Government Heads Into New Spending Period

WASHINGTON (UP)—Key lawmakers of both parties agreed today the federal government is heading into a new period of red-ink spending despite President Eisenhower's "balanced" budget.

Some viewed this prospect with alarm. Others figured in view of the business slump deficit spending isn't as bad as it would have been last year or the year before when the economy was booming.

The President in his annual budget message Monday forecast record-high peacetime spending of \$17,900,000,000.

Spending May Be Higher In addition some Democrats claimed actual spending for some programs will be higher than the President said.

Key Democrats already were talking about launching a drive to hike defense spending over the levels proposed by the President.

Chairman George H. Mahon (D-Tex.) of the House defense appropriations subcommittee said it might be necessary to make "some increases" in funds for ballistic missiles.

# Senate To Make Study Of Dulles' Conduct Of Foreign Policy

WASHINGTON (UP) — Democratic senators assured Republicans today a Senate study of foreign policy will be just that: a study, not an "investigation" of Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and his conduct of foreign policy.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee voted unanimously Tuesday to name a subcommittee to map the study after Republican members did not imply criticism. Democratic members who pushed for the study felt the seriousness of recent world developments — notably Russia's advances on the economic and scientific fronts — made a high-level overall look imperative.

Senate Democratic whip Mike Mansfield (Mont.) declared the review will not be a "vendetta" against Dulles.

Democratic members said they all want and expect the study to be non-partisan.

However the Democratic initiative in setting up the study, coupled with a speech by Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson (Tex.), reflected the party's increasing concern about what many members consider the inadequacy of the Eisenhower-Dulles foreign policy.

Johnson, addressing CBS television affiliates Tuesday, proposed that the United States "demonstrate its initiative before the United Nations by inviting all member nations" to join in this

nation's outer space projects.

"If we are to win space as the outpost of peace," Johnson said, "all men may — and should — share in that endeavor."

Johnson, chairman of the Senate preparedness subcommittee which is investigating U. S. missile programs, said "it would be a mistake to stop" with a reappraisal of military and scientific capabilities.

"Our foreign policies require the same reappraisal," he said.

In the meantime House leaders drove for passage today of the first bill of the week-end session — an emergency authorization of \$540,070,000 for missiles.

It was learned the measure contains money to start construction of the nation's third big intercontinental ballistic missile ICBM base to locate ocean-penninsula rockets pointed at Russia.

House members were expected to pull the high priority legislation through by a near-unanimous vote and send it to the Senate.

Authority to start building the third ICBM base was reported to be included under a section of the bill authorizing construction of ballistic missile facilities costing \$112,400,000. But it was understood only a part of this sum would be applied to the ICBM base.

Defense Secretary Neil H. McElroy, who disclosed Monday funds would be sought this year for the base, said no decision had been made on its location. The other two will be at Cape Air Force Base, Calif., and Warren Air Force Base, Wyo.

Meanwhile Chairman George H. Mahon (D-Tex.) of the House defense appropriations subcommittee declared Republicans were making a "grossly misleading" charge in contending Democrats jettisoned off 300 million dollars for missiles last year.

He said not one penny from the program was made or were scheduled to testify today before the Senate preparedness subcommittee in an open session. Witnesses included President Robert Gross of Lockheed Aircraft Corp., Dan Kimball, vice president of Aero-Jet, and Patrick H. Lynd, vice president of Hughes Aircraft.

George B. Hunter, president of the Glenn L. Martin Co., told the committee Tuesday government "red tape" was holding up his company's development of the Air Force's Titan 3,000-mile ICBM.

WASHINGTON (UP) — President Eisenhower said today he thinks a reasonable amount of red-ink financing would be far preferable to any increase in taxes.

The President, in his first meeting with reporters since last Oct. 30, stuck to his belief that there will be a business upturn this year that will keep the new budget balanced. But he conceded that Congress might vote additional expenditures and thus force federal spending over his projected goal of \$13,000,000,000.

The President appeared to be in an amiable, easy mood.

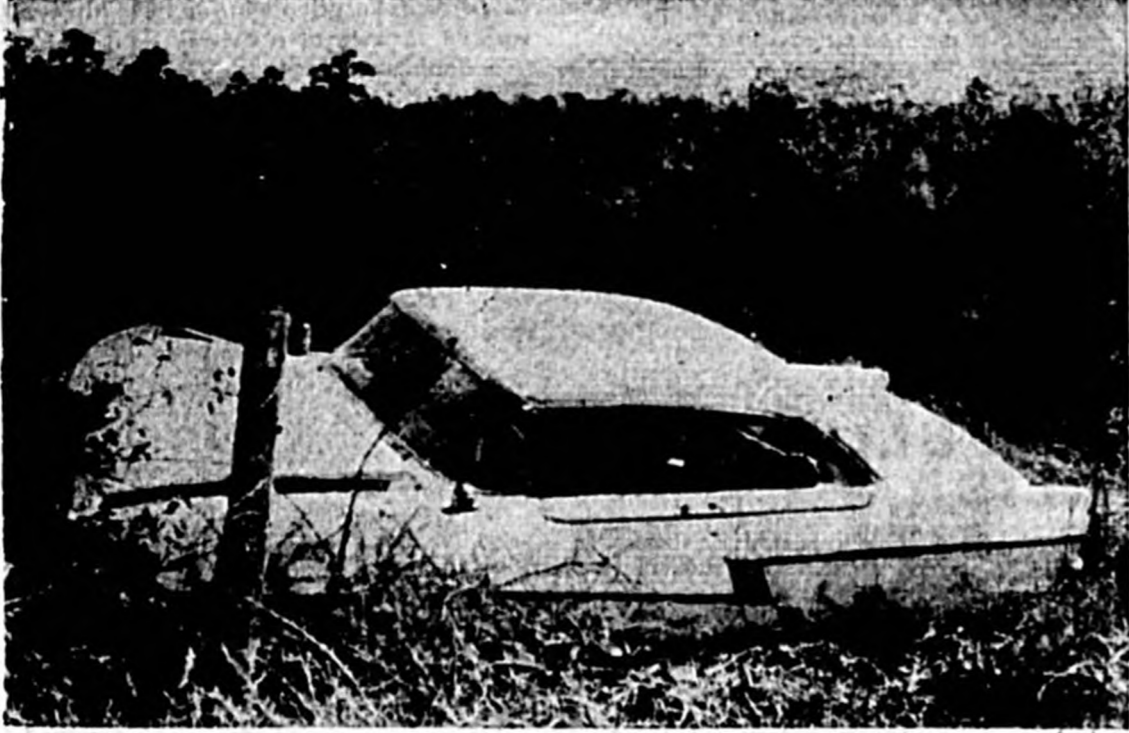

## 1 Injured In Two Wrecks Yesterday During Noon Hour

Two automobile accidents interrupted the noon hour for Florida Highway Patrolmen in Seminole County yesterday.

Damage was estimated at nearly \$1,500 and one person was injured.

Shortly before 12 noon, a 1955 Mercury, driven by Mrs. Fred Behrens of Lake Monroe, plowed into a stump 15 feet off the highway to smash the front end of the car.

PHIP Patrolman Olin Garrett, investigating the accident, said yesterday that he believed Mrs. Behrens "fainted" causing the automobile to go out of control traveling north on the Upsala Rd. about one mile from Monroe Corner.

Mrs. Behrens was taken to Seminole Memorial Hospital suffering from a lacerated forehead and possible internal injuries.

The car barely missed a power pole when it cut down several fence posts and barbed wire as it gouged through deep sand and into a field.

Constable J. Q. "Slim" Galloway said "I'm at a loss as to what happened for there is no evidence of speed or passing another car."

Shortly after 12 o'clock, a 1942 Packard, driven by William H. Yarnell, 60, of Longwood, attempted a left turn off of 17-92 into Wildmere Ave. and into the path of an oncoming car traveling south.

Joel D. Radford, 20, a navy man stationed at Key West, said "There was an automobile passing me on the left and I could not avoid the collision that way so I was forced to veer to the right."

The front end of Radford's 1954 Buick was damaged an estimated \$250.

James L. Sikes estimated damage to the Packard would be a "total loss."

Yarnell was charged with failing to yield the right of way.

## Nationalist Regime In Political Crisis

The Chinese Nationalist regime is undergoing its first big political crisis since it moved to Formosa in 1949.

The crisis threatens to split the Kuomintang, Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's dominant political party.

Premier O. K. Yui has been impeached by the "Control Yuan," one of the five branches of the Nationalist government, for "neglect of duty."

Dispatches from Taipei, capital of the Nationalist island stronghold, say that Yui may be ousted in favor of Vice President Chen Cheng.

The move against Yui is a manifestation of rising discontent with the government and with the presently set up of the Kuomintang.

But Chiang is 70 years old.

**Has Wide Power**

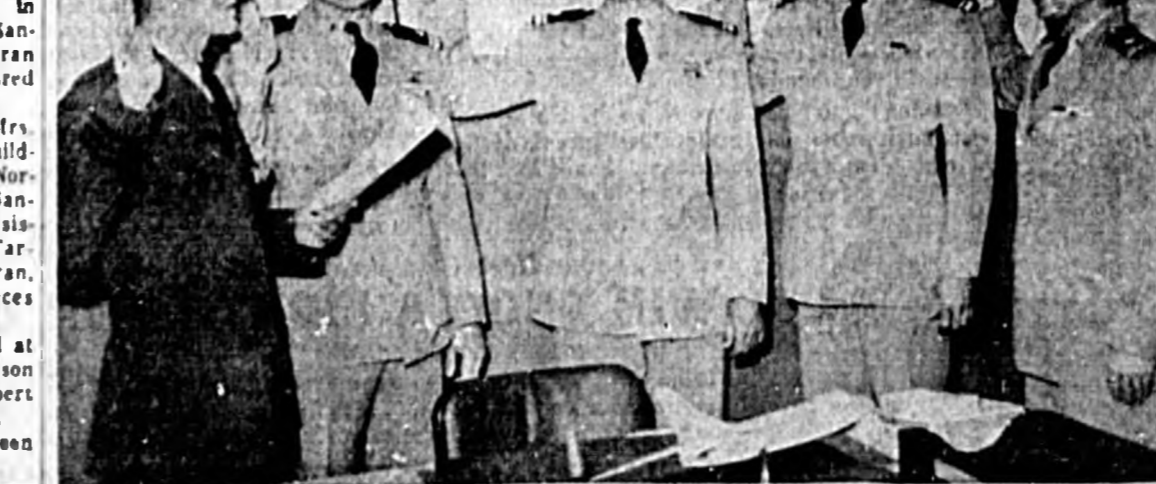
The control Yuan is a sort of government watchdog committee, empowered to investigate about everything and everybody in Formosa.

The significance of the Control Yuan's action in impeaching Yui lies in the fact that it is composed of veteran members of the Kuomintang itself, and thus involves a party split.

Generalissimo Chiang himself is not involved in the crisis. He is the unchallenged leader, as he has been for 30 years though he did not assume the presidency until 1948.

But Chiang is 70 years old.

### Presbyterians Embark On Plan

The Presbyterian Church in the United States embarked this month on a "five-year plan" that many denominations would consider hopelessly idealistic.

It is asking its three million members to double their total giving to church work by 1962.

The Presbyterians have the best possible reason for believing it can be done. They've done it before.

In 1950, the so-called northern Presbyterians were giving about 100 million dollars a year for local, national and foreign enterprises of their church. Last year they gave more than 220 million dollars.

Although the denomination has grown in size during that period, most of the jump in its budget reflects more generous giving.

The present per capita giving figure of \$72.03 a year is one of the highest to be found in major Protestant bodies. It compares, for example, with \$62.70 for Episcopalians, \$43.92 for Methodists, and \$40.17 for Southern Baptists.

**Envoles New Concept**  
Behind the remarkable Presbyterian record is a new concept of church finances pioneered by the Rev. Dr. John Thompson Peters, secretary of stewardship and programs.

Before Peters took charge eight years ago, the denomination followed the custom which still prevails in most Protestant bodies. Each year it would adopt a budget for the coming year, hopefully making the total a little larger than the previous one. This

method was then parcelled out among the 8,600 local Presbyterian churches. When the goal was reached, the drive was described as a success and everyone rested until the next year.

Under Peters' leadership the Presbyterians switched to an "open end" budget. Each year the national church proposes a "basic program" which simply maintains the status quo. At the same time "advance programs" are laid before the denominations on the basis of "Here are some things which we ought to do, and which we will do if we get the money."

**Can See Ahead**  
The advance programs are spelled out in detail.

Thus Presbyterians know that in 1958, if they give more than the bare minimum requirements represented by the basic program, they will be helping to expand missionary drives in Iran, Chile, and 30 other countries; to build new churches in mushrooming U. S. suburbs and support missions in teeming inner-city slums; to expand the facilities and strengthen the faculties of 41 church-related colleges; to train thousands of church school teachers and other lay leaders.

Beyond the "advance program for 1958" is a list of long-range projects in Christian education, home and foreign missions which will be undertaken when the money is available.

**More To Be Done**  
The effect of this approach is to disabuse any church member of the comfortable idea that the denomination's budget represents all that really should be done this year.

The open end budget is a constant reminder that the responsibilities and needs of Christian service are unlimited. The individual member is able to see a direct relationship between the size of his own contribution and the extent to which the church can obey Christ's command to pro-

claim the gospel to every living creature.

...also, according to Dr. Peters, is the only basis for "true Christian stewardship."

"The church is not a club which we pay fixed dues," he said. "Giving is part of our discipleship, an act of worship, an expression of gratitude to God."

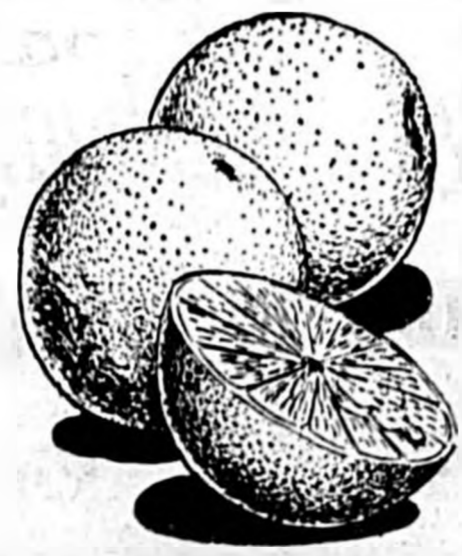

### Florida "Polio Mother Of The Year" Has Four Small Children

OCALA—A Bay County mother of four children, Mrs. Dean Smith Bozeman has been named Florida "Polio Mother of the Year" by State March of Dimes Chairman C. Farris Bryant.

Mrs. Bozeman was stricken with paralytic polio when she was only six years old. Today, though she walks on crutches and has had several operations which necessitated her learning to walk again, she keeps house, cares for her children, and is an active participant in community activities.

Chairman Bryant, in naming Mrs. Bozeman, pointed out that her determination in fighting back against the disease which has crippled so many thousands of Americans makes her an admirable choice for Florida's 1938 Polio Mother.

He praised Mrs. Bozeman's gritty fight for survival and rehabilitation. She was named Bay County Polio Mother of the Year earlier by the Bay County Chapter.

Mrs. Bozeman is active in the Calloway Community Home Demonstration Club, the school Parent-Teachers Association, and the W.S.C.S. of the Calloway Methodist Church. She is Missionary Education Director in the Church.

She came to Bay County at the age of 10 from Macon, Georgia. She had been stricken at six years of age—long before perfection of today's treatment methods—and placed in a plaster cast where she stayed for two years.

After her family had been forced to mortgage home and property to pay hospital bills, Mrs. Bozeman was brought home where her mother continued treatments in the form of exercise.

The family moved to Panama City in 1917, where Mrs. Bozeman's father hoped to start anew after selling his home to pay bills resulting from her crippling illness.

Mrs. Bozeman finally returned to school, wearing double braces, and forced to let her mother carry her to and from school each day.

In 1940 she went to Umatilla, Florida for a physical therapy, and later to Hope Haven Hospital in Jacksonville for operations.

## W. Virginia Still Leading College Basketball Ratings

NEW YORK (UP)—West Virginia, which extended its undefeated string while two of its chief rivals for the national honors were upset, widened its lead atop the United Press college basketball ratings today and San Francisco's conservative-minded Dons took over second place.

Maryland was this week's only newcomer among the top 10 teams, gaining a place in the midst group after beating North Carolina's defending national champion. Kansas, playing without Wilt (The Slim) Chamberlain, suffered its second defeat of the season last week and dropped one notch to third place.

After five weeks of close contention among five teams for the No. 1 spot, West Virginia pulled away to the biggest first-place lead of the season. The Mountaineers, with a 13-0 record, were the top choice of 88 members of the 20-man United Press rating board and received 335 out of a possible 400 points.

**Dons Extend Record**  
San Francisco, which won the national championship in 1956-57 and 1956-58, jumped back into contention by expanding its record to 28-1 last week. In advancing from fourth to second place, the Dons were the No. 1 choice of three coaches. Their point-total of 223 was 106 behind West Virginia, however.

**Kansas 10-2, Kansas State 11-1 and North Carolina (11-2)**, which occupied the No. 3, 4 and 5 rankings in that order, each attracted one first-place ballot. Cincinnati (10-3), Maryland (9-3), Bradley (8-1), Oklahoma State (10-1) and Temple (10-3) rounded out the top 10 group in that order. The coaches based their ratings on games played through Saturday night, Jan. 11.

**Maryland Jumps to 7th**  
Maryland made the biggest jump among the top 10 teams, moving up from 12th to seventh place. Oregon State (10-1) was left last week and dropped out of the select group, from 10th to 11th place.

With points distributed on a 10-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1-0 basis for votes from first to 10th place, here is how the teams lined up behind San Francisco: Kansas 221, Kansas State 207, North Carolina edged Cincinnati for fifth place, 166 points to 165; Maryland had 143, Bradley 101, Oklahoma State 91 and Temple 83.

Following Oregon State in the second 10 group came Michigan State, Kentucky, Utah and Mississippi State, in that order. Mississippi State dropped four places from 11th after losing its first game of the season last week. Notre Dame and Tennessee were tied for 16th place, with Dayton 18th, and Minnesota, Illinois and Seattle tied for 18th.

**NEW YORK**—There's going to be a lot of action around the goal line after touchdowns in college football from now on.

Final preparations to accommodate an estimated crowd of 10,000 people were begun today by members of the Sanford Boat and Ski Club as the date of the Second Annual Sanford Outboard Regatta, set for Sunday afternoon, drew near.

Sanford Boat and Ski Club Commodore, Dr. A. W. Woodall, said today that the club was looking into the feasibility of seating arrangements for some of the spectators.

It's the first new innovation in scoring in 50 years, and the rules committee is to be commended for the effort to inject new interest into the college game. This move gives the intercollegiate band an entirely different scoring setup from the professionals. And, we wonder if the "monied men" will adopt it.

Some of the coaches do not like the new idea. They say it will eliminate kicking almost entirely. It will most certainly add a lot of excitement for both the players and the spectators.

We'll also see more college players in action next fall. The substitution rule has been amended. Now not only the starting players, but also the substitutes may return to the game once in each quarter. That gives the coaches a greater opportunity for using their second stringers. And they can also develop some specialists for spot plays.

Small schools, that do not have big squads will also benefit because they will be able to make more use of their substitutes.

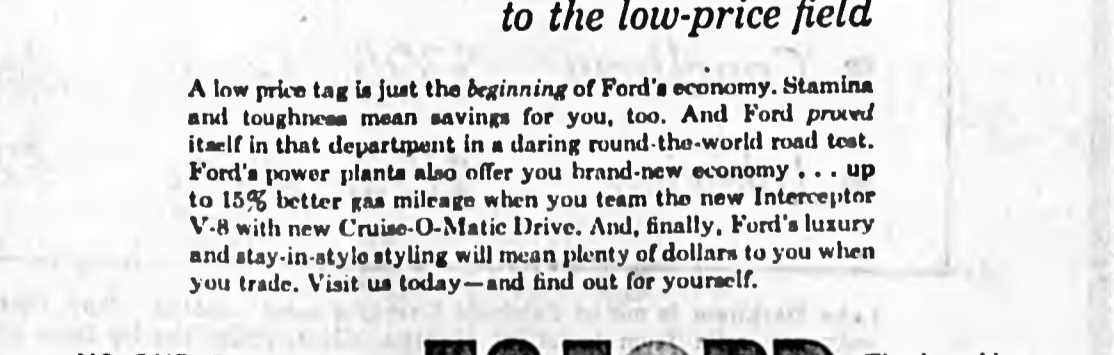
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### Cotton Scarcity May Be Biggest Problem In '58

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UP)—The president of the National Cotton Council says cotton scarcity, rather than surplus, may be the industry's biggest problem this year.

George Chance, Bryan, Tex., president of the council, said in his message to the delegates the industry "faces the weird paradox of having a carry-over large enough to force sharp acreage controls under present law, but a carry-over which still leaves the alarming prospect of not being able to supply enough of the quality of cotton our customers want."

On the bright side, he cited total offtake of U. S. cotton last sea-

son at being over 16 million bales, the highest in 30 years; a drop of more than three million bales from the record high carry-over of 1955-56, with the prospect of another big drop; substantial progress in moving the council's basic, long-range programs of research and promotion toward more adequate levels; and widespread recognition of the urgent need for major adjustments in government policies affecting acreage, price and supply of cotton.

He said on the discouraging side, domestic consumption last year was down over one-half million bales; some of cotton's export gains, especially those by foreign customers increasing their cotton stocks, are non-recurring; and the question of how long the industry can depend on a government export program to keep cotton's price competitive overseas.

### January Designated March Of Dimes Month

Governor LeRoy Collins cited the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis for 20 years of service to Florida and the nation as he signed the proclamation denoting January as March of Dimes Month. Doyle Hanna, six-year-old Tallahassee polio victim, received the proclamation in the Governor's office.

Governor Collins pointed out that there are more than 1000 polio patients in Florida that need rehabilitation and medical aid, indicating the strength of the appeal, "Survival is Not Enough", being made by the National Foundation.

The Foundation, through its chapters, aided 1371 patients in Florida during 1956 with financial assistance. Old cases accounted for 1,070 cases receiving grants of \$321,368.48.

The text of the Governor's Proclamation is:

WHEREAS, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has reached its twentieth anniversary of service to the nation and this state, and

WHEREAS, the National Foundation has aided 323,000 polio patients during these 20 years and has pledged that mere survival is not enough for the many thousands of cruelly handicapped polio victims alive today who must still be restored to a useful and productive life, and

WHEREAS, the State of Florida has more than 1,000 polio stricken citizens in need of rehabilitation and medical aid, and

WHEREAS, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis will continue to work for the final, total rehabilitation of every polio victim in this state and throughout the nation, and

WHEREAS, the twentieth anniversary of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, will provide the means by which these patients may avail themselves of the newest medical treatment and rehabilitation techniques, and

WHEREAS, during the past two decades the National Foundation has sponsored the scientific research which produced the Salk vaccine and has financed the training of vitally needed medical workers, and

WHEREAS, the continuation of these three programs is vitally necessary to the health and well being of the entire nation, and

WHEREAS, the twentieth anniversary of the National Foundation is a time for considering past accomplishments only in terms of their significance to the immediate and future needs of mankind.

NOW, THEREFORE, I LeRoy Collins, by virtue of the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Florida, do hereby proclaim January, 1958 as

MARCH OF DIMES MONTH in Florida, and urge all citizens to join in contributing, thus helping to launch a new era of humanitarian achievement.

### Income Tax Fax

The Florida Accountants Association — an affiliate of National Society of Public Accountants.

Your federal income tax return is due not later than Tuesday, April 15, 1958. However, just because we have an extra month doesn't mean that we should take all that extra time if we don't need it.

If you have a refund due you, the sooner you get the return in, the sooner you will get the refund. If you don't have a refund due, the sooner you get your return made up, the sooner you will know for sure how much you owe and can make definite plans for paying it.

If you need help in filing, you will find that the offices of the Internal Revenue Service are not as busy in the early part of the tax filing period and they are able to give you better service. If you have a problem and call on the accountant of your choice for professional assistance, you will find that he is far better able to help you in the early part of the tax filing period than in the latter part when he is very rushed. Also, if you have a serious problem, it may take several days or weeks to properly study the matter, and also you may have to write or otherwise collect supporting evidence to properly determine the facts and figures to be used in filing your return.

Do you have a big tax bill to pay this year, in addition to what your employer has already withheld from your 1957 paycheck? If you did, then consider making a written agreement with your

employer to have a greater amount withheld from your 1958 paychecks so that you will not have a big bill to pay in 1959.

Withholding, at the regular rates, only covers the tax on your income from salary or wages and is inadequate if you have a large salary or earnings from sources not subject to withholding.

The law provides that you can agree with your employer to have him take more than the regular rate of withholding out of your pay check so that you will have your taxes fully paid at the end of the year.

Your employer must be willing and you and your employer must make an agreement, in writing, in such form as your employer may require, to have your employer take a stated extra amount of withholding from your wages. Your employer handles this just exactly the same way as other withholding and you also handle your reporting of this extra withholding on your tax return the same as any other withholding. This will let you pay your 1958 income tax in 1958, as you receive your income, and not all in a lump sum in 1959.

If this applies to you, then make such an arrangement with your employer now, so that you can spread the payment over as long a period as possible.

### Tourist Season In Full Swing

TALLAHASSEE (UP) — Seasonal job openings are mushrooming as the tourist season gets into full swing, according to a report by the Industrial Commission.

The reports predicted a shortage of waiters and waitresses during January and February in many parts of the state. The construction industry, however, has sufficient help.

In Cocon, the missile center, job openings were plentiful for electronic, electrical and mechanical engineers, electronic technicians, electrical draftsmen, heavy equipment diesel mechanics and technical illustrators and writers. Non-technical jobs were reported very scarce at Cocon.

The picture in Miami shows a shortage of every type of engineer except industrial. There was a strong demand for waiters, waitresses and upholsterers.

In Lakeland, the citrus center, a balance was reported between supply and demand in the labor market.

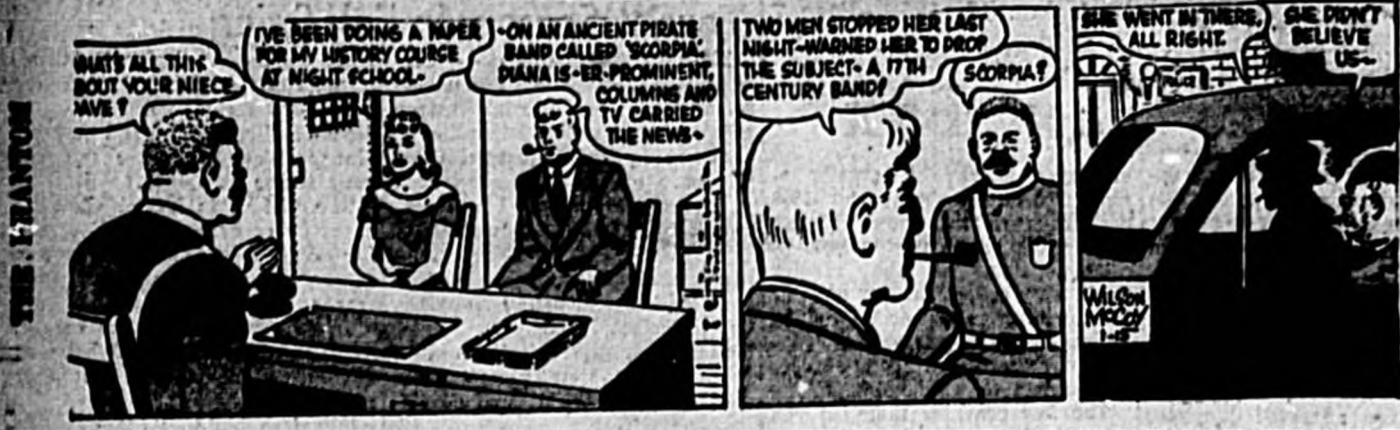

## Nixon Says U.S. Militarily Stronger Than Aggressors

**PHILADELPHIA** - Vice President Richard M. Nixon said today that the United States is "militarily stronger today than any potential aggressor."

Nixon branded as "unmitigated nonsense" any pessimistic talk to the contrary.

The Vice President made these statements in a speech prepared for delivery before the 35th annual meeting of the American Football Coaches Assn.

The luncheon, sponsored jointly by the football coaches and the Scripps - Howard News-papers, also featured the coach of the year award to Wayne Woodrow (Woody) Hayes of Ohio State.

He directed his comment at what he called "a lot of pessimism" in the U.S. to the effect that the United States is weaker than the Soviet Union, that our strategic air force is obsolete because of the successful Soviet satellite launchings, that our economy is inevitably headed for depression, and that our scientists are inferior.

"Such statements," he said, "can only be described as unmitigated nonsense."

The Vice President commented that football coaches "perhaps better than any other group of people" find it from their experience that "superior potential strength does not always insure victory."

"If we become snug, complacent and overconfident," he called behind the Soviet Union," we could fail.

"I can assure the American people that the leadership of President Eisenhower and we are not going to let that happen."

# Ike Confident He's Able To Serve Remaining Years In White House

 WASHINGTON (UP)—President Eisenhower has come through the winter of his early winter chores confident he is up to the burdens and the seasons of his three remaining years in the White House. He would like, however, to get away from the bleak, damp chill

of Washington for a few days of sun and golf. He was expected to do this at the first opportunity and not later than some time early next month.

The Chief Executive's three top priority messages to Congress have been completed. The State of the Union message and the budget have gone to Congress. His

annual economic message is finished and will go to the House and Senate Monday.

A major farm message was to be dispatched to Capitol Hill today.

State Dinner Planned  
 Thus the most time-consuming tasks ahead of the President for the immediate future involve the

state dinners of the 1959 White House social season which begin tonight with the vice president and cabinet as honor guests and will continue through Feb. 11.

Eisenhower was on close-hand display before an audience of 370 reporters Wednesday at his first news conference since last Oct. 30 and the first since his

Nov. 25 mild stroke.

In this meeting he made it plain he has given no thought to resigning because of his past medical record and intends to continue the conduct of the presidency until his term expires Jan. 20, 1961.

"I feel very well indeed," he told the reporters, "but . . . no one can tell what the physical fu-

ture is.

"I am optimistic enough to say this—that as long as I am able, I am going to carry on just exactly as I have in the past, and with no thought of it. From there on, it is in the lap of the gods and that's that."

With reporters peering closely at every move of his hands, every

slightest change of facial expression and listening as his words seeped to every tone and inflection of his voice, the President brushed aside suggestions from some quarters that he resign because of his health.

He said he had not considered resignation in connection with his November illness because the doc-

tors told him he had suffered no damage "to whatever intellectual facilities I have."

"Any time that I believe or any group of doctors—eminent doctors—would say that I am not really up to doing my job, then I would personally, feeling as I do, resign."

# President Proposes 14-Point Farm Program

**Covington Retires From 31 Years Of Postal Service**

December 27th ended 31 years of postal service for long-time Sanford resident, E. A. Covington. Since coming here in 1946 Mr. Covington has made many friends and rates his patrons here as tops in any mail carriers book. Looking spry and healthy at the age of 59 he is looking forward to settling down and enjoying a long and happy life here in the community of Sanford.

Covington first started his government service at the young age of 19 when he joined the army during the first world war. He served at various points under the command of field general John J. Pershing and at the end of the war he entered Clemson College. Just a few miles from his home. In 1921 he was graduated with honors and he moved to DeLand, Florida where he went to work for a citrus grower.

With times uncertain and shaky, Covington decided to apply for an appointment to the Post Office Department. On December 13, 1926 he received his appointment from President Calvin Coolidge and remained a city carrier there until 1940.

With the failing health of his aging mother, who was a resident of South Carolina, Covington transferred to the post office at (Continued on page 2)

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Eisenhower recommended to Congress today a farm program designed to take the government increasingly out of agriculture and put the farmer more on his own. His proposal called for lower price supports on major crops and dairy products, and for increased

authority to set acreage allotments for cotton, wheat, rice, peanuts and tobacco.

It also asked for elimination of acreage allotments for corn, the Midwest big cash crop.

The President told Congress in a special message that the present farm program is "unrealistic" and outmoded.

The president's 14-point program, if adopted, would reduce the government's role in agriculture, he said, recommended by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson, and give farmers more freedom to produce.

Scant Meaning

The President said few of the dollars spent on agricultural programs have been of appreciable help to the small farmer.

"Price supports have meant meaning to a farmer with little to sell," he said.

"Basic agricultural legislation now on the books was originally devised as an emergency effort to cope with a depression, then changed to help fight a war, and subsequently revised again in an effort to meet the needs of peace," Eisenhower said. "It has not been adequately notified to deal with the effects of the technological revolution in agriculture."

"This must be done now," Eisenhower urged Congress to widen the price support range on the basic crops of corn, cotton, wheat, rice, peanuts, and tobacco, and dairy products from 75 to 90 percent of parity to 80 to 90 percent of parity.

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## Kiwians Learn Of Post Office Dept. Problems

Members of the Sanford Kiwanis Club yesterday learned of the many problems confronting the Post Office Department and the movement of mail.

Joel Field, local postmaster, assisted by Dick McLaulin, Harold Appleby and Clyde Piery presented the problems by interview, question, and moving picture.

Field explained that the National Association of Postmasters footed the bill in producing the film "Men, Mail and Machines."

Dick McLaulin explained, as he was being interviewed by Joel Field, that the post office department lost \$62 million last year and would lose an estimated \$703 million this year.

"Postage rates were last increased in 1932," he said. The President has asked six times in the last five years for a postage rate increase which can be done only by Congress, McLaulin pointed out.

On a question from Field, McLaulin explained that the Post Office Department hasn't broken even since the end of World War II.

As for the cost per person, Kiwanians learned, the increase would come to only 32¢ per year for each citizen. McLaulin said "Citizens are now paying 38¢ a year in taxes to support the post office department."

Postmaster General Arthur Sumnerfield, speaking in the film presentation said that the United States boasts of 1/16th of the world's population and produces 2/3 of the world's mail. "There were more than 60 billion pieces of mail last year," he said.

"We cannot better than a half million stamps this Christmas season," McLaulin stated, "but we are using a stamp cancelling machine that was in the local post office in 1924 when I went to work there."

## 5 Cars Involved In Wreck On Osteen Bridge

A five-car smash up at the Osteen Bridge, east of Sanford on State Road 415, interrupted the travels of a honeymooning couple and stopped three others temporarily, shortly after 8 o'clock last night.

Janet Cook Forbes, 39-year-old DeLand insurance agent and music teacher, traveling west at an apparent high rate of speed, failed to keep her car on the right hand side of the bridge road and smashed into four automobiles, one after the other, all traveling east.

Each car was sideswiped and could continue operating with the exception of the Negro woman's own car which went out of control and off the highway to crash into a fence.

The first car hit was that of David Robert Heilbrunn, 26, a bank cashier of New York City. He and his wife are on their honeymoon. His Ford automobile was damaged an estimated \$250.

The second car sideswiped was a 1956 Hillman owned and driven by John Jawor of Daytona Beach. Damage to this car was estimated at \$300.

Third car struck was a Plymouth sedan driven by John Lee Morgan of Castle Brewer Court, Sanford. Damage to his car was estimated at \$100.

The fourth car involved in the smashup was a Pontiac driven by John B. Brown, a Longwood painter. Damage to this car was estimated at \$800.

Florida Highway Patrolman Olin Garrett, investigating the accident, said charges of reckless driving would be placed against Janet Forbes. Damage to her car was estimated at \$600.

Patrolman Garrett was assisted in the investigation by Deputy Sheriff A. E. Evans of the Seminole County Sheriff's office.

The automobile, Deputy Sheriff Evans said, hit the tank of the truck first and then the rear wheel.

Charges will be filed, said Evans.

Father Alois Ruffing, 39, told German police the incident occurred Dec. 21 while he was talking with a group of German teenagers in front of a bar across the street from his church.

As a result of the incident Ramstein Air Base commander Col. H. C. Hartwig put five bars off limits to U. S. servicemen in Ramstein and nearby Landstuhl and asked airmen and their dependents to stay away from Ramstein until anti-American feeling died down.

Father Ruffing told a reporter the attack may have occurred because he reported to Air Base authorities last November when he found an American car parked near his church early one morning with "two couples enjoying themselves in the car."

### Eastern Bankers Cautious On '58 Business Prospects

CHICAGO (UP)—Eastern bankers appeared to take a more cautious viewpoint of business prospects for 1958 than those in the West, according to a survey released Wednesday night.

The survey, conducted by the credit policy commission of the American Bankers Assn., showed that most bankers agreed the present business trend is downward but should improve.

The study showed that bankers were keeping a watchful eye on inventories, while currently range from moderately high to adequate.

A breakdown of the survey by Federal Reserve district showed: Richmond: Business and credit outlook good except in agriculture and coal mining, decline expected in industrial construction but upturn in public construction.

Atlanta: Inventory situation at all levels may be higher despite decline in Birmingham iron and steel industries.
