Sheriff: Join county crime fight

Sanford County Sheriff Don Frazier invites residents to join the Florida Sheriff's Association in his continued fight against crime in the county.

SANFORD — Seminole County Sheriff Don Frazier says the new mail drive to a roadway will allow citizens to help fight crime.

Frazier is urging local residents to become members of the Florida Sheriff's Association (FSA), a not-for-profit corporation made up of the 67 sheriffs of Florida along with business leaders and citizens

throughout the state.

"The FSA can be credited for many positive trends related to public safety in Florida," Frazier said.

Through this organization, lawmakers were convinced to build more prison beds, increase the maximum time prisoners serve and more recently to modify sentencing guidelines which prevent many career criminals from ever seeing the inside walls of a state prison.

In addition to recent reports that Florida actually saw a decline in crime, it should be noted that state prisoners are now serving an average of 71 percent of their sentences, as compared to 31 percent seven years ago. There are more prison beds to accommodate criminals now and with the sentencing guideline legislation of 1997 offenders will receive stiffer penalties to start.

Rescue worker: We had this one little ray of sunshine

SANFORD — Chris Johnson could barely see over the hood of his Seminole County EMS Bronco as he headed into the storm.

"He was driving hard from his home in Geneva toward southeast Sanford.

"It was raining sideways and the winds were tremendous," said Johnson, assistant fire chief for the county.

At the same time Johnson answered his call. Lt. Mike Hammonds and three others hauled out in a fire/rescue truck from Station #35 at Five Points. Lt. Dick Criswell led another unit from Station #41 at Midway and Rescue #31 came from Sanford.

On one of the most harrowing nights of their lives, these men were among a corps of rugged individuals who helped save lives and assisted those caught in last week's tornado.

The first on the scene were astounded at the extent of the damage and the composure of the local residents. "Even after this awful tornado, they were holding their own and helping each other and helping us," Johnson said.

Johnson II pumped his Bronco over a couple of pine trees across Sipes Avenue and dashed toward a home whose roof had been blown off.

He hollered inside and heard a woman holler back, "Am here! Praise the Lord!"

Rescuing 92-year-old Ted Hasty was a shot of adrenaline to Johnson. In the next few min-

Airport flying in the winds of change?

Sanford cops favor moving headquarters

SANFORD — Will Sanford police take over the sheriff's department facility at the Orlando Sanford Airport? While the question remains undecided, the possibility appears to be gaining in favor.

Monday evening the Sanford City Commission and Sanford Airport Authority held a joint meeting at the airport with the main item being a discussion of the use of Building 110 as the city's new police station. The sheriff's department will be moving from that location to its new headquarters at Five Points at the end of September.

Airport Executive Director Steve Cooke said the meeting was quite positive. "We discussed the rental fees," he said. "Right now the sheriff's department pays \$4 a square foot, but Mr. Shoemaker (Aviation Authority member) suggested we might make it lower."

Cooke said the minimum amount previously determined for the building was \$3.85 a square foot. "We might be able to live with that," he commented.

While the city of Sanford actually owns the airport, rent money received for structures

goes to the Airport Authority which is mandated to use the income on operational matters.

Sanford City Manager Bill Simmons, along with Police Chief Joe Dillard and Deputy Chief Dennis Whitmore had previously toured the airport building. During a recent city commission work session the tour was described as satisfactory with Simmons predicting the building would have sufficient space for the department needs for possibly the next two decades.

Dillard said the police department is basically in favor of the relocation. "But we don't know exactly how much work it

Lake Mary revisits issue of growth

LAKE MARY — Growth in Lake Mary has involved a number of major developments during the past years. Major projects however, require major consideration and this Thursday's city commission meeting should stand as a prime example.

Of the four items listed on the agenda under unfinished business, one has been postponed at five previous commission meetings, one postponed four times, one three times, and the fourth item has had a request submitted by the applicant to postpone it.

"The largest part of it involves the proposed school, Learning Unlimited International," said City Manager John Litton. The facility is to be located on the west side of Rantoul Lane, north of the city's sports complex.

"We want to insure appropriate traffic flow from Rantoul to 46 A," Litton said. Rantoul to the 46 A side remains unpaved at this time.

"The city believes that this is a needed facility," he continued, "but we want to make sure the traffic problem doesn't become financially impossible for the developer." Litton suggested one answer may be a

Center offers up-to-the-minute aid information

SANFORD - The Seminole County Disaster Recovery Center swung into operation yesterday in Sanford. The center is designed to assist residents in filing claims with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) in connection with tornado storm damage.

The new center is located at the Seminole County Cooperative Extension Service auditorium directly across U.S. Highway 17-92 from Elia World of U.S. Highway 17-92.

It is linked by computer to federal, state and county systems that will allow residents who have applied for aid to receive up-to-the-minute information about the status of their applications. It also contains a bank of telephones linked directly to FEMA, allowing residents to file a claim on-site. Small Business Administration applications can be made on-site.

Additional help is also available at the center. Representatives from various agencies

will be on hand to lend assistance in many areas.

Florida Division of Emergency Management.

Florida Department of Insurance - to help residents understand the provisions of their insurance policies.

Seminole County Building Dept. - to assist in obtaining building permits on the spot.

Community and Veterans Affairs officials - will help link residents with these services.

Salvation Army Emergency Services Center - will be on hand to serve snacks and hot meals to anyone needing assistance.

Within just a few hours after opening its doors for the first time yesterday morning, Public Affairs spokesperson Opal Jackson reported receiving 110 applications from local residents.

The center will be open seven days a week, from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m. Jackson said the center will continue to operate "as long as we are needed."

Damage assessment

SANFORD - Seminole County Property Appraiser Bill Suber has finalized an assessment of damage to property associated with the tornadoes. He has estimated damage to buildings in the county at \$5.355 million. Suber's staff conducted on-site visits to each property where damages were reported relating to the tornadoes.

The figure does not include household goods or vehicles, but that information is still being compiled.

Although preliminary estimates were lower, county officials believe that the Property Appraiser's figures reflect the magnitude of the impact of damage to Seminole County property owners.

Care boxes available

SANFORD - The Sanford Church of Christ, 1500 S. Park Ave., has care boxes available for victims of the tornado. If someone needs a box delivered or you wish to pick up one for a family come by the church or call 322-7784.

The boxes contain enough food for a family for four days. Items such as a razor, toiletries, paper plates, plasticware, cups, beverages, canned meats, crackers, jelly and more. Boxes for infant needs such as diapers, pacifiers, toys and formula are being assembled.

Volunteers sought

SANFORD - The Seminole Community Volunteer Center needs volunteers in three areas. The first is licensed contractors to help rebuild homes. The second is to help with clean up and debris removal, and the third is to help staff the hardware store and mini-store being established. The Seminole Community Volunteer, Inc. is requesting volunteers to phone 323-4440 for information or registration.

Debris caution

SANFORD - As a result of the large amount of debris created by the tornadoes, some travel lanes and drainage ditches were blocked in some areas struck by the tornadoes and piles of debris on homesteads had created what were considered hazardous conditions.

Seminole County Public Works Department crews managed to clear the debris by the weekend however, and officials say electric power has now been restored to all habitable structures.

Seminole County and Sanford crews, county contractors and donated debris removal equipment handled most of the needs.

Seminole County Director of Emergency Management Kenneth Roberts has issued an executive order regarding the situation to prevent any further problems involving debris recovery:

1.No debris shall be placed in drainage ditches or travel lanes.

2.All persons removing debris from commercial or residential sites shall ensure that the debris is removed in a safe manner. Debris must be placed in county approved containers designated for debris removal.

The executive order is in effect until rescinded for the following Sanford streets: Pine Way, Sipes Avenue, S. Sanford Ave., Marquette, Beardall, Frers Lane, Kentucky, Laura, Myrtle Street, Palm Way, South Brisson and Nolan Road.

The last minute

More than 20 American Red Cross outreach teams are blanketing the hardest hit tornado areas to locate and assist families who may not yet have come in to one of the service centers. "We want to make it as easy as possible for families to get the help they need," said Wayne Brennessel, director of the relief operation.

Caseworkers started yesterday, going door to door in Seminole, Orange, Osceola and Volusia Counties.

According to the latest Red Cross figures, in the four county area, 334 families are now receiving financial assistance, 1,797 persons have visited crisis centers, and 21,924 meals have been served.

Crop damage

TALLAHASSEE - Florida Agriculture Commissioner Bob Crawford has estimated that there was \$100 million in damage done to Florida crops as the result of this winter's storms, and attributes most of it to the tornadoes. The biggest damage was done to winter vegetables and strawberries. Citrus reportedly has received little damage, but estimated are still being made.

Disaster assistance

TALLAHASSEE - Florida residents whose homes or businesses were damaged in the tornadoes and resulting floods now have until April 6 to register for assistance with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). The deadline was extended because of additional damage reported during this past weekend. The toll-free line for FEMA is 1-800-462-9029.

Stray animals

SANFORD - Seminole County Animal Control is warning citizens in the tornado damaged area to be cautious of wild and stray animals. While there is no reason for alarm, precautions should be taken:

1.Avoid contact with wild animals and stray cats or dogs. Do not pet or feed them.

2.Teach children to do the same and report immediately if they are bitten or scratched by any animal.

3.Make sure pets are currently vaccinated against rabies. This is especially important for pets that are allowed outdoors.

Orange, Osceola, Lake and Brevard counties as disaster areas, where residents may be eligible for the HUD 203(h) loan. It was established to assist families displaced as a result of the disasters. Borrowers could be eligible for 100 percent financing.

Builder warning

TALLAHASSEE - State and federal disaster officials once again are warning Florida tornado and flood victims to beware of unscrupulous builders when repairing damaged homes and businesses. Joe Myers, director of the Florida Department of Community Affairs, commented, "Every disaster attracts rebuilders who defraud residents because they are vulnerable and eager to get back into their homes."

Officials stress that residents should ask for identification and references, and require evidence that rebuilders are licensed. Also, residents should not pay for work before it is completed.

When in doubt, phone the Attorney General's Economic Crimes Office at (850) 414-3600.

Children counseling

The Florida Department of Children & Families is offering monetary assistance and mental health counseling for persons in the areas affected by the El Nino-related storms, floods and tornadoes.

Victims can receive up to \$13,400 to cover housing, damages to personal property, medical expenses or transportation costs. Money can also be used to cover funeral expenses for those who died as a result of the disaster.

Funding for the department is from the U.S. Small Business Administration and volunteer agencies.

DMV fees waived

The Governor has issued an Executive Order allowing the Tax Collector to waive DMV fees for duplicate or replacement motor vehicle license plates, registration certificates, title certificates, and duplicate or replacement drivers licenses, for residents of the affected counties, who lost these items due to the adverse weather conditions. This waiver is effective until April 25, 1998 for all victims of our recent tornado tragedy.

In addition, the Seminole County Tax Collector's Office is authorized to waive the fees imposed by law for late renewal or application for the above documents and licenses which were delayed due to the effects of the adverse weather conditions.

All Seminole County Tax Collector's Offices have a required "Waive" affidavit to help those affected regain those documents lost in the storm.

sites he helped two injured women and a dog into the bronco. "The dog followed and I let it in," Johnson said.

The initial rescues were followed with the discovery of the dead. "My heart sunk," Johnson said, "and things would still be worse." Making the task all the more difficult was the fact Johnson, a 21-year vet with the county emergency department, knew many of those who lived in the devastated area.

"Mr. (Tom) Tipton taught the economics class I took," Johnson said. "Most of the folks here are second and third generation Sanford families."

Neighbors and relatives of the victims helped the rescue workers count the number of people in each residence. Obviously, the initial efforts were to find the survivors, then to figure out who was missing. Then, more searching and clearing out hazards.

"We had a hat stick device that goes off when there is danger and it was screaming at times," Johnson said. "We got all kinds of static in our head sets. In a crisis like this, you do what you have to do. When people are dying, you jump over trees."

Whatever the courage the rescuers had, so did the those ravaged by the storm. "They're not the type to call for help unless they really need it," Hammonds said. "These are strong people who cared about each other."

Hammonds, 43, has two children aged 8 and 12 and said each of the men on his crew also had children. "We realized how precious each young life is," he said.

On the night of the horrible twister, it was this crew that searched for three hours to locate 5-year-old Ashley Ann Himes.

Firefighter Eric Borna, 31, heard a cry for help from a wooded area he was combing around 3 a.m.

"It came from behind us and it was very faint," Borna said. "We found the little girl in sort of a squat position on the ground surrounded by trees."

Borna said Ashley was awake but he thought she must have been unconscious for awhile. It was a miracle she was alive, that she could have survived being thrown 200 yards and into the trees.

"I told her I was a firefighter and asked where she hurt," Borna said. "She pointed to her right leg and said she was cold. There was blood and mud on her face. She was dazed and glassy eyed. I asked her for her name and she said, 'Ashley Ann Himes.'"

Borna carried the girl from the woods and said her arms were so cold that he became cold, also. "It was a miracle she was alive," Borna said. "The odds were stacked against her."

"There in the dark and destruction, we had this one little ray of sunshine," Hammonds said.

Ashley Ann Himes was released Tuesday from Arnold Palmer Hospital for Children and Women. The men who rescued her say they would like to see her again but know it is best they do not. That her seeing them so soon would bring back the terror of the tornado.

However, there is still much work to be done. Florida's overall crime rate continues to be third in the nation. Criminals broke into 213,050 homes and businesses in 1996 and stole \$1.6 billion in property. They also committed 42,142 robberies and 94,777 aggravated assaults.

cific complaint about the job he is doing, Cooke's contract appears to be in jeopardy. The Sanford Aviation Authority Tuesday voted to close Cooke's contract effective at the end of September, 1998.

"I don't know what they don't like. They just didn't make that clear. I told them I would be interested in continuing to serve as executive director, but I believe I'm deserving of some clarity in what they believe has been wrong," Cooke said this morning.

Cooke had been granted a one-year contract last September, when his title was expanded to executive director.

It was expected that the contract would be renewed, possibly for an extended period, as Cooke's handling of airport management had hardly ever come under criticism.

Depending on the approach taken by the authority, Cooke could find himself included in the applicants for his own job. Details however were not immediately made available.

"It was on the meeting agenda," Cooke said this morning. "It was a report on the evaluation of my contract. They said they didn't like the old contract and wanted a new one."

He added that 1997 was the best year thus far in the airport's operational history, and he felt this year would be even better.

Cooke has been the recipient

of a number of awards for his airport work, on the national as well as local scene. One such award was the annual Toppers Award for his contributions to the Sanford community. Local businessman Tony Russi, himself a previous award winner, gave Cooke the award.

Regarding the decision made yesterday by the authority, Russi expressed concern. He said this morning that he believed Steve Cooke's was being "treated shabbily" by the authority.

"I don't know where they would a better airport executive director. He's done an outstanding job and is well respected in aviation circles. I imagine Mr. Cooke can go to any airport in the country with his credentials."

Ron Rose, director of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce, said that he respected the airport authority. "It is a capable, honorable group that is formed to make tough decisions. I would defer to the judgment by this board."

Aviation Authority member Lon Howell, a former Sanford City Commissioner, voted in favor of ending Cooke's one year contract, but was against advertising for any other applicants for the position. Howell was unavailable for comments this morning.



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

Lake Mary's Yang has more than wrestling on his mind

LAKE MARY - Unsung heroes come in many shapes and sizes.

They are the best players on a team or the ones who might not get all of the glory but dedicate themselves through hard work.

Lake Mary wrestler Philip Yang is both of those.

Besides being one of the best wrestlers not only on the team but probably in the State of Florida, Yang is the quiet type who leads by example. This is his third year on the varsity team and he is only a junior.

Since the accident, Yang has been making trips to Gainesville in order to be with his brother and his family through this difficult time. He travels back and forth so he can go to school and attend practice while spending as much time at his brother's side as possible.

"I would stay in Gainesville if I could and be with my brother," Yang explained. "We are very close and he's even the one who got me interested in wrestling. But my parents and coaches have made me realize that I can't just stop doing all of the things that I need to like studying, attending school and wrestling. It's been a little hard to concentrate, but I know that I still have to keep up with my responsibilities. My coaches have really guided me and help to keep me focused as much as possible."

On Saturday night, Yang stepped onto the mat to wrestle his final district match. It wasn't easy for him to push his family troubles out of his mind for a few minutes, but as most heroes do, Yang rose to the occasion and was able to focus on the task at hand and perform not only for himself, but for his team as well.

His opponent had beaten him earlier in the season and Yang knew that in order for his team to win the district and for him to advance to regional competition, he had to concentrate and get the win.

"I just pushed everything out of my mind and concentrated on winning," Yang said. "I knew I could beat my opponent and had to push all of my doubts out of my mind and just do my best. I have confidence in myself and my coaches told me that they had confidence in me also and I was able to focus on that instead of my brother."

Yang won his match and now has the opportunity to represent Lake Mary at the regional competition this weekend.

Once again, Yang will have to put his personal feelings aside and try to focus on the task at hand in order to fulfill his goal of advancing to the state competition.

That is a lot of pressure for anyone, especially a junior in high school. Yang, however, is not an ordinary student or athlete and he has found a way to juggle school, wrestling, frequent trips to Gainesville and the heavy weight on his mind about his brother, who thankfully is improving every day.

That certainly qualifies him as an unsung hero.

The Fighting Seminoles fell to 2-3 overall with the loss and will play another SAC match at Lake Mary starting at 3:30 p.m. on Thursday.



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



Let doctors teach students!

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have trusted my gynecologist for two years. In fact, he performed my hysterectomy last year.

However, during my routine check-up last week, he had a resident with him in the office. When I was set up for the exam (and covered only with a paper sheet), my doctor asked whether I would mind if the resident observed. Of course, I said that I would, and the resident left. Then my doctor said that was OK, but I was left with a feeling of discomfort. Why is my doctor such an idiot?

DEAR READER: Young doctors can best hone their skills by observing older, more experienced practitioners. This form of medical education is invaluable, and I believe that you should have been pleased that your gynecologist took the effort and time to teach a younger colleague. He was not an idiot. In fact, he behaved completely ethically by asking your permission and, when it wasn't granted, performing the examination without rebuffing you.

I hope that if a similar situation occurs in the future, you will reconsider your decision. Although each patient has the right to refuse to be the object of a teaching session, most adults recognize the appropriateness of one-on-one training and welcome the opportunity to participate in the education of young doctors. Your doctor is to be congratulated, not reviled.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Now that annual mammograms are recommended for women over 50 (and even, by some experts, women over 40), can we assume that during our physical exams we no longer will have to suffer the embarrassment of disrobing and allowing our breasts to be fondled by male doctors?

DEAR READER: This is a "Did you stop beating your wife?" question. When properly performed, a breast examination is not "fondling." Rather, the doctor feels for lumps, tender areas and other abnormalities. Therefore, either you have a problem in definition or your doctor ought to be called on the carpet.

While it's true that mammograms can detect tumors that are often too small to palpate, most authorities continue to recommend manual breast exams (both self-exams and those performed by a physician) in conjunction with the X-ray tests.

This is rather like the situation in men with respect to prostate cancer. While the PSA blood test is ordinarily a reliable method of detecting such malignancies, experts urge doctors to continue carrying out the traditional rectal examination, because the combination of the two tests is a more accurate predictor than either one alone.

I hope that your doctor is not fondling your breasts. If he is, he should be reported to his county medical society. I also hope that women will continue to have manual breast exams as well as mammograms. Breast cancer is a serious disease, and we must employ whatever means we can to diagnose it early.

DEAR DR. GOTT: In several of your columns, you have discouraged the use of one aspirin a day for the average person. However, several doctors in my community recommend aspirin for healthy people, as a preventative for stroke and heart disease. Please comment.

DEAR READER: Aspirin prolongs blood coagulation. Therefore, many experts recommend its use in patients who are at risk for stroke and heart attack. However, to my knowledge, no expert has urged healthy adults who are not at risk to take an aspirin a day.

Nonetheless, many doctors and patients swear by this strategy. All I can say in defense is that the final word is not in.



WIN AT BRIDGE

The trick of the trick

Bridge is a game of tricks — there are 13 of them in each deal. But "trick" has another meaning: a deceitful device or deception. Well, sometimes one can have a tricky trick — as in this deal.

How would you try to hoodwink the opponents into permitting four hearts to make after West leads the spade 10?

At the other table, Zia Mahmood (North) and Michael Rosenberg had reached three no-trump despite the 10-card heart fit. (East opened one diamond, South made an intermediate jump overcall of two hearts, West responded two spades, North cue-bid three spades, showing a spade stopper and asking for a diamond guard; South bid three no-trump, and North passed. Brilliant!)

In this auction, West's opening supposedly showed a six-card suit and 5-9

high card points, but at favorable vulnerability some latitude is permitted. When East raised to three spades, South, envisioning a singleton spade opposite, overcalled four hearts.

When the dummy appeared, declarer could foresee the defense: spade to the ace, spade to the king, spade ruff, diamond ace. How could he trick East into doing the wrong thing? With almost no pause for thought, South called for dummy's spade five. This left East with the impression that South had started with king-doubleton of spades. So, after winning with the spade ace, East continued with the ace and another diamond. South won, drew trumps, and claimed, losing two spades and one diamond.

Who was this trickster? Cezary Balicki from Poland. Now, though, maybe East and West are playing sane weak two.
