Residents protest nude dance clubs in their neighborhoods

SANFORD - Nude dancing had residents steamed Tuesday night at a meeting with county officials. A group of nearly 20 local residents met to express their displeasure with the county's plan to consider rezoning the Midway Commerce Park and the area east of the Orlando-Sanford Airport to M-2 (Impact-Industrial), a new designation created specifically for adult entertainment facilities.

Judge upholds ruling to keep nude dance club open

The score is now, 2-0, in favor of Sassy Merlot's over Seminole County in their adult entertainment squabble as to whether bare-she-is or bare-she isn't. On Tuesday, Circuit Judge Alan A. Dickey upheld his earlier ruling that the county could not stop the nude dancing at Sassy Merlot's, one of two clubs to open recently without an adult entertainment license.

during a temporary ban designed to allow the county time to tighten its vague, out-dated ordinances. Wood, considered the most conservative judge in the territory ruled the county had a right to do so. Dickey, perhaps the most liberal of judges, ruled otherwise as he had on June 4. VIP Gold closed soon after Woods' ruling. Dickey maintains that nothing in the county's ordinance can be construed to regulate or control constitutionally protected expression of speech - as nude dancing is deemed by no less authority than the U.S. Supreme Court.



Citizens' concerns voiced to county heads



Waco will leave you breathless

Screen Tests

Tonight, at 9:00 p.m., at the Annie Russell Theater at Rollins College, one of the most important movies of the year will make its Central Florida premiere at the sixth annual Florida Film Festival. This is the first and only time during the nine day festival that audiences can see this powerful and controversial documentary.

Aside from *Ulee's Gold*, *Waco: The Rules of Engagement* is one of the best films at the festival and, definitely, one of the best films of the year. Thought provoking would be an understatement in describing this documentary on the 51 day standoff between government agents and the Branch Davidians led by David Koresh. The movie really centers around the questionable tactics used by the agents during the standoff and the final showdown that resulted in over 80 men, women and children dying from the fire that burned down the Waco, Texas compound.

The most interesting and disturbing thing is how government agents are depicted as being the ones who started the fire -- given the amount of flammable chemicals they were pouring into the compound to try and root out the Davidians. It is not concrete evidence, however, but pretty close. The film relies heavily on an infra-red mechanism used during the Gulf War to show certain revealing points about the fatal hours of the debacle.

Husband and wife producing team Dan and Amy Sommer Gifford bring *Waco* to the screen. These meticulous journalists try not to paint any of the Davidians, including Koresh himself, as martyrs. Rather the film explores the many assertions of FBI and Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms negligence -- possibly criminal -- during the ordeal. The documentarians use actual footage from *Waco*, interviews with survivors and others, home video from within the compound, excerpts from the House Congressional hearings about the disaster, the aforementioned infra-red findings and opinions from academic experts and other-wise.

They ask searing questions like: Did FBI agents fire upon the compound when they repeatedly denied ever doing so before or during the fire? Why would agents use the crippling -- and in large doses, lethal -- gas on helpless children stored away in the compound? Did the FBI realize that the amount of chemicals they were using could incinerate the compound in a matter of minutes? So many questions could be asked, but, from the evidence presented, the audience is asked to draw its own opinions.

Waco: The Rules of Engagement will leave you absolutely breathless and disturbed. It should be pointed out that *Waco* is not for the weak stomachs. There are graphic scenes of burnt corpses and gunfire wounds that may render nausea to those without intestinal fortitude. However, the real cause of nausea may not be from the scenes of injury and death, but from the implication that our government could have covered up one of the biggest stigmas of its storied existence.

volunteering as a group spokesman into his pocket.

"More junk," he said.

After breaking out into smaller groups, those discussing growth and management demanded to know why county officials were letting developers circumvent county rules and codes at will. Why, the citizens wanted to know, were they allowing "people pollution" to overtake the county.

County staff members dutifully scribbled down the questions in black and in green marker on large pads while moderator Dick Thomas kept a careful eye on his stopwatch, not allowing discussions to continue a moment beyond the appointed 20 minutes.

Residents struggled to get their questions properly worded to meet the criteria of the staff who would be preparing the information for county commissioners who did not attend the meeting.

"All we want," said Barbara Barber "is a moratorium on building while the county looks at what is happening."

Staffers intent on doing their

job correctly merely asked that she either word her statement as a question or wait until they were asked for solutions.


Residents merely shook their heads.

The meeting on Tuesday evening was one in a series of neighborhood evaluations of the Seminole County Comprehensive Plan.

"We just hope they're listening to us," Jerry Keith said. "I just want them to understand what we're trying to say. We're trying to work with the system."

Other concerns of the residents included keeping a proper buffer between commercial/business properties and residential areas; maintaining compatible development; ensuring that county officials understand fiscal responsibility with regards to population density and tax revenues; the need for more public input regarding rezoning issues; and taking away developer power in code matters.

The next Neighborhoods in Action meeting will take place on Tuesday, Aug. 19 in the Seminole County Commission Chambers at the County Services Building, 1101 E. First St. in Sanford.

Curbing delinquency: A path to the future

TALLAHASSEE. Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) Secretary Calvin Ross recently announced the release of the state's juvenile delinquency prevention plan for the future. "Our goal is to show that an investment now really does pay off in the future," said Ross.

The plan will serve as the primary tool for DJJ to direct and conduct delinquency prevention and early intervention policies, practices and services. The department is focusing on the major components that impact a child's healthy development both in the family and in the community, which if effectively addressed will reduce the rate of delinquency. These major components are:

- **Staying in School:** facilitating successful educational achievement in appropriate learning environments.
- **Keeping Busy:** increasing opportunities for accessible structure and supervised time outside the formal learning environment.
- **Living Violence-Free:** reducing violence in the community, at school and at home.
- **Getting a Job:** increasing the opportunities for successful employment through development of youth employability skills.

The department will target

prevention and early intervention funding towards programs that address the issues related to these four areas.

"I know that the time has come to slow the constant development of deep end costly incarceration and speed up the investment in youth and families. This must occur at the beginning when youth have a chance for hope, success and a future," Ross added. "We cannot tackle this problem alone. The success of this plan will be based on the joint efforts of our juvenile justice partners: boards, councils, local governments, other agencies, and community neighborhood and business leaders. Together we can make a difference."

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
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Have fun in the sun but take precautions

Barbecues, swimming pools and baseball games are all synonymous with summer fun. But, the American Red Cross of Central Florida reminds residents that this season can also pose risk for a number of injuries or ailments. The following safety tips can help protect you and your family throughout the hot summer months.

Sunburn
Increased outdoor activity can often result in sunburn. If you do get a sunburn, cool the skin with wet cloths or water. To reduce the chances of sunburn, avoid sun exposure between 10am and 3pm, apply sunscreen with ample coverage and wear a hat or cap with a wide brim.

Heat Stroke
Heat stroke is a life-threatening condition resulting from exposure to high temperatures. Symptoms include disorientation or loss of consciousness, headache, vomiting and a very high body temperature. To treat heat stroke, seek medical attention immediately, move the victim to a

cool location and apply wet cloths.

Bug Bites
Insect bites and stings can be avoided by wearing insect repellent, avoiding perfumes and learning to recognize harmful insects and their nests. If you are stung, remove the stinger by scraping it away with your fingernail, wash the area with soap and water and apply an ice compress. Seek medical attention if allergic reactions develop.

Water Safety
Since water activities are very popular in Central Florida throughout the summer, it is important to be aware of the risks of swimming.

Basic safety guidelines for swimming include taking swimming lessons, swimming with a buddy, swimming in areas that have a lifeguard and leaving the water immediately if lightning or thunder occurs. Also, avoid swimming in unknown areas and never eat, chew gum or drink while swimming. It is also essential to know your limits as a swimmer and respect the limits of others swimmers.

Don't just sit there!

There may be some good in what many citizens consider to be today's *bad news*. Suddenly, people who didn't even know where the Seminole County Services Building was located, are streaming through the doors. The Board of Commissioners played to full houses last Tuesday as it dealt with two hot topics - emergency medical/ambulance services and adult entertainment.

On Tuesday, 20 Sanford residents stopped by to discuss their outrage that nude bars and sexually-oriented businesses may soon be re-located in the neighborhoods. They huddled with Deputy Attorney Lonnie Groot and Planning and Development Director Frances Chandler.

County Commissioner Daryl McLain, who represents District 5, has vowed his support to the citizens who are fighting to maintain the dignity in their communities. "We don't want this type of thing happening here," McLain said.

There's another public hearing on adult-entertainment at 7 p.m. Tuesday, and the BCC Chambers is expected to fill well before the Pledge of Allegiance. The commission is intent to adopt strict, new ordinances to replace the tissue-paper codes that the previous board members let fly.

To be sure, every voice is an important one. Sooner or later, the public will help decide not only what it deems to be morally right but what the country's and county's judicial systems deems legally right.

One day, the members of the U.S. Supreme Court may reach the conclusion that nude dancing isn't all that swift a form of protected speech. Or, if they do, who knows what could go next?

Until then, the people who are concerned have got to stay involved. They've got to attend home owners association meetings, sign petitions and write to their elected officials. Write letters for publication in the *Sanford Herald*. And write to the two circuit judges who have made opposite decisions on whether to allow two nude dancing clubs to operate in the county. Judge Leonard Wood ruled for the county in its attempt to close a club. Judge Alan Dickey twice ruled against the county upholding what he viewed as protected freedom of expression.

What's your opinion? Express it now.



Some unlikely enemies of diversity

Ken McCluskey is one of a handful of black professionals working in the securities industry here in San Diego. Last year, he not only made his firm's "executive club," which is reserved for the scant 10 percent of brokers who meet their production goal, he also made the firm's West Coast sales division "winners circle" and was invited to attend the firm's coveted "national masters" trip.

By all accounts, McCluskey was successful, handling more than 250 clients, generating millions of dollars in business for his brokerage house and earning six-figures in salary and commission. Yet, a little more than a month ago, McCluskey was unceremoniously fired.

His firm jettisoned him over a dispute with a client. And unlike other brokers who've had similar disputes with clients, McCluskey was offered neither arbitration (to try to resolve the matter) or even an opportunity to resign rather than be fired.

This disparity is attributable to one factor, he says. His complexion. "If I had been white," he says, "it would never have happened." McCluskey believes his bosses had a difficult time dealing with a black achiever and were looking for just the right chance to get rid of

him. "I am the only successful African-American any of these guys ever managed," he says.

I mention McCluskey's case because some of my readers think that black conservatives, like yours truly, refuse to see racial bias when it rears itself. Not so, I respond.

However, I am not as quick to draw the race card as some blacks. I do not believe that every time a black person has a problem with a white person -- in the classroom, in the workplace, wherever -- that racism must be

involved. I am willing to give whites the benefit of the doubt until I see prima-facie evidence of bigotry on their part.

Like the Texaco controversy, in which the oil company's executives were recorded making racist statements. Or the Denny's dispute, in which the company was charged with contemptuous treatment of black patrons. In both cases, there was hard evidence of racial bias.

I don't know enough about McCluskey's former employer, one of the nation's leading brokerage houses, to conclude whether he was a victim of racism. But his termination does appear to be part of a pattern here in San Diego, which may be sheer coincidence or may suggest a subtle bias against successful black professionals by local employers.

For instance, Roy Hancock spent six years doing home loans for a major bank. During his best years, he did more than \$20 million worth of loans, which was quite an achievement as he was not assigned to the more affluent areas of town where home prices were highest.

Two years ago, Hancock was fired without warning. When he arrived to work one

Dark Floyd

You've probably heard the news by now about the latest fire sweeping across the Internet: If you slap on your "Wizard of Oz" videotape, mute the soundtrack, and play Pink Floyd's "Dark Side of the Moon," amazing synchronicities will allegedly occur.

According to the New York Daily News, which took time, and from its busy schedule of cleaning up Manhattan to break this story, "Floyd sings, 'The lunatic is on the grass' just as the scarecrow begins his floppy jig near a green lawn. The line 'got to keep the loonies on the path' comes just before Dorothy and the scarecrow start traipsing down the Yellow Brick Road." And so forth. Amazing. Whatever.

This revelation has left me more depressed than exhilarated. For one thing, how was it discovered? Through trial and error? Did some Floydhead suck down doobies as he spun the platter to every movie in his video collection? Does it work with "El Topo"? "Yellow Submarine"? "Alien"?

Did he try playing it to his videotape of "Pink Floyd -- The Wall"? Or the movie of "Tommy"? What about "The Last Waltz"?

After visiting The Synchronicity Archive on the World Wide Web -- check it out if you can! -- I learned that certain Floydheads did find that for "... the last approx. 23 minutes of (2001: A Space Odyssey), (the audio... is provided by Pink Floyd's 'Meddle' album, the last track titled 'Echoes.'" So Pink Floyd fans are definitely out there, trying to find random connections between their CDs and laserdiscs. Good luck to you all!

But what if the reverse is true? Did some "Wizard of Oz" fanatic go through every CD in his collection for the perfect match?

Neither scenario seems likely. So the discovery must have been accidental. This is even more depressing. Some unknown consumer must have been hanging around the house one day, watching "Wizard of Oz" with the sound off, simultaneously listening to "Dark Side of the Moon," paying attention just long enough to conjure some Jungian connection. Does this not speak volumes about this anonymous person's lifestyle? We must find this person and put him humanely to sleep.

The only other alternative is that Pink Floyd intended "Dark Side of the Moon" to accompany "Wizard of Oz" all along. They just kept it a secret until "Dark Side" fell off the Billboard charts. It was a fiendish scheme to keep the album-oriented-rock format alive beyond its allotted time.

Keep in mind that, according to what I've read, "Dark Side" must begin after the MGM lion's third roar, otherwise it doesn't synch with the movie properly.

Again, this insane precision makes me suspicious.

If this was a discovery by a Floyd or "Wizard" cult member, think of the many hours of trial and error that went into it. How would you know that the music shouldn't start at the first lion's roar, or the second, or wait until after Dorothy has sung "Somewhere Over the Rainbow," or when she lands in Oz?

And an even larger question remains: Why would anyone want to do this? Personally, I've seen "Wizard of Oz" and listened to "Dark Side of the Moon" enough for one lifetime. What's next? "Gone With the Wind" and "Sergeant Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band"?

A friend of mine (J. Raoul Brody) sent me an e-mail informing me that he'd tried an experiment himself. He put the soundtrack to "Wizard of Oz" on his old-fashioned

Early score: Gore 2, Gephardt 0

After the first two tests of strength of the 2000 Democratic presidential race, the score is Vice President Al Gore 2, House Minority Leader Dick Gephardt 0. But by this fall, Gephardt could narrow the gap.

Gephardt has suffered two defeats trying to pull House Democrats away from President Clinton's budget deal, but he could win future fights over the budget and trade.

The first contest occurred on May 20, when only 72 of 204 House Democrats present and voting (35 percent) supported Gephardt in opposition to the budget deal that Clinton cut with congressional Republicans.

The second test occurred in two House Democratic Caucus meetings on June 5 and June 10, when a lopsided consensus developed in favor of a Democratic tax proposal that held to the terms of Clinton's budget deal.

No votes were taken, but it was clear that the deal-breaking alternative offered by Rep. Jim McDermott (Wash.) was supported only by 20-odd Democratic liberals.

They were the only ones cheering when Rep. Jesse Jackson Jr. (Ill.) declared during the June 5 meeting, "It's time to declare the Clinton era over and move on."

McDermott's proposal would have directed \$130 billion worth of tax relief over five years mainly to families making less than \$35,000 per year by giving them a \$200 per person credit for Social Security taxes.

During the caucuses, moderate Democrats like Rep. Cal Dooley (Calif.) argued that a tax plan so heavily skewed to the poor would hurt Democrats in middle-class districts, which they need to win in order to recapture control of the House in 1998.

Gephardt, who earlier blasted the budget deal for "a deficit of fairness" and tried to organize opposition to its tax provisions, ended up supporting the tax alternative drawn up by Ways and Means Committee Democrats that closely tracked Clinton's position.

Besides raising doubts about Gephardt's ability to lead his own troops against Clinton and Gore, the Democratic budget decisions suggest that the center of gravity in the Democratic Party has shifted to the center.

If so, that would be a major triumph for Clinton, who has been trying to re-orient the party to a new, less government-heavy direction. Gore is Clinton's partner in the endeavor and will have to run in 2000 on the success or failure of that effort.

Even though Gore is leading Gephardt after two rounds, the 1997 maneuvering is far from over. Other key tests will come over final passage of the budget, most-favored-nation trade status for China, and fast-track authority for trade agreements.

Gephardt and the administration presently

are united in opposition to the House Republican version of the tax bill, but eventually Clinton and Gore will have to decide whether to support or oppose the final version produced by Congress.

As a Republican document, it almost certainly will contain more tax breaks for the wealthy than Clinton now favors, and Gephardt is certain to be against it.

If Clinton supports the final House-Senate conference report as a means of securing a bipartisan budget deal, Gephardt will have another chance to pull away a majority of Democrats and score a victory over Clinton/Gore.

Of course, if the final version is truly distasteful to Clinton, he could use his veto to cajole Republicans into an acceptable compromise.

According to Groot, the ruling states that municipalities may regulate such businesses, but must allow them to operate in an area in which it is feasible for them to survive. Groot said, "I doubt that Thomas Jefferson thought showing off your hiney would be constitutionally protected, but that's how the court has ruled."

Iris Hunt, who spoke on behalf of Indian Mound Village residents, said her community has become a "sacrificial lamb" for the county. She says her neighborhood, which lies just east of the Orlando-Sanford Airport, was chosen as a possible site for the new zoning because county commissioners think they will receive less resistance there due to the low population density of the area. She vowed that she and her neighbors will never give up their fight to keep such establishments out of their neighborhood. The area is currently zoned A-1 (agricultural).

Frances E. Chandler, acting Planning and Development director, explained that planning and zoning had not been instructed by the commission to find the optimal place for adult entertainment, but rather to find areas that met certain specific conditions.

The guidelines specified such factors as

minimum separation distances from schools, churches and bars as well as prohibitions against visibility from major roadways. She stated that the final decision regarding the proposed changes would be made at a public hearing at the County Commission meeting on June 24 at 7 p.m. Chandler stated that the county had not had adequate time to consider all of the possible areas which might be suitable. She said the commission must act before the current moratorium banning new adult entertainment establishments expires on June 30 at 12:01 a.m. Chandler said that if the commission does not act by then, adult businesses would be allowed to open in any industrial area.

Several residents of the area expressed concerns about the negative impact the establishments might have on property values. Some feared they would not be able to resell their homes if the zoning was changed to M-2. Chandler acknowledged that banks are sometimes hesitant to finance housing in industrial zones, but stated that the county will write to lending institutions on behalf of residents who experience these types of problems.

The final decision regarding the rezoning issue will be made at a public hearing at the County Commission Chamber on June 24, at 7 p.m.

morning, he was presented with a two-page, single-spaced termination letter that catalogued in detail every criticism his employer had about him over six years of service.

Interestingly, the letter said nothing about his productivity, the business he was generating for the bank. "They wouldn't attack with concrete criteria," he says, "so they attacked with the subjective."

They caricatured him as some sort of threatening figure, even suggesting he was prone to violence. They labeled him a malcontent who got along with neither his superiors or his colleagues.

Yet, a mere matter of weeks before he was fired, Hancock recalls, he played a friendly round of golf with both his immediate supervisor and one of his co-workers.

Was Hancock the victim of an institutional bias against black professionals? Again, I do not know enough about his former employer to reach an unequivocal conclusion. But he does appear to be part of a pattern in San Diego that, he says, "transcends any particular industry."

What I find most ironic about McCuskey's and Hancock's cases is that both their former employers viewed themselves as committed to "diversity" in the workplace. Their supervisors were not "conservatives," were not adherents to the philosophies of Newt Gingrich or Clarence Thomas. These were white men who viewed themselves as liberal-minded on matters of race. They probably even voted for Bill Clinton.

That's something that Alexis Dixon can relate to. He labored four years for a nonprofit organization, raising hundreds of thousands of dollars in grants, while developing several youth and adult assistance programs.

Dixon decided to resign after receiving a mediocre performance review from his liberal boss. Among the areas in which the black professional was found wanting was "appearance." "I couldn't believe what I was reading," says Dixon, "as I sat there in my Armani suit."

Dixon's former boss is the kind of white liberal who shows up at Martin Luther King Day breakfasts, who proclaims how "colorblind" they are, who likes to accuse white conservatives of being "racists."

For foreign students, service in the armed forces or on an official church mission of the student's home country is considered equivalent to such service in the United States. Because of this by-law, Menchikova's one year

of military service is exempt from her five-year clock and it left her with three, not just two, years of eligibility at UCF.

In her two years at UCF, Menchikova has excelled both on and off the court. As well as being a Dean's List student and a two-year Trans-America Athletic Conference All-Academic honoree, Menchikova is a two-time America Coaches Association All-District Four Team member, the 1997 TAAC Player-of-the-Year along with a two-time First Team All-Conference and six-time TAAC Player-of-the-Week honoree.

The fourth means great barbecue

The Fourth of July is fast becoming my favorite holiday (after Halloween and Thanksgiving). All sorts of great things happen on the Fourth: parades and fireworks, swimming and boating, not to mention great barbecue.

The Fourth of July is one of the few holidays that doesn't require fancy dress: A bathing suit and cut-offs will do just fine, thank you. When it comes to food, the Fourth of July is a casual feast: barbecued chicken, steak and burgers, potato salad and watermelon and strawberries and ice cream. If only EVERY day of summer could be like this.

Here's an all-American menu for a barbecue for eight: What could be more fitting than "Fireworks Chicken," from Michael McLaughlin's new book, "All on the Grill?" I've paired it with some unbelievable baked beans (really worth the extra effort) and a piccalilli corn salad from Sheila Lukins' red-white-and-blue "U.S.A. Cookbook," and a carrot slaw I adapted from an old favorite, "Home Cooking Sampler," by Peggy K. Glass. Finish up with Maida Heatter's Heath Bar Brownies and you've got yourself a feast.

This is a very kid-friendly menu: I tired the chicken on a bunch of children and none of them found it too spicy (but all of them ate it WITHOUT the "mop").

To minimize your work, make the chicken rub and the "mop" a day ahead, along with the brownies (keep 'em refrigerated). Put the baked beans in while you're throwing together the corn salad and the carrot slaw (a snap). Add a green salad, if you feel like it, and some homemade vanilla ice cream (for the brownies) if you have the energy. You'll still have time for a dip before eating. Frisbee anyone?

CHILE-RUBBED FIREWORKS CHICKEN WITH BBQ TABLE MOP

For rub:

- 3/4 cups pita, unseasoned medium-hot chili powder or sweet Hungarian paprika
- 1-1/2 tablespoons granulated white sugar
- 1-1/2 tablespoons granulated brown sugar
- 1-1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1-1/2 teaspoons ground cumin
- 3/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 3/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 3/4 teaspoon dried thyme crumbled
- 3/4 teaspoon dried oregano, crumbled

For mop:

- 1 cup medium-hot smoky prepared barbecue sauce
- 3/4 cup ketchup
- 1/3 cup fresh orange juice
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 1 teaspoon hot pepper sauce, such as Tabasco
- 2 quartered chickens (about 7 pounds, total) or 7 pounds of chicken parts, rinsed and patted dry

Make the rub: In a medium jar, combine all ingredients and shake well to blend. Store at room temperature, tightly

covered, up to three weeks. Make the mop: In a medium bowl, whisk together the barbecue sauce, ketchup orange juice, soy sauce and hot sauce. (You can prepare it a day ahead. Cover and refrigerate. Allow to come to room temperature before using.) Lay the chicken on a sheet pan. Sprinkle with the rub, pressing the rub into the skin. Use it all. Cover the chicken and let stand at room temperature for 1 hour.

Light a medium-hot fire in a charcoal grill or preheat a gas grill to medium. Lay the chicken, meaty sides up, around the edges of the rack, away from direct flame. Cover and grill for 5 minutes. Turn chicken over, cover and grill for 5 minutes. Continue turning the chicken every 5 minutes until just cooked through but still juicy (the spice coating may look slightly burned). Your total cooking time will probably be between 30 and 40 minutes.

Serve hot, warm or cool, with mop drizzled on top or offered at the table for dipping. Yield: 8 servings. -- Recipe from "All on the Grill," Michael McLaughlin (HarperCollins, 1997).

Place beans in a large, heavy pot, add water to cover by 2 inches and soak overnight (or quick-soak by bringing them to a boil over medium-high heat and boiling for 2 minutes). Remove from heat and let stand for 1 hour, covered. Drain and rinse several times.

Place soaked or quick-soaked beans back in pot and add water to cover by 2 inches. Bring to a boil, simmer until just tender but not mushy, about 45 minutes. While cooking, skim off any foam that rises to top. Drain and set aside. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Place bacon in a heavy, oven-proof pot. Cook over low heat until fat is just rendered, 5 to 6 minutes (do not brown). Remove with slotted spoon and set aside. Add onion to the pot and cook until wilted, 10 minutes. Add peppers and cook, stirring, 5 minutes more. Add beans, reserved bacon and the chopped tomatoes. Then add the remaining ingredients except the reserved tomato juice, apples and salt. Fold together and cover and bake for 2 hours.

Add the apples and 1/2 cup of the reserved tomato juice and bake, uncovered, until thick and fragrant, about 2 hours. Season with salt and serve hot and bubbly. Yield: 6 to 8 servings. -- Recipe from "U.S.A. Cookbook," by Sheila Lukins (Workman Publishing, 1997).

Fried foods are out on low-fat diet

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have had two strokes and a heart attack. My doctor has me on a low-fat diet. Is it all right for me to eat a couple of pieces of fried fish or chicken once in awhile?

DEAR READER: If you are on a low-fat diet, you should avoid unnecessary fats. This would include fried foods of any type. Are you running a risk by eating an occasional piece of fried chicken? Probably not, especially if you fry the food at home using olive oil.

However, restaurants are not so picky about their fats, so I'd avoid ordering fried foods when you eat out — because you may be over-dosing on high-cholesterol substances in such environments.

You may be aware that cardiologists have recently revised their thinking about the treatment of elevated cholesterol in heart patients. The present recommendation is stricter than in the past, aiming to keep the blood cholesterol below 200 milligrams per deciliter and the LDL (bad cholesterol) below 130 mg. This usually requires prescription medication (Mevacor, Lipid and others).

Therefore, while I applaud your concerns about moderating dietary fat, you may wish to check with your physician about the advisability of taking a prescription cholesterol-lowering drug. Such therapy may actually cause arteriosclerotic blockages to regress, a benefit that simple dietary precautions are unlikely to achieve.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My grandson has many, many moles on his body. They are brownish black, range in size from a pencil eraser to a silver dollar and have continued to grow as he got bigger. There are fine hairs growing from many of the moles and the lesions sometimes itch. His twin sister has no moles. What is this condition and what should be done about it?

DEAR READER: I believe that your grandson has "dysplastic nevi," moles that are usually (but not always) inherited.

In most instances, these nevi cause no health problems for several years. Then they may begin to undergo troublesome changes (darkening and bleeding), which indicate that they could be evolving into melanomas, a highly malignant skin cancer. People with dysplastic nevi who have a family history (parents or grandparents) of melanomas are at highest risk.

Patients with these nevi should be closely monitored by a dermatologist.


Dysplastic nevi can continue to appear well into middle age, unlike normal, harmless moles which are ordinarily present from birth. Once again, the principal risk in patients with dysplastic nevi is a family history of melanomas. Such a history mandates ongoing frequent examinations by a skin specialist. Lesions that darken or otherwise change should be removed.

WIN AT BRIDGE

The errors weren't funny

Sometimes — after two or three glasses of wine — I think I should give stand-up comedy a try. In the morning, sanity returns to its throne and I go back to my computer.

This deal might be called a comedy of errors, except I think someone — I forget who — thought of that title first. Against six spades, West led the diamond king. South won with dummy's ace, played a spade to his ace, and tried a heart to dummy's jack. When that finesse worked, declarer discarded his diamond loser on the heart ace and made his slam.

How many errors can you spot during the bidding and play? There were three. The first was North's raise to four spades. With

such a good hand for play in spades, he should have made an advance cue-bid of four diamonds. This shows a maximum no-trump, usually four-card trump support, and the diamond ace; simultaneously it denies the club ace. South's slam bid was debatable as the opponents might have had two immediate red-suit winners. Technically, he should cue-bid five clubs.

In the play, if the heart finesse had lost, declarer would have been one down immediately. Declarer should have taken a ruffing finesse, leading a heart to dummy's ace and continuing with the heart queen. If East covers with the king, declarer ruffs, plays a club to dummy's king and discards a minor-suit loser on the heart jack. Here, though, when East plays low, South throws his remaining diamond. West is welcome to the trick, but declarer's club loser disappears on the established heart jack.


