

Garden Gate By MRS. E. C. HARPER

Gardeners are advised to delay pruning of damaged plants by the University of Florida agricultural

Reperiment station.

Keep your pruning shears off cold damaged plants until they have had a chance to start a comeback. Horticulturist G. II. Hlanck-man of the University of Florida agricultural experiment stations offered that advise today to folks whose shrubs and other ornamen tals were damaged by the recent sub freezing temperatures.

"If you prune your plants now," he explained, 'you are likely to gut off too much live wood or not enough damaged plants." After the plants have had a chance to come back, the damaged discolored por-tions to be cut off and the good live growth that should be left become much more apparent. So it's best to wait a couple of weeks or so be-fore beginning to prune. Damaged branches with dark leaves may not be pleasant to look at but they will do no further damage to the

Some have heard that leaving famaged branches on a plant would affect the whole plant—that the trouble would "go down the branch or stem to the roots"—

but the experiment station horticulturist emphasized that there
was no foundation for the idea.

Leaving cold damaged parts on
a plant for a few weeks will do
no further damage to it, although
they should be pruned off as soon
as extent of the damage can be
determined, he said.

the cold may be dug up and removed to make way for new plantings, and poinsettles, many of

Special to Central Press W ASHINGTON Tep officials in Washington say privately that the Korean war probably will last through 1951, and possibly for years, unless the Chinese Communists can be persuaded to pull

out of Korea Actually, they point out that we definitely will be in World War It if we have to fight the Chinese for an indefinite length of time. If we are committed to war in China-declared or undeclared, we will be in a costly world conflict

On the other hand if the Chinese Communists drop their intervention in Korea, the Korean war will end within a matter of weeks. The North Koreans are in no position to withstand a United Nations attack without help

Faced with this dilemma, United States officials are, of course, doing everything possible to avoid full-scale conflict with the China Reds. War or peace for generations rests with the Peiping regime. or its Kremlin masters







