## Post Office searching for missing tubs

Before making your next trip to the post office to purchase stamps, check your garage and closets for plastic mail-storage tubs that are property of the U.S. Postal Service.

Although the tubs are convenient for storage purposes, the post office is asking that you return the tubs as soon as possible. The tubs cost \$3.25 and the group doesn't want to purchase another supply of them.

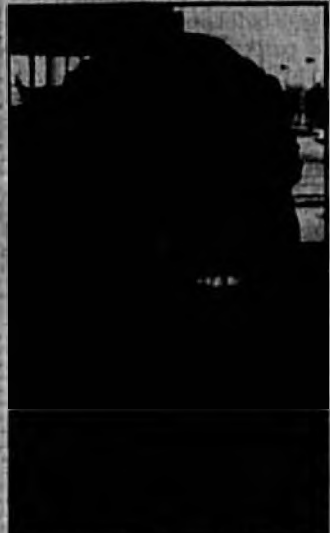
These bins are used by the postal service to sort, process and deliver mail. Two years ago, the U.S. Postal Service had 20 million of the mail tubs. Today, they're down to only 20,000.

Each tub is about a foot tall, 18-inches long by 13-inches wide, with the words "U.S. Mail" printed on them.

If you have one, you know what they look like. But, what you may not know, is that it is illegal to have them. In fact, the side of the tub states if you steal a tub you will be prosecuted.

As an incentive for people to return the tubs immediately, the postal service is offering amnesty to anyone who returns a tub. You may bring them to a local postal office or leave them for letter carriers to collect.

# Sheriff's Office dangles 'bait' for auto thieves

SANFORD — Auto thieves beware: that car you're trying to boost may be the bait officers are using to catch you in the act.

The City-County Auto Theft Bureau is launching a high-tech initiative to reduce the incidents of auto theft in Seminole.

Traditional surveillance techniques required officers to "stake out" a car in hopes of nabbing a thief as he tried to steal the vehicle. Such tactics are labor intensive and sometimes yield few arrests.

The new initiative implemented by the Auto Theft Bureau involves the use of bait vehicles that require only passive monitoring, which means law enforcement no longer has to sit on a bait vehicle and keep it under physical surveillance.

## Monitoring system shuts off car, locks doors if someone tampers with vehicle

"It cuts down on the overtime for deputies," said Steve Olson, public information officer for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. "You just park the bait car in an area and then let it do its thing."

The passive monitoring is done with the aid of global positioning equipment manufactured by Stat Security. The vehicle is monitored, by satellite, by a firm in California. If the vehicle is tampered with, the monitoring

company will contact either the Seminole County Sheriff's Office Communications Center, or the on-duty auto theft investigator, or both.

Upon command, the firm in California can shut off the car, and lock the doors, trapping the suspect inside. Auto theft investigators can also shut off the car, and lock the doors with a hand-held device, if they choose to do physical surveillance. The suspect is also videotaped inside the vehicle by a small, hidden camera.

"This technology is used a lot on the West Coast," Olson said. "I believe we may be the first in the region, if not the state, to use this system."

The bait cars are placed in areas of the county where, numbers indicate, auto theft is a problem. The vehicles can now be left in an area for days. Deputies and local police are notified that the passive bait car is placed in their area. Upon the cue from the communications center that the car is being tampered with, law enforcement can respond to the scene to make an arrest.

At about \$1,000, the new passive monitoring devices also cost less than some of the other units that have been used in the past, some of which cost about \$5,000.

## Air potatoes get the ax in Longwood

LONGWOOD — Volunteers recently removed nearly two tons of exotic air potato plants from the Spring Hammock Preserve near Longwood as part of the Seminole County Natural Lands Program.

More than 150 volunteers, including students, parents, local boy and girl scout troops and 4-H clubs, worked to remove air potato plants at the preserve during the three-hour event known as the Air Potato Raid.

"The event was very successful," said Amy Raub, volunteer program manager of the Seminole County Natural Lands Program. "It was a good family event as well — a place where people were in a positive atmosphere and making a difference."

The Natural Lands Program was devised in November of 1990 to preserve environmentally significant land in Seminole County and help eradicate non-native, invasive plants, including the air potato plant, that currently exist in the area.

According to Mark Lichtenheld, who portrayed Seminole Jones, the Air Potato Raid's master of ceremony, another important component of the Natural Lands Program is to educate the general public on environmental issues.

"I was there to give volunteers insight into the air potato plant," explained Lichtenheld, lead tech in the Seminole County Public Engineering Department. "That way, when they go home they will pick them up instead of just kicking them back into the woods where they create more of a nuisance."

The air potato plant (*dioscorea bulbifera*) is an exotic vine that thrives in Florida. Known as the kudzu of Sunshine State, the vine grows quickly and covers Florida's native vegetation. With its thick vine and broad leaves, the air potato prohibits the native plant it covers from undergoing photosynthesis, resulting in its death.

"It kills out all kinds of native vegetation and is bad for our wildlife," said Raub. "The air potato has little or no value to our wildlife. It can be toxic and it isn't a natural or native food source for them."

According to University of

## Chamber Mardi Gras event raises \$25,000

SANFORD — It's good to be royalty, just ask Sandy Swain or Paul Osborne.

Swain and Osborne were crowned Queen Divine and King Rex at the Sanford Chamber of Commerce Mardi Gras Ball Friday night after raising about \$15,200 for the chamber.

"My feet haven't touched the ground yet," Swain said. "I had such a great time meeting a lot of people and raising money for the chamber of commerce."

The rules for earning the crown of Queen Divine and King Rex are simple: the woman and man who raise the most money wear the crown. Swain, who represented Headliners Salon and raised \$5,200, eked out a victory over Diane Crews of the Orlando Sanford International Airport. Crews raised about \$5,100.

The title for King Rex was not as close. Paul Osborne of Venture One Properties raised more than \$10,000, almost triple that of his closest competitor, Frank Wolfe of Wolfy's on the River.

## Children to dig up dirt at City Hall

LAKE MARY — Amateur archeologists will set up shop next month in front of City Hall.

This year's Olde Lake Mary Days, which is scheduled for Saturday, March 1, will include a hands on archeological area for children. Budding fossil hunters will have the opportunity to search for fossils and other prehistoric items during the daylong activities.

"We're really excited about this year's children's area," said Peggy Wolfe, chairperson for Olde Lake Mary Days. "Its theme is 'Dig Into The Past,' and will include various fun and educational activities."

Along with fossil hunting, other children's activities include a treasure pit for children 5 and younger, games, arts and crafts with historical themes and a dinosaur bounce house. Children will be given an activity passport to take to each station, where it will be stamped, Wolfe said. If they participate in each activity, they will receive a goodie bag before leaving the festival.

"Of course, children who are too young to participate in all of the activities will still receive a stamp," Wolfe said.

Cost for the fossil hunting activity is \$1, while all other children's activities are free.

There will also be plenty of entertainment and activities for adults during the 10th annual event. The Taloko Indian Dancers will once again be appearing at Olde Lake Mary Days, with performances scheduled for 11 a.m., 1 p.m. and 3 p.m. Civil War reenactors will also be on hand, with battles between the 3rd Rhode Island Artillery Battery "3" and the 37th Alabama Company H scheduled throughout the day. Civil War Surgeon John Higgins will show visitors the medical instruments and tools used to treat wounded soldiers during the period, while author James L. Head will relay stories about the war.

Other living history demonstrations planned for the day include a Seminole Indian Encampment by Terrell and Molly Hendrix, an early Florida Indian camp and flintknapping demonstration by David White Wolfe and Native American education and music presented by Dale Lindsley and Leo McCloe.

## Eternal Reefs enhances ocean environment while paying tribute to loved ones

Mary Gavene, mother of 32-year Sanford resident Charles Thomas, had just two requests about what to do with her remains after her death: First, she wanted to be cremated; second, she wanted to be laid to rest with her late husband, and Thomas' stepfather, Edward.

Where to spread those ashes was another matter, at least until she read about Eternal Reefs

memorial reef balls.

"She didn't want a burial plot, didn't want anyone to have to visit," Thomas said. "Three years ago she read an article in the Orlando Sentinel about Eternal Reefs and she decided that's where she wanted to go."

What is a memorial reef ball? It's an intriguing new alternative to cremation urns and ash scattering. It's also a means for enhancing the ocean environment.

The root of this idea comes from the formation of Reef Ball

Development Group Ltd. in the early 1990s. Don Brawley and Todd Barber, two college roommates in Georgia who enjoyed scuba diving, became concerned over the decaying of natural reef formations. As a means of helping repair this decline, they patented a mold system that uses a concrete mixture to form artificial reef formations that are placed in the ocean. Soon the two had a worldwide corporation and by 2000 had placed over 1,000 reefs.

But a reef they cast on May 1,

1998, had a little something different about it. Before his passing, Brawley's father-in-law, Carleton Glen Palmer, had a request for his son-in-law.

"He said 'You know Don, I got a favor to ask,'" Brawley said. "He said when he passed away he wanted to be laid to rest in one of those reefs we built. He said 'I can think of nothing better than having all that action going on around me all the time after I'm gone.'"

Palmer died soon after and this favor came to fruition within that

forementioned reef. Brawley never imagined such a thing would lead to so much more, though he found out different very quickly.

"When I told them, everybody was like 'Wow, that's neat. Can you do that for other people?'" Brawley said.

With that Eternal Reefs was born. Using what Brawley referred to as a casting process, the Atlanta-based company mixes the cremat

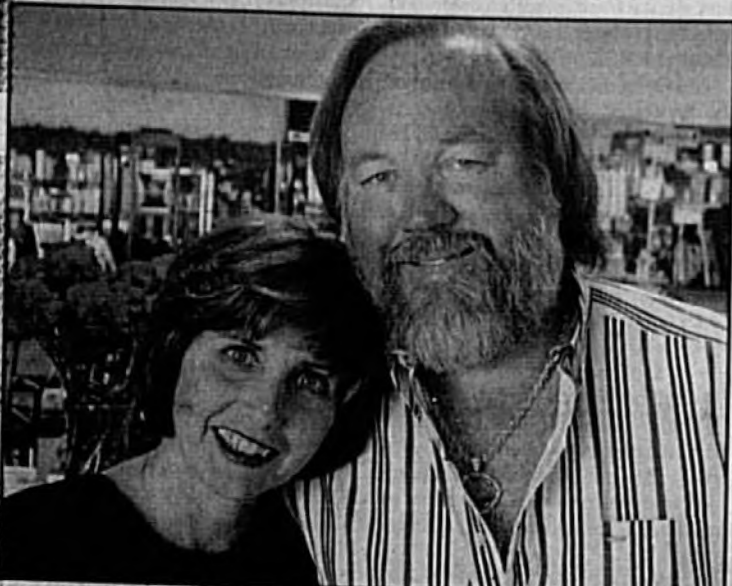

but I would have to say it was a lot of fun," Osborne said shortly after being crowned.

Together, all eight candidates for king and queen raised more than \$29,000, double the goal chamber president Angelia Gordon had hoped. In addition, the day-long Mardi Gras celebration on Saturday, helped pad the chamber's coffers.

"Friday and Saturday exceed our expectations," Gordon said. "Both financially and in the number of people who attended, we did better than we expected."

Revenue is still coming in, Gordon said, and the chamber should net about \$25,000.

"All of our bills come to about \$30,000," she said. "All but a couple of those have been paid. Our income from the queens and kings, the sponsorships and the Mardi Gras store was about \$55,000. Chamber officials are already making plans for next year's Mardi Gras. Though there were only a handful of minor glitches, Gordon said her organization began planning for the event about six weeks ahead of time.

"Next year's Mardi Gras we're beginning six months ahead," she said.

Florida, Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (UF/IFAS), the air potato plant was introduced into the United States from West Africa during the slave trade.

Native to Asia, the plant was found throughout Florida by 1905 and was eventually recognized as a pest plant during the 1970s. In 1993, the plant was named to the Florida Exotic Pest Plant Council as one of Florida's most invasive plant species.

The Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services placed the air potato plant on the Florida Noxious Weed List in 1999 making it illegal to own the plant without a permit.

"Because each air potato plant can produce up to 300 aerial tubers, or potato-like growths or seeds, which fall to the ground and start new plants, the propagation rate is extremely high," said

Lichtenheld.

For this reason, Raub says, the Air Potato Raid will not completely eradicate the exotic plant at the Spring Hammock Preserve.

"We must have continued support of these types of events to help protect our natural areas for the future," she said. "It will take several years to get a handle on the problem."

Members of the Natural Lands Program hope to make the Air Potato Raid an annual event.

ed remains with water and the concrete mixture to form the memorial reefs. They then place a plaque on the memorial and invite family members of the deceased to leave handprints in the concrete so they "can hold hands for eternity." They also encourage other things such as using sidewalk chalk to write messages on the memorial.

Then at the proper time the memorials are put on placements vessels while the families are taken to the placement site on charter boats. Placement locations are in Sarasota, Pensacola, Charleston, S.C. and South Padre Island, Tx. The families can place flowers over the site and are given a memorial certificate with the longitude, latitude and GPS readings.

Brawley said that they have 150 memorials in the water currently, but are hoping to double that this year.

Charles Thomas' parents will be laid to rest in early June in Sarasota. This type of burial provides an option to those who are unsure of what to do with loved ones' remains, and it also creates a habitat for fish and smaller buds of life.

"It's good for people as far as closure," Brawley said. "We take so much from the ocean, this is a way of giving something back."

The Lions already led by 60 points when the finals began and put nine wrestlers in the finals, winning seven classes, to easily claim the trophy with a total score of 223.5 points.

Oviedo, which will send 12 of its 14 wrestlers to regionals, was followed by Winter Springs (146.5), Pine Ridge (117.5), Lake Mary (111), Lake Brantley (80.5), Seminole (67), DeLand (57) and Deltona (51).

The Bears had four individual champions and Lake Brantley one, giving the Seminole Athletic Conference 12 champions in the 14 weight classes.

Oviedo was not the only local schools to claim a district title on Saturday as five other girls' basketball teams also went after trophies.

The most surprising result probably came at Winter Springs High School where the host Bears won yet another district title despite having a losing record in the regular season.

What was surprising was the ease with which Winter Springs (13-16) won the title, coasting

past Lake Howell (19-13), 40-18.

It was not until the fourth quarter that the Silver Hawks, who were held to one point in the third period, could match the Bears' first quarter point total of 14.

Junior Sara Nuxol hit three three-pointers and was the only player to score in double figures in the game, tossing in 14 for the winner's. She also handed out five assists, while Brittany Walters pulled down seven rebounds. Marci Romitelli led Lake Howell with six points.

Winter Springs will be at home on Thursday to host New Smyrna Beach (18-8) and former Oviedo assistant Ray Ridenour, while the Silver Hawks will travel to Deltona to face state-ranked Pine Ridge (23-4). Both games are set to begin at 7:30 p.m.

Angela Guiu led Trinity Prep with 12 points, while Erin Kirkwood was also in double figures with 10.

The Saints will hit the road on Thursday, playing at Melbourne Central Catholic (28-2) starting at 7:30 p.m.

The final game involving county teams found The Master's Academy using a huge first half advantage to roll past host Orangewood Christian, 56-30, in the Class A-District 6 final.

Whitney Porter scored 16 points and Stephanie Nichols had 14 points and 10 rebounds as the Eagles (22-3) built a 27-10 halftime lead and never looked back.

Former Lake Howell standout Abby Kohn, the daughter of Lake Howell boys' coach Steve Kohn, added 10 points and six assists for Master's. Orangewood Christian (19-7) was led by Jenna Brunswick, who finished with 19 points.
