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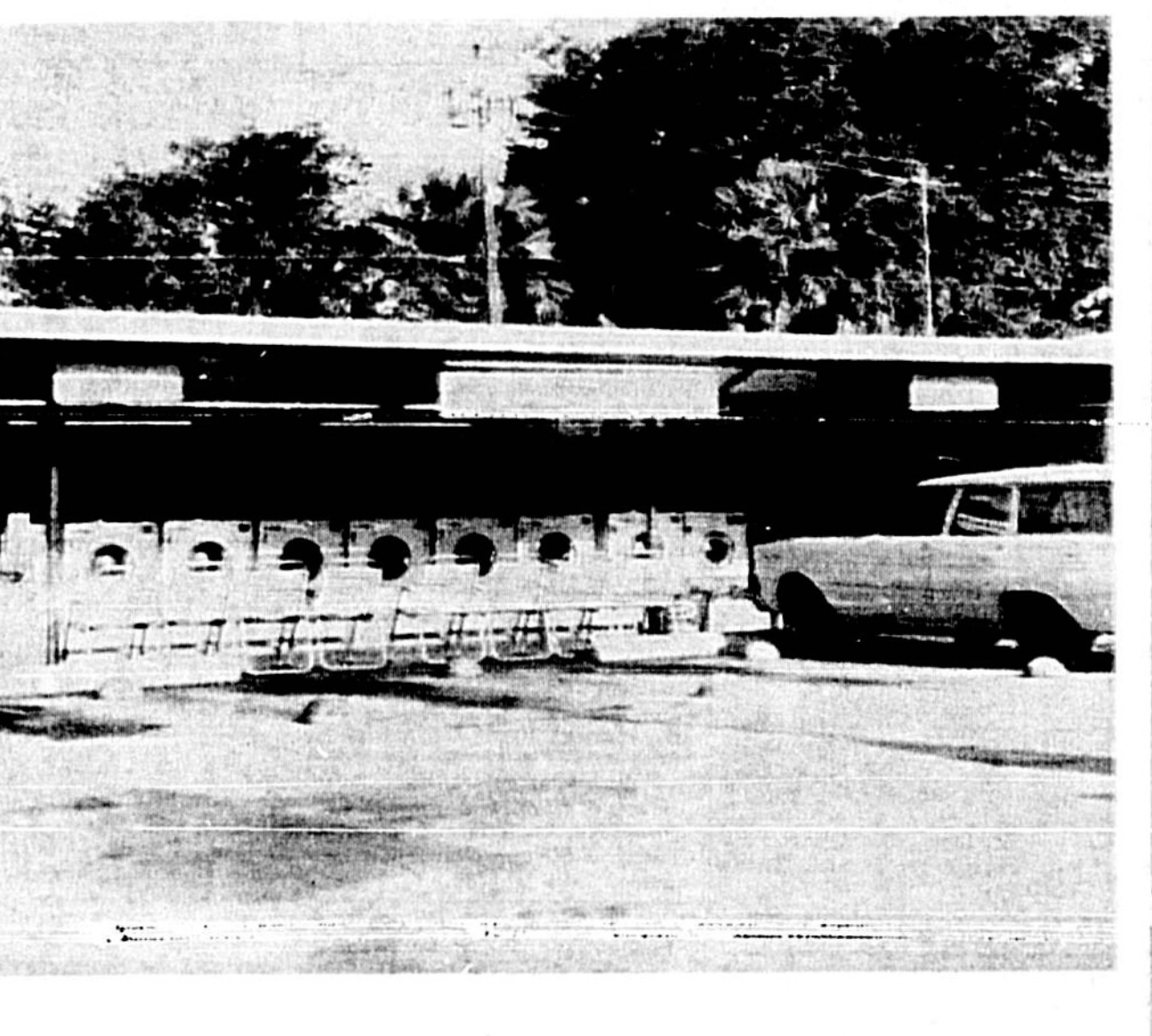

# Commission Cuts \$ Chamber, Jayces

County Commission Chairman John Alexander dropped what he described as a "bombshell" yesterday when he announced the county has appropriated no funds in the budget for fiscal 1969-70 for any chambers of commerce.

"We are considering creating a public utility commission to recommend to the board the best utilization of the board, Chamber of Commerce interests, industrial interests and tourist promotion," the chairman declared.

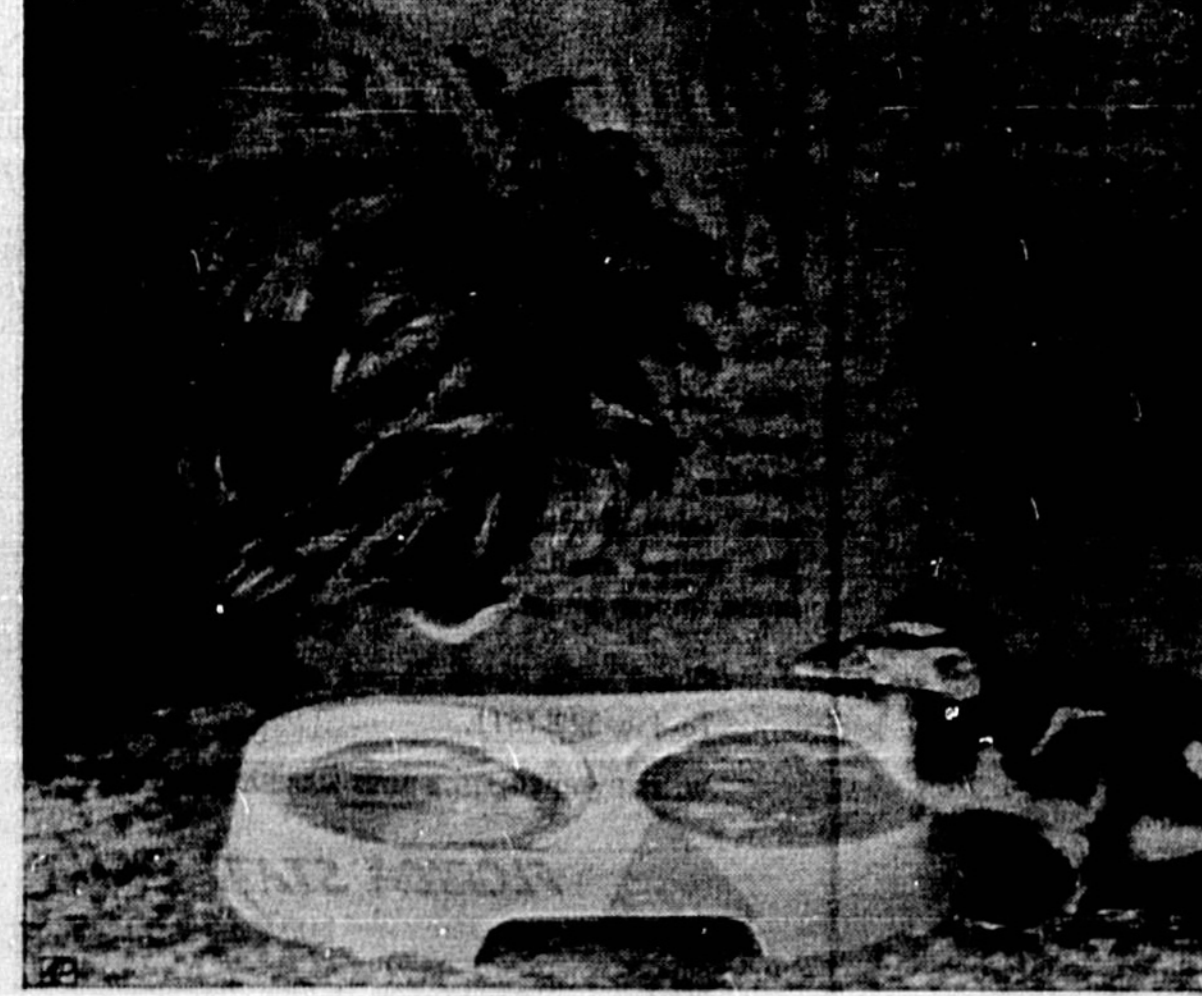

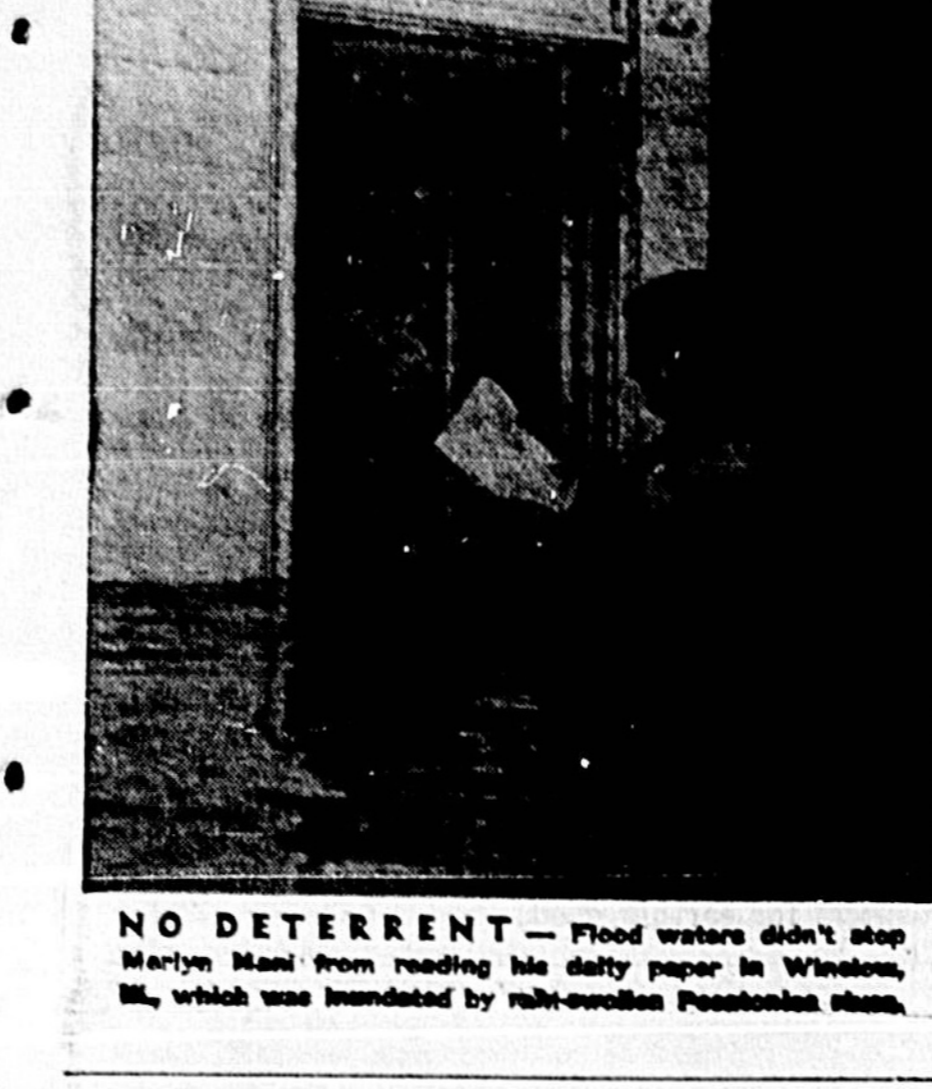

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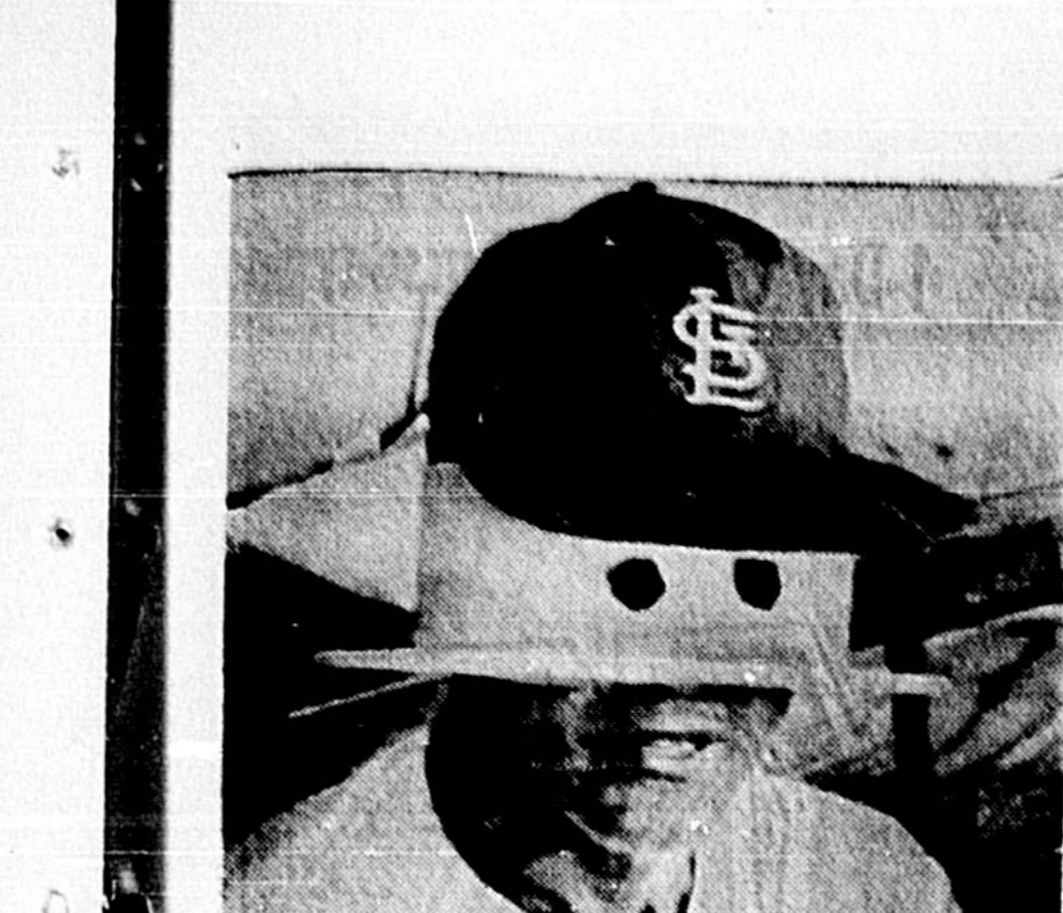

# All-Stars Will Try Again This Afternoon

WASHINGTON (AP) - Denny McLain is flying back to the nation's capital to throw the first pitch in today's rescheduled All-Star game.

But President Nixon isn't. That set of circumstances came about Tuesday night when a storm that hit Washington in late afternoon forced postponement of the All-Star classic until 1:45 p.m., EDT, today, weather permitting.

Nixon left right after the postponement for Texas in a splashdown of Theta I in the Pacific and was replaced by Vice President Agnew.

But while baseball had Agnew pitch hitting for Nixon, McLain expects to be on hand when it's time to throw the actual first pitch before a sellout crowd of 45,000 and a national television audience that will be watching in a jet after the delay.

McLain said he would return in a jet after the delay and should arrive at about 12:30, leaving him just over an hour to get to the ball park, suit up, take some warmups and step up on the mound.

While McLain's departure and the fact he was stranded by the rain for about 15 hours in the American League dugout caused a stir in the All-Star camp, the postponement only created more enthusiasm for Erie Bank in the National League dressing room.

The outstanding first baseman of the Chicago Cubs ran from player to player, yelling, "I want to play in the daytime any way. Now we can play in the daytime. Isn't that great?"

Then turning to Willie Mays, he quipped: "Here we are two guys 39 years old and we'll be able to play in the daytime. You know we'll be able to see the ball better in the daytime."

A daytime game was no certainty. The forecast for today called for showers later in the afternoon. An early rain that would delay the start would force the starting time back as late in the day as necessary.

No plans have been made beyond Wednesday. If the game cannot be played, then Commissioner Bowie Kuhn said the decision over whether to postpone the game to another date or cancel it would be made at that time.

The postponement Tuesday night was the first in All-Star history going back to 1933 and covering 29 previous games in which the National League built a 2:15 edge over the American League. One game ended in a tie.

Two previous games were heavily on a home hitting line up that included Oakland's Reggie Jackson and Washington's Frank Howard.

Jackson is the major league home run leader with 37 while Howard has hit 34. The eight All-Star starters had a total of 179 home runs in 1959 for the eight All-Star games.

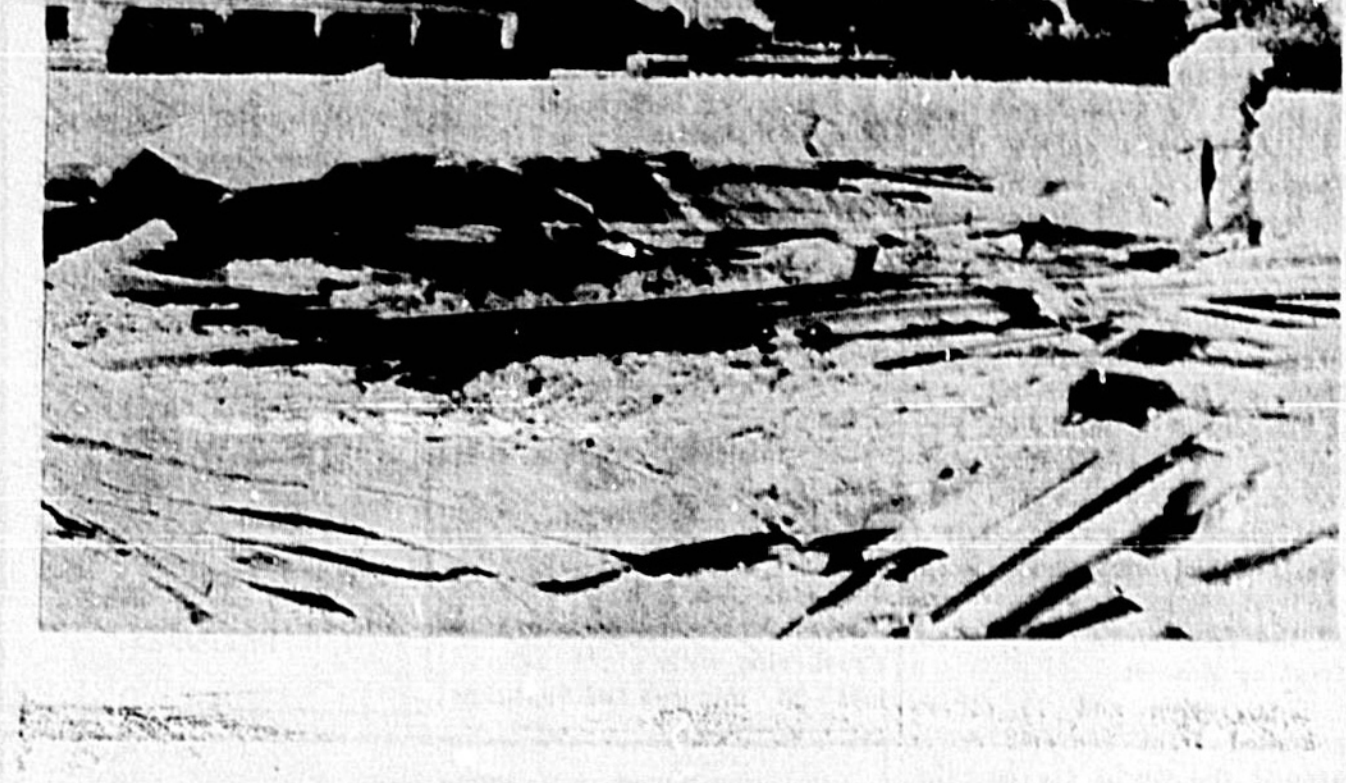

# Ground War Lull Continues

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. troops turned a brigade headquarters in the Mekong Delta area to South Vietnamese forces today in another step toward completing withdrawal of 25,000 Americans from the war zone by Aug. 31.

Control of Fire Support Base Moore at Cal Lay passed from the U.S. 8th Infantry Division to the 12th Regiment of the South Vietnamese 7th Infantry Division. The base, 43 miles southwest of Saigon, has been headquarters of the American division's 1st Brigade and one of its combat battalions. The 7th Viet-nam Division is the major unit assuming responsibility for continuing the fight in the delta region as 11,400 men of the 9th Division pull out under President Nixon's order reducing U.S. combat forces.

Brigade are slated to begin the transfer to Hawaii in about a week. Meanwhile, a Ranger patrol which is staying in Vietnam scored an ambush victory over the Viet Cong. The U.S. Command said six of the enemy were killed when the Rangers ambushed two sampans on a river 22 miles southwest of Saigon. There were no U.S. casualties. The U.S. and South Vietnamese commands reported one Viet Cong killed in an action since the current lull began June 18.

A spokesman said, however, that some Americans were killed in small-unit actions not considered important enough to include in the daily communications. U.S. forces suffered light casualties, but no one was killed in a four-round mortar attack on an American Division engineer camp near Duc Pho, 320 miles northeast of Saigon, the U.S. Command reported.

Government troops reported 12 enemy killed in light encounters near Quang Tri, south of the demilitarized zone.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — President Nixon, after spending the night in this spreading bay area for Pacific travel, heads today for a mid-ocean rendezvous with the Apollo 11 crew — the first men to walk the moon.

The President and Mrs. Nixon landed at International Airport in the early morning hours and drove directly to the St. Francis Hotel. They began their trip, which ultimately will take them around the world a few hours earlier than expected when rain washed out the All Star baseball game, which Nixon intended to attend before leaving Washington Tuesday night.

The Nixons will fly to different destinations this afternoon — the chief executive heading for the Apollo 11 splashdown area and the First Lady going to Honolulu. Nixon will make a seven-hour flight over 3,240 miles of the Pacific to tiny Johnston Island. There he will board a jet-powered Marine helicopter to make a 90-minute flight to the USS Arlington, a communications ship, for an overnight stay.

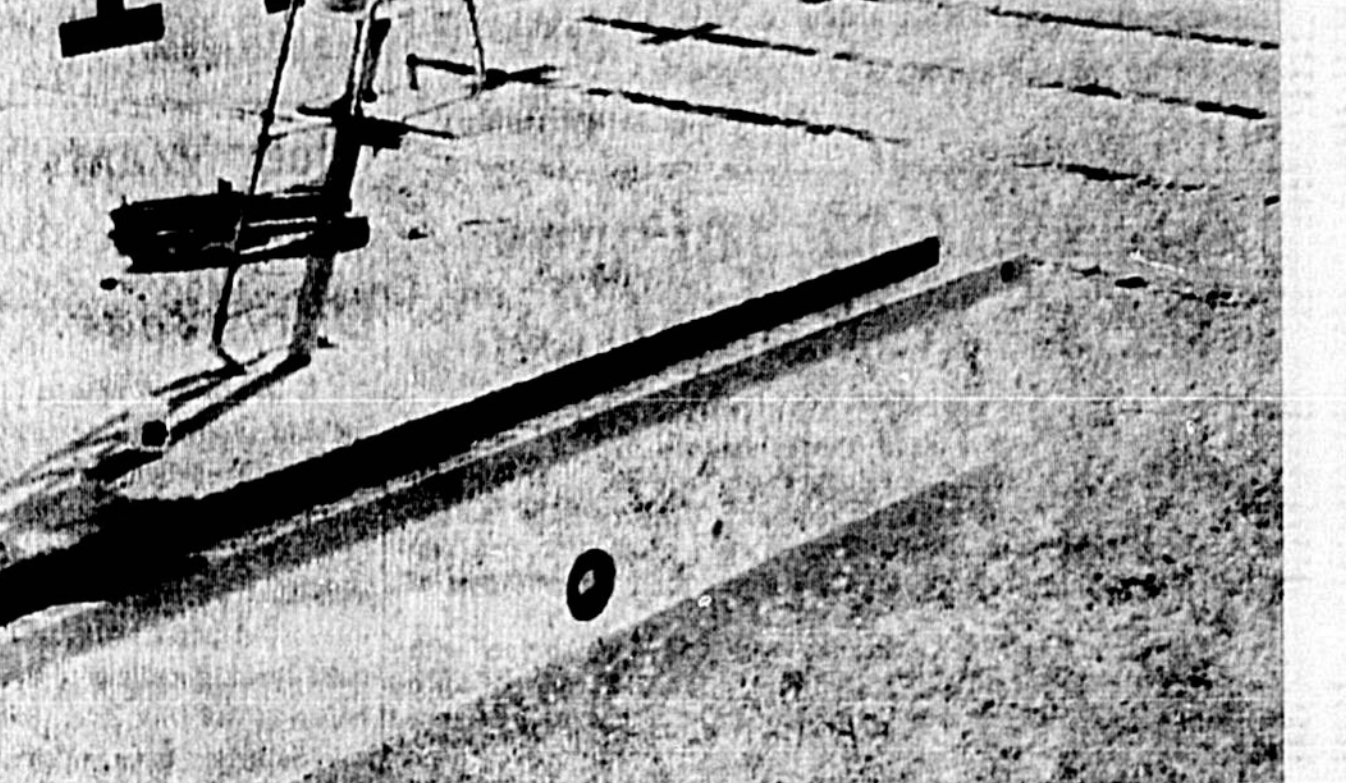
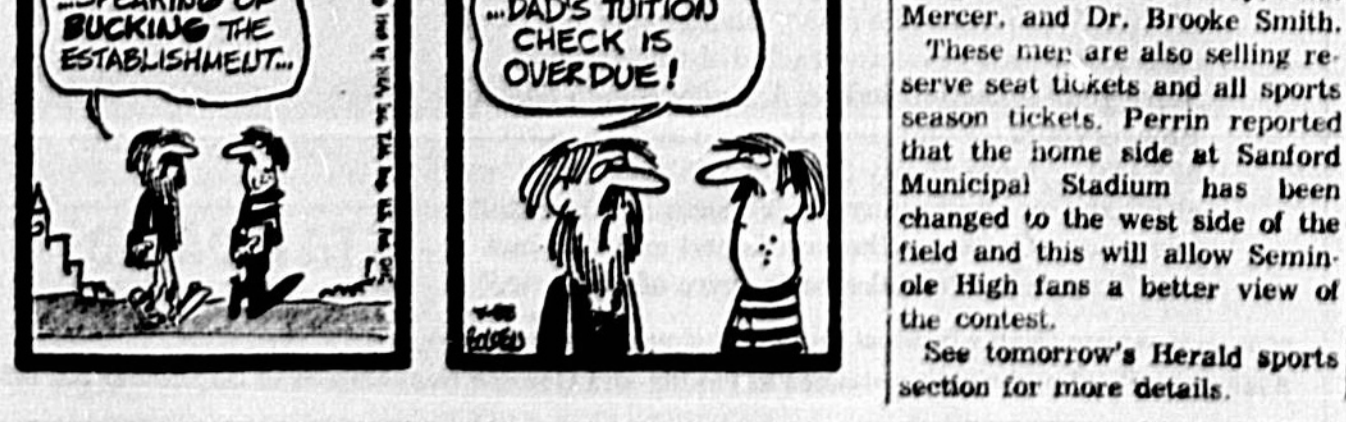

## De Borbon Picked To Replace Spain's Franco

MADRID (AP) — A parliamentary delegation called on Thursday before the Spanish Congress to nominate a new successor to the late Generalissimo Francisco Franco.

### French Girls Acquire Lean And Leggy Look

PARIS — (NEA) — No longer can one think of French girls as "petite," "wiry" and "bump." Of course, the canon of beauty differ with the passing of each generation, but one thing is certain. Frenchwomen have acquired a new type of beauty.

This is a fact which everyone who is in close contact with the younger generation readily admits and, according to a doctor attached to several large schools, "a new race is now born."

Harold Caron, a well-known cinema producer, recently declared: "The difference in grace, poise and charm between this generation of under-20s and their mothers is tremendous." A professor in one of the French public schools says: "As every form comes around I am amazed at the beauty of my pupils. They are a hundred times more attractive than we were at their age."

Medical statistics are there to prove that young girls in 1950 are very different physically from their grandmothers and mothers. The "petite" type has been superseded by slim, long-legged, lithe adolescents. They are now as tall as their grandmothers were.

A specialist in the study of endocrine glands announced recently that he would not be surprised if by 1970 French daughters would be anything from two to three inches taller than their mothers.

Strangely enough, the new generation has not gained extra weight. The average girl weighs around 110 pounds. What she has acquired is longer legs, a smaller bust and slender hips.

Other advantages today can boast of are better teeth and more harmonious features.

Specialists say that diet is responsible for most of these changes, along with a more general practice of sports, country weekend and modern housing. Television, they add, contributes to taller and handsomer adolescents. Any boy or girl who keeps abreast of modern living, who is eager to learn about and discuss current events grows more than adolescents who are deprived of these advantages. Insecurity and worries, on the other hand, prevent tremendous handicaps.

But French mademoiselles have not stopped at changing their silhouette, weight and vital statistics. In the last 15 years they have been exposed to, have looked, listened and read all about beauty. The cinema has been an important beauty school. Brigitte Bardot, (the sex kitten who herself typified the new generation in her film "And God Created Woman") was responsible for the hundreds of little Bardots one saw in the street.

Yet it is interesting to note that it is now some years since any star has had a deep influence on contemporary youth. This is probably due to the fact that television, radio and women's magazines have exerted more and more influence. Girls today will more readily emulate a cover girl than a movie star.

Even teen-agers now know all about cosmetics, beauty treatments, slimming diets.

Will this improvement of the French girl stop one day? Specialists here again believe that there is always room for improvement, but they seem definitely to believe that at the mid-to-distant future women will stop growing. By then they will have attained the ideal height for a woman — 5-feet-6-inches.

## Late Summer, Early Fall Vacations Are Good For Hay Fever Victims

Vacation schedules for many an office worker are influenced by the hay fever season which reaches its peak between Aug. 15 and Sept. 15.

Staff members who suffer from hay fever are likely to request time off during this period, making plans to vacation in a part of the country where the pollen that brings on late summer-early fall hay fever symptoms either do not exist or are present in only small amounts.

The southern tip of Florida, the California coast, and the Pacific Northwest are some of these areas.

It is no longer the victim of a broken romance who is encouraged to take an ocean voyage or trip abroad. Today it is more likely the hay fever sufferer who is given this "prescription" aimed at taking her away from the offending pollen and from a congested which is most common in North America.

Not all hay fever, however, is due to ragweed pollen or another allergen which is most common in North America. It may be that they are sensitive to allergens in the new environment, too.

"The severity of hay fever depends on the amount of pollen in the air and the person's degree of sensitivity," according to the Allergy Foundation of America. Hot, dry, sunny, windy weather raises invisible clouds of pollen or mold.

Among the most common of hay fever's symptoms are: lack of sneezing, redness, swelling and itching of eyes, nose, throat, and mouth; stuff nose with annoying watery discharge; and fatigue of the ears.

To control them, anti-histamine drugs are usually helpful. A nasal spray combining an

# No One Will Forget: Apollo 11's Odyssey

AP — Apollo 11 has virtually insured mankind of immortality and marks a first step "to a territory of another dimension," experts who steered America's man-on-the-moon program predicted today.

"It is the culmination of a dream and the beginning of a very important new theme in the history of mankind," said Dr. Werner von Braun, director of the space agency's Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Ala., which directed development of the Saturn A-man-to-the-moon rocket.

"The other day, when the question was raised with what historical event I would compare this, I gave the answer 'the event of aquatic life crawling on land.'"

"I think mankind will really measure its step as important as that," he added. "I think the ability for man to walk and actually live in other worlds has virtually insured mankind of immortality."

"We can run now or support it where we want to go where other worlds can move our life, or we can modify the environment in such a way that we

find other places comfortable and livable also," the rocketry veteran observed in a news conference as Apollo 11 headed homeward.

Dr. George E. Mueller, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's associate administrator for manned space flight, called the flight of Apollo 11 a "first step in an expansion to a territory of another dimension."

"It seems quite clear the planned man-on-the-moon system is within our capability to create, both manned and unmanned, by the end of the decade," he said.

In order to go to the stars, however, "we need a new source of energy. We know what that is—just takes an invention," he said.

Mueller said scientists believe the fusion of hydrogen to make helium will provide such energy.

"That energy has been described, but not invented," he said.

Project officials said they were impressed with the ease with which astronauts Neil A. Armstrong and Edwin E. Aldrin Jr. landed around on the moon. Apollo 11's touchdown, site was in the east central segment of the moon.

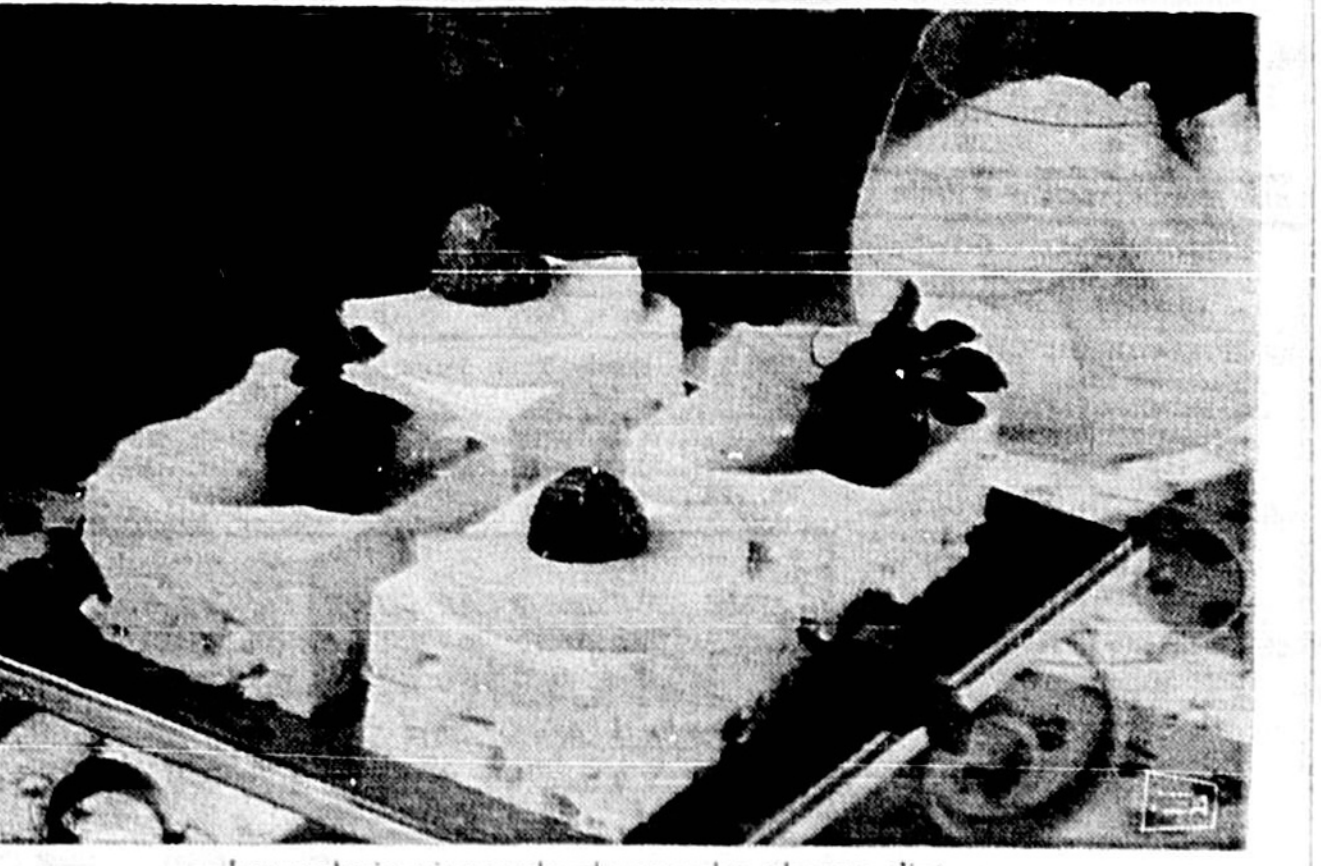
Those who eat desserts suffer the most when trying to lose a pound or two in this weight-conscious era.

Many now can have their cake and fewer calories, too, by using lower-calorie ingredients. A mini-cake cheesecake has tart sweet pineapple creamy cottage cheese flavored with cranberry juice cocktail. A serving is 86 calories without a garnish of fresh strawberries. The latter push the count to 116.

**MINI-CAKE PINEAPPLE CHEESECAKE**

- 1 cup small curd creamed cottage cheese
- 1 envelope unflavored gelatin
- 1 cup low-calorie cranberry juice cocktail
- 1 cup low-fat pineapple yogurt
- 2 tablespoons low-calorie granulated sweetener
- 2 cans (1 1/4 oz. each) low-calorie pineapple slices, drained
- 1/2 cup evaporated milk, well chilled
- Red food coloring
- 12 strawberries

Beat cottage cheese in small bowl at high speed until very creamy. Soften gelatin in 1/2 cup cranberry juice. Bring 3/4 cup cranberry juice to boil; stir in gelatin until dissolved. Beat gelatin, yogurt and sweetener into cheese. Chop pineapple, reserving 1/2 slices for garnish. Beat evaporated milk at high speed until soft peaks form. Add food coloring into cheese mixture until smooth. Pour into 1 1/2 x 1 1/2 x 1 1/2 inch pan. Refrigerate until set, about 4 hours. Cut into 12 servings. Garnish with pineapple half and 2 strawberries. Makes 12 servings.

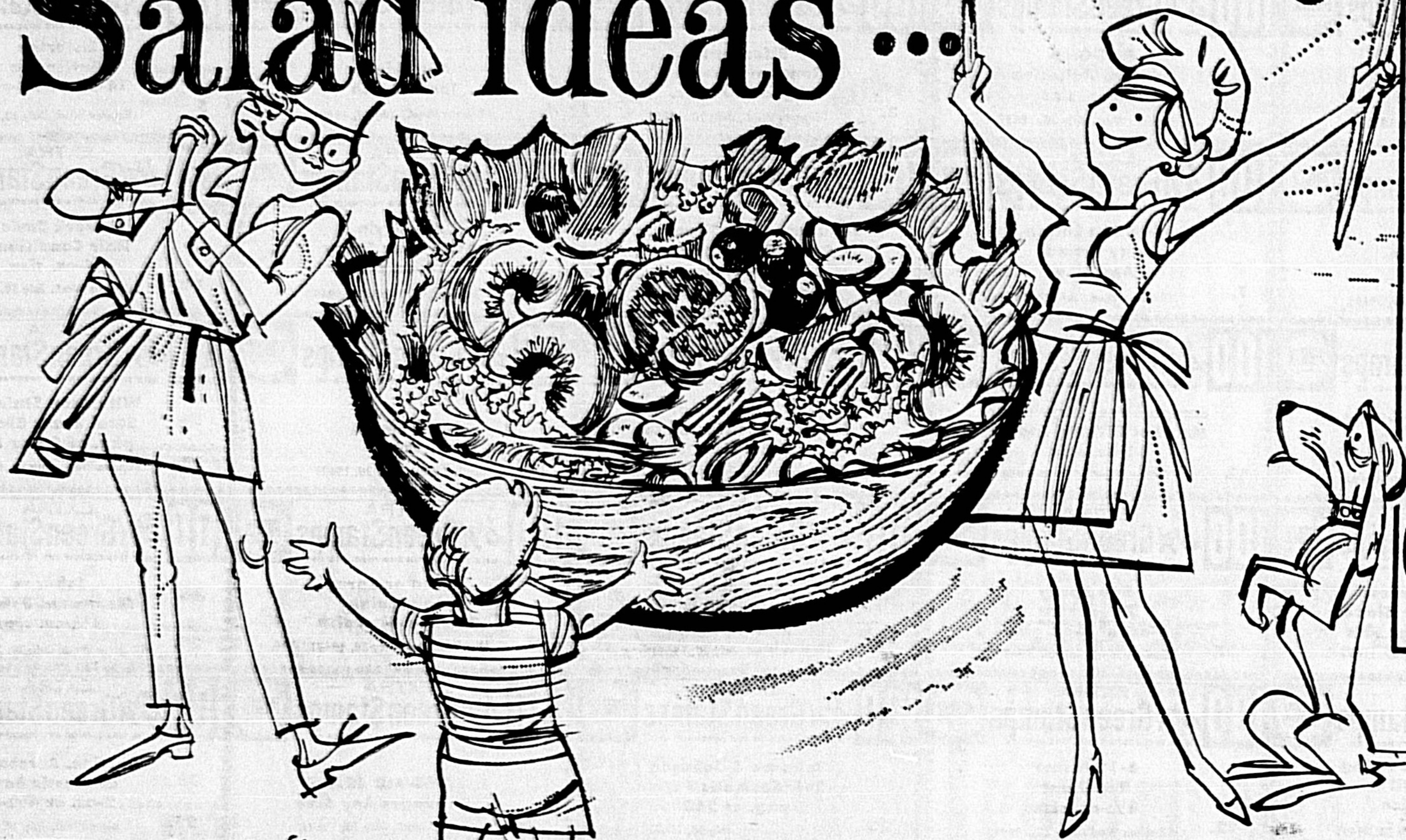

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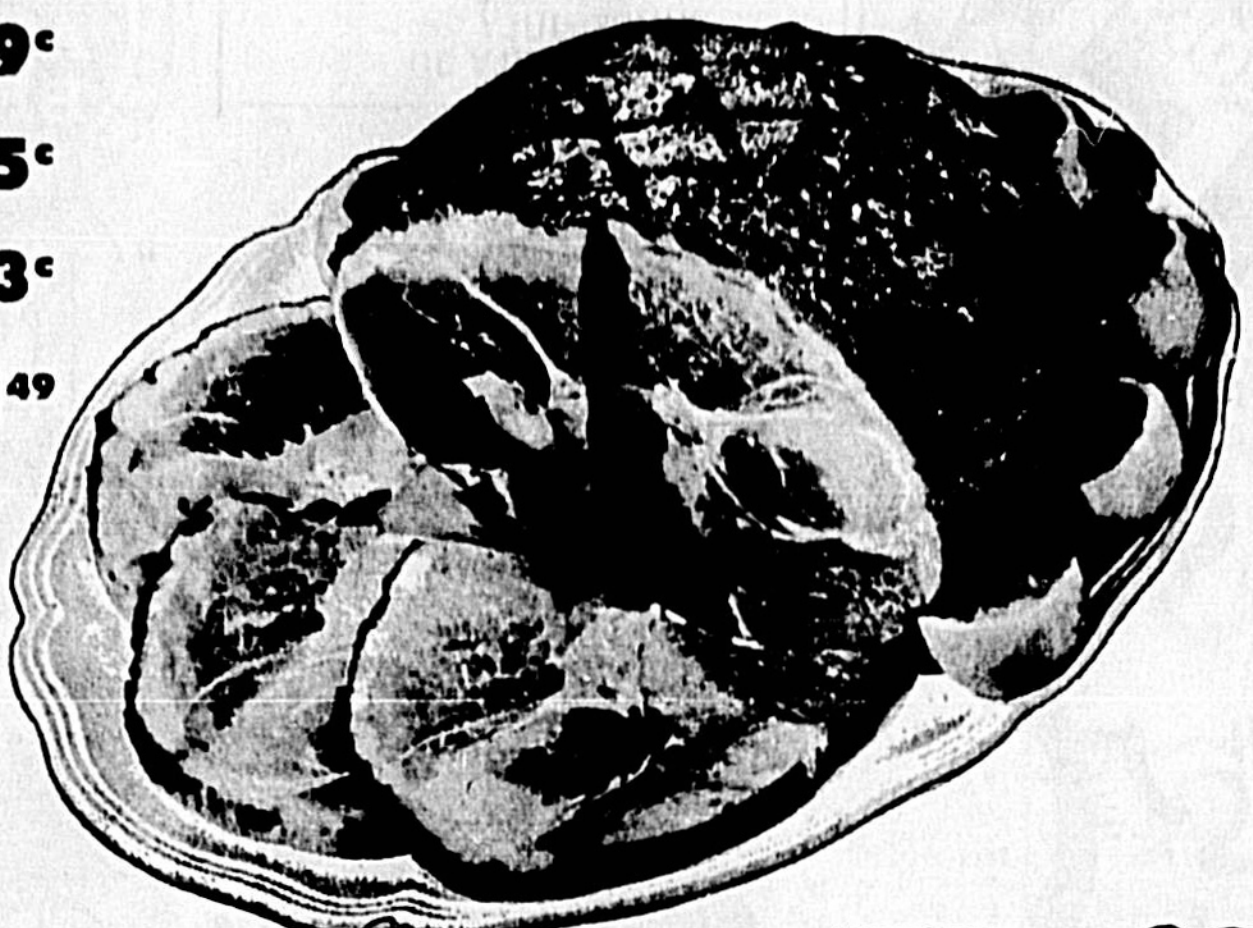

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# What Is A Wrinkle Today?

If you are feeling physically well, have the "good" sense of well-being and are having difficulty co-ordinating your physical movements, it is possible that you may be suffering from a lack of potassium. Particularly if you are taking diuretic medications to lower your water and salt content.

Instead of using pills to overcome the lack, try eating potassium-rich and low-sodium fruits, such as prunes and prune juice, oranges and bananas.

That is the advice of Ronald Okun, M.D., director of Clinical Pharmacology at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center in Los Angeles. Dr. Okun is also a consultant to the California Department of Public Health.

"There are about 16 million people in the United States today suffering from hypertension (high blood pressure). Most of them are young, between ages of 20 to 40. Diuretics are prescribed to reduce abnormal accumulation of body fluids (edema). The medication helps remove fluid (salt and water) from the system, thereby aiding in reducing high blood pressure," he explains.

Sufferers from heart, kidney, liver and often women during the premenstrual tension, are given diuretics, too. The drug companies do over \$100 million a year in these medicines.

"But in removing excess fluids from the body, these medications also deplete the potassium essential to well-being," he states. "The efforts of drug companies to make compensating potassium medications have not been successful. Often they cause ulcers in the small intestines."

In fact, the FDA insists that the labels of such drugs warn of the possible serious complications and urge dietary supplementation instead when practical.

That means using foods instead of drugs to build up necessary potassium. The California Heart Association recommends the following fruits as high in potassium and low in salt—prunes and prune juice, bananas, oranges and grapefruit juice.

Okun, 37, and a graduate of the University of California School of Medicine in San Francisco and a Fellow in Clinical Pharmacology at Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore, says: "I feel there has been a medical oversight of the importance of prunes rebuilding supplies of potassium. Bananas and oranges we have heard about. But now we know that prunes and prune juice are equally important."

Asked about low-sodium diets for the millions who are taking diuretics, he warns them against eating pickled meats, such as ham, corned beef and smoked tongue, and canned vegetables since most use salt as a preservative.

# Make Your Lemon Pie

Summertime lemon pie is made the easy way.

For the crust use chocolate cookie crumbs mixed with a little sugar and melted butter. No baking necessary.

The filling is a fluffy concoction made with fresh lemon juice and gelatin that needs only brief cooking on top of the range.

One word of warning: use really good chocolate cookies for the crust. Excellent chocolate cookies can usually be found at a local bakery that specializes in fine products.

After you've found the best chocolate cookies, roll them into crumbs the easy way. Put the cookies into a plastic bag and close tightly. Then crumb the cookies by crushing them with a rolling pin. If a plastic bag isn't handy, roll the cookies between a couple of sheets of wax paper; or forget the handwork and use the electric blender.

LEMON FLUFF PIE

1 envelope unflavored gelatin

1/4 cup cold water

4 eggs, separated

1 cup sugar

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 cup freshly squeezed lemon juice

2 teaspoons grated lemon rind

1 cup heavy cream whipped

1/4 cup Chocolate Crumb Crust, see below

Sprinkle gelatin over cold water and allow to soften for about 5 minutes.

In top of double boiler beat egg yolks well and then gradually beat in half cup of the sugar and the salt. Stir in gelatin mixture and lemon juice.

Stirring constantly, cook over boiling water—water should not touch double boiler top—until slightly thickened and gelatin is thoroughly dissolved—about eight minutes. Stir in grated lemon rind.

Chill until mixture mounds just slightly when dropped from a spoon.

# Summer Salad Delight

Sliced red-ripe tomatoes make some of summer's best salads. We've been concocting these—as we're sure you have—for years. But only recently did we find a new way to give tomatoes subtle new flavor.

It's the pimiento-stuffed green olives that do the flavoring trick. The tomatoes are layered with the sliced olives and an herb-seasoned dressing. After chilling, the olives impart their flavor to the salad. We urge you to try this combination because we think you'll thoroughly enjoy it.

The tomatoes for this salad should be peeled. You can use the blanching method suggested in the recipe or this one: insert a fork in the stem end of a tomato and rinse in cold water; rotate the tomato over a gas flame on the rangetop until blistered; rinse in cold water and remove skin.

TOMATO OLIVE SALAD

1/2 cup olive oil

1/4 cup wine vinegar

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1 teaspoon crushed dried basil

1/4 teaspoon crushed dried thyme

1 small clove garlic, peeled and crushed

4 large tomatoes

1/2 cup sliced pimiento-stuffed green olives

2 tablespoons diced sweet Spanish type onion

Into a small bowl turn the oil, vinegar, salt, pepper, basil, thyme and garlic. With a fork, beat well.

Dip tomatoes into boiling water until skins loosen—about 30 seconds. Place in cold water and remove skins. Slice fairly thick.

Beat dressing again. In a shallow serving dish arrange tomatoes in layers, spooning some of the dressing and the olives over each layer. Cover and chill for three to six hours. At serving time, sprinkle with onion.

Makes six servings.

NOTE: After long chilling the oil in the dressing may congeal, so it is best to remove the oil and from the refrigerator 10 minutes or so before serving.

**THE FAMILY LAWYER**

"As long as you are doing the driving, let me pay for the gasoline."  
Suppose that you, as the driver, accept this kind of an offer from your passenger. Could such an arrangement knock out your liability insurance in case of an accident? After all, liability policies often do say that the driver must not use his car to carry "passengers for hire."  
Nevertheless, in a number of cases, courts have held that the insurance coverage is still in effect. They reason that a casual payment by a passenger, just to be sociable, does not really mean he is "hiring" the car.  
But suppose the arrangement is somewhat more formal. Take this situation:  
A young man heading for a Florida vacation took along three passengers—all of them strangers. Before they started on the journey, he collected from each passenger a flat fee as payment for transportation.  
Here after an accident on the highway, the driver was informed by his insurance company that his liability policy did not protect him.  
And, after litigation, the court agreed with the insurance company. The judge said that even though the driver was not a regular "carrier," he had indeed been carrying "passengers for hire" on this occasion.  
In the final analysis, your insurance coverage will depend on the exact language of your own particular policy. Many modern policies do have a specific provision allowing you to carry—on a short-the-entire-trip basis—non-passengers as friends, neighbors, fellow workers, or school children.  
It is a wise precaution, before collecting any fee, to get the most informal contributions from passengers, to check your insurance policy first. Otherwise, you may be caught without an insurance umbrella when you need it most.

**VA Makes it Easy**  
Veterans and their families will get quicker service from the Veterans Administration if they follow the suggestions listed below, the VA said today.  
Contact the local VA office, not the VA office in Washington, D. C., as all records are maintained locally.  
Bring a copy of the veteran's discharge form when first applying for a benefit.  
Full name, address and file number should be included in all correspondence.  
When writing about insurance, include the policy number.  
Be prompt in reporting changes of address to the VA.  
Make certain the right beneficiary is named on the insurance. VA can pay insurance only to beneficiaries whose names are on record, so be certain to update to reflect marriages, deaths, divorces, etc.  
Veterans can save time and money, and avoid lapse of insurance by having premiums deducted from monthly VA compensation or pension checks.  
Those not receiving monetary benefits from VA can pay insurance premiums quarterly, semiannually or annually—rather than monthly—to save money on premiums.  
Beneficiaries of veterans, when writing about pension or compensation, should give the full name of the deceased veteran and his file number, as well as their own name.

**Making A Lattice Pie Is Easy**

Some cooks are wary on making a fresh peach pie that has a lattice topping. And they have reason because weaving strips of pastry across a juicy fruit filling takes some practice.  
So for unpracticed pie-makers we have a suggestion. Forget the most elegant lattice pie of nine-inch size which its twelve narrow strips of pastry inter-twined in a woven design. Make a lattice pie this way: use only six wide strips of pastry and you'll find the weaving easy.  
The following recipe for peach pie is an honest one—no flavor but fresh peach flavor comes through. There's something about plain sweetened peaches combined with rich browned pastry that's wonderfully simple and good.  
When it comes to the amount of sugar used, we feel we should give you a small warning. We like the one cup called for because we like a sweet pie, but some of our guests—especially those who are English—and some members of our family prefer a filling that's not so sweet. So if you feel you'd enjoy the least amount of sugar that may be added, decrease the one cup called for to three-quarters cup.  
And another tip: if a fresh peach pie ever turns out less sweet than you like, sprinkle it generously with confectioner's—powdered—sugar before serving.

**FRESH PEACH LATTICE PIE**

1 package — 11-25 — ounces pie crust mix  
1 cup sugar  
1/4 cup flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
2 pounds—about—fresh peaches  
1 tablespoon butter  
Have a kettleful of boiling water ready for use in removing skin from peaches.  
Make up pastry according to package directions and shape into a ball. Remove half a cup of pastry and shape into a small rectangle. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate.  
Roll out remaining pastry 1/8 inches larger than inverted nine-inch pie plate and fit into nine-inch pie plate. If necessary use kitchen scissors to trim any very uneven edges, but leave generous overhang; refrigerate.  
In a large mixing bowl stir together the sugar, flour and salt; reserve.  
Place peaches in a medium pot or large mixing bowl and cover with boiling water. Let stand until skins slip off easily—two minutes. Remove skins and slice into a quart measure to make a generous four cups; reserve.  
Remove small pastry rectangle from refrigerator and roll out to a ten by six inch rectangle keeping sides straight or trimming. With a knife or pastry wheel, cut from six inch wide into six one-inch wide and 18-inch long strips.  
With a straight spoon or a fork, place peaches—minus any juice that has collected—into sugar-flour mixture; toss until dry ingredients are moistened; turn into pastry-lined pie plate.  
Place three of the pastry strips, evenly apart, across peach filling; holding back alternate strips as you do so. Weave remaining three strips, one at a time and evenly apart, over and under the first strips. As you weave, if you like, twist second batch of strips.  
Hold edge of lower crust over ends of strips and pinch together to make a high edge to help keep juices from leaking. Flute if you can manage to do so.  
Dot peaches not covered by pastry strips with butter.  
Bake in a preheated 425-degree oven for 35 to 40 minutes, until pastry is browned—35 to 40 minutes. If filling shows start to leak, place a 12-inch square of foil on rack below pie plate to catch drippings.

TOKYO (AP)—The Japan Emigration Bureau reported that 639 Japanese citizens emigrated to Latin American countries in fiscal 1968.  
The figure, the bureau said, was only one-thirtieth of that of 1967, a peak year for Japanese migration to Latin America.
