En route Herbert playfully pened the bag. Out tumbled \$40,000 in 10s and 20s. The astonished and delighted oursome canceled the trip to he blood hank.

They divided the money in he car with promises to each ther that they wouldn't spend t wildly.

That was last Tuesday. But Police Captain Clarence 'erguson' said Sander's resistance lasted only 24 hours. Then he paid out \$4,008 in cash for a hig, 1963 model Cadillac because owning one "was my life's ambition."

The word got to Ferguson that Sanders who had a police record, was driving around in a flashy car and spending money freely.

Ferguson put, three detectives on his trail. They reported that in three days Sanders bought a complete new wardrobe and "went to New York City where he got a parking ticket."

A listing in Who's Who is one sign of success in life. Surprisingly, though, many of those who have achieved membership in this rather exclusive circle would never have been voted "Most Likely to Succeed."

A study of 1,072 leaders in business, education and government, made by Myron S. Olson, professor of education of the University of California, turns up the fact that the majority of these persons-all noted in Who's Who in America-averaged only C-plus to B grades in col-

lege. Four per cent were. D-minus students.

Citing the study, another educator, Ronald C. Doll of Hunter, College, notes that these leaders did only moderately well within the narrow band of the traditional school and college curviculum. But later, "in the wider spectrum of life experience," they blossomed.

"One wonders," he says, "what their schools might have done for them if they had provided more opportunities for individual interestfinding and exploration of interests."

Breed New

Although there are still many blank spots on the maps of this jetshrunken world, there are no more lush and extensive areas waiting to he discovered. Nevertheless, exploration is at the greatest peak in historv

Reflecting this phenomenon, the venerable Explorer's Club recently moved into new quarters in New York City and will become a central clearing house for the worldwide activity.

Speaking at the dedication of the club's new World Center for Exploration, Dr. Serge A. Korff. president of the club, noted there are more expeditions afield than ever before. But while they may share the same spirit of adventure that impelled the early bravers of ocean, desert, jungle and mountain, the men of the 20th century are a different breed.

"Today's explorers are the men of science," said Dr. Korff, "probing the sea and the earth to find new sources of food, water and natural resources so essential for survival of the mushrooming world population. It is vital to provide the means to help professional explorers, scientists and serious researchers to best util-

ize manpower, funds and time in investigating the unknown and benefiting humanity."
