TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — House speaker-designate E. C. Rowell said he may appoint a small committee of legislators to recommend a program to give Florida a top-rate program of vocational-technical education.

consideration to a three- or four-member committee that would go to other states for a look at their vocational programs.

He said Georgia has a particularly outstanding program and he thought a committee could learn much from a visit

to this neighboring state.

"Everyone is all fired up about scientists, but there are a lot of youths that don't have a scientific bent," Rowell said.

"We need refrigeration experts, television and automobile mechanics and we need

to offer programs along these lines."

He said vocational-technical programs can go a long way toward solving the poverty program without a federally-underwritten plan.

The Department of Education recently published a

study of vocational-technical education which was ordered by the last Legislature and conducted by Associated Consultants in Education, Inc. A number of legislators have indicated they don't think a whole lot concrete will come from this study.

It is fairly general in scope and makes no concrete recommendation for specific appropriation of money, although it found that to adequately meet the needs of all high school students who should benefit from occupa-

tional education would require an initial expenditure of \$79 million for construction of shops and laboratories.

After that, construction costs would vary from \$9 million to \$13 million a year at both high schools and junior colleges.

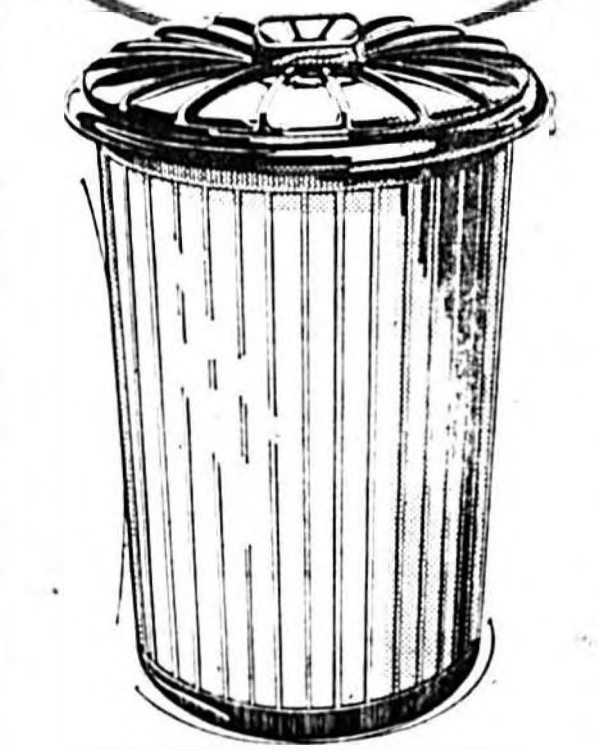

'Operation Beautify' Off The Ground

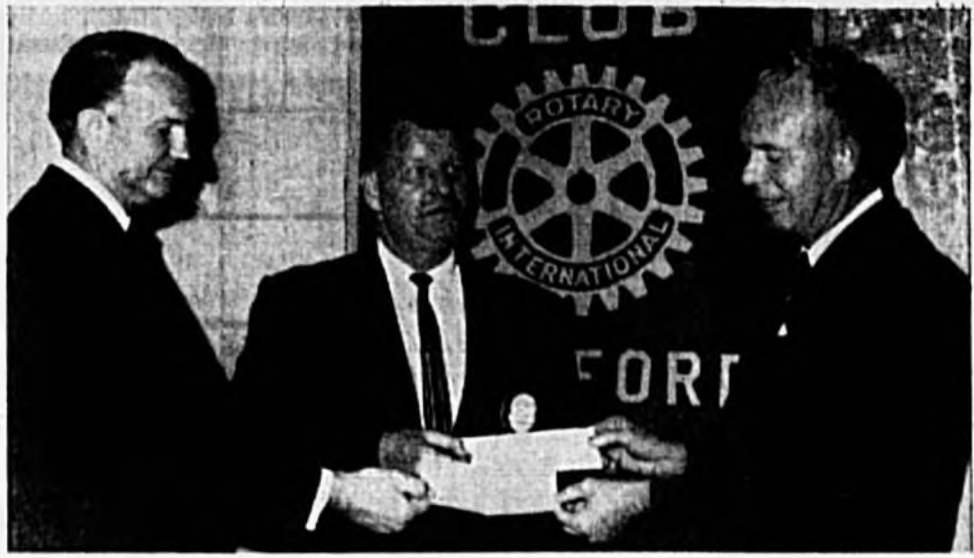

Traffic Goes 3 Ways On Zanesville Bridge

ZANESVILLE, Ohio (UPI)—In Zanesville, Y stands for bridge, a unique landmark at the junction of the Muskingum and Licking Rivers. You can cross it, yet still be on the same side of the river.

Tourists have been bewildered when told to go to the middle of the bridge and turn left. To try such a feat on any bridge other than Zanesville's Y would be dangerous. There have been occasions, however, when motorists neglected to make the turn. On Feb. 13, 1932, a Zanesville bricklayer lost control of his automobile after sideswiping a taxicab and crashed through the guard railing into the icy water 40 feet below. He waded ashore.

The present steel and concrete bridge was opened Jan. 14, 1902, replacing a wooden covered structure which had been condemned.

The first Y Bridge was erected in 1814. Toll was charged. Each "foot passenger" paid three cents. For a four-wheeled carriage drawn by four horses, the fee was 75 cents. Builders had no knowledge of Muskingum and Licking River floods and the bridge was washed out in 1818.

A second bridge was built the following year. After 13 years, it was declared unsafe.

Then came the covered wooden bridge which stood for 68 years before it started to sag under the weight of electric streetcars. At first it was a toll bridge, only people going to church or to a funeral being exempt. In 1866, it became toll free after its purchase from private owners by the State of Ohio, Muskingum County and the City of Zanesville.

There was no formal opening but William Wells, a furniture dealer, offered \$100 in merchandise to the first couple married on the bridge. Other merchants added to the prize list. Albert Bridwell and Carrie Weaver accepted the offer and the promoter announced plans for a brass band, police escort and other fanfare.

But Ray Steele and Ida Gatewood beat them to the person. They were married on the bridge on Jan. 7, 1902. The Bridwell-Weaver wedding occurred the next day without fanfare. The Steeles went to court to collect the gifts as Wells maintained they were not the couple he had selected. A jury's verdict was in the Steeles' favor.

Until 1902, the bridge carried all National Road and U. S. Route 40 traffic through Zanesville. Its roadway will accommodate only three lanes of traffic.

Now automobiles and trucks speed through Zanesville on Interstate 70 and new bridges across the Muskingum and Licking Rivers, just upstream from the historic Y.

The east arm which extends to Main street in downtown Zanesville is 420 feet long and has three spans. The short west arm of two spans is 275 feet and the three spans of the north arm total 300 feet. Zanesville motorists still keep the old Y pretty busy. It is also on Ohio Route 440 and the Interstate 70 business loop.

In the Y Bridge the only one of its kind in the nation or world? The question is perennial. Some say the Triborough Bridge in New York City is Y shaped but the approaches at right angles do not form a true Y. Zanesville has also received reports of a triple-span bridge in Tokyo and of a small Y bridge in Franklin, N. J.

Thus, it seems, Zanesville can at least claim the largest Y bridge in the United States.

Two-Man Orbit About Mar. 23
CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—The United States is moving ahead with plans to rocket Gemini astronauts Virgil I. Grisson and John W. Young into orbit in two weeks. Their two-seater spaceship and its Titan-2 rocket passed a major test Monday that included a seven-hour countdown which stopped one minute short of blastoff.

Several problems cropped up during the test, including a propellant leak in the rocket's second stage, but space agency officials said the mock launch was generally considered a success. "On the basis of what we know today, we're going to try to maintain the schedule," said a spokesman for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. NASA refused to pinpoint the launch date but sources close to the program said the target is March 23.

Pet Porkers
AKRON, Ohio (UPI)—Sweaters for dogs, thimble collars for cats, and now—electric blankets for pigs. Well, almost. One of the biggest problems in raising "porkers" is the mortality rate among piglets. Today's sows often produce so many offspring they can't keep them all warm. So, adapting a product originally designed to prevent ice from forming on the wings of airplanes, Goodyear has introduced a heating pad for the floor of pig brooders. Using a wire heating element imbedded in synthetic rubber, it works very much like an electric blanket.

Farm Note
MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI)—The nation's youngest—or at least, smallest—commercial soybean farmer must be Armando Itadicioni Jr., 11, of Memphis. He grew 10 pounds of the oil seed in his mother's shrubbery garden during 1964 and sold them to the local office of Cargill, Inc., nationwide soybean processor. Armando received a check from Cargill for 15 cents, based on a market price of \$2.65 per bushel for the near-two-billion dollar crop.

Diabetes Test
CLEVELAND (UPI)—A scientist at Western Reserve University here has developed new, portable equipment with which humans can quickly be tested for diabetes. With the equipment, a solution containing blood taken from the examinee is measured for blood sugar content, then tested against a standard solution, using Leeds & Northrup recorders to chart the findings. The patient can know the results in only eight minutes.
