



First of all, the missile will entirely change the vital time factor. U. S. News points out that today, in the bomber age, It is 10 hours from Soviet bases to American cities. Elaborate warning systems exist, and there would be time to deal with attack. Our strategie air force, with bases around the world, is ready for massive retaliation. But when and if missiles are perfected and produced in quantity the time of attack will be reduced to 35 minutes at the outside.

Under that set of circumstances, will massive retaliation still be possible and still be a deterrent to the aggressor? U. S. News carries an interview with General Norstad, commander of NATO, in which he says: "The retaliatory capability of our Western Forces could not be destroyed by simultaneous attack either now or in the future." And, "the lesson for NATO in the Sputnik era is that we must maintain our retaliatory force."

Another expert the magazine interviewed -General Gallois of the French Air Force -feels that "the threat of massive retaliation will be a more effective defense policy in the missile age than it is today." His reason is that missile launching sites can be conatructed by the thousands, and that each would be much more difficult to destroy than a larger air base with its planes. He adds: "If adequate precautions are taken, the danger of a generalized war in the future will decrease rather than increase."
