



BUB-HOLUTION .-- The United States Navy has one answer to the problem of detecting and sinking the modern, snorkel-type submarine.

At Akron, O., the Navy is building the largest non-rigid airship ever constructed -- 324 feet long with a capacity of \$75,000 cubic feet of non-inflammable helium gas.

This compares with the rigid-type sirships Akron and Macon of 1831-32 which were 785 feet long. However, aboard the new blimp will be futuristic-appearing devices to detect and track the modern undersen fighters. The new airship will have the advantage of being able to hover
