Crack Passengers Train Of Southern Line Is Looted by Two Men Near Georgia City

(AP)—A crack passenger train of the Southern Railway was looted by two men near Georgia City, Ga., last night. The train was carrying passengers from New York to New Orleans and was stopped at Georgia City, Ga., about 10 miles south of that place. The men broke into the train and stole several passengers' bags and trunks. The train was then allowed to proceed to New Orleans.

Retired Michigan Teacher Is Killed

Plans Offered For Bolstering Banks

(AP)—Strengthening of supervision over state banks and greater efforts by the controller of the currency to prevent "bad failures" of national institutions, was urged before the Senate banking investigation committee today by Oscar Wells, chairman of the First National Bank of Birmingham. He said "Most of our difficulties come from inadequate management and inadequate supervision. State bank superintendents and examiners, he said, "paid too meager" salaries and all inexperienced in many cases.

U. S. OWNERSHIP OF POSTOFFICES GAINS APPROVAL

(AP)—The administration's proposal for wider federal ownership of postal facilities was passed yesterday by the House. The bill authorizes \$45,000,000 for the removal of postal activities from leased quarters into government owned quarters and garages. It also authorizes the construction of new quarters and garages. The bill was passed by a vote of 317 to 10.

Clarence Saunders Grocery Concern Is Declared Bankrupt

(AP)—The Clarence Saunders Stores, Inc., southern serve-yourself grocery chain, was declared bankrupt in federal district court yesterday and the way was cleared to return the firm to private operation. Creditors with claims of \$1,200,000 have approved a reorganization plan worked out in co-operation with the receivers, who probably will direct the business when its receivership ends.

I. C. C. Authorizes Railways To Revise General Schedules

(AP)—Railroads were authorized by the Interstate Commerce Commission yesterday to revise, within the next four months, the general schedules of freight rates on petroleum and petroleum products throughout the Northeast and from the mid-continent oil refining territory to all points in the East.

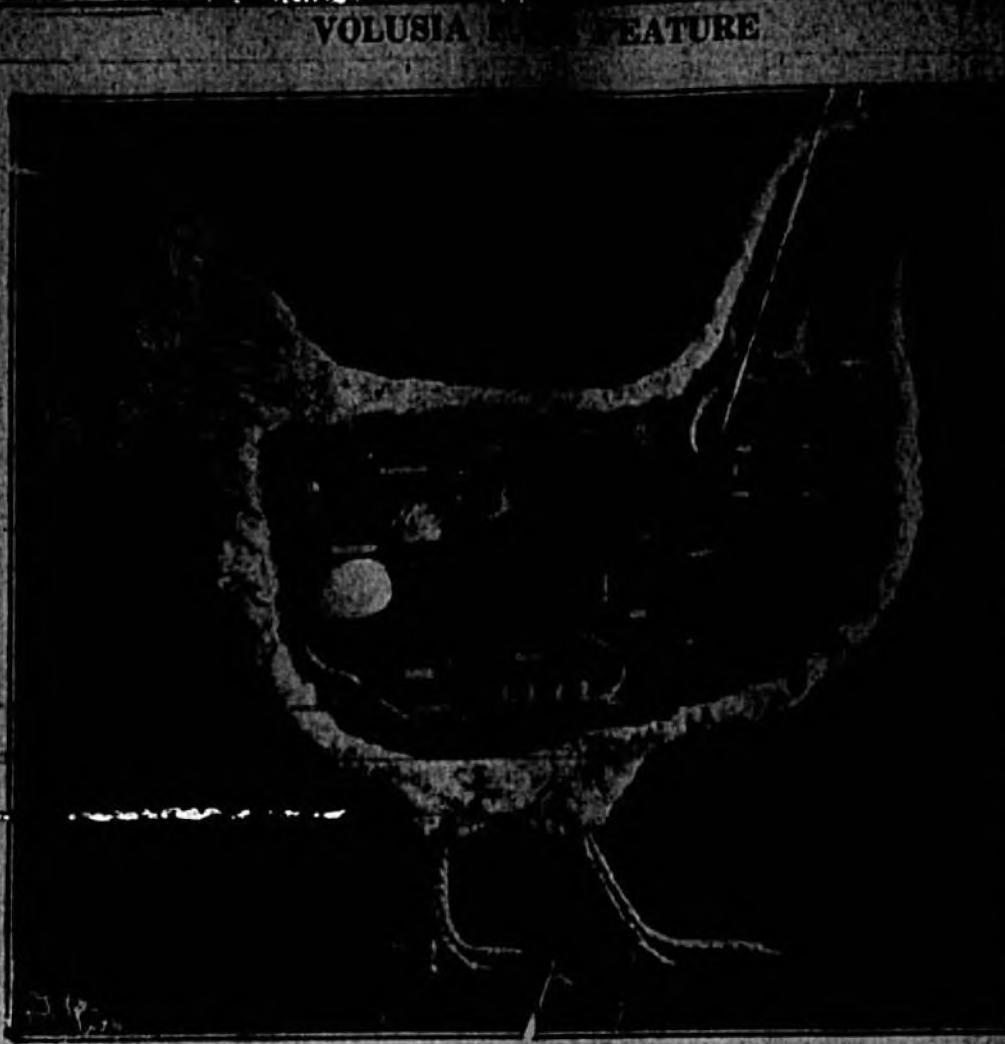
The program has 20 platform acts, and seven dramatic productions. This program given daily, 1:30 and 7:00 p. m. fireworks at night.

"Mary Ann," the famous mechanical hen, built by the United States Department of Agriculture for exhibition at the World Poultry Congress at London, England, will be an outstanding attraction in the Poultry Building of the Volusia County Fair held Feb. 17-21. Experts from the department of agriculture at Washington and Gainesville will champion Mary Ann and demonstrate her workings.

Mary Ann is 18x24 feet in size, standing higher than a man, and is operated by electricity. She actually lays eggs, her insides making them from raw material in a manner similar to the processes of nature as carried on by the ordinary barnyard fowl. While she does her laying she explains the various processes, carrying on a discussion about nutrition ap-

plied to egg production. A concealed phonograph, of course, provides Mary Ann's monologue.

"We are extremely proud of having secured this mechanical hen," said Secretary Manager Earl W. Brown, "for every fair in the country is clamoring for her and there is only one of her. However, as the Volusia fair has been selected by the department of agriculture for the annual state boys and girls poultry exhibit and poultry judging contests, and as the federal government and the state are very much interested in promoting the poultry industry thru the young folks, we were favored in securing Mary Ann. Also, at this fair, the Florida branch of the American Poultry Association will have its state showing of birds, as well as the state showing of many special breeders,

(Continued from page 1) The market today was a study in contrasts. It opened with a gasp, as the Dow Jones Industrial Average advanced 15.14 points to 218.46. This was the highest gain since the crash of 1929. The volume of trading was also unusually heavy, with over 100 million shares changing hands.

The advance was led by the railroads, which were up an average of 2.5 points. The steel industry also showed strength, with several key stocks rising sharply. However, the market was not without its problems. Some sectors, such as the utilities, were down, and there was a general sense of uncertainty about the future of the economy.

Analysts are watching the market closely, looking for signs of a sustained recovery. They note that the current rally is still in its early stages and that there are many factors that could influence the market's direction in the coming weeks.

U.S. Ownership Of Postoffices Gains Approval

(Continued from page one) The House today passed a bill authorizing the purchase of the postoffice buildings owned by private individuals. The bill was passed by a vote of 318 to 102.

The bill is part of a larger program to nationalize the postal service. It allows the government to buy back buildings that were sold to private owners after the war. The program is expected to save the government millions of dollars in the long run.
