Sheriff's Office dangles 'bait' for auto thieves

SANFORD - Auto thieves beware: that car you're trying to boost may be the bait officers are using to catch you in the act.

The City-County Auto Theft Bureau is launching an high-tech initiative to reduce the incidents of auto theft in Seminole.

Traditional surveillance techniques required officers to "stake out" a car in hopes of nabbing a thief as he tried to steal the vehicle. Such tactics are labor intensive and sometimes yield few arrests.

The new initiative implemented by the Auto Theft Bureau involves the use of bait vehicles that require only passive monitor-ing, which means law enforcement no

longer has to sit on a bait vehicle and keep it company will contact either the Seminole under physical surveillance.

"It cuts down on the overtime for deputies," said Steve Olson, public informa-tion officer for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. "You just park the bait car in an area and then let it do it's thing."

The passive monitoring is done with the aid of global positioning equipment manu-factured by Stat Security. The vehicle is monitored, by satellite, by a firm in California. If the vehicle is tampered with, the monitoring County Sheriff's Office Communications Center, or the on-duty auto theft investigator, or both.

Upon command, the firm in California can shut off the car, and lock the doors, trapping the suspect inside. Auto theft investigators can also shut off the car, and lock the doors with a hand-heid device, if they choose to do physical surveillance. The suspect is also videotaped inside the vehicle by a small, hidden camera.

"This technology is used a lot on the West Coast," Olson said. "I believe we may be the first in the region, if not the state, to use this system.

The bait cars are placed in areas of the county where, numbers indicate, auto theft is a problem. The vehicles can now be left in an area for days. Deputies and local police are notified that the passive bait car is placed in their area. Upon the cue from the communications center that the car is being tampered with, law enforcement can respond to the scene to make an arrest.

At about \$1,000, the new passive monitoring devices also cost less than some of the other units that have been used in the past, some of which cost about \$5,000.

Before making your next trip to the post office to pur-chase stamps, check your garage and closets for plas-tic mail-storage tubs that are property of the U.S. Postal Service.

Although the tubs are convenient for storage purposes, the post office is asking that you return the tubs as soon as possible. The tubs cost \$3.25 and the group doesn't want to purchase another supply of them. These bins are used by the postal arrvice to sort process and deliver mail. Two years ago, the U.S. Postal Service had 20 million of the mail tubs. Today, they're down to only 20,000. Each tub is about a foot tail 16 inches long by 13.

"I was there to give volunteers insight into the air potato plant," explained Lichtenheid, lead tech in the Seminole County Public Engineering Department. "That way, when they go home they will pick them up instead of just kicking them back into the woods where they creates more of a nuisance.

The air potato plant (dioscorea buibifera) is an exotic vine that thrives in Florida. Known as the kudzu of Sunshine State, the vine grows quickly and covers Florida's native vegetation. With its thick vine and broad leaves, the air potato prohibits the native plant it covers from undergoing photosynthesis, resulting in its death.

"It kills out all kinds of native vegetation and is bad for our wildlife," said Raub. "The air potato has little or no value to our wildlife. It can be toxic and it lan't a natural or native food source for them."

SANFORD - It's good to be royalty, just ask Sandy Swain or Paul Osborne. Swain and Osborne were crowned Queen Divine and King Rex at the Sanford Chamber of Commerce Mardi Gras Ball Friday night after raising about \$15,200 for the chamber.

"My feet haven't touched the ground yet," Swain said. "I had such a great time meeting a lot of people and raising money for the chamber of commerce." The rules for earning the crown of

Queen Divine and King Rex are simple: the woman and man who raise the most money wear the crown. Swain, who represented Headliners Salon and raised \$5,200, eked out a victory over Diane Crews of the Orlando Sanford International Airport. Crews raised about \$5,100.

The title for King Rex was not as close. Paul Osborne of Venture One Properties raised more than \$10,000, almost triple that of his closest competitor, Prank Wolfe of Wolfy's on the River.

Eternal Reefs enhances ocean environment while paying tribute to loved ones

It's an intriguing new alternative to cremation urns and ash scattering. It's also a means for enhancing the ocean environment.

The root of this idea comes from the formation of Reef Ball

OCALA — Seminole Community College's Mid-Florida Conference men's basketball title hopes are alive and well thanks to its two most

The win pushed the Raiders' victory total to the magical 20 win plateau, against just eight losses, but more importantly moved the locals into third place in the Mid-Florida Conference with a 5-3 record, just a game behind co-leaders Florida Community College at Jacksonville and Santa Fe Community College.

SCC now has the chance to at least tie for the conference championship as it must travel to Jacksonville to face FCC-J tonight (Wednesday) and then hosts Santa Fe in the Raiders' final home game on Saturday.

Both games will be the nightcap to a womenmen doubleheader, with the women tipping off at 6 p.m. and the men set to take the court at 8 p.m. Admission is free.

SCC led by 12 points, 41-29, at halftime but with 24 seconds to go in the game, the score was tied at 69-69 with the Raiders in possession. But CFCC's Greg Boyd got a steal and lay-up to make the score 71-69 in favor of the Patriots.




