

New post office opens March 31

SANFORD — Local residents can soon enjoy the conveniences of a state-of-the-art post office located in downtown Sanford.

The new branch, located at the corner of East 1st Street and Sanford Avenue, is set to open March 29 and will replace the existing location on Palmetto Avenue.

"Getting this new location was a total community endeavor," said Postmaster Joseph Guthrie. "And, likewise, it's an upgrade for the entire community."

According to Guthrie, the city of Sanford footed the bill for improvements to the landscape and curb lines. The owner of the strip mall paid for the renovations to the exterior of the building, while the U.S. Postal Service paid for significant improvements to the interior.

"The U.S. Postal Service is not in construction mode, so to have this new office at

this time is significant for the city of Sanford," Guthrie said. "Along the way, we were concerned that financing might be withdrawn because our business is so closely associated with the economy. But, in the end it all worked out."

The plan for a new post office in Sanford

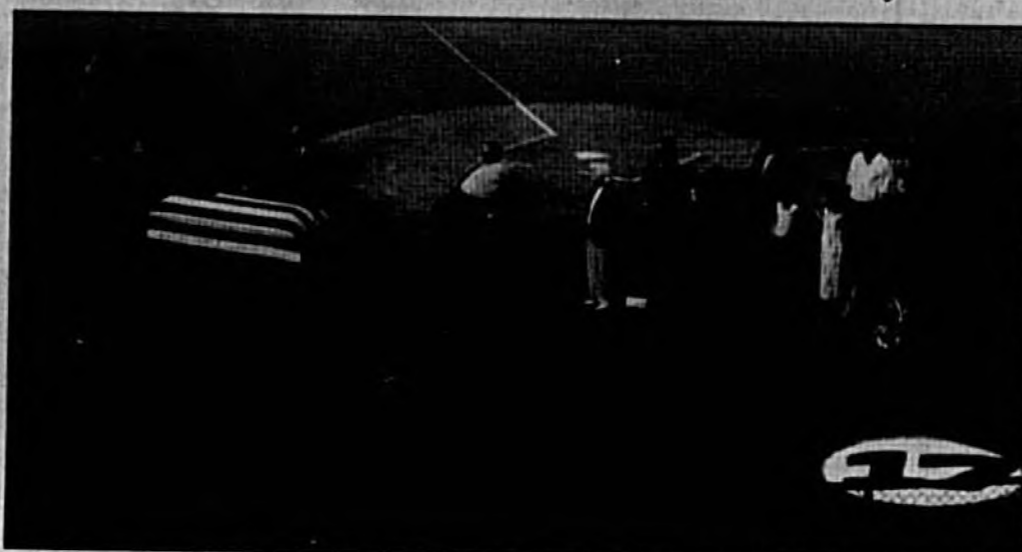

July 30, 1913 - March 1, 2003

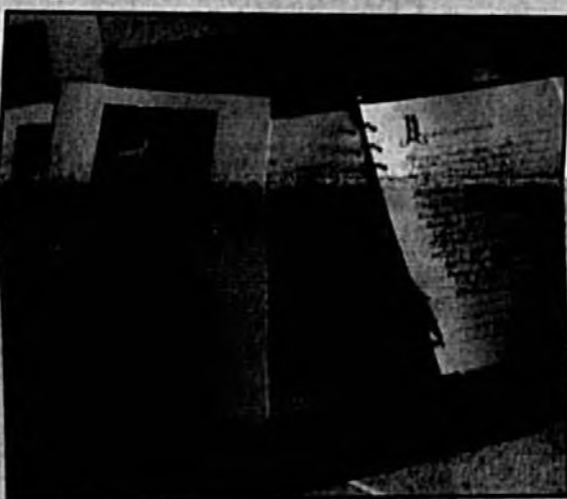
(An excerpt from Christopher Neal's poem honoring "Buddy" Lake)

New airline offers flights to Trinidad

SANFORD — Whenever Gerald Bourne visits Sanford International Airport, he can do so with great pride. He has the knowledge of his contributions to the growth of the airport.

Years ago he looked at the airport — named at that time the Central Florida Regional Airport — and came to a great revelation.

"In those days Sanford airport had nothing going on at all," Bourne said. "I thought to myself one day this place could be such a wonderful airport."

Bourne helped bring in the first international flights to Sanford. Looking at the transformation that has occurred at the airport since, it would stand to reason that Bourne's vision had come to fruition. And it has, but not before one more detail got addressed.

"For me personally it was an unfulfilled dream because I always dreamed of having flights to Trinidad," said Bourne, a native of Trinidad and Tobago but also a naturalized citizen of the U.S. and current resident of Longwood.

Now with the creation of Bourne's newest venture, Krystal Caribbean Tours, his dream is fully coming true.

Through this company Bourne, and his business partner and fellow countryman Ainsley Boodoosingh, operate flights between Sanford International Airport and Trinidad that allow local residents to visit Bourne and Boodoosingh's homeland without having to deal with extra travel upon returning to the U.S.

This partnership began in earnest when the two met a few months ago via a mutual friend. Boodoosingh, managing director of a company called Unlimited Travel and Tours that he runs out of Trinidad, was already flying his own 757 between New York and Trinidad five days a week. As soon as Bourne, who had tried and failed in previous attempts to establish a company that flew from Sanford to his native land, learned of this he pitched his vision to Boodoosingh.

"I said to him I have this dream and I asked him if he'd agree to

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Dotson's friendship with 'Wild Kingdom' co-host brings free medical clinic to Sanford

SANFORD — A local surgeon's friendship with a national celebrity is bringing free medical services to Seminole County.

A DC-3 carrying thousands of pounds of medicine, hospital supplies and eyeglasses is scheduled for an April landing in Sanford. The flight is just one of more than a dozen missions this year planned by the Remote Area Medical Volunteer Corps (RAM), a non-profit group dedicated to taking medical care to impoverished areas.

The former World War II plane is coming to Seminole as a result of Dr. Gary Dotson, who practiced general surgery in

Seminole and Volusia counties for more than 20 years. When RAM Founder Stan Brock

pulled him aside during a recent mission in Guyana, South America, and asked if Seminole County could benefit from the organization's service, Dotson answered with a resounding "yes."

"Sanford and the surrounding area is not a remote area by any means," Dotson said. "But, there are a lot of poor here who need medical services."

Founded by Brock in 1985, RAM is a publicly supported, all volunteer charitable organization with no paid employees. Volunteer doctors, nurses, pilots, and support workers participate in expeditions — at their own expense — throughout the world. Medical supplies, medicines, facilities and vehicles are donated to the group.

Brock, former co-star of the television series "Wild Kingdom," established the organization after spending many years with the Wapishana Indians, who live in the Amazon rain forest. After witnessing the near devastation of whole tribes by what would have been simple or minor illnesses to less primi-

Some suggestions: Walk away from the cause of your anger. Leave the room, leave the house if necessary, until you have regained control. Write a letter in which you express your feelings.

You may never give that letter to Danny — in fact, you probably shouldn't — but you will feel 100 percent better once you have gotten it out of your system. Be sure to show your letter to your husband. He should know to what degree Danny's habits are affecting you.

There are other healthy, acceptable ways to express anger. I have incorporated some of them in my booklet, "The Anger in All of Us, and How to Deal With It." DEAR PUZZLED: A modern man should take into consideration whether or not the women he's dating have approximately the same income he does.

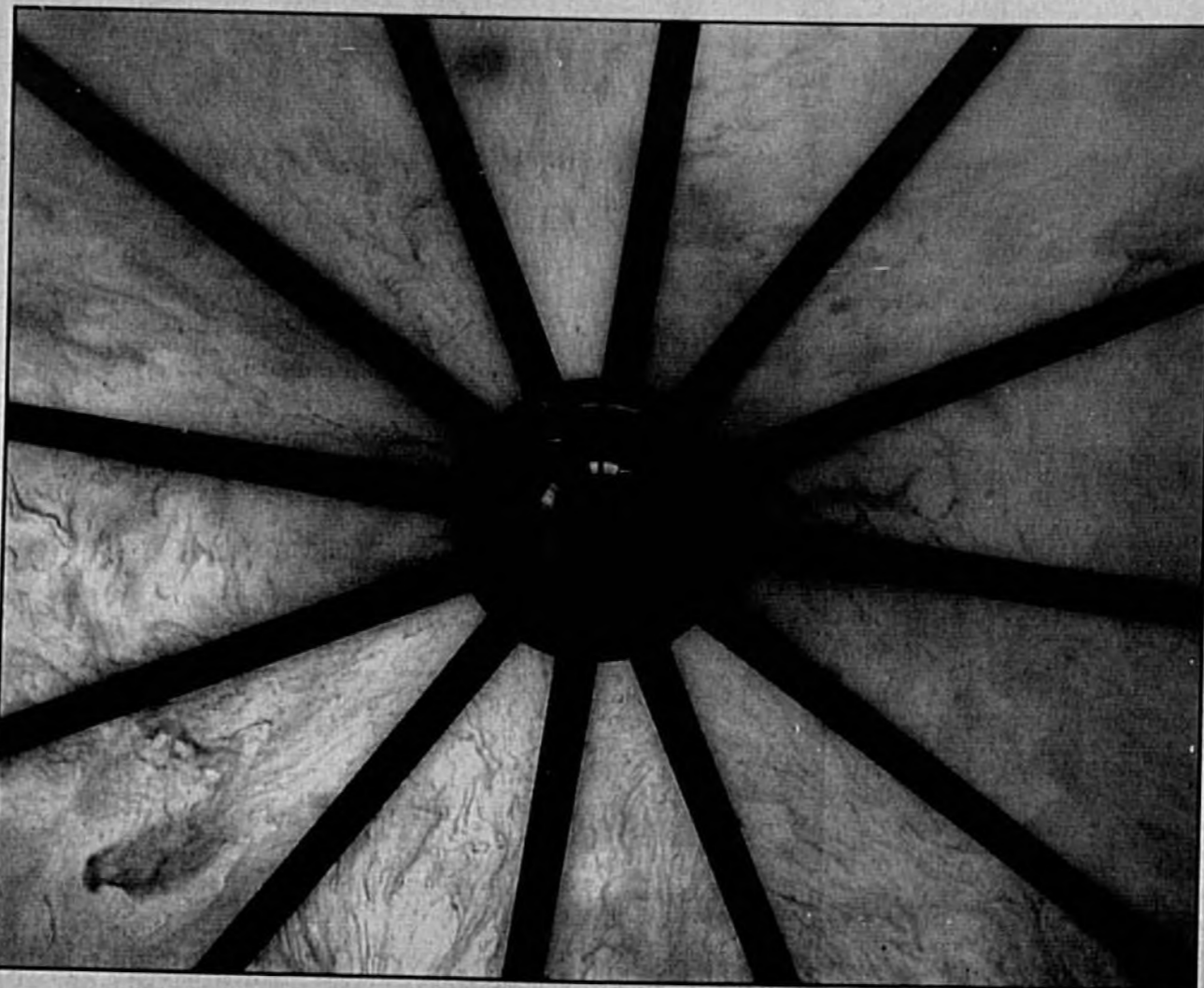

work together," Bourne said. "He sent his airplane from New York to Sanford to Trinidad in December."

The plane, appropriately named the "Jerry Angel," did a number of rotations before the two men finally came to the decision of forming the business. Recently they ran two trips out, one on Feb. 28 and another on March 8.

They are now currently hammering out a partnership with Pan Am and have plans to expand their services to direct flights to Caribbean destinations in the Dominican Republic, Haiti, Jamaica, Guyana and the Turks and Caicos Islands.

In the meantime their current service to Trinidad surely tops the old option Central Florida residents had of flying out of Miami. The average transit time from there to Trinidad is nine hours, compared to three hours and twenty minutes out of Sanford via Krystal. And that doesn't factor in travel from Miami to the Central Florida area.

"Many people would face a four hour drive from Miami," Bourne said.

This new success is just another achievement for both men. Boodoosingh is an extremely successful businessman who has worked as a tour operator and travel agent for the past 30 years. He presently moves about 1,000 customers a week, sometimes 1,200.

began in 1998. Once a site was selected by Sanford's Blue Ribbon Committee and the U.S. Postal Service, construction began. Now, after approximately four months, the office is nearly complete.

To prepare for the move, the current post office will be closed on March 29. Employees will

spend the weekend moving items to the new location for the soft opening scheduled for March 31.

To keep customers up-to-date of the changes, post office box customers will receive a letter of explanation and new keys in their boxes in the days leading up to March 29.

"The old post office will be left open for a few days for the transition of those who have been out of town or haven't checked their mail," said Guthrie. "It won't, however, be a manned office after closing on March 28 and their mail will be delivered to the new location after March 29."

The new 8,500 square foot location is equipped with new post office boxes and stamp vending machines. Unlike the current post office, a scale will be located in the lobby for after-hours access.

"The new facility is very user friendly," Guthrie said.

The new location also features easier parking and five retail stations to be open during business hours.

Guthrie, who coordinated the overall project, was recently promoted to Postmaster of Daytona Beach. He was granted a delay in assuming responsibilities to see the project through, however, due to inspection delays he will leave one week before the official opening.

"I will continue to work closely with Lake Mary Postmaster L.C. Johnston, who will act as the interim Sanford postmaster until the selection process is complete," said Guthrie, who will

tive people, he vowed to find a way to deliver basic medical aid to people in the world's impoverished or inaccessible regions.

Today, Brock has established a relief force comprised of people in a diverse range of medical professions who volunteer hundreds of hours to bring medical, surgical, eye, dental and even veterinary care to tens of thousands of people and animals. About 60 percent of the group's expeditions serve rural America.

Dotson was introduced to Brock in the 1980s. The former "Wild Kingdom" host was working with Jack Hanna to raise money for Sanford's zoo.

"Jack told me that Stan founded an organization to take volunteer medical personnel to remote sites," Dotson said. "I remained in

contact with him, and when I retired three years ago, the first thing I did was get hold of Stan."

Since signing up for RAM, Dotson has traveled to rural India, South America and Appalachia, volunteering his time and services to help people. Currently, he is trying to sign-up volunteers for the upcoming RAM clinic in Sanford.

"Right now, we have 12 dentists, five eye doctors, several dozen nurses and a lot of non-medical people who have said they wanted to help," Dotson said. "People have been very polite and very positive about what we want to do. But, we understand it's not for everybody."

While volunteer medical professionals will provide the services, other nonprofessional volunteers are needed, especially individuals who are bilingual.

Anybody who would like to help should call Dotson at 407-333-9661.

The free clinic is scheduled from 7:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday, April 12, and Sunday, April 13. Services will include blood pressure, diabetes, cholesterol, and HIV screenings; dental cleanings, fillings and extractions; PAP smears, mammograms, and birth control; diet education; eye exams and glasses.

Services are for the uninsured and people who cannot afford to pay, Dotson said. No one will be turned away; nevertheless, services are on a first come-first-served basis.

"Anybody who comes will be treated, and they won't be asked how much money they make," Dotson said. "In our experience, however, there are usually long

lines, and we can only serve about 1,500 people."

Dotson also recommends people bring their own lunch and something to drink. Food will not be provided on-site, and people may have to wait for a long period of time for various medical services.

The local surgeon plans to continue his search for volunteers

until the DC-3 lands on April 12. He is also traveling throughout the community, notifying people about the upcoming clinic. He recently hopped on a motorcycle with a friend and spent a day distributing fliers to local churches and neighborhoods.

"This is a community effort," he said. "If all goes well, we may do it again in one year."

Public asked to participate in deer management survey

OCALA — The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) began this week offering five public workshops around the state for deer hunters in order to gauge interest in enhanced deer management.
 The only workshop in the FWC's Northeast Region will be in Ocala on April 2 beginning at 7 p.m., at the Rowan Agricultural Complex Building Auditorium (Marion County Extension Service), 2232 N.E. Jacksonville Rd.
 The workshops are the initial step in a process to see if there is public support for regulations that, if approved, should eventually lead to bigger antlered deer on both private and public lands.

At the workshops, biologists will describe the regulation review process, provide information on deer ecology and management in Florida, present major findings from a hunter survey the FWC conducted last summer, explain the options for new deer management regulations, and provide each attendee the opportunity to select the regulation option they support.
 "The public will have seven options from which to choose," said John Morgan, the FWC's deer management section leader.

The seven options include:
 * Change nothing. The current regulations allow for two antlered deer to be harvested per day throughout the entire hunting season, with no season bag limit. An antlered deer is defined as one having one or more antlers at least five inches in length.

* Establish a bag limit of two antlered deer per season and retain the 5-inch antler requirement.
 * Establish a bag limit of two antlered deer per season and require that one of them have at least one three-point antler and the other have at least one 5-inch antler.
 * Establish a bag limit of three antlered deer per season and retain the 5-inch antler requirement.
 * Establish a bag limit of three antlered deer per season and require that one of them have at least one three-point antler and the other two have at least one 5-inch antler.

* Establish, in specific counties only, a two antlered deer per season bag limit and require that both of them have at least one three-point antler, and to select participating counties based on landowner and hunter preferences.
 * Allow landowners or groups of landowners with at least 2,000 contiguous acres to ask the FWC to establish, on their land only, a two antlered deer per season bag limit and require that both deer have at least one three-point antler.

"We hope deer hunters will use the workshops to educate themselves about deer management and at the same time participate in the survey process to help us decide how we want to manage deer in the future," Morgan said.

He added that the deadline for expressing preferences is April 9, and none of the options will affect the current regulations regarding antlerless deer.
 As further explanation of the proposed changes Joy M. Hill, Public Information Coordinator, Northeast Region, Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission added.

"Under the seven options proposed for new antlered deer regulations, the bag limit proposals listed are for the entire hunting season, not just for an individual type of hunt such as archery or muzzleloading gun," said Hill. "For example, under the new proposals, if someone was hunting during the 2002-2003 hunting season, they could take only two or three antlered deer for the whole year, depending upon the option. If they got that limit during the first week of archery season, for example, that would be all the antlered deer they could take until the 2003-2004 hunting season.

"They would not be able to take any additional antlered deer during the remainder of the 2002-2003 season (the remainder of archery, muzzleloading gun, modern gun or general gun). It is a simple concept that seems difficult to explain because we often refer to each type of hunt (archery, muzzleloader, general gun) as a season. In this case, hunting season refers to the whole year."

Workshops are not the only way deer hunters can participate in the survey. People can go to the FWC's Web site at www.wildflorida.org/hunting/deer_survey.asp and express their preferences on-line, or contact the FWC's Ocala Regional Office Division of Wildlife at (352) 732-1225 for a survey form.

Workshops in other areas of the state will be as follows:
 * April 3 at 7 p.m., in Lakeland at the Lake Mirror Auditorium, 121 South Lake Ave.
 The first public workshop was held in northwest Florida in Marianna on March 11 and approximately 300 people attended.

In a separate but related issue, hunters are encouraged to comment on the split deer season in Northwest Florida. The Commission wants to know if deer hunters want to stick with the existing season format for the Northwest hunting zone, or eliminate the split and go with a straight 72-day general gun season beginning at Thanksgiving (and ending 12 days earlier).

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

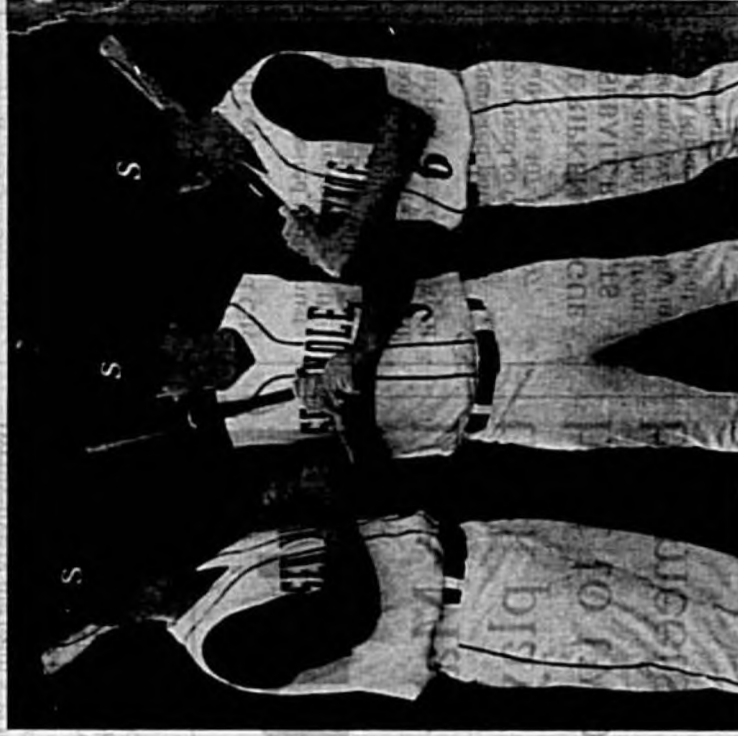
