#### Two killed in gang violence

TWO YOUNG MEN WERE KILLED in a weekend outbreak of street gang violence, the first since a three-day gang peace summit last week, police said today.

Douglas Henegen, 21, of Titusville City was sitting with friends in Hansen Dam Park Sunday night when two men in their 20s drove past in a black car and fired several shots. Detective Albert Ferrand said.

Henegen was hit repeatedly by the gunshots and died at Pacific Community Hospital in Huntington Beach about an hour later.

Ferrand said investigators believed the shooting was gang related because of its method. It was not immediately known if Henegen was a gang member.

Earlier Sunday, a carload of suspected gang members opened fire on a rival gang of about 100 in the park. The police investigation was hampered by the rain. Several suspects were paralyzed with wounds.

# Police study on agenda

## Longwood report proposes changes

LONGWOOD — An 18-page Management Analysis and Evaluation study on the Longwood Police Department submitted by consultant Jeff K. Kramer will be considered for adoption by the city commission meeting at 7:30 tonight in Longwood.

The report states that the police department is poorly organized and managed in a manner

similar to many other small police agencies. It recommends management personnel be required to obtain an associate degree in 12 months and a bachelor's degree in 48 months. In addition, the chief and captain would be given 12 months in which to complete the Southern Police Institute 12-week course.

The commission is also scheduled to vote on what they are willing to pay. City Attorney Michael Kramer as a contract attorney. Kramer currently works as a full-time attorney for the commission but as of Oct. 1, the position will become part-time. The commission rejected Kramer's first proposal of a monthly retainer of \$9,800 for legal services on a consulting basis for a maximum of 80 hours and \$85 an hour for time spent in excess of that. He later said he

would not take less than \$75 an hour. He suggested the commission budget \$81,600 for legal services.

In a later memo, Kramer advised the commission that unless they enter into a professional fee agreement before Oct. 1, he will charge \$100 an hour for legal services as of that time. He pointed out the city has paid that hourly rate to six other consulting attorneys over the past two years, including former city attorney Ann Galby.

The commission has agreed to put \$84,434 in the budget for legal services but at Thursday night's work session postponed discussion of a fee for part-time city attorney.

Other items on the agenda include:

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# Leak throws NASA countdown behind

CAPE CANAVERAL — Engineers struggled through a delayed practice countdown for the shuttle discovery today, but another launch pad leak derailed a trouble-plagued fueling test and threatened yet another delay for a key engine test firing.

With Discovery lit up by high-power spotlights, NASA managers scrambled throughout the morning to figure out how to work around a steady stream of glitches that disrupted a second attempt to load a half-million gallons of supercold rocket fuel into Discovery's external tank.

The fueling exercise was designed to serve as a rehearsal for a crucial unmanned main engine test firing, which had been scheduled for Thursday at 7:30 a.m.

Engineers were debating whether the engine firing would have to be delayed again — the fourth time so far in the countdown — or whether it can be conducted Thursday as planned.

Launch director Robert Sieck said a decision on how to proceed was not expected before Tuesday when engineers have a better idea what will be needed to fix the launch pad leak, a leak remarkably similar to one that disrupted the first fueling exercise Thursday.

Even though engineers had problems with the fuel loading test, the countdown was allowed

Last year, revenues were a whopping \$101.9 million, a jump of 128.5 percent in a decade, according to estimates by the Association of American Publishers.

Those figures do not take into account other kinds of tests that have burgeoned during the education reform movement of the 1980s.

Higher feed prices could hurt Florida farmers

MIAMI — Florida farmers have been spared most of the direct effects of the nation's summer drought, but the accompanying increases in feed prices could hurt hog, poultry and dairy farmers and horse breeders.

# Murder investigation resumes

**OVIDO** — Oviedo and Orlando police and the Seminole state attorney's office today picked up the bungled investigation into the September discovery in Oviedo of a skull and dress believed to be that of 6-year-old Regina Mae Armstrong, kidnapped in Orlando in June 1985.

The skull was found by construction workers developing the Twin Rivers subdivision off State Road 419 on Sept. 11, 1987. That same day Oviedo police investigator Sparky Dingess and Florida Department of Law Enforcement technicians took the skull to an anthropologist at the University of Central Florida for an evaluation.

The anthropologist identified the skull as that of a girl the age of Regina, who had been dead since about the time she was kidnapped, but the find was not reported to Orlando police.

Last week Oviedo's new police chief, Dennis Peterson, found the dress in a police department evidence locker. Peterson suspected the dress might have been Regina's. The find was reported to Orlando police and Donna Armstrong, Regina's mother, identified the dress late Friday as the one Regina was wearing on the day she disappeared.

The skull had been sent to the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C., for further study, Seminole State Attorney Norman Wollinger said.

"The first priority is the case itself, finding the killer of Regina," Wollinger said. Second, Wollinger said today, is to determine how communications broke down during Oviedo's police investigation into the find, and why Orlando police were not notified promptly of the discovery.

Wollinger said there have already been personnel changes at the Oviedo police department. Former Chief Robert Wade Hancock was fired for incompetence about six weeks after the find, Wollinger said it is

too early in the probe to say if charges might be filed in connection with the botched investigation.

His major concern, Wollinger said, is "to see where we're at. It's all news to me. The 10-month time lapse is not to our advantage. I don't know if we would have found anything out there 10 months ago. I don't know if we will find anything now," he said of the construction site where the skull was found. Lawmen will recomb that site, he said.

Regina was kidnapped outside her east Orlando apartment while she was playing with her older sister and a boy. The kidnapper was described by the children as a 30- to 40-year-old white man, about 6 feet tall, of medium build and with dark hair.

A massive search, which extended into the Lake Jesup area of Seminole County, was mounted for Regina, but no clues were revealed for three years, until Friday when her mother identified her dress.

## California transit bus drivers fear attacks in wake of shooting

**OAKLAND, Calif.** — Transit bus drivers called for more protection from violence and at least one said he is carrying a weapon after an apparent revenge attack that left a driver dead and four passengers wounded.

Donald Palmer, 25, and his brother David, 25, were expected to be charged early this week in the shooting aboard the AC Transit bus, homicide investigators said Sunday. Police continued their search for possible accomplices, Sgt. Jerry Harris said.

The Palmer brothers allegedly carried out the attack on a 40-line bus at about 1:30 a.m. Friday, 16 hours after their mother, Ellen Palmer, 52, was killed in an accident involving another AC Transit bus a few blocks away.

Some form of revenge was considered the likely motive, investigators said. Ironically they said, it appeared that Ellen Palmer probably caused the accident by running a red light.

The slain bus driver, Billy B.J. Givens, 43, had nothing to do with the accident and other drivers expressed outrage that it had led to such a violent and misdirected outburst.

"Revenge? That's insane," veteran AC Transit driver Dave

Nelson said "That dude (the slain driver) probably had no idea the earlier accident even happened. The passengers sure had nothing to do with it. How stupid can you get?"

Carlucci flew to Moscow from Helsinki, Finland, for a tour that will include an address at the Soviet general staff academy and visits to an air base and an army division near Moscow and a naval base in the Crimea.

He was met at Sheremetyevo Airport by U.S. Ambassador Jack Matlock and Soviet Defense Minister and army chief of staff Dmitri Yazov, the official Tass news agency said.

Following his arrival, Carlucci was to lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier near the Kremlin and then hold two hours of talks with Yazov at the Defense Ministry. He was then scheduled to visit the general staff military academy, named after Mikhail Frunze, the first Red Army chief of staff.

Carlucci told reporters at the airport he was confident his unprecedented itinerary will be carried out in its entirety.

"He will be shown equipment and personnel that would have been impossible a couple of years ago to have been shown to a foreigner — let alone a secretary of defense," a U.S. official close to Carlucci's schedule.

**Chinese leadership divided on reforms**

BEIJING — The unprecedented adjournment of a crucial summit of Chinese leaders may mark a major setback for liberal economists and could herald a slow-down in senior leader Deng Xiaoping's capitalist-style reform program.

Chinese sources said Sunday that the leaders, split over the future of the economic reform policies, cancelled their annual summer summit held to map out government strategies for the coming year.

The leaders decided Friday to call off their annual series of summer meetings at the northern beach resort of Beidaihe after failing to reach agreement on how to carry out future reforms, Chinese sources who requested anonymity said Sunday.

The unprecedented adjournment may mark a major setback for economists who have urged the government to speed up changes and could herald a slow-down in the ambitious capitalist-style reforms that Deng launched nine years ago.

**Police break up Polish demonstration**

WARSAW, Poland — Police used truncheons to break up an anti-Soviet demonstration by some 200 people trying to march in memory of the more than 200,000 Poles killed in the 1944 Warsaw uprising against the Nazis.

At least three people were arrested in the demonstration Sunday by the protesters who questioned why the Soviet army never came to the rescue of Poles when the Nazis razed Warsaw in retaliation for the uprising.

Later, police allowed one activist, historian Wojciech Ziembski, to lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. As about 300 people looked on, he demanded the withdrawal of Soviet troops from Poland.

"We want the return of the Polish territories robbed from us and the withdrawal of the troops by the neighboring power," he said.

**Hussein opens door for PLO**

JERUSALEM — King Hussein's decision to partially cut ties with the occupied West Bank leaves thousands of Palestinians without a clear picture of what the Jordanian king will do next, but opens the door wider to the PLO in the territory.

"Jordan is not Palestine," Hussein said Sunday, indicating that he no longer has designs on trying to retake the West Bank. "The independent Palestinian state will be on the occupied Palestinian soil."

But Hussein, during a 30-minute speech broadcast on radio and television and monitored in Jerusalem, affirmed Jordan's role as a "confrontation state" and said Amman "will not renounce its commitment to participate in peace efforts."

Hussein is telling the Palestinians that they must manage on their own," Israeli Foreign Minister Shimon Peres told Israeli Television.

Jordan and the Israeli-occupied territory — forged when the East Bank and West Bank of the Jordan River united after the 1948 Arab-Israeli war — were never meant to interfere with the creation of an independent Palestinian state, Hussein said.

"We respect the wish of the Palestine Liberation Organization, the sole legitimate representative of the Palestinian people, to secede from us in an independent Palestinian state," said Hussein, whose Hashemite kingdom ruled the West Bank for 19 years before Israel gained control during the 1967 Six Day War.

Palestinians and Israeli officials characterized Hussein's remarks as opening the door to the PLO for a greater financial and administrative role in the West Bank.

**Persian Gulf cease-fire talks resume today**

UNITED NATIONS — U.N. officials said Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar would resume his shuttle negotiations with the foreign ministers of Iran and Iraq today in an effort to work out a cease-fire in the nearly 8-year old Persian Gulf war.

Perez de Cuellar, and foreign ministers Ali Akbar Velayati of Iran and Tariq Aziz of Iraq took the day off Sunday. Officials said the talks would resume today, with Perez de Cuellar scheduled to meet Velayati at 11 a.m. EDT in U.N. headquarters.

The two men also met Saturday, when Perez de Cuellar said he remained "hopeful" that a cease-fire agreement would be reached this week.

Iraq, however, has insisted that Iran agree to direct talks as a precondition to any truce, a demand Velayati has so far rejected.

A member of the Iraqi negotiating team said after Saturday's talks that his delegation had still not begun substantive discussions with Perez de Cuellar since arriving in New York Tuesday, and he denied reports that Iraq was being pressured to soften its demand for direct negotiations.

**Meanwhile fierce battles rage despite claims of withdrawal**

MANAMA, Bahrain — Iran said its forces recaptured a border town held by Iraq and repelled Iraqi assaults across the battle-scarred frontier, but Iraq insisted it was withdrawing its troops from Iranian territory.

The latest fighting along the frontier came as the Iranian and Iraqi foreign ministers took a day off Sunday from their separate talks with U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar on seeking an end to the nearly 8-year-old Persian Gulf war.

The indirect talks, with Perez de Cuellar as mediator, were scheduled to resume today.

Baghdad has insisted on direct talks with Tehran as a condition for declaring a cease-fire in the fighting,

while Iran says it is ready to hold direct talks after the truce has taken place.

Iraq's official Islamic Republic News Agency said the border skirmishing continued Sunday after Iraqi forces tried to capture the Malckshah heights near the town of Mehran, about 100 miles east of Baghdad.

There was no word from Iraq on the fighting, but the Iranian news agency said the Iraqi invaders "were faced with the brave resistance of Muslim combatants and local tribesmen who repelled them" from 16 square miles of Iranian territory.

The state-run Tehran radio said Iranian forces early Sunday "liberated" the border city of Qasr Shirin, some 110 miles northeast of Baghdad, after advancing on it during the night.

and substantive talks have yet to start," said Riyadh Al-Qaysi, a former U.N. ambassador and a member of the delegation led by Aziz.

"The way the Iranians have been conducting themselves proves... that what Iraq proposed is not only legitimate and correct, but also is very vital for

securing a real comprehensive and durable peace that is desired by the international community, the Security Council and the countries in the region," he said.

Saturday's meeting between the Perez de Cuellar and Velayati lasted 75 minutes. Afterward, the Iranian minister left U.N. headquarters without comment. It was his fifth round of discussions with Perez de Cuellar.

Perez de Cuellar told reporters at the start of the meeting that there had been some obstacles in the talks, but they were not substantial and were merely "procedural difficulties that I have to iron out."

"I will maintain pressure on all sides in order to obtain a quick way out to the present situation," he said.

Asked whether he will announce a cease-fire date this week, Perez de Cuellar said, "I am still hopeful."

While Perez de Cuellar and Velayati were meeting, Al-Qaysi issued a statement for the Iraqi side stressing the need for direct talks with Iran.

"The facts that emerged during the past few days indicated clearly that Iran's objective is this: it wants a truce short of attaining the full objectives of Resolution 598," Al-Qaysi said.

Iraq says a cease-fire should be declared without any preconditions.

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Management of kidney problem

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have what's called sponge kidneys. The doctors don't tell me much. I have an infection that won't clear up and a history of kidney stones. What can you tell me about this condition?

DEAR READER: Medullary sponge kidney is a congenital abnormality of the renal collecting tubes, marked by dilation of tiny passageways in the kidney. This causes poor urine flow (stasis) and a tendency to stone formation. Bleeding into the urine, renal colic and chronic infection are common complications that need treatment as they arise. No preventive or curative therapy is available. Most patients have an excellent prognosis, providing the infection and kidney stones are appropriately treated when symptoms develop.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have AIDS-related complex (ARC). Would the new drug AZT help?

DEAR READER: AZT, formerly known as zidovudine, is now marketed as Retrovir (zidovudine). The drug is very expensive and can cost up to \$10,000 for a year's supply. It may be useful in treating ARC; several ongoing studies should provide an answer within a few months.

I cannot say whether Retrovir would help your condition; this is a subject that you and your doctor should discuss.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My temperature ranges between 94 degrees and 97 degrees. My blood pressure is 170/110. I take 200 milligrams of Synthroid, plus Lasix, Corgard and K tabs. I have a problem with low sodium, potassium and chloride

levels. Why is my temperature so low?

DEAR READER: Your low body temperature is less of a potential problem than your persisting high blood pressure and mineral imbalance. A blood pressure of 170/110 is too high; it needs to be brought down to a

more normal range. This may take some alteration of your medicines, under your doctor's supervision.

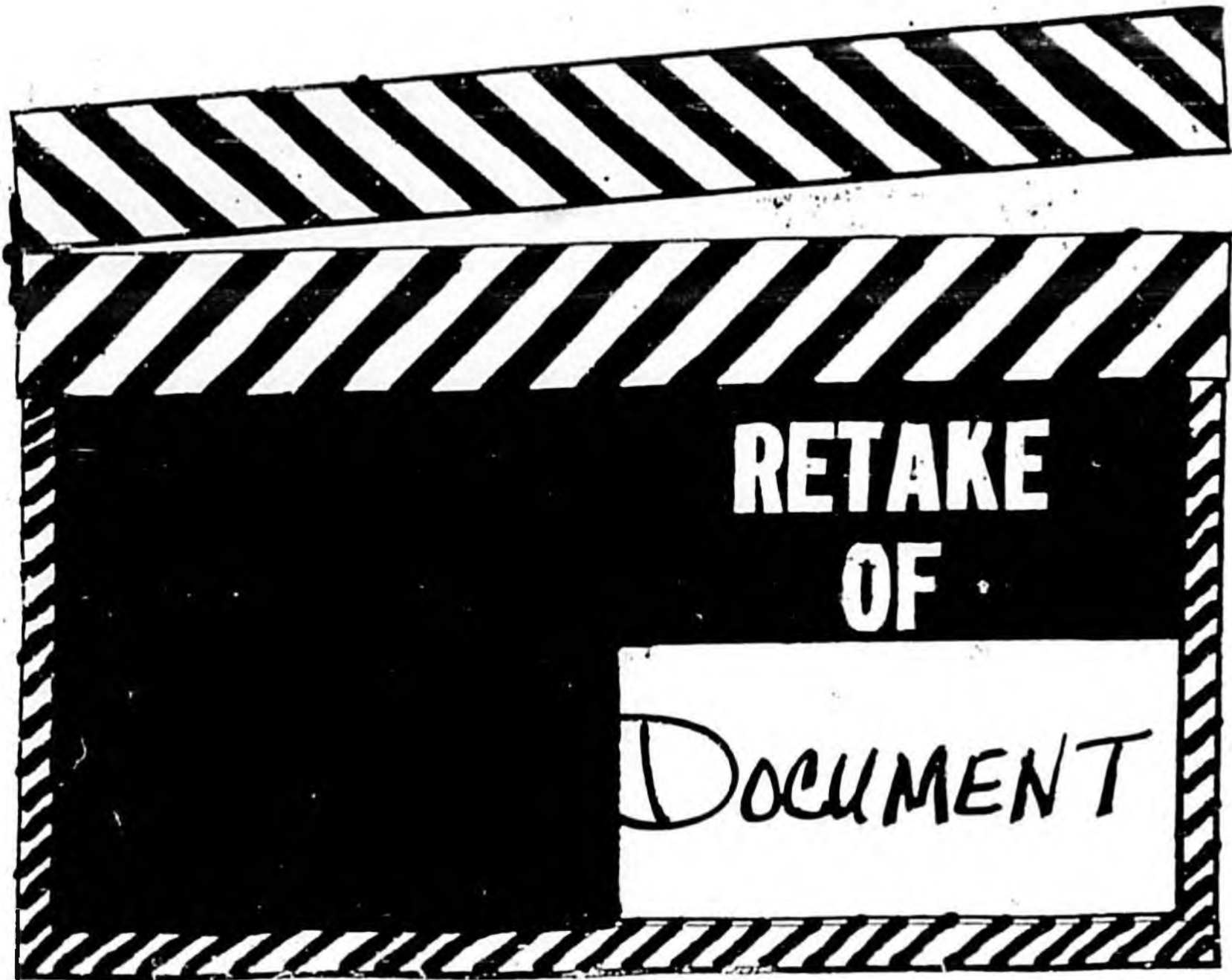












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
