ANNUAL REPORT

Of the Secretary of the West Side Improvement Association

We come to the end of the year and disbanding of the association with a feeling of pride in the results accomplished by this organization for the improvement of the West Side during the season of 1912-13.

In November 1912 our president succeeded in securing a restraining order of the Gulf Refining Co.'s oil tanks in the vicinity of the West Side Park.

In the course of the year important communications were received from Mrs. Mary T. Wood, chairman of the Information Bureau of the National Federation of Woman's Clubs, and Miss Zona Gale, chairman of civics of the National Federation.

In February Mrs. John W. Dickens president of the Welaka Club was a guest of the association being present to inspire interest in the proposed amalgamation of the Woman's Club of Sanford.

In April a vote to amalgamate with the Woman's Club of Sanford resulted for amalgamation ratified at the May meeting of the association. It was agreed however to continue the meetings and payment of dues until November 1st the annual meeting of the association.

On April 2nd a Cleaning-up Day for the West Side was a splendid success and has been far reaching in its effects. Merchants, corporations, city council, The Herald, owners and renters of property enthusiastically cooperated with the association with the result that there has been a decided improvement in private grounds and public streets of the West Side.

A large consignment of seeds for children's gardens was received by Mrs. Robbins through the courtesy of the Burpee Seed house of Philadelphia which were distributed to the members of the association.

Walks have been plowed in the park a merry-go-round for the pleasure of the children placed there and much labor and money have been expended upon its improvement.

A division of the funds in the treasury was made April 7th between the Park and streets and the street division was applied on Cypress curbing for three blocks on Elm avenue. This too has had far reaching results for property owners and city council seeing the excellent improvement on Elm avenue cooperated with the street committee of the association and continued the good work and Elm avenue from First to Fourth street; Second street from Myrtle to French avenue and Third street from Myrtle avenue to Elm avenue and across Mr. Hunge's lot on Third street have been graded and curbed.

Through the influence of the association the city council have had parkways vacant lots and ditches cleaned out and recently weeds cut down in the park.

Drainage in Osceola

For the purpose of discussing two big drainage projects with Isham G. Randolph, the noted drainage engineer, who is shortly to make a report on the Everglades, a delegation of prominent Kissimmee citizens, including State Senator Arthur E. Donegan, P. A. Vans Agnew, W. B. Harris, editor of the Kissimmee Valley Gazette, Capt. Clay Johnson and J. M. Lee, is in the city, as is Mr. Randolph.

One of the projects involves about 800,000 acres of fertile land in Brevard, Orange, St. Lucie and Osceola counties, upon which Mr. Randolph has already made a favorable report. This project is somewhat similar to that evolved about ten years ago by Geo. Hopkins, which was enjoined by Federal Judge James W. Locke at the instigation of the Jacksonville Board of Trade on the ground that fulfillment of the plan would affect the navigability of the St. Johns river. Jacksonville Metropolis.

Negro Kills Farmer's Wife

Orala Fla. Oct. 3.—Floeing from a negro an escaped convict who entered her home about four miles north of Orala this morning Mrs. P. T. Wilson a white woman was shot down and died almost instantly. Charles Luffman a neighbor who heard Mrs. Wilson scream and the shot that was fired ran to the house. He met the negro coming from the place and the negro fired a shot at him. Luffman was unarmed and as the negro again threatened him with the gun he had to let the black go unmolested.

Hurrying back into the yard Mr. Luffman found Mrs. Wilson dying. She expired within a short time. Luffman immediately notified the sheriff here and a posse was organized. Hundreds of armed men joined in the search and automobiles were sent out on every public road with a view to cutting the negro off.
