as beasts treat their catch in the wild.

Lion Country Safari officials have said they will not destroy the 4-year-old Helmut. They said the young lion was unprovoked and simply acted naturally.

Jackson focuses on crisis in Haiti

MIAMI — En route to spend Christmas in Cuba, the Rev. Jesse Jackson stopped briefly here Thursday to refocus attention on the continuing crisis in Haiti.

Jackson was greeted by a crowd of about 60 supporters chanting "Jessel Jessel" outside the Haitian Refugee Center. In a news conference, he said the United States' policy toward the troubled Caribbean island nation is "essentially now an abandoned policy."

He said the United States' posture is that it is not able to restore democracy there. However, he added that "we use our power to entrap people in Haiti" in reference to U.S. Coast Guard efforts to keep Haitians from escaping by boat to the United States.

Jackson said he plans to visit Haiti but has not yet set a date. He expects to meet again with Haiti's exiled President Jean-Bertrand Aristide next week when he returns from Cuba.

Jackson, who described his trip to Cuba as a humanitarian mission, plans to meet with President Fidel Castro as well as the Cuban media, human rights activists and political prisoners. He also will speak at two churches.

Castro's daughter Alina Fernandez Revuelta recently defected to the United States and has expressed concern about the teen-age daughter she left behind. Jackson said he would talk to Castro about the possibility of his granddaughter leaving Cuba.

He also said he wants to assess the impact of the U.S. embargo against the communist nation.

Youth tries to change marathon rules

LAROO — A youth with muscular dystrophy is trying to get the rules governing marathon racing changed to allow the entry of electrically-powered wheelchairs.

Because his disease has affected movement of his arms, Ben Thomas has to use a swivel stick to control his power wheelchair.

The 15-year-old wanted to enter the first Walt Disney Marathon in Orlando next month.

Disney officials said they can't allow it. The 26.2-mile race is sanctioned by USA Track & Field, meaning the Jan. 16 event can be used as a qualifier for the Boston Marathon and any world records set would be official.

Ethics panel probes Brown

\$5,000 fine proposed against representative

U.S. Rep. Corrine Brown, who represents a portion of Seminole County including Midway, would pay a \$5,000 fine under a proposed settlement of a state ethics probe into allegations she used staff members to work in her private travel agency while she was a Florida state representative.

The state Ethics Commission will decide Jan. 27 whether to adopt the proposal, said Virilinda Doss, attorney for the commission. The recommended order, dated Dec. 13, was signed by Brown, her attorney and Doss.

Brown declined comment late Thursday, saying she had not seen a final agreement, and referred calls to her attorney, Rodney Gregory of Jacksonville. Messages were left on his home and office answering machines.

According to the settlement, the Jacksonville Democrat would pay the proposed fine within 30 days of approval of a final order.

The state Ethics Commission last April had found probable cause that she had violated ethics laws. The probe stemmed from a complaint filed by Andy Johnson of Jacksonville, a land developer and talk show host who ran an unsuccessful campaign against her for the U.S. House seat.

Johnson had made other allegations, including that Brown pressured staff employees to buy tickets from her travel agency. But the panel dismissed those allegations.

Johnson said late Thursday he had not yet seen the proposed settlement, but the recommended fine was not enough.

"If she is guilty, she has cost the state much more than \$5,000 and she should have to make full restitution," said Johnson, adding that the state Attorney General's Office should also launch an investigation.

Brown served in the state Legislature from 1982 to 1992 before her election to Congress last year.

Former Brown aide Betty Ann Howard had told commission investigators she worked from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. six to seven days a week in Brown's Jacksonville travel agency while on the payroll as Brown's legislative secretary and aide from November 1985 to June 1988.

Brown has claimed Howard made the allegations because she was fired and had a grudge against her.

Brown sold her interest in the Springfield Travel Agency Inc. in 1992.

Refugee reunites with dog

MIAMI — Cuban refugee Oswaldo Collado Brito can thank television and a Key West woman for reuniting him with his best friend — a Chihuahua dog named Leon — just in time for Christmas.

Collado Brito, along with his brother, the dog and 11 others, fled their communist homeland by boat Sept. 18. They were picked up two days later in the waters off Key West by the Coast Guard.

The dog was taken to the Monroe County Animal Shelter for tests and vaccinations. Collado Brito, brought to Miami for immigration processing, was told he had three days to pick up the dog.

In Miami, he joined his wife and daughter who defected to the United States six months earlier on a Miami flight. He didn't have the money to get back to Key West and believed the dog was no longer his.

"I lost the phone number and the name of the location holding the dog," Collado Brito said Thursday. "My friends tried to assist me, but I had no luck."

But the dog was featured on a Dec. 14 television program about adoptable animals. Marlene Carbonell, who had located her missing cat the day before, luckily tuned in and launched a search for Leon's owner.

"It got to be an obsession. I wanted it to be a happy ending because this is Christmas," Carbonell said. "Besides, Leon spelled backwards is Noel."

Collado Brito's name surfaced on the computers at Church World Services, which helps resettle refugees in Miami, after Carbonell contacted officials there. The Key West Tourist Development Council pitched in by arranging for the dog to be flown to Miami for free and Monroe County waived all animal shelter fees.

Study bolsters bid for black massacre memorial

TALLAHASSEE — Florida needs to preserve the long-hidden history of a Levy County black community leveled by a white mob seven decades ago, say backers of a \$50,000 study.

"This is saying 'yes, it did happen,' because people denied it for many years," said Rep. Al Lawson, D-Tallahassee, chairman of the legislative black caucus. "We hope to put this in the Florida history books so it won't ever occur again."

Lawmakers and victims' descendants will meet in January to discuss proposals for an official apology, a memorial, and state compensation for families of those displaced in the 1923 New Year's week rampage, Lawson said Thursday.

The study by university researchers, commissioned by House Speaker Bolley "Bo" Johnson, concluded the state was negligent. Lawson is drafting a bill calling for \$7 million in reparations.

Gov. Lawton Chiles is looking at the report, spokesman Ron Sachs said. "The governor believes this was a dark and tragic time. He is

going to review the hard work involved in this report and react formally."

Researchers from Florida State University, Florida A&M University and the University of Florida interviewed survivors and dug into news accounts and academic papers.

In a 93-page report, they documented a rampage that virtually destroyed Rosewood, a hamlet of 25 to 30 families near Cedar Key, about 100 miles north of Tampa.

"Some legislators say why bring it up," Lawson said. "I don't think you help society by trying to hide the dark past."

"We can document that eight people were killed during the racial violence — six blacks and two whites," said the report. "The rest of the black community of Rosewood was driven from the area by white mobs who then burned their homes, a church, a masonic hall and a store."

The head of the Rosewood Family Advisory Committee, Arnett Doctor, whose grandmother Sarah Carrier was killed, has said about 50 people could qualify for damages under the bill.

The measure is similar to one Congress passed to repay Japanese-Americans forced into concentration camps by the U.S. government during

Trooper flap a matter of credibility

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — The outcome of a controversy pitting the word of two Arkansas state troopers against the man they once guarded, Bill Clinton, may hinge on the troopers' credibility.

In that respect, a \$500,000 auto insurance lawsuit involving the troopers, Larry Patterson and Roger Perry, could be illuminating.

Patterson and Perry served on Clinton's security detail when he was Arkansas governor and claim to have facilitated sexual liaisons for him with several women. They also claim Clinton offered their colleagues federal jobs in return for their silence — allegations Clinton has denied.

The troopers' credibility is crucial because they've offered little more than their word.

On Tuesday, Hillary Rodham Clinton accused the troopers of promoting stories she called "outrageous" for political and financial gain. On Wednesday, the president denied any wrongdoing but refused to discuss specifics of the allegations.

Both troopers say it was not the alleged infidelity that made them go public; rather, it was Clinton's alleged misuse of state personnel and property to arrange his affairs. They admitted under questioning at a news conference that they abused their power and broke the law themselves if their claims about what they did for Clinton are true. They said they did it because they feared he would have them fired.

They also accused Clinton of offering members of the governor's security detail federal jobs if they would keep quiet or keep tabs on stories with which colleagues might go public. They attributed this information to a trooper they declined to name, but whose identity became known as Danny Ferguson through contact with other present and former troopers.

Ferguson denied Wednesday that Clinton offered him or any other trooper a job in exchange for silence or help in shaping their stories.

Although state police records generally portray Patterson and Perry as satisfactory officers, a check of the troopers' records revealed incidents over several years involving their credibility.

A report showed that in 1970, Patterson's sergeant confiscated his gun, badge and state car after a domestic incident in which Patterson reportedly beat his wife. The couple later divorced and the woman died two years later of cancer. Patterson said this week his wife's allegations of abuse were not true.

A 1981 report on Perry showed he was reprimanded for being asleep on the job. A supervisor wrote that Perry had been addressed in the past about being absent-minded and irresponsible, and that his actions had become "almost intolerable."

In a 1991 sexual harassment lawsuit, a female employee of the Arkansas State Police Association accused Perry of continuously making sexual suggestions and sexual movements that caused her stress and forced her to leave the job. Perry was president of the private group for state troopers at the time. The suit was later dropped. Perry said this week that the allegations were unfounded.

There is even a Perry vs. Patterson lawsuit.

In a suit pending in Pulaski County Circuit Court, Perry accuses Patterson of being drunk when Patterson drove a state police vehicle into a tree in December 1990, injuring Perry and a female trooper who was Patterson's companion.

Death threats lead kids to visit Santa at police stations

DENVER — Santa listened to children's Christmas wishes from the safety of police stations after death threats against "that fatso" led eight Denver-area shopping malls to cancel appearances by St. Nick.

David and Jeffrey Henderson, twins who will turn 4 on Sunday, planned to sit on Santa's lap at the Crossroads Mall in Boulder. Instead they had to visit him at the Boulder Police Department, a few blocks away.

"They said, 'Why is he at the police station?'" said their mother, Vicki Henderson. "I told them some bad person wrote a letter to Santa and said they were going to hurt him, so this is where he can be safe."

They were among hundreds of children who had to go to police and fire stations because of the anonymous threats — delivered by mail and fax machine — calling Santa an "impolite."

"Time is running out on that fatso," one letter warned. "By Thursday, he will be history along with anybody that gets in his way."

The letter-writer said that he had enough guns and ammunition to kill 100 people and that the slayings of four people at a Denver-area pizza restaurant earlier this month "was nothing" compared with the carnage he would cause.

Police, FBI agents and the Postal Service investigated the threats as mails posted notices

that Santa had returned to the North Pole.

Then police officers, firefighters and other volunteers suited up as St. Nick in more than a dozen high-security Santa workshops. By noon Thursday, officers guarded long lines of children.

"I sure never imagined I'd be protecting kids and Santa," said Detective Jim Wollack, who watched 75 children line up in suburban Westminster. "This is supposed to be a happy time of year."

At another site, an 8-year-old boy solemnly warned his Santa to be careful. "He told me, 'Watch out, Santa,'" said Sebastian Metz, a member of the Guardian Angels crime-fighting group who dressed up as St. Nick on Thursday.



Storm of violence corrodes humanity

When Defense Secretary Les Aspin bungled America's mini-wars around the world, President Clinton's loss of confidence prompted Aspin to resign. Now, the president needs to send a similar message to at least three of his top domestic-policy advisers. But to quote a current street expression, Clinton just doesn't understand.

Americans do, but nobody is listening to their anguished cries. At least not yet.

Put aside this column for a moment and glance through your newspaper. Somewhere on those pages is a grisly account of an unusual murder or murders, not necessarily in your community, but in cities or towns like yours.

Murders are equal-opportunity savagery. No region of the country, including yours, and no race, including yours, is exempt from these atrocities, some of which are almost too sickening to comprehend.

In the last two-week period, multiple murders have been committed: In San Diego, by a brilliant young naval officer; on Long Island, N.Y., by a Jamaican-born son of a businessman; in Aurora, Colo., by a fired pizza worker; in Oxnard, Calif., by an unemployed computer engineer; in suburban St. Louis by unknown persons.

Only when a heartless beast inside a human skin commits just one cruelly calculated murder

do we react in horror. In Milwaukee, a teen-ager blows away the face of a kneeling mother and then explains, "I'm the big man. I got the gun. Why does she have this attitude?" In California, a 39-year-old career criminal abducts 12-year-old Polly Klaas from her bedroom and then kills her.

In the nation's capital, drive-by killings in black neighborhoods are as normal as legislative deliberations.

We'll never be able to stop violence or murders. But we can do a far more efficient job of containing both, just as Australia, Canada, Great Britain, Sweden and Switzerland do. In 1990, these countries' combined deaths by handguns were only one-third of the United States' deaths by handguns. The reason: strong gun control

laws. We must restore a reciprocity of civility, a reciprocity that the gun-owning NRA (Neanderthalic Rifle Asinities) helps to violate.

The work has already begun. For the first time in history, the American people rose up in a righteous wrath and demanded their Congress pass a gun control bill.

The passing of the Brady bill was a long overdue defeat for an organization that is as politically responsible for the proliferation of violence as are the criminals.

On the long journey to reclaiming our humanity, the Brady bill is only a small step. Here are the next three steps: 1) Require that all guns be licensed. 2) Slap a heavy -- and I mean, painfully heavy -- tax on all ammunition. 3) Challenge the unproven theory that the Constitution permits individual ownership of guns.

It doesn't. And those who resist this truth are no different from those Americans who believed the Constitution supported slavery and denied votes to women.

Somewhere in this nation of 206 million adults, there must be one -- just one -- adult who is prepared to challenge the NRA's misinterpretation of the Second Amendment. This person must go to the Supreme Court.

Cases may overturn precedents

CHICAGO — In two wildly different but equally fascinating cases, Cook County Illinois prosecutors are attempting to force radical changes in the law. One case involves an ailing fetus, the other an alleged mob hit man.

The first case centers on a 22-year-old woman called "Mrs. Doe," who is now about 38 weeks pregnant. In a routine prenatal examination it was determined that the woman's unborn child was not getting sufficient oxygen through the placenta and was in danger of either being stillborn or brain damaged if the pregnancy proceeded to term.

Doctors wanted to remove the child immediately by a Caesarean section because it would survive with little difficulty outside the womb if delivered now. But the mother refused, insisting that her religious and personal beliefs prevented her from having the surgery. The only way she can give birth, she insists, is naturally.

The hospital where she is being treated notified the State's Attorney Jack O'Malley who brought a case to court to try to get an order compelling the surgery.

"This is an unborn baby who is going to die unless we can convince or compel this woman to have a C-section," said Andy Knott of the State's Attorney office. "We felt we had to move quickly, and we are."

The woman was represented at an emergency hearing by both a public defender and the American Civil Liberties Union. Susan Wisnietz, an ACLU lawyer, argued that the state cannot force a person to undergo a medical procedure even if it is to benefit someone else.

How would an order for a Caesarean section be carried out? she asked the court. "She'd have to be dragged to the hospital, strapped to the operating table and put under anesthesia."

But that's not what Patrick Murphy believes. He's the Cook County public guardian representing the interests of the fetus. "If presented with an order from this court," he says, "I'm sure she would comply."

But Judge Gary Brownfield ruled with the mother. He refused to order the operation, saying that nothing in the law compels a competent person to undergo an unwanted medical procedure.

On Dec. 15, the Illinois Appellate court upheld the lower court's ruling, but Murphy said he would appeal to the Illinois Supreme Court.

In the second case, alleged mob hit man Harry Aleman was tried and acquitted for the 1972 shotgun slaying of Teamsters official William Logan.

In a very unusual 1977 trial, Aleman waived a jury and chose instead to be tried solely by Judge Frank Wilson. In the bench trial, Wilson found Aleman not guilty.

Now State's Attorney O'Malley wants to retry Aleman, despite the law against double

jeopardy (being tried twice for the same crime). O'Malley believes Judge Wilson had been bought and thus the previous trial should be considered void and that no double jeopardy exists.

In 1990, a Chicago lawyer — Robert J. Cooley — got into trouble and began coo

perating with federal authorities. Among the tales he told was that in 1977 he transmitted a \$10,000 bribe to Judge Wilson, in two installments — before and after the verdict — to acquit Aleman. Shortly after being questioned by the FBI about the matter, Wilson killed himself.

The argument being used to justify the new trial is that because of the bribe, Aleman was never in jeopardy of being convicted in the first place. Moreover, there have been several Supreme Court rulings involving double jeopardy defenses to retrials where a first trial has been voided because of a bribed juror.

"If a defendant does not have a right to a crooked juror, should he have a right to a crooked judge?" asks Renee Goldfarb, head of the criminal appeals section of the State's Attorney office.

But legal experts admit that the state's theory is one that has probably never been advanced before and tests the limits of double jeopardy. The case will probably end up in the Supreme Court.

In the meantime, it will be argued in state appellate courts. Aleman's lawyers will contend that the evidence against their client in the original trial was weak and that Wilson's verdict was not unreasonable. They will also argue that the only evidence of the bribe is the word of lawyer Cooley.

Race enters the adoption process

WASHINGTON — Whatever Charles Foster can't give his son, Douglas — and he admits there's a lot — he can always give him the look.

I first saw it two weeks ago, as Foster, 37, watched Douglas bouncing on his mother's lap. The child, 4, couldn't stop laughing.

Foster couldn't stop staring. The expression on the Silver Spring, Md., mortgage banker's face was so nakedly loving, I almost turned away.

But many loving parents stare at their kids that way. Foster's look only seemed striking because he and his wife, Marcy, are white and their adopted son is black — or, as "Dougie" himself describes it, "brown." Dougie's brother, Sean, 9 — the Foster's birth son — has ivory skin and dirty-blond hair. Dougie and Sean also have a 2-year-old foster brother who is African American.

Such colorful family mosaics — Marcy called them "rainbow coalition" families — aren't new. White couples have for years adopted children whose ethnicity differ from theirs, often because more such children are available than white babies. Too often, say agency officials, black adoptive parents can't be found.

Though always controversial, "transracial" adoptions are getting a closer look, thanks to the Senate's consideration of a bill that says race can't be the sole consideration in children's foster care and adoption placement.

Critics, such as the National Association of Black Social Workers, say such adoptions wouldn't be necessary if agencies tried harder to find black adoptive parents. They fear that black children raised in a white milieu may not appreciate their heritage, culture and themselves as African Americans.

The Fosters say they agree, and that however many smiles they've received from black strangers since Dougie joined them, their home isn't optimum for a black child.

So they've done what they can — hired a hip, young black woman to babysit, become foster parents to a long-lashed, black 2-year-old whom they'll also adopt if no black family can be found, and settled in a supportive, mixed neighborhood.

While such complexities might puzzle any 9-year-old, they truly bewilder Sean Foster because he is completely at ease with his brother's blackness.

When Sean, then 4, learned he would be getting a new brother who's black, he was "excited" — for typical, little-boy reasons. "I just wanted a brother so I could fight him," he says, "though sometimes I'm more gentle."

Dougie's skin color doesn't matter, he says. "Everybody is, like, a human."

He sighs. "My best friend at school is somebody who's black. ...I love Dougie. I mean, the only thing he's scared of is bees."

Adds Dougie brightly, "And fireflies, also."

In a more perfect world, the worst thing a boy like Dougie would fear is bugs — never other people's judgments or perhaps, someday, his own doubts about having a white family. In a more perfect world, all parentless children would find same-color families to love them.

But in the imperfect meantime, I'm with Charles Foster, who says, "We're giving him a great advantage...the opportunity to feel loved for who he is. ...You can pontificate all day long, but...these children have to be loved."

Actually, in a perfect world, such discussions would be moot. Everybody would be, like, a human.



But many loving parents stare at their kids that way.

occasional rain, although it is expected to be relatively light. Tomorrow, the weather service says it will be cloudy in the morning, but clearing in the afternoon with temperatures in the 80s. Christmas night readings were expected to be in the upper 30s. Cold air flows were expected to pass through the state farther north than had been originally predicted. North Florida therefore, may be in for hard freezes. "It's going to be cold, just the ingredients aren't there to produce any snow," said meteorologist Jim Bolden of the National Weather Service in Tallahassee. He said hard freezes with lows in the low 20s were expected today and Saturday morning in North Florida, but there will be insufficient moisture in the air for a white Christmas. Temperatures also will drop to the 50s and 60s in South Florida. Highs will range from about 40 in the north to 70 in the south. In Miami, National Weather Service forecaster Bob Pifer said no records will be threatened. The coldest Christmas Day on record was 1989 when the thermometer dropped to 30 degrees. Temperatures would have to fall to the teens to break records in North Florida. Cloud cover will keep night temperatures from reaching so low, Pifer said. But it also will keep the sun from warming things to normal levels during the day. It is not expected to get cold enough to harm Central Florida's citrus crop, although growers will be closely watching the thermometer. At least four hours of temperatures of 27 or lower are required to damage the fruit, said Florida Citrus Mutual spokeswoman Mary Hartney in Lakeland. She added that cool weather can be beneficial by bringing out the color of the fruit. Strawberry and vegetable farmers also are hoping for just enough cold weather to sweeten, color and crisp their crops, but not enough to damage them. The cold weather is boosting sales of firewood, but it has firefighters warning people to check their heating systems and avoid unsafe methods of trying to stay warm. Sanford has already become aware of these dangers, with the total destruction of a house on Greenway Street in Midway this week, reportedly caused by a faulty fuel heater. Tourism officials say the cold snap is unlikely to impact their business. "It's going to be pretty darn

cold here but I guess that's all relative," said Lee Daniel, spokesman for the St. Petersburg-Clearwater Area Convention & Visitors Bureau. He is predicting a good holiday season.

with suspected problems were not in need of special education services. Many students, Supt. Paul Hagerty said, are better served in the regular classroom with some additional tutoring. "It's a matter of what is best for the students," said Hagerty. "It has nothing to do with the psychologists." The psychologists concluded,

however, that some students who are in need of the services being denied access to them because they weren't being tested.

Both sides see the state Department of Education findings as positive, however.

While the report concluded that, in opposition to current practice, all students should be tested, Hagerty saw it as reinforcing school district policy. "The findings show that we

are doing a good job in Seminole County," Hagerty said. "There are some minor technical adjustments we will be making, but we are doing a good job."

The report also concluded parents have the right to question the conclusions of psychological testing and that they should be made aware of that right at the time they meet with psychologists to discuss test results.

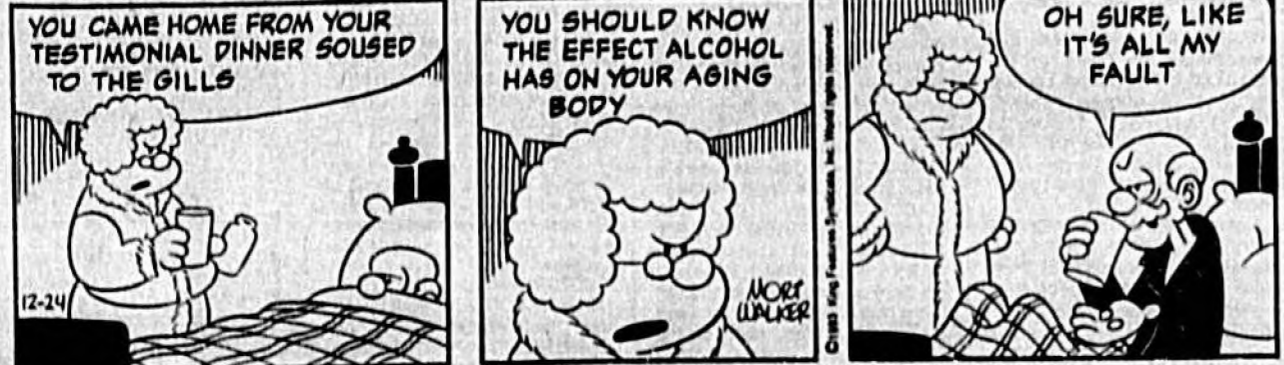

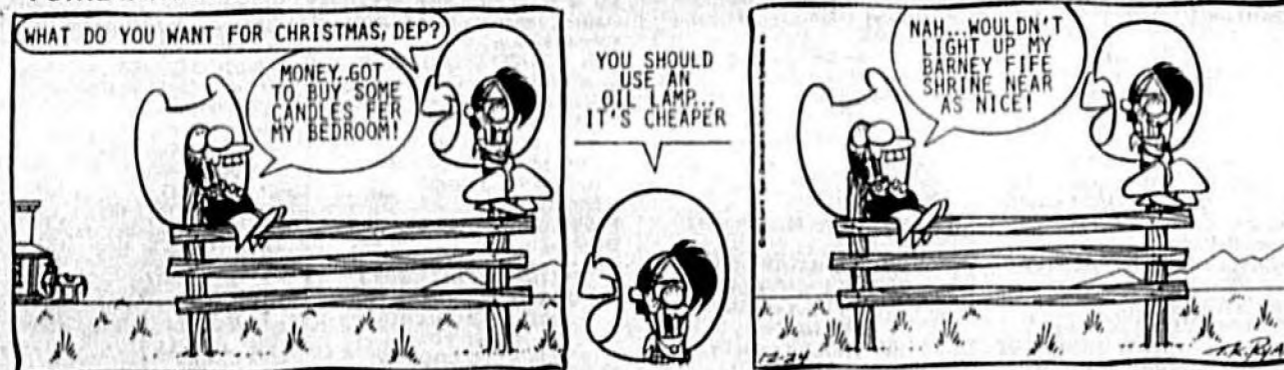

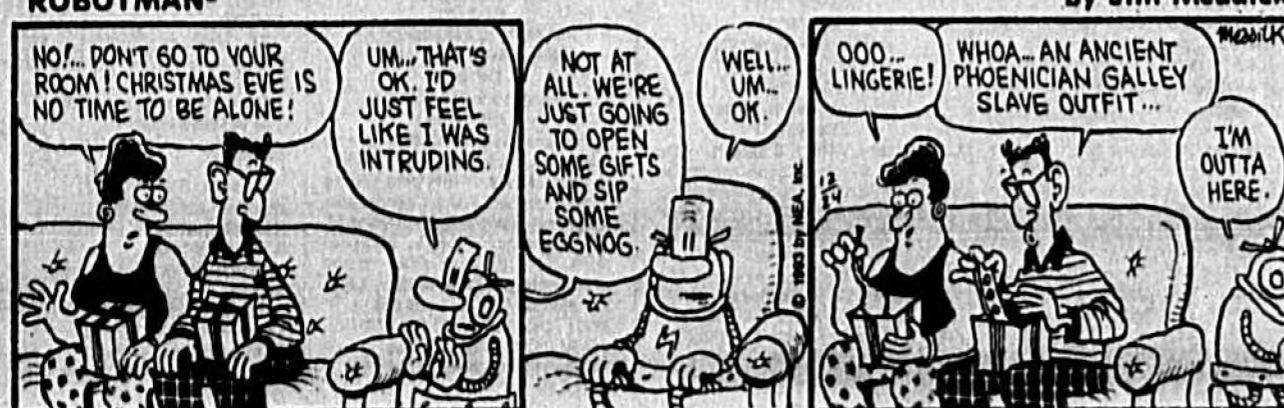

Sarcoidosis marked by inflammation

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been diagnosed with sarcoidosis. Do you have any information relative to the treatment of this disease and the physical and mental effects of it?

DEAR READER: This disease, of unknown cause, is marked by areas of inflammation (called granulomas) in many of the body's organs, primarily the lymph nodes, eyes, liver, skin, and lungs; virtually, any organ can be affected, however.

In most patients, early sarcoidosis produces no symptoms; the disease is often discovered by chance in routine chest X-rays. When the disease progresses, it advances slowly and many years may elapse before patients notice symptoms, such as cough, breathlessness, diminished vision, arthritis, fever, weight loss, and malaise.

The diagnosis is made by biopsy.

Sarcoidosis is rarely fatal; many patients recover, without treatment, in a matter of years, even in the presence of widespread tissue involvement. The major complications of sarcoidosis are lung scarring (pulmonary fibrosis) eye damage (leading to blindness), heart irregularities, disfiguring skin lesions, and an excess of calcium in the blood -- all of which are treated with cortisone steroids. Methotrexate, an anti-metabolite drug, is also used in therapy.

DEAR READER: Although

many "growths" on the hard palate are simple bone cysts or other benign tissue, malignancies can arise in this area. You should be examined by your dentist, who may be able to reassure you that nothing serious is present -- or may recommend a biopsy. Don't

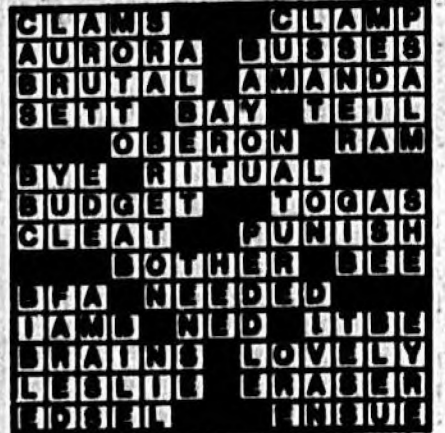

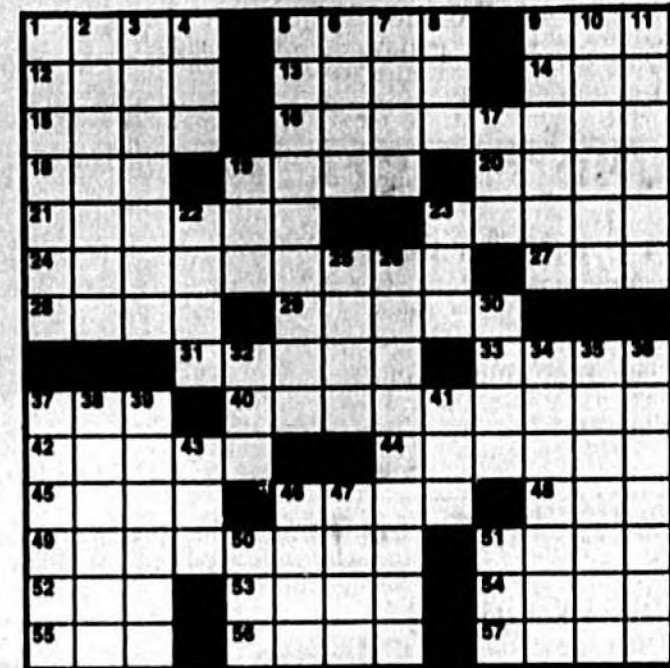

WIN AT BRIDGE

Which mammal — apart from Homo sapiens — has the greatest vocabulary?

On today's deal, taken from the 1985 U.S. Trials, one West couldn't resist bidding, and he paid the price.

At the first table, West passed throughout. Then he led the club jack against four spades. Declarer finessed dummy's queen, of course, but then was faced with a tricky problem. Rather than commit himself immediately, South called for dummy's heart two. East went in with the king and, when West dropped the queen, continued with a low heart, which West ruffed. Later, declarer lost two diamond tricks: one down.

When West used the Unusual No-Trump, showing a minor two-suiter, it was easy for declarer to read the heart-queen

lead as a singleton. Playing West for 2-1-5-5 shape, declarer won immediately with dummy's ace and drew two rounds of trumps. When the club finesse won a moment later, South claimed his contract, conceding one heart and two diamond tricks.

Don't bid unless you think you can either buy the contract or steer partner to a good lead he won't find unaided. Here West had no reason to expect to win the auction at a safe level, especially with the unfavorable vulnerability.

Aikman signed the biggest contract in NFL history Thursday, agreeing to a \$50 million, eight-year deal that includes an \$11 million signing bonus.

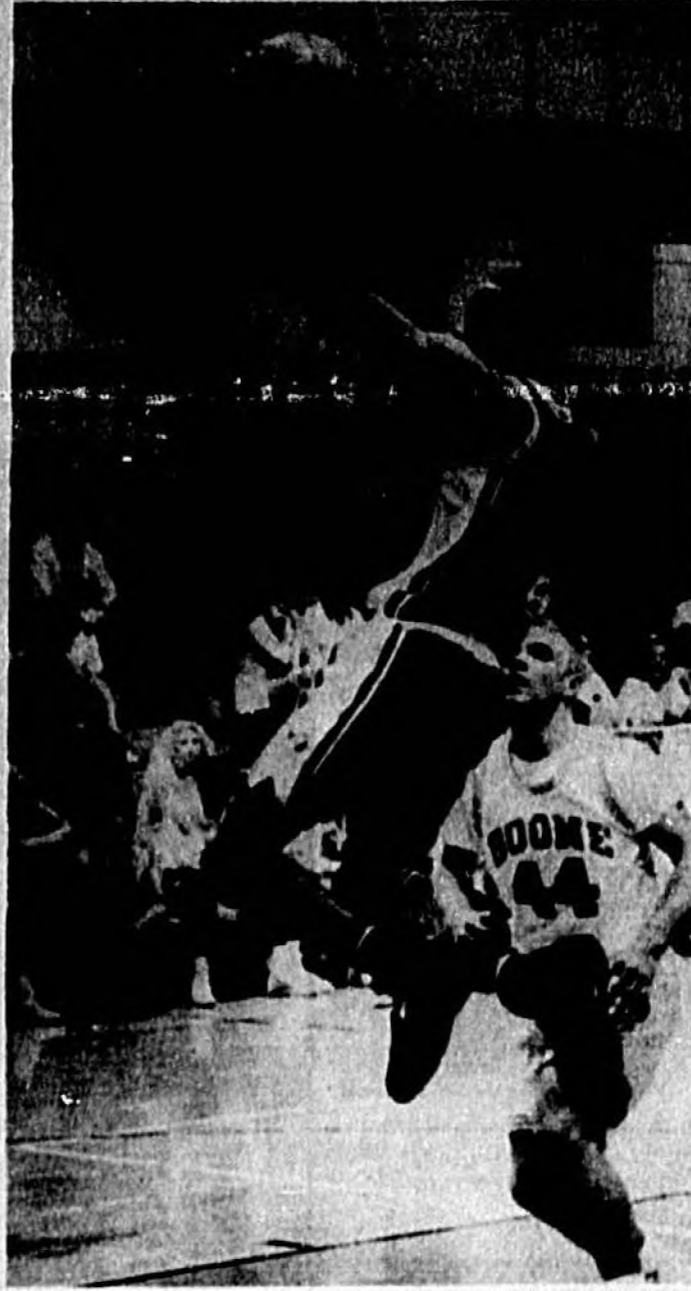
Dykstra will be richest Phillie

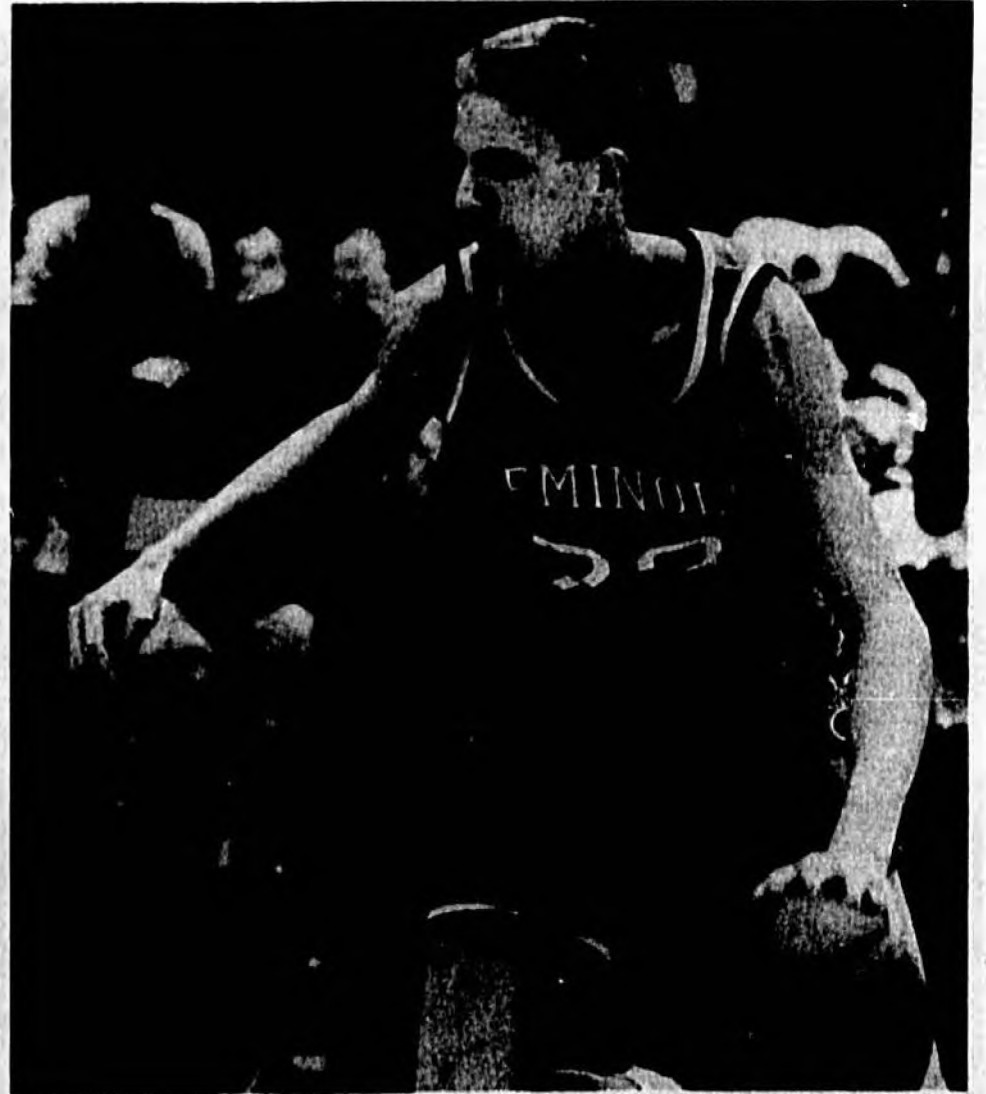

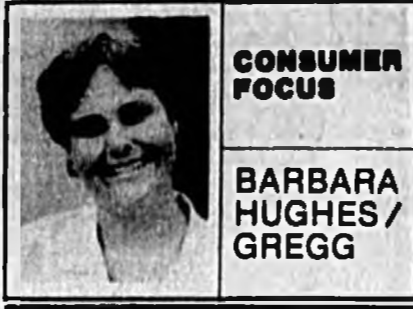

Batteries can cause chemical burn

To keep those holiday toys and appliances operating, will you be stocking extra batteries? Be safe this holiday season and throughout the new year.

Since 1988, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission has received over 100 reports of household batteries leaking, overheating and rupturing. This permits corrosive liquid to leak, which can cause chemical burns. About one third of the incidents involved injuries, a number of which were chemical burns to children from the leaking battery fluid.

Household batteries can overheat and rupture in several ways. If you try to recharge a battery not intended to be recharged, the battery can overheat and rupture. If you have a rechargeable battery, be sure to use the proper battery charger intended for the size and type of battery you have. Do not

use an automobile battery charger to recharge flashlight batteries because the batteries could rupture.

If you use alkaline and carbon-zinc batteries together in the same appliance or if you mix old batteries with new freshly-charged ones in the same appliance, the batteries can overheat and rupture. Always use a complete set of new batteries of the same type when replacing batteries.

If a battery is reversed (positive end where the negative end belongs and vice versa), it can overheat and rupture. This has happened when young children install batteries backwards. Warn children not to take out batteries or install them. Parents should install batteries in household appliances and children's toys.

Have fun with those new toys

but be safe too! And remember, don't throw those batteries away! Gather up your old paint cans, lawn and pool chemicals, or any other hazardous waste and take those with your old batteries to the transfer station. DEAR TORN: Many parents have found it is helpful to establish a "No Illegal Use" rule in their homes before a problem arises. In many families alcohol is a part of the holiday celebration used in an appropriate manner among the adults. However, as you have discovered, the problem arises when kids feel that they have the same entitlements as the adults. The guidelines you may want to consider for your "No Illegal Use" house rules conform to state and federal laws. These include:

- No use of alcohol by anyone under the age of 21.
 - No possession or use of any illegal drugs.
 - No use of cigarettes by anyone under 21.
- An important point to remember is that you may be held legally responsible for any harm done to persons or property perpetrated by a minor under the influence of alcohol or other drugs supplied or consumed in your home with or without your permission.

Many parents feel uncomfortable about establishing a "no use" rule for their kids when the parents themselves drink. Remember, the real issue here is no illegal use. If the adults choose to drink, they must do so in an appropriate, responsible manner.

It is never appropriate or responsible to get drunk. And now a word to all readers — "Have a wonderful and safe holiday!"

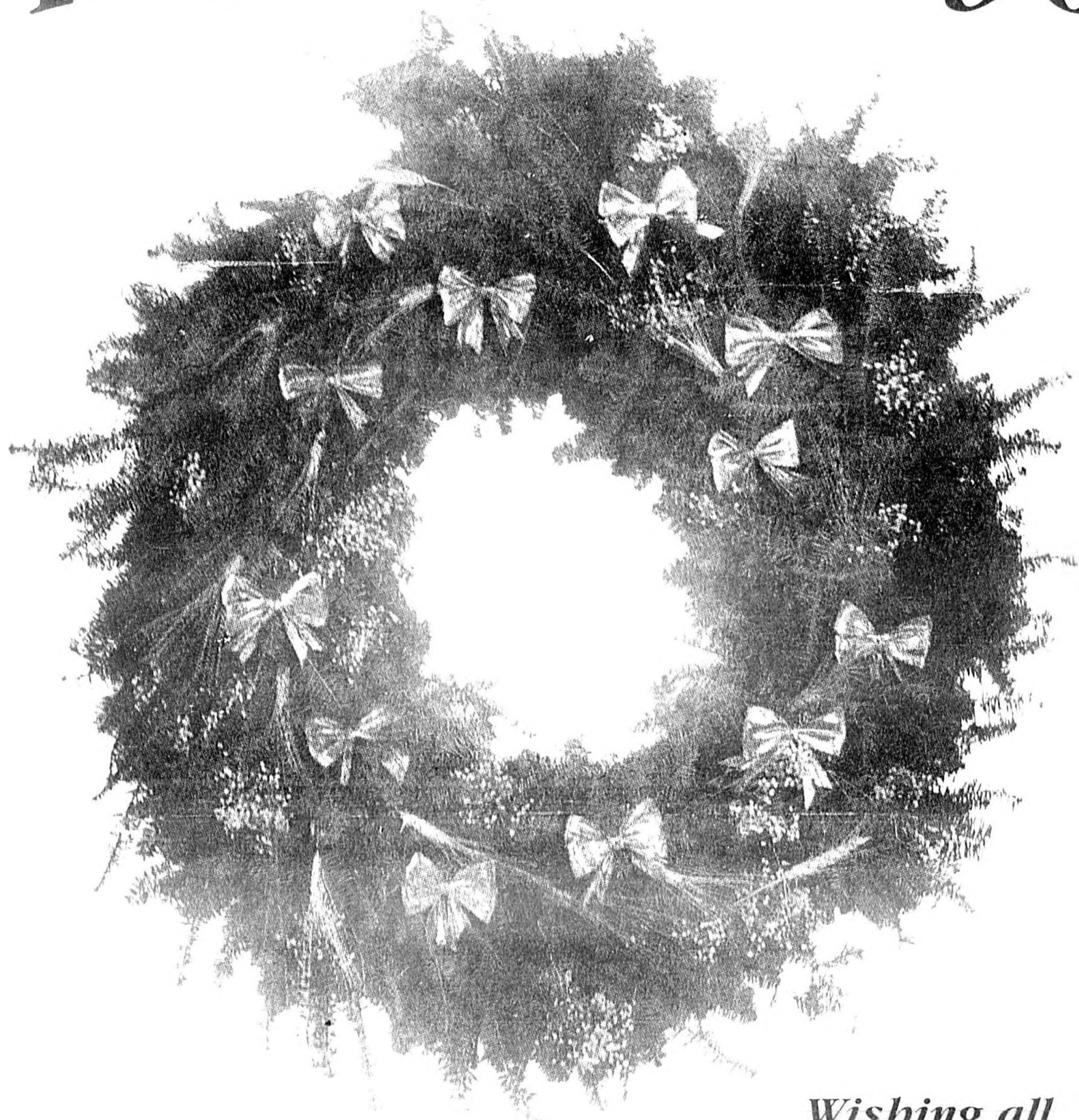
