



Senate OKs Act To Halt Viet War

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate has voted a second time to halt U.S. combat operations in Indochina, but the battle to make it stick is far

The amendment by Sen. Edward Brooks, R-Mass., was passed Wednesday night in a series of eight intricate, hardfought votes. The tally on the key test was 49 to 47. Attached to a \$20.5-billion Pentagon

procurement bill, the amendment provides for U.S. withdrawal from Indochina, except Thailand, within four months if Hanoi releases American prisoners and accounts for GIs missing in action.

The measure would cut off funds for all war operations except the amount required for withdrawal and the protection of withdrawing forces. An amendment by Sen. George Aiken, R-Vt., to incorporate President Nixon's conditions for withdrawal from Vietnam was adopted at one point 51 to 47, but was replaced later with

Non announced support for Aiken's amendment in a telephone call to the senator Wednesday afternoon, marking the first outward endorsement by the White House of any endthewar language.

The bill itself eventually carried 92 to 5, unlike the foreignmilitary-aid bill which the Senate killed last week after a similar end-the-war amendment was attached to it. However, the House version of the

procurement bill has no end-the-war provision. A conference between the Armed Service committees of both chambers could kill it. Sen. James Allen, D-Ala., raised another possibility: simply keeping the bill in conference

without acting at all, to give Nixon more time to

For this reason, he said, "there is a good chance it won't be voted on finally until after the election.'

The bill itself was largely a victory for the Pentagon in its requests for weaponry programs. "The old pattern is still alive," said Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, "We're just acquiescing to the Defense Department in anything it wants. We're raising questions, but not accomplishing much."

Senate OKs Act To Halt Viet War

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate has voted a second time to halt U.S. combat operations in Indochina, but the battle to make it stick is far

The amendment by Sen. Edward Brooks, R-Mass., was passed Wednesday night in a series of eight intricate, hardfought votes. The tally on the key test was 49 to 47.

Attached to a \$20.5-billion Pentagon procurement bill, the amendment provides for U.S. withdrawal from Indochina, except Thailand, within four months if Hanoi releases American prisoners and accounts for GIs missing in action.

The measure would cut off funds for all war operations except the amount required for withdrawal and the protection of withdrawing forces An amendment by Sen. George Aiken, R-Vt., to incorporate President Nixon's conditions for withdrawal from Vietnam was adopted at one point 51 to 47, but was replaced later with

Non announced support for Aiken's amendment in a telephone call to the senator Wednesday afternoon, marking the first outward endorsement by the White House of any endthewar language.

The bill itself eventually carried 92 to 5, unlike the foreignmilitary-aid bill which the Senate killed last week after a similar end-the-war amendment was attached to it.

However, the House version of the procurement bill has no end-the-war provision. A conference between the Armed Service committees of both chambers could kill it.

Sen. James Allen, D-Ala., raised another possibility: simply keeping the bill in conference without acting at all, to give Nixon more time to negotiate a settlement with the North Vietnamese.

For this reason, he said, "there is a good chance it won't be voted on finally until after the election.'

The bill itself was largely a victory for the Pentagon in its requests for weaponry programs. "The old pattern is still alive," said Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield. "We're just acquiescing to the Defense Department in anything it wants. We're raising questions, but not accomplishing much."

Editorial Comment

Capital Punishment On Hot Seat

sitting in "Death Row" can be rationalized to the point of where they could be eligible for parole at any time or under any mitigating cir-

That this comment needs to be made now is significant only when viewed in the rather murky light which has been surrounding the recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling which found capital punishment "cruel and unusual."

This week federal district court judge Charles R. Scott ruled that this, indeed, was the case when vacating the death sentences, but not the conviction, of 60 and retaining jurisdiction on the 39 whose petition is now before the state

Violation of the 8th and 14th amendments of the United States constitution was found in the federal court's decision last June and cited again in Judge Scott's ruling.

Florida is only one of the various states where the supreme court ruling has made it necessary for the states to take action so that their penal code could be wisely brought into consonance with the federal finding and yet carry out the will of the people.

Here in Florida both the executive in the person of Gov. Reubin Askew and the legislature have joined to do the necessary at a special session of the legislature in November after the

A republican inspired drive to have this special session held at once was killed in the legislature when the needed votes to call such a session were lacking.

This issue is one which required the very best of research. It is so enmeshed with the clash between old penology and the advances which modern rehabilitory processes have achieved that cool, wise action is difficult if not im-

Yet that is just what must be had so that Florida can stand at the top of the list of states which has adjusted to the supreme court ruling with laws which will stand the constitutional tests and as well as the common sense need for

Askew's appointment of a committee of distinguished and experienced leaders with retired Supreme Court Justice E. Harris Drew to study the various opinions of the U.S. Supreme Court Justices (it was a 5-4 ruling) is a long step in the right direction.

The House of Representatives has a special committee at work on the same problem and has scheduled public hearings to feel the public

Presidential 72 Quiet GOP Convention? Not Sure

WASHINGTON - With President Nixon's announcement that he is keeping Spiro Agnew as his running mate, and with the White House firmly in control of the writing of the GOP platform, some Republicans are wondering what they'll do

"In 1972," the report states, "the new, young voters will need to know how they can participate not only in the election of a president, but also in the election of the candidates for this high office.

"In addition, we hope that in the selection of a candidate for president, these recommendations will encourage greater involvement in the Republicun Party on the part of all our citizens, regardless of sex, age, race, religion, color or national origin."

In an almost comical but potentially dangerous rivalry, the Nationalists reply on even-numbered days, mostly with psychological warfare leaflets. Dribbles of refugees from the mainland still brave the 1,600 yards of shark-infested

waters that separate the two Chinas. The Peoples Republic of China considers Taiwan to be an integral part of the nation. Its eventual recovery, by one means or another, is a stated goal. The Communists are opposed, says this observer, by a "compact, highly trained and fiercely loyal armed force" on Taiwan. If that is a realistic assessment, this fact alone suggests that the world may not always be permitted to pretend that Nationalist China no longer exists.



GLOBAL VIEW Reason for Soviet Egyptian Ouster

WASHINGTON (NEA) It is now known that Russian military advisers were caught up to their elbows in Egyptian politics. They intrigued for the promotion of those Egyptian army and air force officers most sympathetic to the Rus-

sians and to communism. They worked against Egyptian officers who were less eager to cooperate. They involved themselves more and more in attempts above and below the table to run the Egyptian army and ir force, playing one officer against another.

But this is not all. The Russians made efforts, as in the Sudan, to subvert civilian Egyptian officials to secure illegal or special coperation with the Soviet Union. They did this by promises special favors and influence from Moscow for those airo officials who would go along.

They intrigued against those officials who were nationalist, pro-West or otherwise not "cooperative" with or sympathetic to the Russians and to Soviet aims in Egypt and the Middle East.

They subsidized local Arab groups willing to cooperate in pulling down one man or another or in aiding the political or military fortunes of others the Russians favored. Under Russian influence and Egyptian pressure the Communist party of Egypt dissolved itself in 1965. Its nembers then joined the Arab Socialist Union. Since that time, a number of these former Communist party members have moved up in Egyptian politics and in the controlled press. Some of these individuals have been work-

ng under Soviet direction. Finally, Moscow used economic and military aid pressures in an attempt to bring the Egyptians into line with

County Board Actions

Acting County Attorney Howard Marsee indicated to the County Commission that it does indeed have the authority to rezone property or at least to initiate a zoning change. He said that it would have to follow the same procedure as any other applicant for a zoning change, and that a negative vote by the planning and zoning board would require a board majority voting in favor of the change. This is as opposed to the usual practice of the majority of members present at public hearing to approve the change

Rezone Property

Mental Health Facility

A legal description of the property being considered for purchase for the Seminole County Mental Health facility has been received from Florida Hospital North. The Board of County Commissioners approved funds for an appraisal by

Alan Sayford. Acting County Attorney Howard Marsee, responding to a question by Commissioner John Kimbrough, said the interest earned on the bond issue funds may be used for the purchase of equipment or land for the mental health facility. The bond issue which was passed by the voters two years ago in the amount of \$325,000 has been accruing interest during this interim period when studies for the building and building site have been conducted.

Currently approved for appraisal is property adjacent to the new Florida Hospital North, which is nearing completion on SR 436 in Altamonte Springs. Architect Eoghan Kelley indicated to the board that the construction of the facility and his professional fees would be covered.

Back Pay Due Jane

"It is the opinion of the office of the County Attorney that Bob Jane is due payment for the time during which he was

suspended from his position as constable of District 6." Such payment cannot be made, however, until Jane or Jack Bushor, who held the job during the Jane suspension, submits the annual reports necessary for the computation of the amounts due Jane. According to Acting Attorney Howard Marsee, Bushor, to date, has refused to submit the annual report which has been requested more than once. Jane has requested back payment of \$17,550.

Marsee was authorized by the board to request substantiation from James C. Dauksch, attorney for Jane, as to the correctness of the amount requested. He was also authorized to notify Bushor again that an annual report is long past due. The letter is to indicate that unless such report is made, appropriate legal action will be instituted.

Fire Protection

The Overstreet Investment Company water treatment plant is not presently operating beyond capacity, according to reports to the Board of County Commissioners by Utility Administrator William Pinch. The plant is capable of providing adequate water to Sleepy Hollow, first addition, and all of the other presently approved projects. However, Pinch emphasized that capacity is not adequate to provide fire protection for any additional subdivision or apartment

Pinch recommended release of building permits for all projects within the Overstreet Investment Company certificated area which have been approved by the utility control office.

He also recommended the release of building permits in the Sanlando Utilities certificated area effective immediately. Their water system capacity problems will be greatly alleviated when a high service pump impeller is replaced and emergency power source is provided for one well pump, according to Pinch.

In other action by the Board, Pinch was given direction to proceed with the development of "connection fee" criteria for all private utilities operating in the unincorporated areas of Seminole County. The authority was granted the utility administrator following his comments that it is essential to have good valid criteria. "I can forsee problems in many areas otherwise. We don't want to penalize existing residents with increased rates in order to subsidize developers. We should insure that low rates not be jeopordized by the fact of plant expansion. What we really are asking, is that the developers pay their own way."

According to Pinch, there are no set fees at this time. "The charge may run up to \$150 or the actual cost of making connections, whichever is greater."

Cooperation Problem

"There appears to be a problem concerning cooperation between the maintenance and road departments," Commission Chairman Greg Drummond stated to the Board. The question arose over the request of maintenance supervisor Henderson Ferguson for the use of a grader during ball season. This grader would have to come from the

road department and Road Supt. J. C. Lavender has his

equipment out on road problems. Ferguson also needs a

dump truck to hall fill dirt into recreational areas. Lavender told the board there are no problems of any department at any time. "It is just a question of what will have to be left off. We have just so much equipment to go around. We will do whatever this board authorizes me to do." He said that he is having serious problems with developers building subdivisions and then "we end up building their roads for them." He reported that six houses

and that he did not even know they were being built. "Now I have to go in there and build their road. And the situation is going to get worse before it gets better." He said that Ferguson "don't need the equipment. We are going to have to go in and do the work. I don't know what

Use Caution Cleaning Outdoor Table Umbrella By POLLY CRAMER

DEAR POLLY-Helen might clean the canvas umbrella over her outdoor table as we clean our canvas hammock. For many years we have been soaking it with plenty of hot water and detergent, scrubbing with a brush, rinsing and then hanging it over the line to dry for several days. We do this every year and our hammock still looks quite nice. Also, she might try spraying her leather hassock with that well-known household disinfectant to remove the mildew odor. My daughter has lots of mildew during humid weather and she uses this on practically everything.-MRS, C. L.

DEAR GIRLS-Most of the new outdoor table un brellas are made of a vinyl that is cleaned easily but I was advised that the older canvas ones cannot always be cleaned too satisfactorily. Some are not preshrunk so great care must be taken to prevent too much soaking and then shrinking but always dry with the umbrella open. If the design is painted on, do not scrub. The roughness of the paint used makes them even harder to clean. First test a small place on any umbrella .-

Revson and McQueen also finished first in the prototype classification. I will miss seeing the 12 Hour Grand Prix of Endurance at Sebring. I do feel that Road Atlanta will do a fine job and keep up the fine tradition started in Sebring some 23 years ago. I had my complaints with the Sebring officials over various items but on balance I will still miss seeing this fine event on that old airport course.

Talladega 500

This weekend we have the Talledega 500 from Alabama with the Dick Petty versus Bobby Allison versus David Pearson battle shaping up again. Alabama International Motor Speedway has been the scene this past two years of fantastic races with some events having as many as 50 lead







Electric Auto Interest Mounts

AP Business Analyst

NEW YORK (AP) - The nation's electric utilities are somewhat accustomed to finding themselves in usual defensive positions. They have, for instance, been among the

staunchest defenders of capitalism, even though the principle that underlies the system, that of risk-reward, is something a utility with assured profits need not worry about. And now they are in the incongruous position of

trying to earn the greatest profits that efficiency and good management can provide while at the same time urging customers to cut down on the use of their product.

This latest problem is likely to get much worse

before, if ever, it gets better. And, doing its bit to worsen the situation is none other than the industry itself, judging from a recent announcement.

The announcement came from the Electric Vehicle Council, self-described as "an organization of manufacturers, utility companies, and individuals interested in advancing electric transportation technology and use both in this country and abroad."

More Americans than ever before, says the council, have expressed interest in buying an electric car for around-town driving. Fifty-five million Americans, it claims, would be interested in buying a shortrange, limited-speed electric auto if it were available for under \$2,000.

"This latest consumer survey demonstrates a increasing interest in electric, on-the-road vehicles," said H.J. Young, executive secretary of the council.

"The question," he said, "is really not whether the electric car will come into wide use. The question is how rapidly this use will develop." Advocates of the electric car claim its batteries would be recharged from power outlets during times of low usage by industry and households.

They also commend the car as clean, or at least cleaner than the present internal combustion engine, although this argument assumes that the utilities themselves, because they provide the power, are clean.
