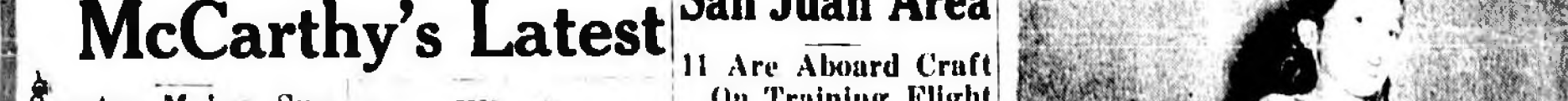

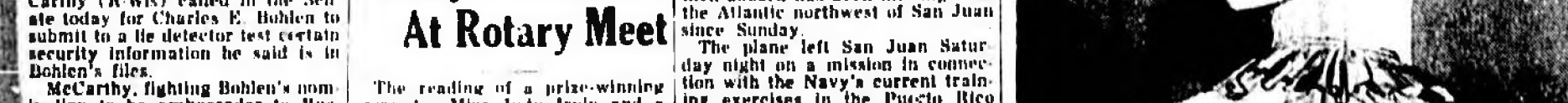

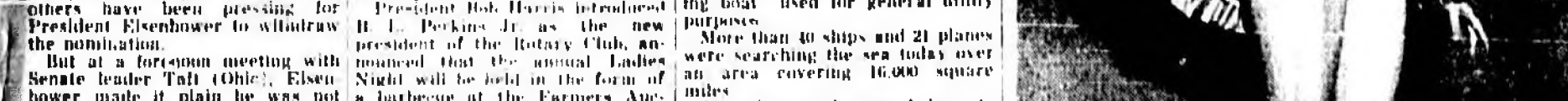

**State's Vets Take
Critical View Of
UNESCO Doctrines**

ORLANDO (Special) — Encroachment of one-world teachings of UNESCO was hit recently by representatives of Florida veterans' organizations in a report issued at their spring conference.

The Department Commanders Conference of Florida made up of present and immediate past commanders of statewide veterans organizations took a dim view of the efforts of UNESCO—United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization.

Alleged undermining of Americanism by UNESCO's doctrine of world citizenship was ordered made the first order of business by each of the member organizations before their respective governing bodies in state conventions to be held between now and June.

The American school system at all levels from grade to high school and college is absorbing UNESCO teachings "that patriotism in the United States should be set aside and patriotism to one-world citizenship should be made a permanent thing," said a spokesman for the Department Commanders Conference.

"Love of and defense of our country is the primary aim of all veteran and reserve organizations and they intend to fight with a united front any group that would submerge or set aside patriotism in America for patriotism of

United Nations or any other one-worldism," the spokesman added.

Attending the conference were representatives from the following state executive groups of the following organizations:

American Legion, Disabled American Veterans, AmVets, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Military Order of the Purple Heart, Military Order of the World Wars and the Reserve Officers' Association of the United States.

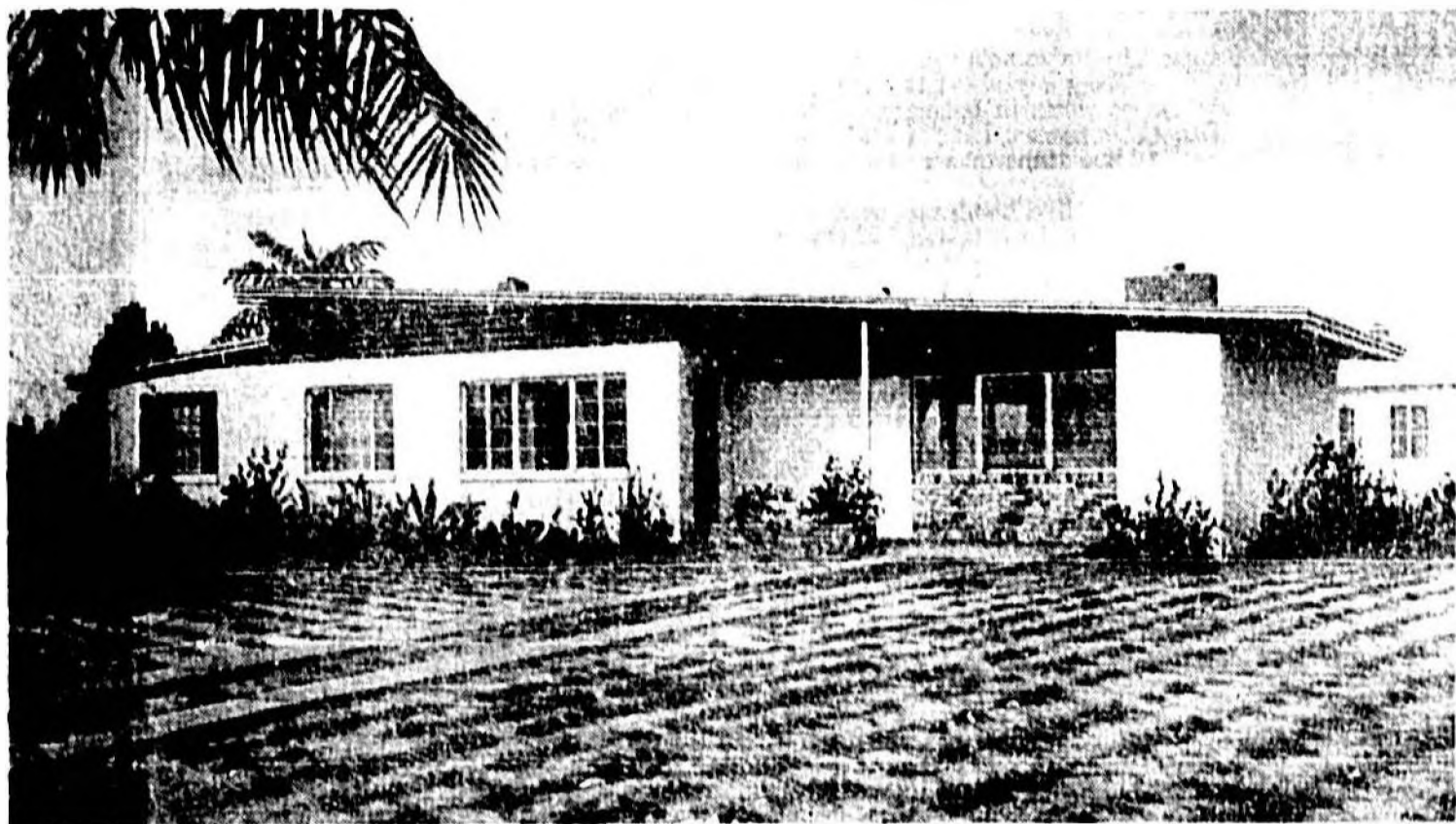

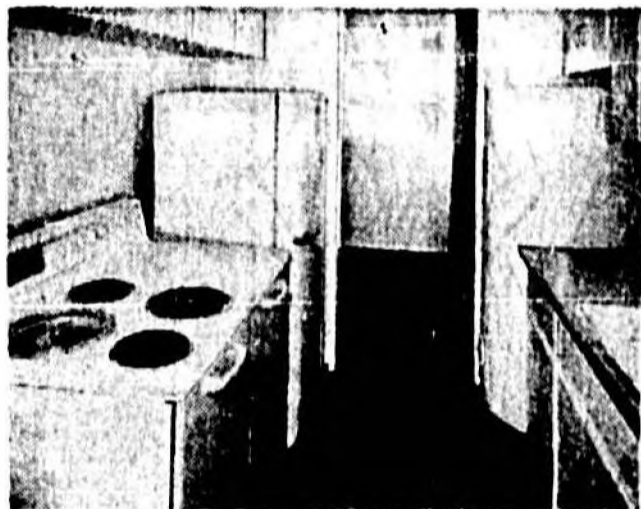

Boarding House In Negro Section Is Destroyed By Fire

A fire broke out in a two-and-a-half story wooden Negro boarding house, at 817 Holly Avenue yesterday afternoon, severely injuring occupants and leaving the structure a total loss.

The fire, which broke out at approximately 8:30 p. m., was caused by a small stove on the second floor. The fire spread rapidly, and within ten minutes the entire structure was in flames. Firemen were alerted by the time the fire broke out, but the fire was too well established to be easily controlled. The firemen worked for about an hour before the structure was completely destroyed.

The boarding house was owned by Miss Jeannette Laing of 621 Oak Avenue and had an estimated value of approximately \$4,000.

Occupants of the house fought the blaze to no avail before City firemen arrived. By the time the fire was under control, the entire structure had been almost completely destroyed. Firemen fought desperately to keep the flames from spreading to surrounding structures, but 60 percent damage was caused to a wooden cottage immediately to the north before the fire was extinguished.

Firemen returned to the scene at 10:30 p. m., and the smoldering of the debris began smoldering again.

"There wasn't anything we could do when we arrived," Chief Cleveland explained. "The building was almost completely burned and it was all we could do to keep it under control."

Firemen Henry Faint and R. T. Bennett were severely injured slightly from the flames as was Chief Cleveland.

None of the occupants was injured. Garfield Johnson, a neighbor, was injured by falling from a window. Johnson was taken to the hospital where he is recovering from his injuries.

A pet dog was burned so badly that Chief Cleveland had to shoot him. Mattie Crook operated the boarding house for Miss Laing.

Earlier Saturday firemen answered two minor alarms. An overheated oil stove brought them to the Palm Hotel at First Street and Elm Avenue at 6:00 p. m. A short-circuited transformer in the rear of Kader's Jewelry, was attended to later the same evening.

Weather Curtails CAP Training Plan

H. James Gut, chairman of the Seminole County Defense Council, stood by at WAWY operated by Kenneth Sapp of this city, but no takeoff came through from Brim. Gen. J. F. Moriarity, director of the 12-county Orlando Reserve of Civil Defense, at 1:44 p. m. saving planes would not take off from Orlando.

Along with Lt. Col. Forrest Breckenridge, Mr. Gut and Mr. Sapp, were on the defense portion of the operation for over an hour.

Victim Of Gunshot Wound In Fair Shape

TALLAHASSEE — Former Taylor County Sheriff Bill Toles was reported in "fair" condition at Tallahassee Memorial Hospital today from a gunshot wound.

Toles was brought to the hospital here Sunday night. Taylor County Sheriff Maurice Linton said Toles had been found at home with an apparently self-inflicted shotgun wound in his chest.

Toles was suspended from the sheriff's office by former Gov. Fuller Warren just four days before his term was to expire last January. Warren removed Toles on a charge of drunkenness and refusal to cooperate with the attorney general's office in arresting a suspected burglar.

McCarty Is Feeling Fit, Sees Visitors

TALLAHASSEE — Gov. Dan McCarty is feeling just fine and expecting to be up and around in another week or two, Mrs. McCarty reported today.

He is seeing a few visitors at the Tallahassee mansion where he is continuing to recuperate from a Feb. 23 heart attack, but he has balked at having his picture taken again in bed.

H. C. Phipps Funeral Rites Slated Tuesday

PALM BEACH — Funeral services will be held here Tuesday for Henry Carnegie Phipps, 71, retired financier and clubman whose family was prominently identified with the development of Southeast Florida.

Phipps died Saturday at his winter home after a long illness.

Phipps was born in Alleghany, now a part of Pittsburgh, Pa. His father was associated with Andrew Carnegie in the steel business and the Phipps family helped found the United States Steel Corp.

The family was the first to bring pulp to South Florida and in the early 1920s organized the Palm Beach Co. to handle properties. The Bessemer Properties, Inc. was organized in 1927 with Henry C. Phipps as president.

A Yale graduate in the Class of 1902, Phipps married Miss Gladys Mills, sister of Owen Mills, former secretary of the treasury, in 1907.

self-supporting, never asking one cent from the county or other outside sources.

Recalling that 63 years ago he used to play with a little freckled face boy, known as T. M., Mr. Evans introduced Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Johnson, and pointed out that they had recently returned from Cuba, where they have lived for many years, to retire and make their permanent home in Sanford in the neighborhood of which Mr. Johnson was born.

Mr. Johnson revealed that his father had been brought to this country by General Sanford, founder of this city, in 1882 and had worked for him for five years, thereby acquiring a homestead. T. M. himself, though born in Maitland, spent most of his early life in and around Lake Mary, went to Cuba during the Spanish-American war and remained there most of the time since until last fall when he bought a home on Camera Avenue.

Mrs. Johnson was then introduced and made a short talk. Being of Spanish ancestry knowing but little English and speaking in Spanish, some of the meaning of her remarks were lost upon her audience, but she provided an interesting and amusing part of the program.

Mr. Breckenridge called attention to the Florida's healthful climate, plentiful fruits and vegetables, economical living conditions, abundant sunshine and good water as among the various reasons for retiring to Florida. He said more and more people in the North are seeking to get away from the hardships and problems of living in congested areas in the North and find a home in Florida.

The society of the Chamber of Commerce, he said, "to try to locate them here. Utopia is not devoid of problems but in a place where people can live together in harmony under God and strive to work out their problems. It is not what you retire from, but what you retire to that counts."

Mrs. Dean said that she had introduced a course in "Southern Folklore" at Rollins College seven years ago because she had felt that this generation of almost complete mechanization was in danger of losing much of the grace and charm which the pioneers had enjoyed as a matter of course.

"Folklore, whether in the form of poems, stories, singing or dancing," she said, "relieves us from the dangers inherent in the tensions among which we live and helps to keep alive the rugged virtues of our ancestors and the joy of laughter."

She then quoted from William Alexander Percy's "Lanterns on the Levee," recited his poem on "Tom," and gave readings from Roark Bradford's "Adam and Eve Chilton."

One of the most popular numbers on the program was little Cindy May, who was introduced by Mr. Evans as the "Mary Pickford of today," and who presented two song and dance selections with appropriate costumes. Accompanied by Mrs. G. Blankenship at the piano, she sang "A Good Man Is Hard To Find," and "Candy Store Blues."

Another popular entertainer was Robert Lord, born in Sanford, a great grandson of John Lord, now of the University of Florida, and winner of a second place on the Paul Whiteman talent show in New York City. Playing the guitar he sang "Colored Boy Blues" and "Elmer and the Bear."

Mr. Schirard playing the violin presented two numbers the work of Sanford musician Harry Wester. They were "Indian Love Call" and "The Old Buried Cross."

C. W. Wiederholt and John Peckham presented a tap dance which was well received.

The Lake Mary orchestra under the direction of Raymond Hall played the "Jennie Lind Polka," "Kiss in the Dark," and a number of other selections.

There were 194 persons over 60 years of age present, including 33 men over 75 and 27 women over 75. Eight foreign countries were represented as well as 25 states. Florida had 27 natives present, Ohio 18, Pennsylvania 15 and Georgia 14.

Prizes were awarded to Andrew Toney, 92 years old, for being the second oldest man present, but because it was a home which he doesn't eat it was given to Mr. Randall who at 90 was the third oldest. The ham was donated by the Tip Top Grocery Co.

U. S. Charged With Trying To Subvert Czech Red Regime

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — Soviet satellite Czechoslovakia ripped into the United States today for trying to subvert the government of the new war.

U. S. Delegate Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. immediately replied that the Red Czech government, which seized power in a three-day coup d'etat in 1948, was itself the chief example of subversion in modern times and was in no position to accuse the U. S. of it.

The bitter blast against the U. S. — one of the strongest ever heard in the U. N. — burst over the U. N.'s 60th anniversary celebration at that group returned from a week end during which many delegates had tried to assess reported "peace moves" by the Kremlin. The speech by Czech Foreign Minister Vaclav David dashed hopes at least temporarily.

L. N. Palat of Indonesia had suggested that the committee postpone discussion of the Czech charges and take up an omnibus Polish peace plan instead. He said this might create an atmosphere in which high-level East-West peace talks could take place.

After both a Soviet bloc spokesman and Lodge killed this move, Palat withdrew his suggestion and the committee plunged into the tempestuous "subversion debate."

In making his "harmony suggestion" Palat said he had been informed it might "greatly facilitate" peace chances. He did not say who told him so, but made

take on the controls issue—whether they will confuse their peace-time economic philosophy with the needs of war.

But he appealed to Congress to take matters into its own hands and provide authority for a freeze on prices and wages, along with price and rationing powers in event of a new war.

"Not just wages or prices or rationing," Baruch said. "What you do or do not do will speed or slow any mobilization that may be forced upon us."

"It will reduce or increase our casualty lists. It could determine the very survival of this nation."

The statement immediately after saying he would like to see chief Soviet delegate Andrei Y. Vishinsky take personal part in the debate.

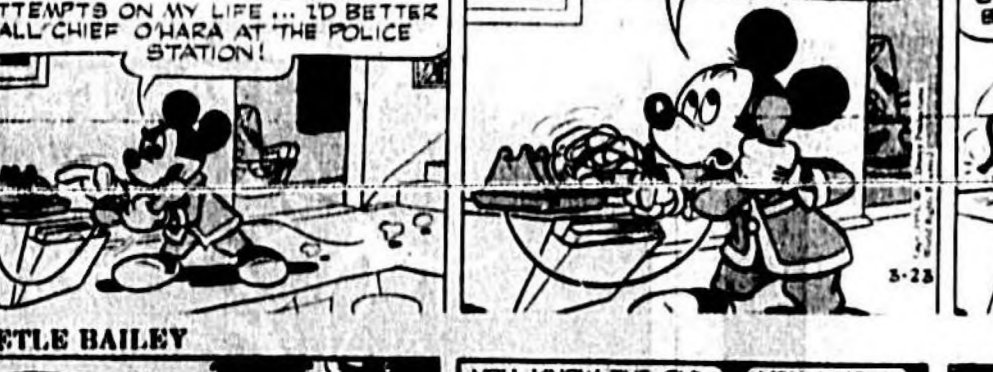
