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### Seminole High Opens 1934 Basketball Season In 29-23 Victory Over St. Augustine

Capt. Leonard McLoosa's Seminole High School basketball squad opened its 1934 season with a convincing victory over the St. Augustine Mulletts in a fast game played in the high school auditorium last night. The score was 29 to 23.

Coming from behind after a slow start, Seminole High, with Sidney Kinlaw and Quinn Jordan leading the colors, took the lead in the middle of the second period and never relinquished it.

The Mulletts, whose best bet was left forward Pierce, trailed 10 to 13 at the half and 18 to 20 at the end of the third period. Two quick field goals by Oliver Miller put the tilt on ice near the finish.

Capt. McLoosa used eight players during the game, including O. P. Herndon. All showed up well, particularly Jordan and Kinlaw, and Coach McLoosa is expecting another victory tonight when his first and second teams will play the Daytona Beach Buccaneers in a double-header at the local court, starting at 7:30 o'clock.

### RING GAMBLERS CHAGRINED OVER FIGHT RESULTS

#### New York "WiseGuys" Take Stiff Beating As Bouts End Oddly

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—(AP)—The wise men of the prize ring in and about New York are immersed in chagrin as deep as the snows that have been flooding in on Manhattan.

The reason was the backfire just before Christmas of two fights that were definitely in the satchel, with a resulting loss not only of holiday funds, but of everything else the smart fellows on the inside could borrow or pawn.

For obvious reasons the two fights can't be named. Libel and libel actions are extremely difficult to defend.

But here's what happened in the first one.

A young lightweight was fighting a veteran whom the smart boys knew was ready to be taken. They were waiting at a small New York club. The veteran still had a lot of followers, friends who would bet. The smart money went after them.

The night of the fight a spokesman for the inside wagers found the manager of the capable young warrior coming into the arena. The spokesman rubbed his hands in glee.

"A nice crowd," he said, "and how does your boy feel? All right? We've got a nice chunk down on him. It's a soft touch."

The manager looked pained.

"You're betting on him, are you?" he asked. "You shouldn't have done that without asking me. The only way we could get this fight was to agree to lose. We're not going to win. You're stuck."

Away flew the spokesman in anguish, hailing his clan.

"Get rid of those bets," he howled. "Lay them off. We've been jobbed. Our man can't win."

Francisly they raced around the arena, betting \$5 here, \$10 there, attempt to force the Bethlehem Steel Company to pay the holders of a \$12,700,000 bond issue in gold-backed Dutch guilders rather than in depreciated American money if bondholders so choose, was started today in the supreme court.

Lawyers representing Fay Rosenbaum, bondholder, said when the steel company issued the bond in 1912 it agreed to pay semi-annual interest of 3 1/2 in American money or 62 guilders, 25 cents in Dutch currency. Attorneys allege that the company is refusing to pay in guilders except to bondholders who live in Holland.

### Chairman Of Chase Bank Resigns From Finance Field

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Charles S. McCaig, chairman of the board of the Chase National bank and a member of the triumvirate which shaped the bank's destinies before the entrance of Winthrop W. Aldrich, Rockefeller representative, announced his resignation from the banking field yesterday.

His resignation both as an officer and director of the bank will be laid before the directors at the annual meeting next week. On Feb. 1 McCaig will assume the presidency of the United Light & Power company, \$500,000,000 utility holding concern with a long string of operating electric power and gas companies scattered over middle-western and south-western territory. William Chamberlain, who is now president of United Light will become chairman of the board.

### NATIONAL LEAGUE ADOPTS LIVELIER, SPEEDIER BALL

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—(AP)—The National league yesterday accepted the speedier American league ball in toto.

President John A. Heydler and William Harridge, of the two major circuits; Thomas S. Shibe, part owner of the Athletics, and Julian W. Curtis, heads of the two companies that manufacture the balls, met in conference in Philadelphia and carried out of the standardization mandate passed recently at the joint meetings in Chicago.

While the specifications decided upon are those of the ball used in the American league, last season, the final "happy ending" of a problem that has plagued major league baseball for many years a part triumph for the National league.

Faster though this new ball will be, it still is far slower than the "jack-rabbit" pellet the two leagues used a few years ago and to which is theory the American league still clings. After 1930, when Hack Wilson popped 56 home runs into the stands and even tiny Rabbit Maranville and Hughie Clegg chased outfielders out of sight, the National league called "lightning" and started removing the lightning from within the horsehide cover.

While the American league manufacturer, Tom Shibe, continued to build a sphere to suit sluggers of the Babe Ruth, Jimmie Foxx, and Al Simmons type, slower than the "menace" ball but still fast, the National league thickened its cover, loosened the winding, and added slightly to the St. Lucie River here the Frank Stuchess so that pitchers got a line of 100, Roosevelt bridge. The structure will be dedicated Jan. 9.

### New York Speaker Will Begin Series Of Bible Lectures

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Subjects of Mr. Dickson's lectures for January are as follows: Jan. 7, "What is Coming—Peace or War?"; Jan. 14, "The Coming of a World Dictator"; Jan. 21, "Crime, Revolution, Anarchy Increasing—What does it Mean?"; Jan. 28, "The Return of Jesus, How and Where?"

As a student of symbolic prophecies contained in the Bible, Mr. Dickson is of the opinion that "Every major question affecting the world at this time is a subject of the prophetic writers of the Bible. To neglect the study of Bible prediction is to turn from the only light which God has cast upon the perplexities of the present time. We are marching steadily on to the fulfillment of the Scriptures which point out clearly the setting up of a universal kingdom under the rule of a world dictator of greater power and authority than either Mussolini or Hitler."

Special music is to be a feature of the services, and special picture songs and picture lectures are to be given each week. Ysaabel Morrison Dickson, mezzo-soprano and pianist, will participate in each service. Song services are to be better than ever.
