



Cataracts Removed, He Lost Equilibrium. DEAR DR. LAMB - I am 74 years old and had cataracts removed from both eyes three years ago. Since then I have lost my equilibrium. I do very well around the house most of the time as I can get hold of things to steady me, but when I am outside or in stores with bright lights I am off balance and motion will induce dizziness. I close my eyes I will black out. My doctor says it could be my eyes or poor circulation. My eye doctor does not seem to know what caused it. Anything you can tell me about my loss of equilibrium, and anything that could be done to help would be greatly appreciated. I am in the input from three different systems; the eyes, the balance system in the ears, and the sensations you get from your joints. I am sure you will help me throughout the body. Finally these three systems are all integrated into the brain to give you information of body position and sense of balance. As the brain receives this information it sends out signals automatically that help you adjust to maintain your balance. If two of your systems are working well you can usually maintain your balance. If only one is working you are in trouble. As an example, a person who has had some degeneration in the spinal cord that affects the sense of body position will still be able to stand still until he closes his eyes. When he loses the signals of orientation from his eyes, and already has lost the sensation from his body that passes through his spinal cord, he will lose his balance.

Tim Fought, But 'Never Got A Chance'

Timothy Sechrist's greatest ambition was to hold a paycheck he earned himself. No one ever gave him the chance. And now he is no more.

Timothy, 19-year-old son of James and Gertrude Sechrist, died Saturday of a congenital heart disease while watching television at his 174 North Lane home in Sanford.

"More than anything, he wanted a job where he could earn money," his mother said. "But he never got a chance. It's pathetic when handicapped young people go to try and get a job. All they ever hear is 'What experience have you had?'"

Tim struggled all his days to live a normal life. "Tim was a blue baby and probably would not

have survived a month in the average family," explains Dr. Van Parker, who cared for Tim since he was 21 days old. "But it was due to the dedication of his parents that he survived. He came close to dying 100 times."

"He wanted so much to be like other children" during his first year of life. And, if he had not been for constant care and concern, he would not have made it.

"According to his father, when Tim was seven months old, he was discovered that two large arteries were reversed. Open heart surgery was performed on the infant at Shands Teaching Hospital

in Gainesville — the first baby with congenital heart disease to be treated there, and the first one where the procedure was used, according to Dr. Parker.

"After his first year he was better," Dr. Parker says, "but he still required lots of attention. The surgery revealed he had bad leg veins."

When Tim was seven, he underwent a second operation. "This time surgeons went inside his heart to try to correct the congenital defect.

Somehow during the surgery the mechanism for controlling the heartbeat was damaged, Parker said. For a time a mechanical pacemaker was used, but it was decided he functioned better without it.

"He wanted so much to be like other children. His parents knew his limitations and this

sometimes caused conflicts. But Tim was the most pleasant and good-natured boy and always tried to do what he asked of."

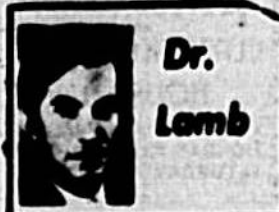
"I didn't want my child hurt and I didn't think he would win any ribbon, so I was driving slow when I went to pick him up," she recalled.

"I couldn't bear to see the look of disappointment I thought he would have. But the trip surprised me when she got there."

"When I drove up I heard the announcement over the loud speaker. He had just won the first ribbon. I didn't even know he was driving. If I had, I would have been scared to death. I guess I hugged him too much."

A great Tim presented his mom with seven ribbons — three of them for first place.

Tim, youngest of five children, was born in Titusville. The family moved to Sanford in 1968 to be near Dr. Parker. "Whenever he was sick,

Dr. Parker was the first person he always wanted," recalls Mrs. Sechrist. Over the years, Tim had attended William School in Pella; Ft. St. Johns School, Sanford Middle School, and Orange High School. When he died he was enrolled in classes for handicapped students at Seminole Community College.

"He liked to get out with me," his father remembers. "I took him fishing in the lake at New Smyrna Beach. I have a shop behind the house, and he enjoyed working there with me making things."

"He loved his church (Central Baptist) and was a member of the Southern Church," his mother adds. "He loved to sing and had a beautiful voice."

And, she adds, "he made friends wherever he went. I don't think he ever had an enemy."

One friend who especially misses Tim is his little dog, "Misty," his companion for seven years. "The part-dachshund-part-chihuahua dog all over the house now looking for him," Mrs. Sechrist says. "Tim sure had a good hold some kind of job if he had the opportunity," she reflects.

"He was not handicapped as far as strength. He could cut the grass. I guess I hesitated to get looking for a job for him because I didn't want to see him hurt," she says.

Tim became ill the last time at SCC broke for the holidays. It was diagnosed as pneumonia.

PSC Vows To Sue County Over Utility License Fee

A lawsuit will be filed in circuit court here alleging that a license fee based on revenue received by Seminole County Attorney Gary Siegel that the fee is not proper. Siegel told the commission two weeks ago the fee violates state law.

According to Raymond Vesterby, chief attorney for the PSC, the fee is based on revenue received from the water and sewage utilities. However, he said, the county

does not regulate utility services. Vesterby contends such fee collection without providing services is a violation of state law.

"It is our opinion," said Vesterby today, "that a license fee cannot be based upon an amount of revenue."

He explained that usually a private business operating under a license fee would pay an amount for the license to operate. He said Seminole county has been taking profits from a percentage of revenue.

"Our staff and the county attorney's staff have conferred on this," said Vesterby, "and we told them basically that we thought the franchise fee was unconstitutional."

Siegel, following a meeting earlier this month with a representative of the PSC's legal department, advised the commission that the state constitution gives the county authority to tax specific items. He said "nothing gives the county the authority for this tax."

Vesterby said the commission voted to file the suit, because of its effect on regulations.

"The commission has to set rates," said Vesterby. "If it is a lawful expense the commission has to consider it in figuring rates. Basically, what we are going to do is go before the judge and say, 'Is this legal or not? If it is not legal it should not be considered in figuring rates.'"

In opposing the continuation of the fee two weeks ago, Commissioner John Alexander noted that the fee was adopted in 1976 giving utilities a franchise to use public roads. That decision has since been stricken down by the PSC, according to Alexander.

He said today he would not institute action to eliminate the fee.

"I made my motion two or three weeks ago," commented Alexander.

Roger Neiswander, county commissioner, said today he was reviewing correspondence trying to determine if the PSC had contacted his office about filing a lawsuit.

"It's a little unusual for them to take such drastic action without first notifying us," he said.

Two 'Sisters' Leave FSU

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Two sorority sisters of murdered Chi Omega Margaret Bowman and Lisa Levy dropped out of Florida State University today, saying their parents learned of their safety.

President Anwar Sadat has decided to give up on the initiative, said an Egyptian source. "But he'll certainly be re-examining it."

The normally gregarious Sadat went into seclusion before announcing past policy announcements, notably his 1973 military thrust across the Suez Canal and the November trip to Jerusalem.

Sadat charges Israel has made absolutely no concessions on his key demands for total withdrawal from occupied Arab lands and self-determination for the Palestinians.

"The president will study various aspects of the Mideast problem," said a U.S. and Egyptian official. However, a spokesman for the Egyptian government said Sadat actually had submitted his resignation Sunday to the U.S. Ambassador Hermann F. Eilat.

"It is not true," an official

close to Sadat said. The state-controlled daily Al-Ahram called the report a "silly rumor."

Foreign ministers' talks grouping Egypt, Israel and the United States were beginning today in Jerusalem in a bid to break a stalemate on Middle East peace efforts. But Sadat has said he has "absolutely no hope" the talks will agree on peace principles and has blamed what he terms Israeli intransigence.

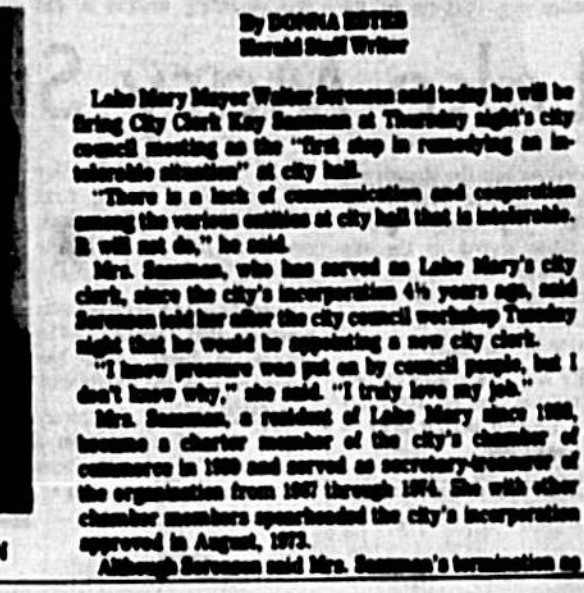

House Panel OKs Kindergarten 'Must' Bill For 5-Year-Olds

Kindergarten attendance for all five-year-old children in Florida may become mandatory this September.

A House subcommittee on education in Tallahassee Tuesday passed a bill which would require school districts to provide kindergarten for all five-year-olds. The bill would require children who would be five on or before Jan. 1, to attend and attend kindergarten classes.

Attendance at school is now required only between the ages of 7 and 14, with children permitted to enter school at the age of 5, according to Florida law.

"We had 2,200 children in our voluntary kindergarten program in Seminole County this November," Brenda Stewart, consultant-coordinator of early childhood education in Seminole County said today.

"We have a maximum ratio by law of 25 students per kindergarten teacher. If the law requires that all five-year-olds attend kindergarten then we will have to have more teachers," she said.

Mrs. Stewart said she does not have many children in the county who are eligible to attend if the program goes into effect.

According to Ralph Ray, administrative assistant and public information officer for

the school district, enrollment in first grade was "about for the 1978-79 school year, 2,200 for the 1977-78 and 2,200 for this year."

He pointed out that the figure this year might appear a bit high "due to the new method of program in the district's primary grades," and that he feels "most of the children eligible under the proposed kindergarten program are probably already in kindergarten."

"A lot go to nursery school, private kindergarten," he pointed out. "I feel that most of the children who would be required to attend five-year-old

kindergarten under the new law are probably doing so already," Mrs. Stewart pointed out that "all elementary schools now offer kindergarten programs."

She said she agrees with the education subcommittee's report which stated that "such progress as the federal government has made in providing kindergarten programs are probably already in kindergarten."

"In Seminole County our kindergarten program is a 'readiness for learning' program," Mrs. Stewart explained.

"Each program differs depending on the needs of the children involved. Each program is adjusted to the background of the children, and what skills they have when they come to school," she explained.

"All kindergartens, however, try to teach the child to learn, teach him to open himself to the world."

"We have a kindergarten resource readiness guide which teachers use to measure a child's skills and to report on which goes on twice during the kindergarten year," Mrs. Stewart explained.

Estimated costs for the new classes and teachers depend on how many children will be in the program, Mrs. Stewart said.
