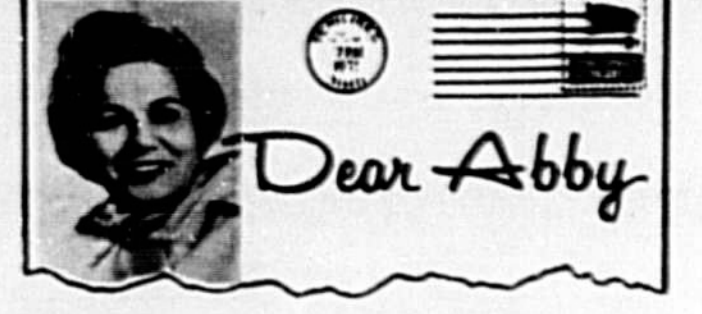

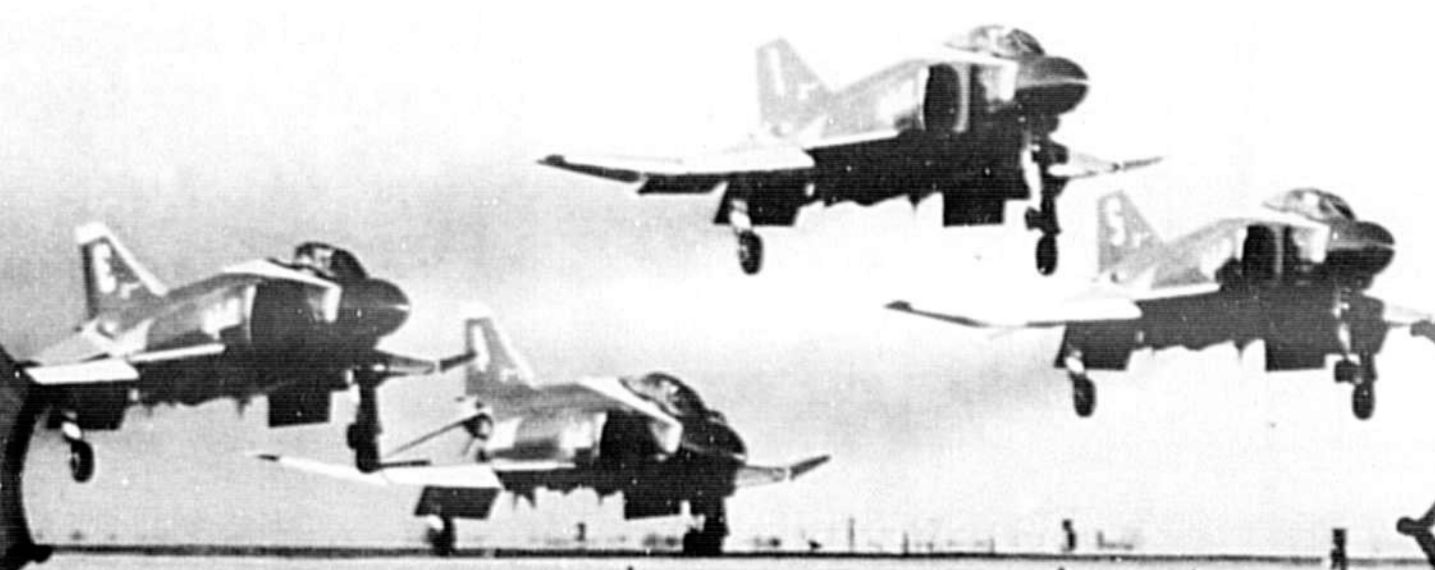

College Program Aimed at Vets

PIKEVILLE, Ky. (AP) — A member of President Nixon's task force on higher education for Vietnam era veterans thinks too often colleges' efforts to attract veterans end at the admissions office.

"Veterans have the maturity and motivation to succeed in college but often lack academic self confidence," said Dennis Love, dean of developmental studies at Pikeville College.

Since coming to Kentucky, the 30-year-old (this native has spent part of his time traveling to other schools promoting programs "to get the veteran back on his feet," Love said.

"It's a matter of saying to the veteran, 'College is not as hard as you think,'" Love said. At Pikeville, this effort is known as the Veterans Educational Training Program, a study skills course that covers such basics as how to take

notes, how to outline a text-book, how to listen in class and how to prepare for examinations.

"A lot of veterans went into the Army because they flunked out of college or because they couldn't get in in the first place," Love said.

"Many saw the army as a means of upward mobility but a lot of them came back without any usable skills," he said.

The most recent figures from Frankfort listed about 16,000 unemployed veterans in Kentucky.

The biggest problem (in getting veterans into college) is reaching them," Love said. In many places, he said veterans who already have returned to college are working in outreach programs. "But even they are having trouble reaching other vets," he said.

Traditional methods aren't working, he said. Among new methods he described is a mobile van in Detroit that visits neighborhoods where returning veterans live. Another includes advertising in "want ad" columns, "which is often the only thing a veteran is reading these days," he said.

The Veterans Administration is doing all it can. The states, the cities and the colleges themselves have to do more," Love said.

Before coming to Pikeville, Love headed a similar veterans program at the University of Detroit. There, he said, veterans who took his course averaged grades that were twice as good as those who didn't.

Love said a class pre-dominantly for veterans serves another purpose in that it gives them a chance to talk about mutual problems and experiences.

This is especially important, he said, because unlike previous post-war periods there no longer are large, easily identifiable groups of veterans on campuses.

Save Jobs As Well Help For Independent Firms

In a move to save thousands of independent firms from closure as well as save jobs for a large number of workers, Congressman Wright Patman of Texas, a veteran champion of small and independent business, has joined forces with Senator Alan Bille of Nevada, Chairman of the Senate Small Business Committee.

Paradoxically, the Bille-Patman "Economic Disaster" act is a Congressional move to save independent firms from destruction by other acts of the same Congress. In brief, it would provide authority for the Small Business Administration to make loans for businesses lacking cash reserves needed to comply with the regulations set up by the various pieces of social and ecological legislation.

The bill, which is similar to the one introduced by Senator Bille last year, is supported by 41 per cent of the independent business people in a survey conducted by the National Federation of Independent Business.

Loans made under this proposed law to enable smaller firms to comply with various regulations established by law and bureaucratic interpretation of those laws would carry an interest rate equal to the actual cost of money to the Federal government plus a 1 per cent premium to cover administrative costs, thus eliminating any subsidization.

The measure, in principle, as introduced by Senator Bille last year, passed in the Senate as part of the Disaster Relief Act, but was defeated in the House-Senate conference.

The decision by Representative Patman, Chairman of the House Banking and Currency Committee, to join forces with Senator Bille in this session of the Congress is expected to smooth out the difficulties previously encountered.

The extent of the destruction being created by acts of the Congress is an unknown factor. Senator Bille reports that a study made last year in 14 industries revealed that in the next four years more than 1,000 industrial plants will go out of business.

The first returns from this year's continuous field survey of the National Federation of Independent Business indicate that in order to comply with the Labor Department's interpretations of the Occupational Health and Safety Act alone will require over 16 billion dollars, by the independent business community of the nation.

Representative Patman says of the proposed legislation, "Hopefully, this bill will enable small businesses to stay in operation that might otherwise have been forced to close their doors because of new government regulations."

It is expected there will be opposition to this legislation, mostly originating from the conservative camp who take the viewpoint that government should not be in the lending business. However, many of the adherents of this doctrine

in addition, as evidenced by the work of the OSHA law the Congress passes a law in broad terms, leaving the interpretation open to bureaucratic whims which become part of the law.

It is contended that the regulations by the Labor Department of the OSHA law are unworkable, and in many cases quite frivolous, creating unnecessary expense.

'All Indicators Point To Sound Economy'

TALLAHASSEE — More employment and less unemployment characterized Florida's economy in 1972, Gov. Reubin Askew said today.

"Florida had an encouraging increase in employment in 1972," Askew said. "All economic indicators point to a sound economy."

The governor said a report prepared by the Florida Department of Commerce Office of Research and Statistics says estimated nonagricultural employment rose up to 4 per cent in 1972, compared to a 2.6 per cent growth the year before.

All industry groups except mining showed employment growth in 1972, the report said. The state's unemployment rate was 3.6 per cent, down from 4.2 per cent the year before. The national rate for 1972 was 5.6 per cent, down from 5.9 per cent in 1971.

Unemployment compensation claims decreased 191 per cent, all major industry groups contributed to the drop. The amount paid in unemployment compensation dipped from \$49.4 million in 1971 to \$41.3 million last year.

Proposal Has Gained Support

The demise of one small business may not rank as a disaster, but many independent, small businessmen believe that Federal Disaster Relief programs should not contribute to the crisis of a small business needing help from the Small Business Administration.

The SBA shoulders a substantial part of the work in providing both business and home-owner loans when natural disasters hit. SBA personnel are shifted, often overnight, from regular work to disaster relief loans, and a critical loan to save a small business may get lost in the shuffle.

Consequently, a proposal that the home-owners' portion of the Disaster Relief Program be shifted from SBA to the Federal Housing Administration has gained support from the business community. The National Federation of Independent Business nationwide poll finds 41 per cent in favor of this change, 33 per cent against it and a substantial 26 per cent undecided about the merits of such a change.

Federation will not take a stand, in the absence of a majority view.

The poll shows Florida business owners divided this way: 39 per cent favor the shift to FHA, 35 per cent are opposed and 26 per cent are undecided.

Foundation Reveals Financial Standing

The Rockefeller Foundation appropriated more than \$48.5 million for current and future projects in 1972 and paid out more than \$44 million during the year to meet current and past commitments, the second issue of the Foundation's new publication, *RF Illustrated*, reported today. The Foundation's after-tax income from dividends and interest amounted to \$25.1 million in 1972. The \$44 million spent by the RF exceeded income by \$18.9 million, the deficit being made up from principal funds.

The \$44 million—all of the Foundation's income plus \$18.9 million of principal—surpassed by \$8.7 million the amount which the Foundation is required to spend by the Tax Reform Law of 1969. Under the provisions of this law the Foundation also paid over \$2 million in excise taxes.

Since its founding in 1913, the RF has paid out more than \$1 billion: \$874 million from income and \$211 million from principal. The market value of the Foundation's investments on December 31, 1972, stood at \$967.5 million.

Under the leadership of its new president, John H. Knowles, M.D., a committee of trustees is making a thorough review of the Foundation's programs. "The last formal review of the RF was conducted several years ago," Dr. Knowles said. "With a new president now in the time to review existing programs and areas of new interest to set goals and the best means of getting there."

Of the money spent by the Foundation on its six major programs in 1972, \$3.3 million went to the Conquest of Hunger program. With this money the RF continued to support international agricultural research centers in Latin America, Asia, and Africa.

Other major efforts towards the Conquest of Hunger are the raising of nutrition levels, training of more agriculturalists in the developing world, and safeguarding the natural diversity of plant life by maintaining germplasm banks to of the world's leading food crops.

\$6.7 million was expended on the Foundation's population program last year.

Mobile Homes Safety Check

Most people don't realize how popular mobile homes have become during the last few years. But production figures tell the story: 500,000 mobile home units were manufactured in the U.S. in 1971, almost five times as many as in 1960. Today more than 7 million people live in mobile homes.

Unfortunately, most people also don't realize some of the hazards that can be associated with mobile home living if proper attention is not given to safety features.

If a mobile home isn't properly anchored, a hurricane or windstorm can have disastrous effects. For example, in August 1970 Hurricane Celia damaged more than 7,000 mobile homes in the vicinity of Corpus Christi, Texas, of which almost 4,500 were total losses. Many of the homes were tipped over or suffered structural damage from the high winds. Fire is a hazard in mobile homes because few homes have enclosed areas that can stop a fire from spreading rapidly throughout the structure. In addition, mobile homes often lack fire-resistant materials in the kitchen or around the furnace, have improper electrical wiring, or lack adequate means of escape such as emergency windows in bedrooms.

Legislation presently in Congress would create a National Mobile Home Safety Bureau in the Housing and Urban Development Department to require high standards of safety.

Welfare Reform Rules To States

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Nixon administration has proposed sweeping changes in federal welfare rules to help states weed out ineligible and overpaid recipients.

The new regulations announced Thursday, cover eligibility, appeals hearings and recovery of overpayments. They could save hundreds of millions of dollars in the \$18 billion-a-year welfare system, said Robert B. Carlson, a special assistant on welfare matters in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

He said the initial reaction from state welfare administrators has been "overwhelmingly positive."

Carlson, Gov. Ronald Reagan's former welfare director, was brought to Washington by HEW Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger to promote California-style welfare reform throughout the nation.

When HEW threatened last year to withhold nearly \$500 million a year in federal matching grants to states as a penalty for welfare errors, Carlson said, governors complained that many of the overpayments were due to federal rules which tied their hands.

HEW later softened the threat, and has given states two years to improvement management of their welfare systems.

Weinberger disclosed earlier that he would attempt to improve welfare management through rules changes, because Congress did not act the last three years on the President's welfare-reform legislation.

Two key provisions in the proposed changes, Carlson said, would allow states to make private investigations of recipients' eligibility and give states a free hand to recover payments under "all circumstances."

John Mitchell To Testify About Watergate Today?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former U.S. Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell appeared today at U.S. District Court, where he had been summoned before a grand jury investigating the Watergate case.

In Spain, millions fled the cities Thursday for mountain or seaside resorts. Although some Spanish communities contained deeply rooted religious observances, others cancelled Easter processions because of lack of interest. In Tudela, in northern Spain, a luncheon for the poor on Palm Sunday was called off because the organizers were unable to find 12 poor persons willing to participate.

He reportedly had told friends recently that other officials of the President's re-election campaign planned the Watergate wiretapping over his veto.

Mitchell testified last Sept. 1 in a civil case that he didn't order the Watergate raid, and that he learned other campaign employees had been arrested in Democratic offices only by reading about the incident in the newspapers.

Mitchell, former campaign deputy job S. Magruder and presidential counsel John W. Dean III now are engaged in a three-cornered argument, carried out through public statements and news leaks, over which of them is responsible for the crime.

Sources close to the Senate Watergate investigation have told The Associated Press that the Justice Department expects to see all three of them indicted, along with others.

Magruder, who was Mitchell's second-in-command at the Nixon campaign, reportedly has told federal prosecutors that Mitchell and Dean helped plan the Watergate bugging and later arranged payments to buy silence from men convicted of the crime. Magruder has been unavailable to newsmen, but his lawyer says he intends to testify voluntarily when called before the grand jury.

For his part, Mitchell told newsmen Thursday that the Magruder report is "non-sense."

The New York Times said Mitchell had told friends he was present at three meetings last year when Magruder and G. Gordon Liddy, later convicted in the conspiracy, proposed plans to bug the opposition party headquarters. The Times quoted sources as saying Mitchell insisted he rejected the plans at all three meetings. Dean was present at one or more of the meetings, Mitchell reportedly said.

An associate told the AP today that Mitchell has said privately that he had known of the Watergate plans "he would have tried to stop it."

At the White House Thursday, Dean declared that he won't be made a "scapegoat" and Watergate.
