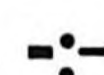
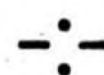

BENEFIT FROM THE FREEZE We remember the old saying: "There is no wind that does not blow some one good." It may seem strange that this may apply even to a freeze. Still it is true.

It is a well known biological fact that insect and plant disease pests increase in numbers and kinds in direct proportion as we approach the Equator. This is due, of course, almost entirely to mild weather conditions.

We Floridians notice this difference in the extreme limits of latitude in our own state in a very marked, though limited manner.

Cold is always considered one of the most important natural checks to insect and plant diseases of economic importance to the agriculturist or horticulturist, and this is especially true when the cold comes very late in the season, or when the cold is immediately preceded by a rather long period of warm, growing weather.

These conditions were exactly fulfilled at the period of the recent freeze South Florida experienced, and there can hardly be any grounds for doubt but that great numbers of insect pests in all the stages, including eggs, of our citrus and truck crops, were killed through the effects of the unusual cold.

Due to the very mild weather immediately preceding the freeze, there is great probability that very few of these pests were in the dormant or resting stage and therefore that full crops may result.

It is the opinion of the writer, that if this be true, and there are good grounds to believe it is, in the writer's opinion, the very best advice to the grower of both citrus and truck crops would be to keep a close watch on the crops.

and we have never had a crop destroyed by any worse than a severe frost or other pests. But we defy any one to predict the future of Florida's future agricultural and allied products with much accuracy.

The occasion for alluding to this editorial prophecy came after our most recent cold wave. In its prophecy, the Times-Union gave a great opportunity in cassava. Nothing has materialized from this; it also predicted that Florida would become a great sugar producing state.

We have to admit that this prophecy hasn't been fulfilled but we confidently believe that the next decade will go far toward its development. Yesterday the Reporter-Star printed an item that one firm was to plant a thousand acres of the Everglades in cane. A week ago we made editorial allusion to the excellent syrup manufactured by the New Eden Plantation Co., of Osceola county.

We understand it is the purpose of the company to go in for sugar on a large scale. Many years ago Capt. R. E. Rose manufactured sugar successfully for a company at St. Cloud on the first of the lands reclaimed by Everglades drainage—this was the Disston drainage scheme. The New Eden Plantation is situated in the same vicinity. These are pointed out as encouraging signs.

But another industry which is destined to free the state from the fear of frost is looming large against the agricultural and industrial horizon—that of cattle and stock raising. We have before us a commercial letter sent out by a Jacksonville firm asking for stock and offering a ready market. Pigs are quoted as showing considerable strength with advance on good grades of twenty-five cents.

Sheep are quoted "receipts light; demand active; prices firm." Goats, "light receipts; fat stock will bring around top prices. We advise shipping in goats as soon as they are fat." And so it goes through the

USELESS FEAR OF BACTERIA

Authority Says People Are Allowing Themselves to Be Needlessly Worried Over the Subject.

To timid individuals a recent article in the Journal of the American Medical Association on "Bacteria on Paper Money and Books" may bring comfort.

We showed that the postmaster general of Great Britain had the mouthpieces on the telephone under his control examined bacteriologically with the result of no disease germs being discovered upon them.

PERFECTION SLOW TO COME

Evolution of Photography a Matter of Many Years and the Work of Many Minds.

The distinction of making the first chemical step in the history of photography belongs to Italy, owing to the discovery by a chemist of the sixteenth century that nitrate chloride of silver is blackened on exposure to light while the foundation of photographic optics was laid by Della Porta in his invention about 1540 of the camera obscura; i. e., the darkening of nitrate of silver by light.

Experiments in 1777 by Scheele, a Swedish chemist, and by Ritter of Jena in 1801, in the action of rays of light upon horn silver, carried the science a step further. But to Thomas Wedgwood of England belongs the honor of having been the first to produce photographs by the action of light on a sensitive surface produced by nitrate of silver, his researches being much aided by the observations of Sir Humphrey Davy. These photographs were made in 1802.

Twelve years later Nicéphore Niepce, of Chalon-sur-Saône was the first to produce a permanent photograph by the process of heliography consisting in coating a glass plate with bitumen of asphalt and exposing it to light.

The heliography, which did not see the light of day, was produced about 1820 by Nicéphore and Niepce. For more than twenty years the Journal of the American Medical Association has published descriptions of which have been found in the papers of Samuel Lower, Dickens, Thackeray and Henry Hall in various ways. W. H. ...

They are striking figures that the Bureau of Education gives in its report on the schooling of the American people. They show that the percentage of the population that are in school, other than pupils of our schools, is as follows: In Germany, the country that ranks next to the United States in the scope of its educational equipment, 29 per cent of the population are in school; in Great Britain, 19 per cent; in France, 17 per cent.

Material for Shoes.

For shoes what will come after leather? Cloth of suitable kinds may be used and rubber or similar material may enter into the product, but manufacturers seem to look most hopefully upon paper as the basic substance.

Paper leather of attractive appearance, adapted for many purposes as well as the natural leather, is, in fact, said to be satisfactorily made already. In a German process, paper of long fiber is converted into pulp, suitably colored, made flexible with glycerine and non-drying oils and waterproofed with shellac solution given the grain of morocco or other leather by pressing in a matrix and finished with lacquer. The matrix is formed by taking an impression of the natural leather in shellac.

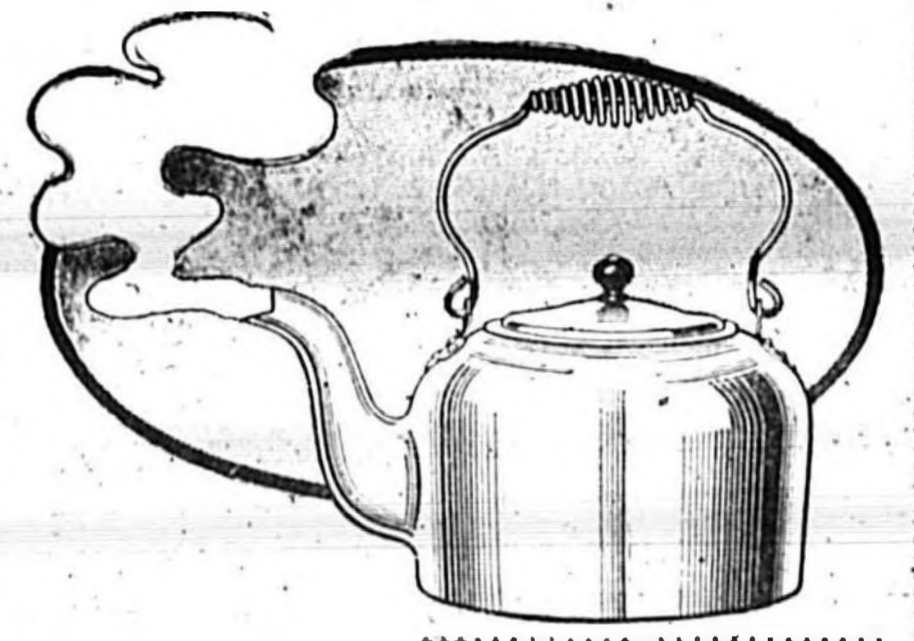
