Political flap ignites over ethics in advertising

Christian groups make character an issue, but county incumbents call sniping malicious

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The aniping appears ready to go on to Election Day. Seminole County Commission Chairman Randy Morris said today he is disappointed by the misin-formation and malicious formation and malicious charges being made against the incumbents in the two commissioners' races.

"All of this is in violation of Florida election law and in violation of any basic moral code," said Morris, who is becode, said Morris, who is being challenged in the District 2 race by Bob West, a Christian Coalition employee whose negative campaigning tactics appall Morris.

SANFORD - Seminole County School Board Chairwoman Barbara Kuhn wants to set the record straight.

In response to a series of paid political advertisements that call for changes in the county commission and school board through the ouster of incumbents. Ruhn distributed to other board members a written response disputing claims made in the ads.



Seven candidates, including two incumbents, are vying for three seats on the school board. Kuhn is not seeking reelection and has not endorsed any of the candidates.

Kuhn said the ada were full of generalizations and unsubstantiated allogations and she felt compelled to dispel the

An outspoken critic of the school board, Goff has made no secret that he wants the incumbents replaced and school superintendent Paul Hagerty fired, Kuhn said.

Goff has been admonished for behavior deemed unacceptable while representing the school district at out-of-town conferences. Kuhn also barred Goff from serving on school related committees.

Coff referred questions regarding the ada to Jones.

Sheriff's office is first in the country certified for integrity

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The Seminole County Sheriff's Office on Tuesday became the first law enforcement agency in the country to be certified by the National Institute of Ethics.

Federal and local officials attended a presentation at the new cheriff's office and public safety building at 100 Bush Blvd., which is scheduled for completion later this year.

To earn the certification, the sheriff's office met seven standards of integrity over a sixmonth period. Maintaining that certification will be an ongoing process that will apply to all deputies, Sheriff Don Eslinger said.


This certification enhances the relationship we have with the citizens in the community. Eslinger said. 'In today's society it is important that people trust us.'

Ethics components will also be incorporated into the inservice training of law enforcement agents at his office, Eslinger said.

The result of the certification will be deputies who are better able to conquer ethical dilemmas and temptations, according to Dessess Brown, sheriff's spokeswoman, Brown said with the certification the agency will face less over lingation and fewer deputies will find their careers, marriages, and self-respect destroyed.



While the water usage is still higher than it was last year at this time, the usage is lower than it was when the restrictions were begun in late May. Therefore, the restrictions are being modified. The changes

Lawn irrigation times are now expanded to include from 4 p.m. to 10 a m., on appropriate days.

The day - of - the - week re-strictions are still in place, as residents living in even num-bered houses may water from Wednesday and Friday. Odd numbered houses may water their yards from 4 p m. to 10 a.m. on Tuesdays. Thursdays and Saturdays. There is still

It also ordered payment of a public opinion survey done in preparation for the trial. Seminole County, which must pay the costs, objected on grounds that the benefits were neither required nor necessary to meet constitutional standards.

The Fifth District Court reversed the decision and Spasiano is now appealing.





The city of Lake Mary and the Florida Department of Transportation has announced that, on Friday, Aug. 58, traffic should be shifted to the new Rinshert Road traffic tenes between the Lake Mary Boulevard and the County Road 46A intersections. This will allow construction to continue on the west side of Rinshert Road which will become the two southbound lense of the four-lane divided roadway. This traffic shift is being coordinated with the Interstate-4 interchange

Project. The I-4 Interchange Project includes the re-construction of the Rinehart Road/CR 46A intersec-tion. The coordinated timing of the traffic shift has re-sulted in a cost savings reducing the required expen-dius of public funds. The projects are being con-structed by Martin K. Eby Construction Company. Construction management is being provided by Contilin, Porter and Holmes Engineers, Inc. and EDCT.





Veteran recreation coach takes reins of Seminole High School boys' volleyball program

Speedy auto retrieval minimizes towing costs

Most people come in contact with tow truck companies as a result of getting stranded because of car trouble. However, in addition to helping drivers with car trouble, tow truck companies offer an invaluable service to many small bustnesses and their patrons as well as to residential communities with limited parking space such as apartment complexes.

Tow truck companies help owners and lessors of businesses maintain parking space, which is often limited, available for a patron's convenience. Also, tow truck companies help ensure that residential parking is not occupied by unauthorized persons thereby forcing residents to find alternative parking which, in a congested area, may mean having to park blocks away. Additionally, tow truck companies provide a service to the community at large by towing cars that are reported as "abandoned" by law enforcement agencies.

A person whose vehicle is towed as a result of unauthorized parking or alleged aban-donment is not likely to appreciate such a service, however. This is in great part due to the fact that the cost of this service to business owners or lessors, patrons, residents, and the community at large in the case of "abandoned" vehicles is passed on to the person whose vehicle is towed.

Under Florida law, a person regularly engaged in the buniness of transporting vehicles by wrecker, tow truck, or car

carrier may recover, remove, or store a vehicle upon instructions from the owner or leasor, or a person authorized by the owner or lessor, of property on which such a vehicle is wrongfully parked, or when instructed by any law enforcement agency. Additionally, Florida law provides a person regularly engaged in the business of transporting vehicles, by wrecker, tow truck, or car carrier with a lien on the vehicle towed for a reasonable towing fee and for

a reasonable storage fee.

Anyone whose had their car towed under these circumstances knows that these fees can quickly add up. Towing fees generally range from 875 to 8200 and storage fees generally range from \$20 to \$50 per day depending on the area and the tow truck company which towed the vehicle. While there is no way to avoid the towing fee other than by waiver or reduction of the fee by the tow truck company, the law does provide a grace period of 6 hours before storage charges may begin to accu-mulate. Therefore, in order to minimize the cost of a tow, a person whose vehicle is towed

for unauthorized parking or alleged abandonment should retrieve his or her car as soon as possible.

in addition to the towing and storage fees that an owner whose vehicle is towed may incur, an owner should be aware that if his or her vehicle is not retrieved within a certain period of time, the tow truck company may, but is not required to continue to store the vehicle. This may lead to the sale of the vehicle at auction to the highest bidder.

Tow truck companies provide an invaluable service to a number of people. However, as noted above, this service can be quite costly for the owner of a vehicle which is towed and may under certain circumstances result in the loss of the vehicle. Next week we will dis-






Oviedo: Our town, our home

By Debra Wood HERALD CORRESPONDENT

Central Florida's explosive population growth caught up with Oviedo more recently than in some parts of our community but, like Lake Mary and Longwood, this city's agricultural and hospitality roots built a strong foundation for a new era of prosperity.

Oviedo's earliest and largest land owner, Walter Gwynn, bought his choice parcel be-fore the Civil War. Gwynn was a surveyor, scouting Florida lands for the government and railroads, when he selected the acreage in Lake Jesup's hammock lands. But the Kentucky native waited until after the war before moving to Central Florida.

America's civil strife prompted many of Oviedo's early settlers to leave their farms in



the South and homestead in the new territory. Neighbors helped each other build homes from locally milled lumber.

Jacksonville merchant Antonio Solary built a wharf on Lake Jesup in the early 1870s, which became the community's port. Steamships made weekly trips from Jacksonville. Solary's store sold groceries, wagons and other goods to the settlers.

The small Lake Jesup settlement had about 40 families in 1875. Four years later, Postmaster Andrew Aulin suggested naming the area Oviedo, because he wanted something unique and Spanish like the state's montker.


mals that can't speak themselves," McMillan said.



Chamber: There is no other place we would rather be

OVIEDO - One of Oviedo's landmarks in is more than a century old and houses the Greater Oviedo Chamber of Commerce.

Nestled in the middie of several trees, the Lawton House stands out to travelers along West Broadway.

Rather peculiar looking as it sits by itself with a parking lot beside it and Lawton Elementary School in the background, the house gives those who visit there a glimpse into Oviedo of yesteryear.

"There is no other place we would rather be," said Rich Sloane, executive director for the chamber. Sloane said that the chamber leases the Lawton House from the city, and has been in residence for eight years. Prior to that, the Lawton House had been used for other businesses and, of course, as a home.

Originally located in the heart of downtown building, on the property where the Memorial Building now stands, the Lawton House was purchased around 1910 by Mr. and Mr. T.W. Lawton. (Mr. Lawton was superintendent of



achools for Seminole County for 37 years, and the house, at one time, was owned by the Seminole County School Board). The couple then had the house moved to its present location in the middle of what used to be a 10-acre stretch or orange grove which had been in the Lawton family since the 1880s. The house was re-rooted with the help of rollers to its present day location.

The story and a half house still utilizes an underground well as a water supply. And it still displays much of the original construction: seven rooms with hardwood floors and walls with up and down board construction.

The house has been added on to several times and is currently under renovation. "It is

a tremendous undertaking," said Sloane

Lake Charm

Gwynn's daughter reportedly was responsible for calling a lake on her Dad's property "charming," and the name stuck. Lake Charm became a winter haven for wealthy Northerners.

Dr. Henry Foster bought 26 acres from Gwynn, grew citrus and persuaded well-to-do friends from up North to buy home sites in his resort development around Lake Charm. During the 1880s, two hotels operated on the northeast shore.

New York piano executive Calvin Whitney
built a home on Lake
Charm in 1886. The
home later became
known as the WhitneyWolcott House. Three
generations of the Wolcott family lived in the
home. The Lake Charm
community was said to
have a population of
250 in 1887.

Looking across the tranquil lake at the stately mansion today, one can almost picture the Victorian elite aitting on the verandah.

Foster was quite influential, philanthropic and full of ideas to improve the area. By the mid 1880s, he owned uncultivated land and 50 acres of groves, together worth \$100,000.

The vast and valuable holdings served him until the freezes of 1894 and '95. The severe weather killed

County's first church still does God's work

OVIEDO -- In the one dozen of worship nearly places Oviedo has to offer, one has remained the original for over a century. The First Baptist Church in Oviedo is said to be the very first church in Seminole County with people County with people traveling far and wide to attend.

Now, the church is housed in a beautiful new sanctuary which seats up to 2,500 people. "It's a growing church in a growing community." said the church pastor, Dr. Dwayne Mercer. The new sanctuary stands next to the old sanctuary and is the most visible landmark in downtown Oviedo.

Mercer said that the

congregation of the church is around 2,100 for Saturday night and Sunday morning services and about 1,500 for Sunday School be-tween Saturday night and Sunday mornings. The new sanctuary scats 2,500. church is equipped for various activities aside from worship and Sun-day school. Preschool is offered and located in the newer buildings. Basketball and volley-ball is available to all ages. And home school students utilize the facilities on Friday. All this only touches the surface as to what is going on at First Bap-tist. "We wanted to do what God wants us to do," said Mercer.

The paster started ministering around 19 years ago in North Georgia. Raised in Athens, Oa., Mercer stud-






River Walk neighborhood flooded by run-off of an adjacent development and in 1995 had started a letter writing campaign to Orange County officials. Located on the Seminole County line, Eberle saw development in the neighboring county impact the lives of Seminole County residents.

Then Hurricane Cordon, in November of 1995, dumped 7.1 inches of rain on an already soaked Central Florida and Eberle saw the river rise to within feet of her home.

"After that came through," said Eberle, "I said, 'look, all I want for Christman is flood insurance." What the really wants is to stop development in the flood plain of the Econ and Little Econ Rivers.



missions, the St. Johns River Water Management District, the Army Corps of Engineers, to the state sen-ate, the governor, the U.S. Congress and to President Bill Clinton. In large a letter writing campaign, she has traveled to Tallahassee to lobby local representatives for growth management along the Econ River and to update FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) flood plain maps. "If I write something, it's because I'm mad," said Eberle. Her letters appears regularly in the local media.

In her investigation into growth along the river, after Gordon, Eberle discovered a FEMA map that shows her home was built in the 100-year flood plain. Flooding from Gordon, a concert. 25-years may be a constant.

her home was built in the 100-year flood plain. Flooding from Gordon, a once-in-25-years event, came beyond the lines of the 100-year flood plain, said Eberie. "Many of the FEMA maps are based on studies which are 10-40 years old," Eberie wrote in a letter to State Representative Bob Starks. "Do not allow development in areas with outdated flood plain maps."

Not only concerned with where the water goes, but what goes in the water, Eberie has worked to keep the Little Econ River clean. She said dumping in the river is a big problem. "It's incredible what people throw in or near the river," said Eberie. A hot water heater was the object of her tre for several months before heavy rains earlier this year swept it farther down stream. She


Eberie has asked for stormwater systems in Seminole County to be fixed, and properly funded. Site wants development in flood prone arcas, and within the 10, 25 and 100-year flood plains, to be halted. She wants the filling and destruction of wetlands to cease. She wants independent biological and botanical assessments of the environmental impacts of development, She wants developers to be required to preserve up to 25 percent of the trees on a property, ending the practice of slash and burn. And the wants government to be accountable for its actions.


In an August 1997 letter to Gov. Lawton Chiles, Eberie wrote, "The


government must be held accountable for allowing homes to be built in the flood plains...It is obvious to me that government is not doing its job. Rules and laws are broken and enforcement appears to be non-existent..."
