# 'Nickel, Dime' Operators Subject Of Legislation

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—A new round of committee meetings started today as members of the busy 1967 Legislature met to consider a long list of state problems including crime, taxes and local government operations. The white-haired legislator, D-New Smyrna Beach, said he will sponsor a stiff consumer protection bill which would give the state attorney general the power to protect the public against "nickel and dime" operators. Senate President Verle Pope said yesterday that the legislature may have to find as much as \$400,000 in new tax money in order to meet its commitments. "If we do the kind of job we need to do, we have got to have more revenue—call it what you will," Pope said. The white-haired legislator said some \$200 million will be needed in addition to current revenues to finance the present budget items and provide the promised \$5,000 minimum pay raise for teachers. Then, he said, the legislature will have to find some money to send to the counties for relief of property taxes. Although the amount will depend on the amount of relief granted, Pope pointed out that taking over half of the ad valorem school burden alone would run \$300 million. 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# Ground Action On Upswing In War

SAIGON (AP)—The U.S. command today reported a sharp increase in ground actions throughout Vietnam with 315 Communist killed in the preceding 24 hours. The first wave of three B-52 bombers to be based in Thailand arrived there today from Guam after dropping 100,000 pounds of bombs on a suspected Communist camp only 21 miles from Saigon. Nine more B-52s will move to Utapao Air Base, in southern Thailand, later this month, out-lying their round-trip time for raids on South Vietnam from 12 hours to less than three. The ground action included sharp barrages of recoilless rifle shells on the U.S. 25th Infantry Division headquarters at Cu Chi, about 25 miles northwest of Saigon. The pre-dawn shelling, which killed three American soldiers and wounded 26, was the second in two days. The helicopter-borne U.S. 1st cavalry, Alamo, later this month, out-lying their round-trip time for raids on South Vietnam from 12 hours to less than three. American pilots flew 96 missions over North Vietnam Sunday despite bad weather. All-weather jets hit the Thai Nguyen steel plant 25 miles from Hanoi and other raids struck an aircraft missile sites 30 miles from the Red capital. ## Lawmakers May Set Counties' Land Tax

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—A prediction that the Legislature may have to judge the tax situation in each of Florida's 67 counties came from a legislative leader as lawmakers continued preliminary work on a score of different subjects.

House Speaker Ralph Turkin said yesterday the lawmakers are asking a 1 per cent hike to raise the range to from \$3.74 to \$5.25 an hour. TEI reportedly is offering a 10 per cent increase.

TEI locked out the Teamsters Sunday after accusing the union of staging scattered, selective strikes against its members. The Teamsters accused TEI of trying to force President Johnson to invoke the Taft-Hartley Act's 60-day cooling-off period.

Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield said Johnson has asked the Justice Department to check the Taft-Hartley Act because "there is some question whether the cooling-off period is being invoked in a proper manner."

General Motors Corp., one of the nation's industrial giants, announced it will suspend truck assembly operations in Pontiac, Mich., beginning today "due to a parts shortage," it said.

Chrysler Corp. cut an eight-hour afternoon shift in full Monday at its Warren, Mich., plant, but hoped for a full day's work today. Ford halted work schedules at its Wayne, Mich., plant to conserve the "flow of incoming parts," American Motors slashed the work day at its Kenosha, Wis., assembly line.

Tons of trucking aboard "piggy-back" freight trains stood unloaded in Chicago rail yards, Thomas Center, chief executive officer of the Chicago Association of Commerce and Industry, said food supplies to the nation's second largest city could be cut off if the lockout continues a week.

## ACL, SCL Rail Merger Effective In Weeks

JACKSONVILLE (AP)—A merger which would establish the nation's eighth longest railroad in the southeast is likely to go into effect within a few weeks.

The U.S. Supreme Court gave its unanimous approval Monday to merging the Seaboard Air Line Railroad and Atlantic Coast Line Railroad into the Seaboard Coast Line Railroad.

Opponents have until May 5 to ask the Supreme Court to reconsider its action, but the 8-4 margin by which it upheld a three-judge special court's approval indicates little likelihood of a reversal.

He left in 1964 after the military government of former President Humberto Castello Branco stripped him of his political rights for 10 years. He was then a senator and considered a again.

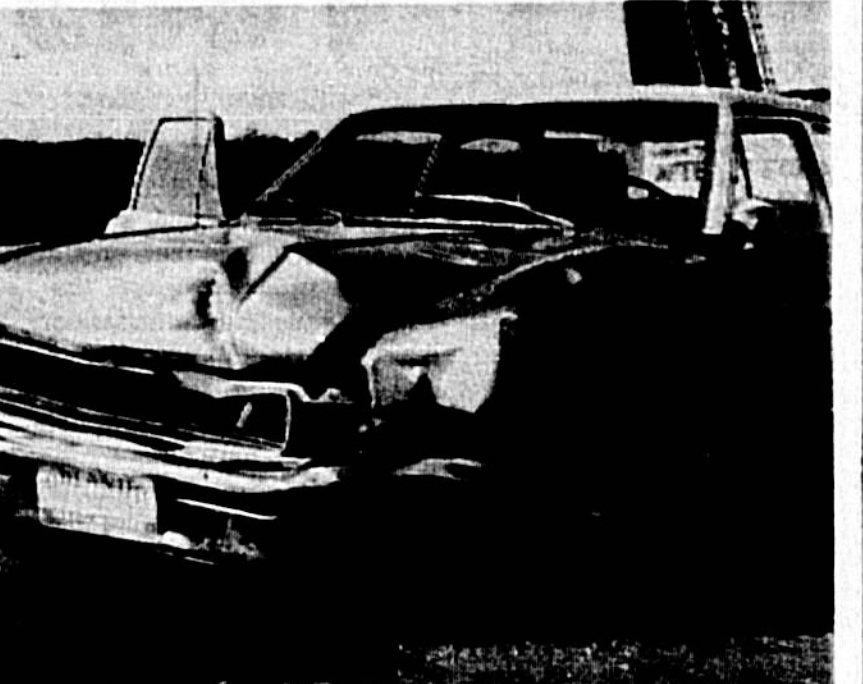

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz believes the critical rail dispute could be settled in the 26-day cooling-off period that President Johnson has urged Congress to tack onto Thursday's strike deadline.

Public attention has been focused on this matter now, said Wirtz, as Democratic leaders planned to push through both House and Senate today the deadline-extending resolution.

Wirtz indicated his belief that public concern over the crippling effects of the strike on the nation's economy would spur an agreement between the rail management and six shopcraft unions if they had additional time to negotiate.

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## \$5,000 Teacher Pay Gets Strong Support

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—A \$5,000 minimum teacher pay raise bill, being used to show strong legislative support for education, was introduced in the House by 56 lawmakers.

House Speaker Ralph Turkin, one of the sponsors, said none of the large group was committed to the actual language of the bill.

Most of the large bipartisan group, he said, only signed the proposed measure to show that they were convinced the Legislature had to raise educational salaries.

Backers of the proposal estimated that it would cost the state \$277 million during the first two years.

The legislation, as introduced, also would make changes in provisions for continuing contracts and provide other improvements which would boost the cost over the \$5,000 pay bill recommended by State School Superintendent Eugene Johnson.

Christians' proposal, which only includes the \$1,050-a-year raises in Minimum Foundation salaries, was estimated at \$145 million.

Phil Constans, associate executive director of the Florida Education Association, said he was surprised at the wide support for the salary bill.

"We're a long way from home," said the official of the state teacher association, "but this is a good start."

A severance tax on phosphate and other minerals also was proposed in the House. The bill would create a two per cent levy on the value of minerals removed from Florida soil.

Other bills introduced in the House would:

- Give 18-year-olds the right to vote.
- Permit right turns on red lights in most traffic instances.
- Eliminate the sales tax exemption for heavy machinery.
- Abolish the Florida Milk Commission.
- Legalize bingo games sponsored by religious, charitable, civic or fraternal organizations, while imposing a sales tax on the price of cards and game admissions.
- Increase the retired teachers pension to \$150 per month.
- Place a ceiling of 60 per cent of the weekly wage on the amount which can be paid in workman's compensation.
- Establish a \$100 per quarter tuition for students at universities except Florida A and M—where it would be \$80, for resident students and \$150 for non-residents.
- Create an "electronic technicians examining board."
- Allow courts to levy up to \$500 fine on persons polluting recreational waters.
- Require a statewide referendum on constitutional amendments to grant a \$10,000 home-steam exemption for the over-65 age group; place a five-mill ceiling on property tax levies; and establish a two per cent gross receipts tax for the support of schools.
- Require annual motor vehicle inspections at a cost of \$2.
- Increase the sales tax from three to four per cent, providing there is a commensurate decrease in property taxes.

## Television Strike Ends

NEW YORK (AP)—Old faces were back on camera and experienced hands at the controls today as network radio and television put taped reruns in storage boxes and returned to the airwaves after their first nationwide strike.

Only formal approval from the 18,000 members of the American Federation of Radio and Television Artists was needed to ratify the agreement worked out by the union May 2 with ABC, CBS and NBC.

The terms of the agreement pushed the basic weekly wage for about 100 local newscasters at network-owned stations in New York, Chicago and Los Angeles from the current \$275 to \$300, in a three-year contract retroactive to last March 1.

WASHINGTON — Washington has not seen a high-powered lobby campaign in years as the steamroller drive by the National Rifle Association to prevent stricter control over the sale of firearms.

Congressional offices are flooded with letters and calls from National Rifle Association members and sportsmen who have been persuaded that the proposed gun control laws will hamper hunting.

Sensors report that the volume of mail on the firearms bills is greater than on the Vietnam.

The big, rich National Rifle Association can claim almost sole credit for this outpouring of protest against a bill designed to curb crime at the source. The NRA position is that instead of trying to control the availability of weapons with which to commit violence the nation should seek out finding means of nearly identification of deranged persons and the mentally ill in our society—a task that could occupy a larger and richer land than ours for a century or two.

It is fitting that Senator Edward Kennedy (D.-Mass.), brother of the President and derided with a mail-order gun,

# Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA) — The new South Vietnam constitution has some remarkable provisions. If enforced, they will mark profound changes in the government and be a major factor in winning the war.

The new constitution (in force from April 1) provides for religious freedom. It asserts the equality of all citizens without regard to race, sex, religion or political party.

Defendants are guaranteed speedy and public trials. A defendant has the right to a defense lawyer for counsel in every phase of his interrogation, including the preliminary investigation.

The accused is to be considered innocent until proven guilty. Doubts are to be considered in his favor.

No citizen "can be tortured, threatened or forced to confess. A confession obtained by torture, threat or coercion will not be considered as valid evidence." The accused and his next of kin must be informed of the accusation within the time limit prescribed by law.

No one can be detained for indebtness.

In the new basic law, the state recognizes the political rights of every citizen, including the right to petition freely and engage in overt, nonviolent and legal opposition. But every activity designed to propagandize or carry out communism is prohibited.

The constitution says the state respects the freedom of thought, speech and publishing "as long as it does not harm personal honor, national security or good morals." Censorship is to be abolished "except for motion pictures and plays."

Freedom to join labor unions and to strike is to be "respected" within the framework and regulations prescribed by law.

The private life, home and correspondence of every citizen is to be "respected."

The state guarantees the freedom of private property. It guarantees to publish "a policy of making the people property owners."

Freedom of trade and competition is recognized, but monopolies and actions to secure control of the market are banned.

Representatives or senators cannot be prosecuted, arrested or brought to court for any statement or vote in the National Assembly.

Government officials and their wives are not allowed to receive government bids or contracts. Neither are representatives, senators or their wives.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Criticism in and out of the press bagged and inflamed him all through his presidency. He was called a crook, and much besides. He was ridiculed as the "stepfather" of his country.

He kept quiet about it most of the time in public. In private, with his aides, President George Washington exploded, venting his anger as a second term.

One of those closest to him, Thomas Jefferson, later to get his own dose of criticism when he became president, told how the fed-up Washington let go at a Cabinet meeting.

Washington, Jefferson wrote, was in one of those positions he couldn't control, regretted his failure to resign, and said "by God, he had rather be in his grave than in his present situation."

President Johnson gets worked up about the critics, too, in and out of the press. He has been blamed for many things, including a "credibility gap." But much of it is mild compared with what some of his predecessors had to take.

President John Adams said that if he believed his critics he would be the "meanest villain in the world." But his successor, Jefferson, that staunch defender of freedom of speech and of the press, even got hit by Adams, who considered him a calamity.

Jefferson, besides the now familiar "hypocrite," was accused of practically everything, from fathering illegitimate children by his slave women to worse.

Shrewd Andrew Jackson wooed the press, and even had three newsmen in his "kitchen cabinet." No good. He got it, too. He was called a murderer and adulterer. President James Buchanan took so much criticism he considered himself the happiest man in the country when his term was up.

His successor, Abraham Lincoln, was called everything from being a balloon to being illegitimate. One hostile newspaper rejoiced at his assassination. The president who followed, Lincoln, Andrew Johnson, was called a drunk, starting with the day of his inauguration.

Such boys and girls doubly need the extra love and visible affection which they derive from having a kitten or puppy.

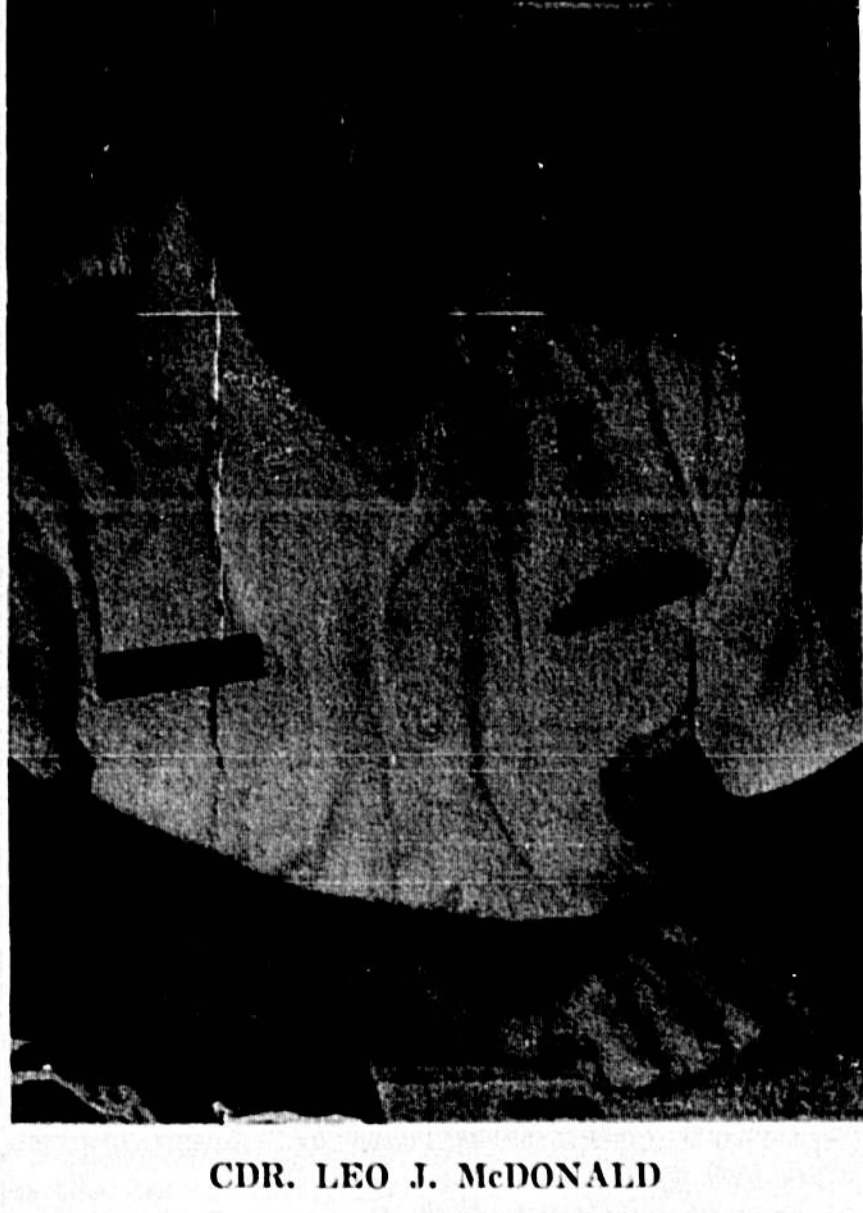
If you consent to letting your child have a pet, be sure you exact a promise that the child will feed the pet and be its caretaker.

In this manner, the pet will teach your youngster to be responsible.

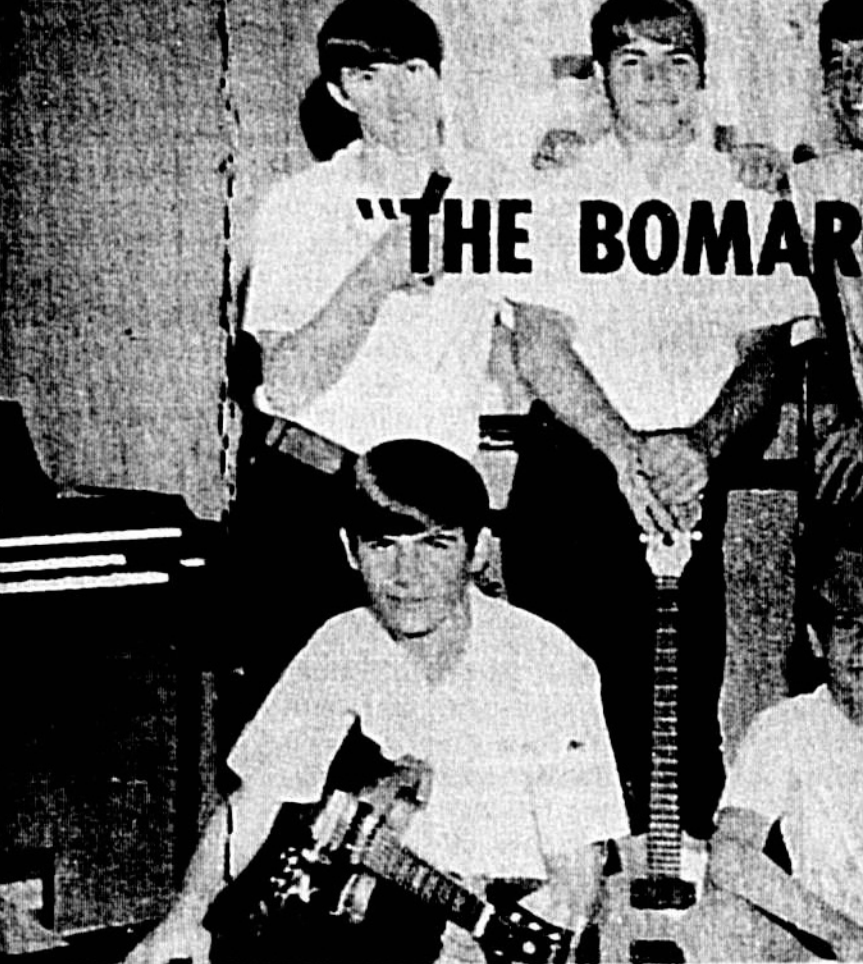

Selecting lures has long been a matter of considering shape, color and action, then hoping they will produce results. As any old-timer knows, it's an expensive process always to have the right combination at any given time.

Now to complicate matters a little further, another factor has been introduced—feel.

Plastic lures, note fishing experts, are either a boon or a bane, depending on the point of view. While they're likely to arouse the disdain and fighting instincts of a dyed-in-the-wool plug caster or fly fisherman, the flexible, many-lure imitations of worms and reels are just about the hottest "fish-baiters" on the market today.

To analyze why these bits of plastic are so effective might require volumes, and it's probable the fish would make lies out of any conclusions that might be reached. But certain facts seem apparent.

The plastic nature of a plastic lure gives it a more natural action when cast or trolled, and it can be fished at any speed and depth. Fish fond of mousing a bait are more apt to be fooled by the softness which closely resembles their natural foods.

The big reason, we suspect, that makes the flexible worm so popular is the fact that it has virtually liberated man. No longer is it necessary to bait the little woman's hook as she cringes away from the worm can. This attribute alone justifies one in every tackle box.

So whatever your feelings on the subject, remember the "feel" of a lure is important. It's like buying tomatoes, always give 'em a squeeze first to see if they're worth taking home.

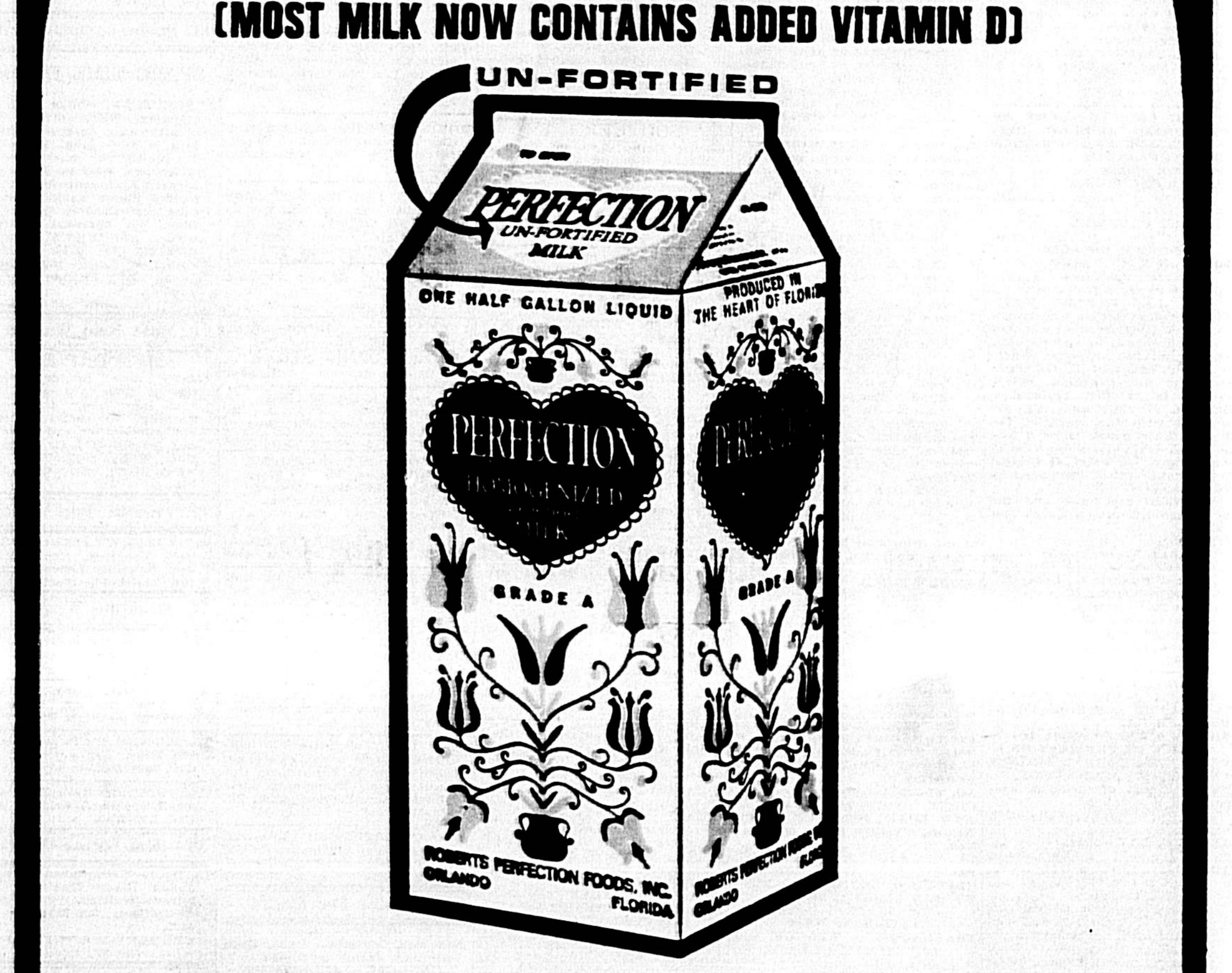

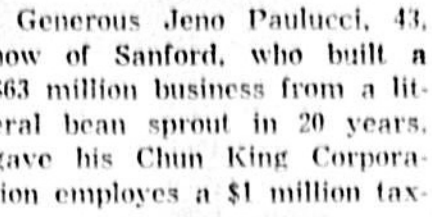
