

Flood Area Building Rules OK'd PEOPLE

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS—Stung with flooding complaints in several city areas, the city council has agreed to a plan limiting commercial, industrial and apartment construction in flood prone areas.

altamonte building rules OK'd (from the railroad tracks to I-4 for Lakes Florida, Aulinda and Mobile) and North Lake (south of SR 436 and east of I-4) basins.

It was said this will be a first step of a series following guidelines established in a recent drainage study completed by consulting engineers Glace and Radcliffe.

Mayor Norman Floyd at first opposed the move, looking toward the possibility of acquiring federal funding for additional drainage studies, later voting with the proposal.

Councilman Cal DeVoey, despite stiff opposition, ramrodded through unanimous approval authorization for City Atty. Joe Davis to prepare for adoption an ordinance setting construction standards in low-lying areas.

The ordinance will designate flood-safe construction elevations and require construction of either water holding ponds or a positive drainage system to a moving body of water.

DeVoey said although many lakes are overflowing in the city, the area has had 10 inches less rainfall this year than at the same time last year.

He insisted that requiring builders to provide drainage will alleviate problem areas along the coast (from the railroad tracks to I-4 for Lakes Florida, Aulinda and Mobile) and North Lake (south of SR 436 and east of I-4) basins.

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — City council Tuesday night turned down colleague Dan Dorfman's proposal to reduce by 20 per cent property taxes in the city.

Ceramic Art Blooms In Laurel

NEW YORK — (NEA) — It's a long way from Finland to Taiwan to Tennessee. When Californian Nancy Patterson set up her potter's wheel in Laurel, Blooming you could almost here the mountain people ask, "How'd she git here?"

Back in the mid-1960s Nancy Patterson probably asked herself the same thing as she struggled to set up a ceramics plant in Appalachia.

As a 29-year-old student just out of UCLA in 1948 she had firm plans to study illustration and design of textiles and wallpaper at the Los Angeles Art Center College of Design. She was wooed away from this determination by an instructor Albert King, a ceramist who had crafted porcelain in a small Los Angeles studio. This was in an era when handcrafts and those who did their own carving, sewing, needlework and ceramics as art and for a living still were considered slightly eccentric, if not exotic.

Nancy Patterson admits that during her Los Angeles stint she saw "a number of American artisans quietly going broke. Europe was the center then, especially of fine ceramic art."

She got her break to work in Europe when the managing director of Denmark's Royal Copenhagen Porcelain Manufactory admired her work. He invited her to come to work for them as a guest artist, without pay, for a month. This month away from her California home stretched into seven years, she reveals, as she went to Denmark to work and study in the fine design studio of Arabia porcelains in Finland. Then she took a sabbatical throughout Europe, the Middle East and Asia. Back from Taiwan, she recalls, "I told my mother I'd be gone six months."

However busy they are in the plant, though, there always is time to swap recipes and make plans for an occasional picnic meal. Almost everyone brings a covered dish. Several women wrote down their favorite recipes for such outings and Nancy passes them along.

These recipes, she admits, gave her an idea: "I like to see good food attractively arranged on a plate. Now I'm planning a cookbook with the help of the people in the area."

PUMPKIN BREAD

3 cups sugar
1 cup salad oil
4 eggs beaten
1 can (1 pound) pumpkin
3/4 cups flour
2 teaspoon baking powder
2 teaspoons soda
2 teaspoons salt
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1 teaspoon allspice
two thirds cup water

Combine sugar, oil and eggs. Add pumpkin. Sift together dry ingredients and add to Pumpkin Mixture. Add water, thoroughly beat and pour into loaf pans. Preheat oven and bake bread in 350 degree oven for 1 hour.

PUMPKIN CAKE

3 cups sugar
1 cup corn oil
two thirds cup water
4 eggs
2 cups cooked fresh or canned pumpkin
3/4 cups flour
2 teaspoons soda (heaping)
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon nutmeg

Mix sugar, corn oil, water, eggs and pumpkin in order given. Mix in sifted dry ingredients and pour into tube pan. Bake for 1 hour and 15 minutes at 350 degrees. Let cool and frost.

FROSTING

8 ounces cream cheese
1/2 stick margarine
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 teaspoon butter
flavor
1 two-pound box powdered sugar

Let cream cheese and margarine soften at room temperature, cream together and add remaining ingredients. Frost cake.

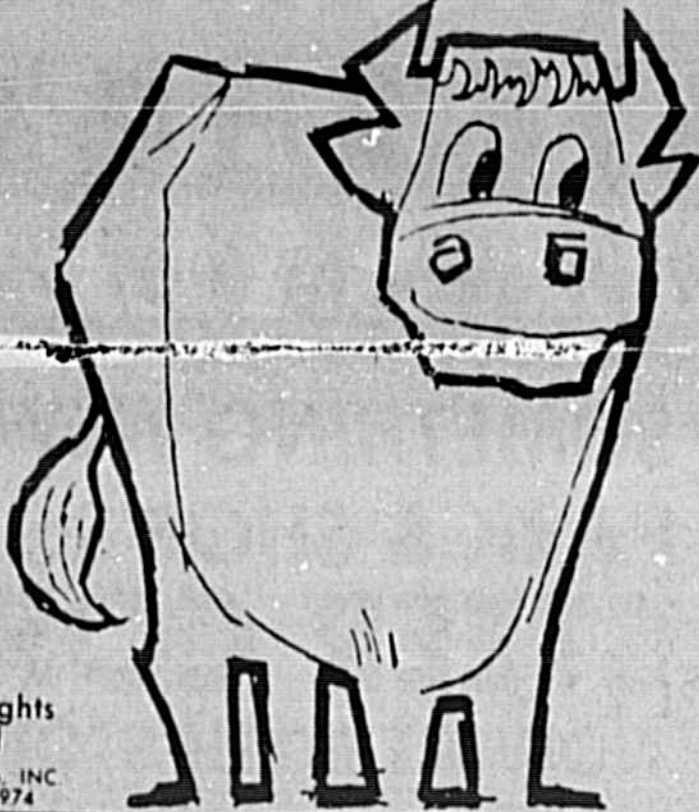

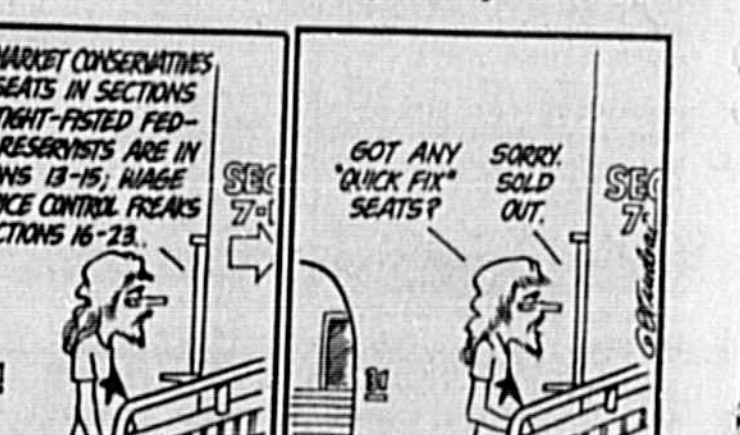

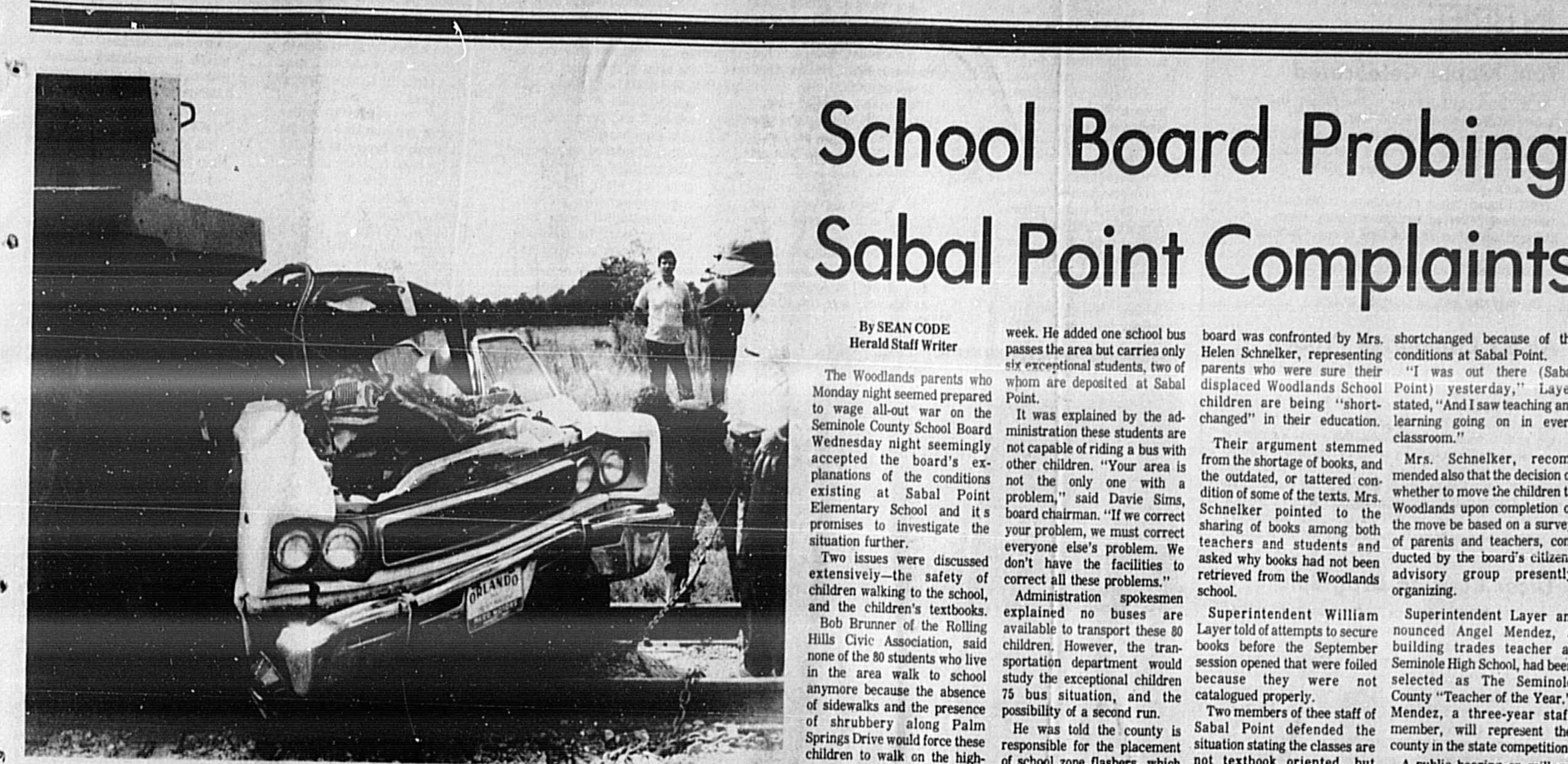

School Board Probing Sabal Point Complaints

The Woodlands parents who Monday night seemed prepared to wage all-out war on the Seminole County School Board Wednesday night seemingly accepted the board's explanations of the conditions existing at Sabal Point Elementary School and its promises to investigate the situation further. Two issues were discussed extensively—the safety of children walking to the school, and the children's textbooks. Bob Brunner of the Rolling Hills Civic Association, said none of the 80 students who live in the area walk to school anymore because of the absence of sidewalks and the presence of shrubbery along Springs Drive would force these children to walk on the highway. However, the traffic conditions at the school have become more congested with the car pool vehicles which transport the children, and may have directly contributed to two traffic accidents in the past week. He added one school bus passes the area but carries only six exceptional students, two of whom are deposited at Sabal Point.

No Sewage Service Yet For Dog Track

Harbor developer and owner of the sewer package plant which serves the kennel club, remain fruitless. "Track officials have indicated they are ready, willing and able to sit down and negotiate toward an amicable solution," said Mack Cleveland, kennel club attorney today. Julian indicated the city feels at least a moral, if not a binding and legal, commitment to provide the sewer service of the past council promised as a condition of the dog track annexation last year. The crux of the problem is that although the city received a Department of Pollution Control (DPC) operating permit for the plant, it is supposedly owned by the Hobbs firm. Actually the city does not know for a certainty whether Hobbs firm owns or has been leasing the plant. City officials were surprised earlier this week at a report from City Supt. Ralph Fisher that the power generator at the plant was removed recently after the Hobbs firm reportedly quit paying the rental fee.

Prisons Closed To New Inmates

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Corrections Director Louis Wainwright today closed the prison system to new inmates because of "incredibly overcrowded prison conditions." It was the third time in three years that the prison system has been closed to new inmates because the population greatly exceeded institutional capacity. Wainwright said there are more than 11,000 inmates jammed into a system built to house about 5,000. "Our facilities have been overcrowded to the point where we cannot continue to jam people in and we cannot guarantee the security of inmates or staff, let alone conduct effective rehabilitative programs," he said. Wainwright said Gov. Reubin Askew has approved his decision to refuse to accept new inmates from the county jail at the Lake Butler Prison Reception Center. He said Lake Butler was built for 726 inmates and presently houses 1,163. Askew will appoint a blue ribbon committee to seek ways to alleviate prisons crowding, Wainwright said. Five new prisons providing room for 1,300 inmates have been authorized or are under construction but Wainwright said the earliest completion date is December 1975 for a Brevard County institution. He said longer sentences by judges, increased crime, Florida's standing as the No. 1 State in terms of the proportion of the population behind bars and public apathy all contribute to the crowding problem. The overcrowding is aggravated by a large and growing number of close-custody inmates who cannot be placed in minimum security programs such as work-release, Suzie Wilson a spokesman for the division said.

Hit-Run Victim Still Suffering

The young man was pedaling his bike along Lake Mary Boulevard just before dawn when an automobile suddenly emerged from the blackness and seemed to swerve toward him. The youth steered off the road, but the car followed, knocking him from his bike, shattering his leg, breaking two fingers and fracturing his pelvis. Anki then dove off into the night. "The police said he had all kinds of lights and equipment, a bright orange flag and everything," his mother declares. "They said there was no reason why the driver didn't see him." Harold was in a cast for almost a year, and is now in a leg brace. But he's still unable to walk without the use of crutches and cannot go back to work. "I have to wait on him like an invalid," his mother admits. "He just sits around the house. We get him in the car and go to church on Sunday, but that's all." Robert Watson, district counselor at the state department of vocational rehabilitation in Sanford, had been working with Harold since Sept. 1970 but had stopped seeing the youth after Harold was placed successfully in a job. "Harold's always had a real good attitude. He's an independent kid," Watson says, "and I don't think he's bitter about what's happened to him. But there's nothing we can do for him until the doctors know what his status will be. If he's able to walk we can try to place him in a job where he will have to walk as little as possible. If he can't, we'll have to re-evaluate him." The department has paid for medical costs not covered by insurance and will continue to do so until it's determined whether or not Harold can return to work. "We're vocational rehabilitation and our services are predicated on the idea that the person is working, or will be working. If he cannot return to work in the future, then we can no longer pay medical costs," Watson says. That decision, Watson adds, may not be made for quite some time. Meanwhile, the departments will continue to support Harold. But Mrs. Rousch is running into other problems. Her husband, incapacitated after a heart attack two years ago and unable to work is on a small disability income. She is trying to encourage another son who dropped out of school to support the family after the father's death. But the family's income will dwindle even farther if he does. "And now the insurance people at Cobia are telling me that they had to terminate Harold's insurance because it was costing the company too much. But at the time of the accident, they said it would be good for two years." "Yet, Mrs. Rousch, like her son, seems uncomplaining by experience. "We've prayed a lot about it and we have no hard feelings against the driver. We wouldn't want the driver to go to jail, because that wouldn't stop the pain. But we just it again."
