SANFORD Concepts for implementation of the planned west side improvement project and the draft of the Reclaimed Water Prograin will be the main topics of discussion at the city commission. workshop session today.

The Westside Improvement Neighborhood Strategy (WINS) Propot is a redivelopment and re-Malization plan for the Goldsboro community which will include the rehabilitation and construction of low income housing.



#### Mother-in-law charged in murder plot

RIVEFVIEW - A woman who won \$5 million in a Canadian lottery four years ago, but who lost her home because of unpaid taxes, has been charged with trying to hire someone to kill her daughter-in-law, officials said

Police, acting on an anonymous tip, Saturday arrested Mary Ellen Futch, 64, after she allegedly offered an undercover agent \$5,000 to kill her son's wife. Peggy Futch, officials said.

Futch was in jail without bond Sunday on murder conspiracy charges. Hillsborough County sheriff's spokesman Jack Espinosa said

The intended victim said she was "shocked" at the idea her mother-in-law was trying to have her killed

#### Accused clinic bomber goes to trial

PENSACOLA - A man charged with intending to blow up an abortion clinic says his faith in God prompted him to back out of a plea agreement and proceed with trial.

John Brockhoeft, 37, was indicted May 26 on charges of possessing materials "designed or intended for use as a destructive device," transporting them across state lines and intending to use them to destroy the Ladies Center, the abortion clinic.

Prosecutors scheduled a hearing last week at which Brockhoeft was expected to plead guilty to two of the thee charges, but at the last minute he changed his mind. Instead, he said he wanted to help in his own defense.

Federal agents acting on a tip staked out the center and allegedly saw Brockhoeft and a local anti-abortion activist, John Burt, drive past the Ladies Center.

Brockhoeft was later arrested at a shopping center. Federal agents checked the trunk of his car and found a detonator. explosives and a 3-inch, foot-long metal pipe. They also found a map with an "X" marked on the Ladies Uniter and anti-abortion literature.

#### Two bills down, two to go

TAMPA - First, there was a \$5 million electric bill sent to a Tampa home last week. Now there's a cable television bill for more than \$1,600.

Jud! and Anthony Musicro said they were atunited when they opened their mailbox Saturday and found a bill for cable television service that seemed a bit high.

The Muskros were fairly certain they did not use \$906 worth of cable service or buy a \$750 cable converter.

Paragon Cable Company officials say they Muskros are right. The problem, it seems, was a new collection agency that sent notices to customers who did not have overdue bills

That problem, cable officials said, will be corrected and letters of apology sent to any customers who received improper

Earlier last week, Tampa Electric Co officials said a \$5 million electric bill a couple received was the result of a light pole number being used for the bill instead of a residential

Officials also said that problem was corrected. Now residents only have to worry about monthly telephone

#### Kirk blasts Gunter campaign funding

MIAMI - Former governor Claude Kirk has joined the chorus of opponents who are attacking state Insurance Commissioner. bill Gunter for accepting contributions to his U.S. Senate campaign from industries he regulates.

In a debate Saturday that featured all of the Democratic hopefuls for the U.S. Senate primary spot. Kirk said Gunter's record of accepting contributions from insurance companies and other industries should disqualify him from the Senate

Gunter said last week in response to criticism of his campaign finances that he had done nothing wrong and that his judgment never had been swayed by a contribution.

## Half of Dade candidates unopposed

MIAMI - Dade County voters will have no say in more than half of the local elections this autumn because the candidates are running unopposed, and analysis blame campaign costs and back-room deals for the lack of choice.

Three-fourths of the judicial races, half the school board races and a quarter of the races for the state Legislature are uncontested.

And in many of the contested races, voters will find lopsided contests pitting entrenched incumbents against novice opponents who are inexperienced and under-financed. The Miami-Herald reported Sunday.

Political insiders and candidates said that in order to campaign successfully, a candidate needs a vast treasury and a network of insiders, which makes expert fund-raisers and political strategists important.

# Testing fuels \$101.9 million industry

TAMPA - American schools have gone into a testing frenzy and the highest scorers are the companies that sold \$101.9 million worth of standardized tests last year to districts eager to measure their progress

Testing is big business for the handful of publishers that produce most of the standardized, multiple-choice tests used to determine everything from whether a student makes it out of kindergarten to whether he graduates from high school, the Tampa Tribune reported.

In 1977, revenues totaled \$44.6 million from the sale of nationally normed tests, the kind school districts use to compare their

students with others around the nation. Last year, revenues were a walloping \$101.9 million, a jump of 128.5 percent in a decade, according to estimates by the Association of American Publishers.

Those figures do not take into account other kinds of tests that have burgeoned during the education reform movement of

Teacher certification testing, for example, is also booming. One company, the nonprofit Educational Testing Service of Princeton, N.J., more than tripled its sale of teacher tests in the last four years, from about 98,000 in 1983-84, to nearly 302,000 last school year.

Much of the testing frenzy sp. .ngs from

the 1983 "Nation At Risk" report commissioned by the U.S. Department of Education. The report said the nation's future economic strength and security were

threatened by a falling education system. As a result, many states strengthened high school graduation requirements, made it tougher to become a teacher.

The idea was we should reveal to the public at large how well a school does against others in the school district and in other school districts," said Sen Curtis Peterson: D-Lakeland, vice-chairman of the Florida Senate education committee.

Critics claim teachers are under so much pressure to produce climbing scores that they are forced to "teach to the test."


Lorna Roll. 33, was charged with pocketing toll receipts she collected at the busy Palm Beach. Gardens exit between March 4. when she became manager, until April 2, when she was ar-

"It was the Lorda J Hoff Expressway, said Itm Valentine, a state attorney's investigator who watched Hoff as she operated.

Valentine found \$844 and 750 toll tickets in Hoff's car as she drove home April 2, although state transportation officials estimate she took nearly \$15,000 by failing to report cash collected on more than a dozen

Protests from the highway agency have so far blocked Hoff's participation in a pretrial intervention program, which was arranged by prosecutors and her public defender who cited her lack of prior record.

The program allowed Hoff to repay the \$844 and stay out of trouble for the length of the

## Higher feed prices could hurt Florida farmers

MIAMI - Florida farmers have been spared most of the direct effects of the nation's summer drought, but the accompanying increases in feed prices could hurt hog, poultry and dairy farmers and horse breeders.

The only direct effect of the drought in Florida has been in the northwest counties, where part of the cotton crop was lost. agriculture officials said

Copeland Griswold, a Santa Rosa County cotton farmer. estimated some 5,500 acres of cotton were plowed under because rainfall didn't come soon enough in the region-



# Murder investigation resumes

By SUSAN LODEN

OVIEDO -- Oviedo and Orlando police and the Seminole state aftorney's office today picked up the bungled investigation into the September discovery in Ovideo of a skulland dress believed to be that of 6 year-old-Regina Mae Armstrong kidnapped in Orlando in June 1985.

The skull was found by construction workers developing the Twin Rivers subdivision off State Road 419 on Sept. 11. 1987. That same day Oviedo police investigator Sparky Dingess and Florida Department of Law Enforcement techniclans took the skull to an anthropologist at the University of Central Florida for an

The anthropologist identified the skull as that of a girl the age of Regina, who had been dead since about the time she was kidnapped, but the find was not reported to

List week Oviedo's new police chief, Dennis Peterson, found the dress in a police department evidence locker. Peterson suspected the dress might have been Regina's The find was reported to Orlando police and Donna Armstrong, Regma's mother, identifled the dress late Friday as the one Regina was wearing on the day she disappeared.

The skull had been sent to the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C., for further study. Seminole State Attorney Norman Wolfinger said.

"The first priority is the case itself, finding the killer of Regina." Wolfinger said. Second, Wolfinger said today, is to determine how communications broke down during Oviedo's police investigation into the find, and why Orlando police were not notified promptly of the discovery.

## Animal control actions taken

Reports of accusations, criticisms, resignations and firings at the Seminole County Animal Control department have resulted in bold, aggressive remedial actions by County Administrator Ken Hooper. It would appear that changes will be for the better.

Faced with the severe problems within the department, Mr. Hooper took direct action by cutting through the lines of command and embarking on the time-tested method of communication to determine the problems. Weekly meetings with employees, which were openly candid, allowed him to see clearly the weaknesses in the department. Meetings with the department head and supervisors provided the forum to take the necessary actions to lay a foundation for efficiency and service.

By assuring employees complete protection in return for their candor, Mr. Hooper was able to get frank answers to blunt questions.

There has been no restructuring of the department, but Mr. Hooper formulated an obvious plan to utilize the existing organization: the administrator is to administer the department, supervisors are to supervise, and employees are to receive clear, concise direction in pursuit of their duties. In addition, the lines of communication are to remain open, and regular meetings are to continue.

Mr. Hooper is to be commended for his forthright actions in a problem area of the county's operation. The department had become a shambles of low morale and inefficiency. His actions have given hope to the employees. His discovery of the department's defects in organization and communication have allowed the refocusing of attention to the primary goals of animal control and service to the citizens of the county. It was a bad situation that has been turned around, and hopefully will continue to

# Rate your job


A malaise does grip the country, after all when it comes to how workers feel about their work. A new survey suggests Americans are not so happy about their jobs as Europeans and Japanese are.

Americans ranked jobs eighth in importance on a list of 10 significant aspects of their lives, while Europeans put jobs fourth and the Japanese second. Both Americans and Europeans ranked their children's education first; the Japanese gave top billing to

On that same list Americans ranked jobs seventh when asked how satisfied they were with the aspects of their lives. Europeans put jobs sixth and the Japanese fourth. All three were most satisfied with their family life.

What must one make of the poll conducted by the International Research Associates and the Roper Organization? Is the American work ethic a phenomenon of the past? We suspect that the findings reflect in part recent changes in the American workplace, where many jobs have become mindless and boring because computers have taken over the thinking.

in any event, these findings ought to concern the American business community: an unhappy or unenthusiastic work force is a less productive work foce. This week's Newsweck magazine contains an indepth article on one firm's progress in this direction. Perhaps more employers should be considering ways to give workers more control over their work - a proven strategy for increasing job satisfaction.

In a copper box will be found many mementos and documents. Among them is believed to be a memorandum of Eisenhower's candid assessment of high ranking allied officers who served with him in World War II.

# Give him chance to grow

WASHINGTON-For those who listened closely, an insight into the frame of mind and future intentions of Jesse L. Jackson came in an unpublicized moment during the Democratic National Convention in Atlanta.

A luncheon reremony was held one day at Jimmy Carter's presidential library honoring men and women who had served in Democratte administrations back to Harry Truman's day. Jackson came straight from a meeting with Michael Dukakis and Lloyd Bentsen, the two men who had denied him the place he sought on the national ticket. He had just publicly acknowledged the failure of hts 1988 ambitions, but if there was any bitterness, it did not show

In a brief talk, he paid gracious tribute to Carter and then half-jokingly recalled how he had been invited along with other black leaders to bill signing ceremonies during the Carter years for food-stamp programs and aid to black colleges "Finally," said Jackson, "I sent word: Don't invite me to any more (such). ceremonies. Invite me to a SALT II briefing, I may think it's Morton's the first time I go, but I

will learn. Give me a chance to grow That last sentence is the answer to the most repetitious question in American politics: What does Jesse want? He wants a chance to grow. And after last week's convention, every television viewer must understand what the reporters who covered Jackson all year have long known: 1988 has been a year of tremendous growth for him.

Jackson is 46, four years older than Robert F. Kennedy was when he was killed. And more. and more, Jackson reminds me of that Kennedy brother, whose rapid growth fascinated and astounded those of us who covered him 20 years ago.

Although it is forgotten now, there were many in the Sixties who thought Bob Kennedy an arrogant, ambitious, unscrupulous, "ruthless" (to use the favorite adjective of the time) little brat, full of his father's prejudices, an enemy of civil liberties who belonged where he began, as a staff investigator for Sen. Joe. McCarthy. They could not see, or accept, that during his years as attorney general and especially after his brother's death, Bob Kennedy expanded his view of the world and of his potential role in it, and became a manable to move millions, black and white, by the force of his moral vision.

So it has been with Jackson. He has traveled a much greater distance from the publichousing project in Greenville, S.C., where he grew up, and he has changed even more. Yet many who watched him in his twenties and thirties decided, as I did, that he was a slick, ambitious con man/shakedown artist, with a gift of gab but a disturbing penchant for

echoing the vocabulary of black supremacist

They could not see, or accept, the enlarged sion of the world and his role in it that Jackson gained, particularly this year, as he won increasing trust from white voters without in any way diminishing his stature and support in the black community.

Already, Jackson can claim a substantial share of credit for what New York Times columnist Anthony Lewis rightly called the remarkable "ease of feeling" between blacks and whites in the Atlanta convention. But at

49, both his growth and his contribution have a long way to

The question is where? Those who know him best, such as his able convention manager. Ron Brown, cannot see Jackson tal ng a Cabinet position to a Dukakis-Bentser administration. He needs his independence. As Jackson told his delegates the day the convention broke town, he wants to be "close enough to serve and far enough away to

challenge. But he also needs the experience of public, elective office--to understand, first-hand, how constituencies mold and constrain politicans' choices and to learn how those politicians deal with each other. Fortunately, there is such a place, an institution which cherishes, protects and greatly amplifies the voice of the independent advocate but which also teaches its members they must cooperate as professionals if they are to shape policy.

"What you have is a very moody and emotional market starting to feel a little bit better about the outlook for inflation and interest rates," said Monte Gordon, research director at Dreyfus Corp. in New York.

## Dollar inches higher; gold, silver lower

The dollar inched higher today against key foreign currencies. helped by continued demand for the U.S. currency and the mability of central banks to stop its rise. Gold was lower in early New York trading.

Last Friday, central banks, including the West German Deutsche Bundesbank and the U.S. Federal Reserve, sold dollars on the open market shortly after the market opened in New York, but the action failed to halt its rise.

No such action on the part of banks was reported in early trading in New York on Monday. In earlier trading in the Far East, the dollar rose past 133 yen to close 0.72 yen higher at

#### Eight states executed 25 inmates in 1987

WASHINGTON — Eight states executed 25 death row itimates last year for the most executions in the nation since the Supreme Court reinstated capital punishment in 1976, a Justice Department report shows

As of Dec. 1, 1987, a record 1,984 offenders were on death row in 34 states, said the Bureau of Justice Statistics, part of the Justice Department.

Of the death row prisoners, 57.4 percent were white, 41.4 percent were black. 0.8 percent were American Indian, 0.5 percent were Asian and 1.1 percent were women, said the report released Sunday. About 50 percent were 33 years and older.

In 1987, eight people were executed in Louisiana, six in Texas, five in Georgia, two in Mississippi, and one each in Alabama, Florida, Utah and Virginia

Previously, the most executions in the United States since 19.6 occurred in 1984, when 21 prisoners were put to death. Eighteen people were executed in each 1985 and 1986.

The Bureau of Justice Statistics said state courts sentenced 299 offenders to death in 1987, while 79 people were released from their death sentences.

#### Wrong turn results in 600-mile odyssey

CENTREVILLE. Ala. — For most people, a wrong turn is a headache. For Frank Collier, who had not been out of Alabama in his 74 years, it was a thrilling, 600-mile odyssey through four states, evidently better than his planned visit to a dentist.

Collier described his 17 hours of wandering as "the most

exciting thing that happened to me."
"I'm all right," Collier said Sunday by telephone from the home he shares with his mother in-law, where he was returned

by friends from his church Saturday night. "I just got off and got teat.
"It was the first I ever have been out of Alabama." he said. "I

ain't been no further than Plinningham before."

He left his bome in Centreville in his 1982 Chevrolet about 5 a.m. Friday headed for the dental appointment in Birmingham, got confused and somehow got onto interstate 65 that runs north from Mobile to Gary, Ind., through Tennessee and

Two Delaware County police officers stopped him heading west in the eastbound lane of Indiana 332 Friday night near Muncie, Ind.

#### Cool weather helps crews battle fires

Wildfires continued to burn out of control today on nearly a million and a half acres in Alaska and Montana, but crews aided by cooler weather gained a handle on blazes in Idaho, Washington and Wyoming's Yellowstone National Park.

A dozen fires have scorched more than 115,000 acres of Yellowstone in the worst fire season in the park's history, but firefighters sufficiently controlled a pair of blazes near the popular Grant Village visitor area Sunday to open the park's south entrance for the first time in more than a week.

Park Service spokesman Andrew Langford said officials planued to close the gate each night at 9 p.m. and open it again at 9 a.m. as a precaution to protect visitors from smoke and falling burned trees.

"It really depends on what the Bre does and what the weather does," Langford said. "If we get a lot of smoke and people can't see, we'll close it again until the smoke clears."

Fire Command Center apokesman Lee I sugar said that crews already had removed more than 1 000 dead tree trunks from 2 miles of road near the south entrance.

"The tourists understand our situation many have never seen the smoke columns, fire camps, helicopters" and considered them an added attraction in the park. Poague said.

Alaska has suffered the most damage from wildfires, with 49 blazes charring: 1.4 million acres. Only nine of those were.

## Producers plan to salvage fall TV season

being actively fought Sunday

LOS ANGELES — With contract talks at a standard. Hollywood producers announced plans to circumvent striking acreen writers and salvage a fall television season by recycling old scripts, looking overseas for talent and offering protection to writers who choose to cross picket lines

"We will get our productions on schedule in any way we can," Nicholas Counter, president of the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers, said Sunday. "We have no choice to do otherwise."

Counter acknowledged that some producers had plans to hire striking members of the Writers Guild of America to write shows for the fall season and would offer them legal and financial protection.

"Indemnification is an issue that has to be worked out between individual writers and the companies in olved," he said.

The last round of federally mediated bargaining between producers and the 9.000-member union collapsed Saturday without resolving differences over residual payments that have led to the crippling walkout, now in its 22nd week

Screen writers struck back Sunday by picketing two popular Los Angeles theaters showing Walt Disney Co.'s "Who Framed Roger Rabbit."

Guild spokeswoman Cheryl Rhoden said Disney was singled out because the company "held a hard line position and made it very difficult for us to move forward (in the tables).

Rhoden said plans announced Sunday at a news conference by the 200-member producers alliance to recyle old scripts with new casts or hire foreign writers will not "produce what the networks need."

## Firefighters wary of burning tank cars

ALTOONA, lowa — Firefighters were letting volatile alcohol burn for fear of explosions if they attack fires on two derailed train cars keeping 2,000 people from their homes today for the third day.

Hazardous material experts were standing by with foam and chemical retardant, to battle the blazes at the tank cars once the denatured alcohol evaporates. Polk County Sheriff's Lt. David Long said.

The overturned tank cars, originally loaded with more than 20,000 gallons of denatured alcohol, were part of two lows. Interstate Railroad freight trains that collided head on in a cornfield Saturday, killing two crewmen in the engine of the westbound train. Two employees on the eastbound train jumped to safety shortly before the crash.

"For every hour that it burns, it's burning more of the fuel off so it's lowering the size of a possible explosion." Altoona Mayor Tim Burget said "Anytime that you sit around waiting for something to happen and it doesn't you start getting confident We're getting confident nothing bad is going to happen."

The hazardous material crew was checking to make sure relief valves on the two burning tankers were working Long said. The tank cars were among 10 detailed freight cars that buckled like an accordian behind the mangled engines.

"Both relief valves are working the way they want them to,"
Long said. "They've got noise and fires coming out of both
relief valves," avoiding a buildup of pressure that could cause
the volatile denatured alcohol to explode

A team from the National Transportation Safety Board began investigating why the two trains were heading in opposite directions on the same track N1SB investigator Edward B. Dobranepski said the team will stay in Altonia for four or five days and a final report will take six to nine months to complete

# Dukakis, Bush exchange ethics barbs

WASHINGTON — Vice President George Bush says he finds Michael Dukakis's comparison of the Reagan administration leadership to a dead fish "very offensive and very tasteless" and a tactic likely to be rejected by voters.

Reacting to an opening salvo from the Democratic presidential candidate on ethics in government, Bush criticized Dukakis's weekend statement and questioned the conduct of a former alde to the Massachusetts governor.

Ethics in government is emerging as a key issue in the presidential campaign. Dukakis launched his strongest attack yet against the Reagan administration's ethics Saturday in Louisville, Ky., when he said the president is responsible for conduct because "a fish rots from the head first."

"There's an old Greek saying: 'The fish rots from the head first.' It starts at the top."

Leaving church services Sunday. Bush told the Cable News Network. "It was that very offensive and very tasteless attack on the president where he made a comparison to a dead fish, and I think the American people will reject that kind of campaign tactic."

Dukakis used a seven-state campaign swing last week to hammer repeatedly at the Reagan administration's "sleaze factor"— a Democratic campaign theme likely to haunt Bush in the coming mouths of political stumping.

"We're going to live with the consequences of the Iran-Contra scandal for a very long time." Dukakis said.

Hush, who this month will become the Republican standard-bearer in the presidential race, has been accused by critics of not speaking out in meetings with the president against a National Security Council plan to sell arms to Iran in exchange for bestages in Lebenon, then divert the profits from those sales to the Contra rebels fighting the Nicaraguan government.

But Bush was not silent on ethics Sunday, specifically mentioning a former top education adviser to Dukakls convicted of scheming to defraud the state of Massachusetts of education funds. Gerard Indelicato, 42, is serving a 2 ½ year federal sentence for conspiracy, perjury, and mail fraud.

"His (Dukakis's) chief education adviser has been indicted, has been convicted, has been sentenced and is now on his way to jail for violating the public trust," Bush told CNN.

In another development Sunday, Republican Sen. Nancy Kassebaum of Kansas said she was not interested in running as a vice presidential candidate this year.

"I don't wish to be considered." Kassebaum said on NBC's "Meet the Press."

# Group warns two candidates about inflammatory rhetoric

WASHINGTON — A bipartisan expert group on foreign policy, which is fast becoming a major issue in the presidential campaign, cautions George Bush and Michael Dukakis to avoid inflammatory rhetoric they may live to regret.

"All candidates should take special care to refrain, even at the expense of political advantage, from disparaging the career services on whom they will later need to rely for the wide conduct of the country's foreign policy," said a report released Sunday by a panel that studied the process and problems of presidential transitions.

"Some political promises which bring success in the election may produce failure in office," added the commission led by three former secretaries of state from both parties — Dean Rusk, Cyrus Vance and William Rogers. "Unwise election statements can become unwelcome legacies to the new administration and mislead foreign powers."

The commission, sponsored by the University of Virginia, first met five years ago and completed its work in 1986. However, it held the release of the report until now to make it more timely, said a university spokesman. The report mentioned no names of candidates.

Vance, who served under Democrat Jimmy Carter, and Rogers, who served under Republican Richard Nixon, were co-chairmen of the panel, which was founded by Rusk, who served under Demo-

crats John Kennedy and Lyndon Johnson Also on the commission were Harold Brown, who was secretary of defense under Carter, and Clark Clifford, who was a defense secretary under Johnson.

Foreign policy is a key flashpoint between Bush and Dukakis in their race for the White House.

The Republican vice president and his supporters have argued that Dukakis, the Democratic Massachusetts governor, has too little experience in the area, while Dukakis has attacked Bush for the Reagan administration's dealings with Panama's Gen-Manuel Antonio Noriega and for the Iran-Contra scandal

"Presidential candidates should display a special degree of caution in the number and scope of promises they make in the foreign policy field." the report read, adding that "once elected, the president-elect should carefully review campaign promises in light of all the facts then available in order to make his decisions afresh away from the pressures of the campaign."

The report also recommended that the new president should speed appointments of foreign policy officials and establish guidelines for incettings with foreign leaders during the transition.

It added that the incumbent president should offer candidates foreign policy briefings — something President Reagon has already offered to Dukakis. Bush, as a member of the administration, has access to

Doctors Sunday removed a respirator after they determined fluid in Jordan's lungs had cleared enough to allow her to breathe on her own

Hinckley Boyle quoted neurologists as saying Jordan apparently sustained no brain damage from the incident. Her doctor said she is awake and alert and smiling. She follows commands and recognizes people. "The spokeswoman said.

Doctors said Jordan, who is confined to a wheelchair, suffers from multiple sclerosis, a degenerative condition.

Kari Larsen, another hospital spokesweman, said Jordan's doctors' only complaint Sunday night was that the patient was talking too much "We're trying to keep her quiet because she's wearing an oxygen mask and when she talks she's off the oxygen."

# Official urging jail sentences for polluters

NEW YORK — The city's sanitation commissioner, faced with the continuing problem of syringes and other debris washing up on beaches, called for tougher penalties against those who dump hazardous medical waste in waterways.

Commissioner Brendan Sexton said Sunday on WABC-TV's "Eyewitness News Conference" program that violators should face long jail sentences for the legally dumping wastes in the city's waters.

But Sexton raid officials to the meantime were looking into the possibility of charging violaters who illegally dump blood vials and syringes in the water with reckless endangerment.

"We have some public health statutes we know are violated but they weren't meant to get someone a 15-year sentence" Sexton said.

What is the right penalty for someone who puts a vial of AIDS-contaminated blood or hepatitis contaminated blood on a beach where children plou? I don't know if a public health violation is all you want to charge them with. The commissioner said

Sexton announced charges Saturday against Muhammad Wastin Pasha, 36, of Queens, manager of the Mideast Medical Center in Harlem. He was accused of illegally disposing potentially infectious waste in improper containers.

Some of the waste may have gotten into the water and some of it was found not too far from the Barlem site, he said

Pasha was charged with two counts of willful violation of city health laws, which are misdemeanors carrying a maximum penalty of a year in jail and a \$200 fine on each count

Meanwhile, an investigation of several other unnamed firms suspected of the illegal dumping was continuing and more charges were expected. Sextonsaid.

"They have quite clearly and consciously", been disposing of the stuff in a way where they didn't know where it ended up." Sexton said of the other oftend-

#### Carlucci arrives in Moscow

MOSCOW - Defense Secretary Frank Carlucet arrived in the Soviet Union today for a four-day tour that will give him a rare look at military installations and units that until recently were off limits to all foreigners, U.S. officials said

Carlucci flew to Moscow from Helsinki. Finland, for a tour that will include an address at the Soviet general staff academy and visits to an air base and an army division near Moscow and a naval base in the Crimea.

He was met at Sheremtyevo Airport by U.S. Ambassador Jack Matlock and Soviet Defense Minister and army chief of staff Dmitri Yazov, the official Tass news agency said.

Following his arrival, Carlucci was to lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier near the Kremlin and then hold two hours of talks with Yazov at the Defense Ministry. He was then scheduled to visit the general staff military academy, named after Mikhail Frunze, the first Red Army chief of staff Carlucci told reporters at the airport he was confident his

unprecedented itinerary will be carried out in its entirety. He will be shown equipment and personnel that would have beca impossible a couple of years ago to have been shown to or / foreigner - jet alone a secretary of defense," a U.S. official scow said of Carlucci's schedule.

The unprecedented adjournment may mart a mejor or back for economists who have urged the government to speed up changes and could herald a slow down in the ambittous capitalist-style reforms that Deng launched nine years ago-

#### Police break up Polish demonstration

WARSAW, Poland - Police used truncheous to break up an anti-Soviet demonstration by some 200 people trying to march in memory of the more than 200,000 Poles killed in the 1944 Warsaw uprising against the Nazis.

At least three people were arrested in the demonstration Sunday by the protesters who questioned why the Soviet army never came to the rescue of Poles when the Nazis razed Warsaw in retaliation for the uprising

Later, police allowed one activist, historian Wojciech Ztembinski, to lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. As about 300 people looked on, he demanded the withdrawal of Soviet troops from Poland-

"We want the return of the Polish territories robbed from us and the withdrawal of the troops by the neighboring power,"

# Hussein opens door for PLO

JERUSALEM - King Hussein's decision to partially cut ties with the occupied West Bank leaves thousands of Palestinians without a clear picture of what the Jordanian king will do next. but opens the door wider to the PLO in the

"Jordan is not Palestine," Hussein said Sunday, indicating that he no longer has designs on trying to retake the West Bank. "The independent Palestinian state will be on the occupied Palestinian soil.

But Hussein, during a 30-minute speech broadcast on radio and television and monitored in Jerusalem, affirmed Jordan's role as a "confrontation state" and said Amman "will not renounce its commitment to participate in peace

Hussein is telling the Palestinians that they must manage on their own," Israelt Foreign Minister Shimon Peres told Israeli Television

Jordan and the Israeli-occupied territory forged when the East Bank and West Bank of the Jordan River united after the 1948 Arab Israeli war - were never meant to interfere with the creation of an independent Palestinian state. Hussein said

"We respect the wish of the Palestine Liberation Organization, the sole legitimate representative of the Palestinian people, to secede from us in an independent Palestinian state," said Hussein. whose Hashemite kingdom ruled the West Bank for 19 years before Israel gained control during the 1967 Six Day War.

Palestinians and Israeli officials characterized Hussein's remarks as opening the door to the PLO. for a greater financial and administrative role in



# Schrader slingshots to Talladega title

TALLADEGA. Ala - With the first three cars involved in a bumping match at the start of the final lap, K in Schrader calmly took the rath of least resistance and shot by his competitors to earn the first victory of his career Sunday in the Talladega 500.

Schrader, who had gone 107 races without a win on the Winston Cup circuit, was infourth place at the start of the final lap at Alabama International Motor Speedway, trailing Dale Earnhardt, Geoff Bodine, and Sterling Marlin.

Marlin was on the high side of the race track and passed Bodine, then tried to get around Earnhardt, who had led the previous 24 laps. But Maritn's car banged into Earnhardt, and their cars hindered Bodine. Meanwhile. Schrader seemed to come from nowhere and shot his Folgers Chevrolet around the high side. of the track to grab the lead

coming out of turn two. Schrader, who was second in the last Winston Cup race two weeks ago at Pocono. Pa.. and who finished fifth at Talladega in May, held the lead the rest of the way. Bodine, Earnhardt, and Wilson crossed the finish line together behind Schrader.



Ken Schrader drove the Folgers Chevrolet through a tight pack in the late going Sunday

and came away the Taliadega 500 title, his first major NASCAR victory.

"It feels good," said Schrader, 33, a native of Fenton, Mo., who earned \$67,920. "We hadn't had all that bad a year. We got started a little slow, but we've been racking up points. We felt if we kept chasing after those points and running as hard as we could, a win would come

sooner or later. "I knew from other forms of racing that first one is the toughest to get."

Bodine finished second in a

Chevrolet, one car length behind Schrader, followed by Earnhardt in a Chevrolet, Wilson in an Oldsmobile. Rusty Wallace in a Pontiac. and Marlin in an Oldsmobile. The race was the final one of the year in which cars were fitted with carburetor restrictor plates designed to reduce speeds.

After Darrell Waltrip, the polesitter who led 115 of the 188 laps, dropped out with 25 laps left with ignition trouble,

Earnhardt inherited the lead and he and Bodine ran 1-2 until the final lap. That is when the action started.

"It got pretty exciting out there on the last lap," said Marlin, who was bidding for his first Winston Cup win. Every man for himself."

But Schrader, a former dirt and sprint car champion and the 1985 rookie of the year. was the only driver who came out unscathed.

"We just trucked around on

op," Schrader said. "I followed Sterling, but when he cut down in (turn) one, I didn't follow him. It turned out OK."

Schrader averaged 154,491 mph on the 2.66-mile superspeedway, and the race took 3:14.13. There were 30 lead changes among 14 drivers and a record 19 cars

finished on the lead lap. Earnhardt, who was trying to become the first driver to win the race three times. appeared to be in perfect position at the start of the last

"I don't know what Sterling was doing," Earnhardt said. "He hit me four or five times - I thought he was going to spin me out. Geoff was trying to keep the 44 car (Marlin) behind, then the 44 got rough with me. They all got to racing each other and forgot about winning the race. I was in the wrong place at the wrong time.

Treckon Earnhardt did not forgot about the incident with Marlin. and banged into his car on the cool down lap.

It was announced during the race that Bobby Allison had been released from Lehigh Valley Medical Center in Allentown, Pa., and would continue to undergo physical therapy at Lakeshore Rehabilitation Complix.

# Airline industry disputes claims of discrimination against blacks

## Committee report cites United, American, TWA

United Press International

WASHINGTON - The airline industry disputes allegations by a House committee that says airlines discriminate against blacks in hiring pilots, senior managers and applicants for other professional positions.

An industry spokesman denied the House Committee on Government Operations' accusations, contained in a report released Sunday.

The entire airline industry is totally committed to full equal employment for everyone." said Stephen Hayes of the Air Transport Association, an industry trade group. "Secondly, in the areas of mechanics and pilots, the demand is so great that if anyone is qualified, they're going to get bired."

The committee said most blacks hold lowpaying Jobs at airlines, while few blacks work in advanced positions The panel said United Airlines, American Airlines and Trans World Airlines are the worst offenders.

The industry pattern is one in which blacks continue to be overrepresented in low-wage. semiskilled and unskilled positions, and continue to be underrepresented in positions requiring advanced education, specialized training and skill," the committee said.

The committee's report said qualified black pilots in particular have had trouble getting jobs with airlines and blamed the discrimination partly on an "old boy" network that favors hiring white men-

Fewer than 200 black pilots work in an industry that has 45,000 pilots, the report said Black pilots known to be qualified are being dented employment for unexplained reasons," it said

The committee said airlines have moved much more quickly to hire white women for proressional positions than blacks, although women

The report singled out United, American and TWA as the worst examples of discrimination. saying blacks at those airlines hold 15 percent of the unskilled positions but only about 2 percent of the professional positions.

United and TWA have operated for the past decade under court orders to stop discrimination, but progress in meeting their goals has been slow, It said.

The committee said that despite United management's claims that it has made "significant" progress in hiring blacks for white-collar positions - bringing representation up to 10 percent in 1986 - "United's overall performance has been cyclical, lacking consistency and continuity.

Only two blacks have reached the rank of vice president in United a history," it said.

A United spokesman, who declined to be (dentified, insisted the airline had a good record of hirting infinerities but said "there still is room for Improvement.

Regarding the hiring of minority pilots, we have a program under way that is on track," the spokesman said. "We will continue to select and truin pilots based on our No. 1 priority — safety."

The committee said TWA has failed to meet a goal, set in a 1977 conciliation agreement with the Transportation Department, of hiring minorities for 25 percent of its positions and 12 percent of its professional positions.

The airline has falled "to use its 'best efforts' to achieve the goals set forth in those agreements." the report said.

TWA officials did not respond to requests for comment on the report

The committee said American Airlines had done an exceptional Job of increasing the number of women in its workforce, especially in pro-Inssioual positions.

But the report said the airline had increased the number of blacks in professional positions from 1.4 percent in 1978 to only 1.9 percent in 1986.
