THE SMITH MESSAGE

The program of the Democratic convention appears to be based on the theory that nothing needs to be debated, that nothing needs to be decided. It is a most extraordinary situation.

There have been many other conventions in which there was no contest over the nomination and none over the platform. But they were very different from this one.

When Theodore Roosevelt was nominated at Chicago in 1896, the outcome was a foregone conclusion because in all essential questions of party doctrine he was a regular Republican.

But here at Philadelphia in 1936 the candidate for renomination is a man who, in the opinion of many Democrats, has radically transformed the principles of his party.

They propose instead to demonstrate their loyalty to a personal leader and to let him determine what should be their political convictions.

Mr. Roosevelt's personal supremacy in this convention has been considerably strengthened by the telegram of Al Smith and his four colleagues.

For the second time within three weeks, The Herald staged a successful election party night that was attended by more than 2500 persons.

Professional race in the 50th district over Steed, lost Seminole County when he carried but eight precincts and pulled only 1254 votes while his opponent was attracting 2049. The city favored Steed with 1477 to 701 while the country precincts gave Hendricks a majority of 81.

Although Mr. Cone was given nine precincts in this county, the areas were small and contained insufficient voters to overcome the ballots which went to Judge Petteway in the remaining seven, which included the city where Petteway's majority was 94. His majority over the entire County was 112.

Hand's election as sheriff was by a majority of 415 ballots. He carried 11 of the county's 17 precincts, J. F. McClelland, the incumbent, took five, and the candidates ran even in one. The sheriff-elect won the country precincts by 123 votes and was given 292 more than McClelland in Sanford.

Capone Is Stabbed By Prison Inmate; Wound Not Serious

SAN FRANCISCO, June 24.—Al Capone, the first public enemy No. 1, was stabbed with a pair of scissors in Alcatraz federal prison yesterday by James C. Lucas, a prisoner from Texas serving 30 years for bank robbery. The wound was said not to be serious.

"Capone was stabbed by another prisoner in the room where they were working," Warden James A. Johnston of the Pacific coast "devil's island" said.

"Capone was stabbed in the back by a pair of scissors. He turned around and knocked his assailant down. The guard rushed over and that ended the affair."

"The guard at once intervened. Lucas was placed in solitary confinement. Capone went to the institution hospital where the assistant medical officer examined him and reported that the wound appeared superficial."

"Lucas gave as his motive for the assault his belief that Capone had informed against him. Capone had stated that Lucas had impertinently tried to arrange financial assistance for him. Capone said that he refused to listen to these propositions."

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European War Baldwin Warns Every Nation Would Rebel Against All Rulers, He Declares

LONDON, June 23.—The next war will cause all nations to rebel against all their rulers and result in "complete and utter anarchy," Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin warned in a speech to 10,000 Scottish Conservatives at Wishaw, Scotland.

Referring to the war menace hanging over Europe, Baldwin said:

"If that fire is ever lighted on the continent, no man can tell where the heather will be burning, and it is not a risk that I, for one, am going to take for my country, so long as I have control in the government.

"I believe that the perils of another modern war in Europe amount to a revolt of all peoples against all their rulers, and you might soon find Europe in a state

of complete and barbarous anarchy from end to end."

Delivering his first public speech since the British government decided to abandon the League of Nations sanctions against Italy, the Prime Minister said:

"We think it right to drop them because we do not believe that their continuance, even if all nations desired it, would serve any useful or effective purpose. Sanctions were put on to stop war. They were not devised for purely punitive purposes.

"There is only one way of altering the course of events as they have so far taken place, and that is to go to war. I do not know a single country in Europe that is prepared for that, and I am quite certain that I should not cast my vote today for that course of action."

Baldwin cited the United States as responsible for the failure of the League to impose an oil embargo against Italy, asserting:

"A great deal has been said about oil. The plain reason why an oil sanction was not put in force against Italy was that enormous quantities of oil come from a country which is not a member of the League of Nations and which we have no reason to believe would prohibit exportation of oil.

"This country is the United States of America, and to put on a sanction which would be futile in its use, merely for the sake of saying that you have done it, is a form of humbug to which I will not lend myself.

"Quite a useful question to ask anyone who speaks on that point is how he would have prevented all coming from the United States to Italy and Ethiopia. It is not an easy question to answer."

Four Clubs Will Be Represented At Tallahassee Confab

TALLAHASSEE, June 24.—Four of Florida's largest women's organizations representing a combined membership of approximately 40,000 persons will be represented here when the annual Women's Institute takes place June 29-July 3 at Florida State College for Women.

Members of the Florida Federation of Women's Clubs, the Florida Congress of Parents and Teachers, Florida State College Alumnae Association, and home demonstration women of Florida will gather here for a five-day program of addresses and conferences dealing with public health, welfare, home making, conservation, and other topics of statewide interest.

Good citizenship will be the theme of the institute which was inaugurated last year by the Florida Federation of Women's Clubs of which Mrs. J. G. Killam, of Tallahassee, now is president. Developing this theme along the lines of county government will be such speakers as Secretary of State R. A. Gray; Representative Loyd Collins of Leon county; Mrs. M. M. Ebert, of Lake Wales, a member of the state planning board; and Miss Sadie Young, assistant professor of economics at Florida State College. Dr. Kathryn T. Abbey, head of the history department at Florida State College, will sound the keynote of the good citizenship program at the opening of the institute Monday night, June 29.

National figures including Dr. Homer P. Rainey, Washington, D. C., director of the American Youth Commission of the American Council on Education, as well as Mrs. Hampton Fleming, of Richmond, Va., chairman of club institutes in the General Federation of Women's Clubs, and Mrs. Charles E. Roe, of Denver, Col., field secretary of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, will address the women's groups.

A highlight of the institute will be a special showing of the government-made moving picture "The Plow That Broke the Plains," which depicts a 50-year-old history of the Great Plains leading up to the time of the dust storms and the efforts of the resettlement administration to rehabilitate the farmers. Arrangements to show the picture before the institute women were made by Mrs. J. Rajston Wells, of Lynnona Beach, chairman of the institute, with Dr. Rexford Guy Tuswell of the resettlement administration and A. T. Talley, local theater manager.

Barkley Hits Republicans, Highest Court

in 1929 to "rain and dreary desolation."
"Three long years of normalcy, and they had wiped out half the values accumulated in this nation since Christopher Columbus and half the total income off all the people of these United States," he added.
"Then came Franklin Roosevelt and assumed the heaviest burden that ever descended on any man since Washington knelt in the snow and Lincoln watched the Confederate flags across the Potomac."
Unprecedented recovery set in, he said, and its "benefits have been bestowed upon all groups." Recounting the emergency and recovery measures, he asked:
"Why was it essential that the powers of government be exerted in a new way on the daily life of the American people? x x x Why had there been a complete breakdown in nearly every branch of public and private endeavor?
"Because for 12 long years—yes, 12 long years—the ancient doctrines of special privilege had stood at the pilot's wheel on our ship of state."
When President Roosevelt assumed office, Barkley asserted, the president of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States asked him to become a dictator "for three long years." But the President scorned the suggestion the speaker added, and led the nation out of the "valley" of depression.
Guaranteeing bank deposits, he said, helped outsize "billions of dollars" from hiding, but Governor Landon denounced the insurance law before the American Bankers Association.
Announcing the Republican platform, Barkley quoted the accusation that the New Deal "had disbanded our country by repudiating its most solemn obligations."
"And on that platform," Barkley said, "they nominated a candidate who, three years ago, urged the payment of public and private debts in money of the printing press redeemable in neither silver nor gold."
He said "deficits and debts" began long before Roosevelt took office, and added:
"We shall balance the budget. We shall balance the books in the Treasury. We shall soon ordain that no discrepancy between income and outgo shall exist."
"But we shall not do it at the expense of human life nor to the degradation of the spirit and morals of our people."
The Kentucky senator said he made no attack on the Supreme Court.
"As an institution I respect it," he added.
"We have sought to serve the American people under the Constitution."
"We have thought that under its broad and generous outlines we might reduce the people's lymphy national disaster. We have sought to treat it as a life-giving character, rather than an object of curiosity on the shelf of a museum."
"We shall abide by its decisions and seek to shape our program in accordance with them."
"But when nine eminent men on the highest court can not agree on what the Constitution means, is it any wonder that five hundred and thirty-one members of the United States Congress find difficulty in agreeing about it?"
Swinging at the Republican candidates, he asserted:
"Governor Landon and Colonel Knox fall upon each other's necks with hollowed russion because they rode the bull moose behind Theodore Roosevelt in 1912. In that fight Theodore Roosevelt had so little regard for the court's decisions that he advocated their 'recall' by the vote of the people."

Ministerial Association Requests Law Enforcement

Sanford Pastors Urge City Commission To Halt Slot Machine Operation And Stop Lotteries

Urging that officialdom of the City will bring about a definite action to "stop the flagrant violation of the law in this community, and especially in regard to gambling," the Sanford Ministerial Association today released a communication on which the City Commission is expected to take action next Monday night.
A short discussion of the problem was effected last Monday, although no definite action was recorded. The letter, over the association's signature, is as follows:
"To the Honorable Commissioners:
"The Sanford Ministerial Association in writing this letter, sincerely hopes that it will be received in the spirit in which it is written; namely, to bring about definite action which will stop the flagrant violation of law in this community, and especially in regard to gambling.
"The word 'depression' has been bandied about for some years now; we have blamed our misfortunes on the depression, we have seen various schemes hatched to ease the way out, we have viewed without alarm some of the people who have been indulged with what little money they have in the hope of reaping a rich reward.
"But in this country where mass production is almost brought to maximum efficiency, and modern methods of transportation make distribution almost as efficient, the cause of the depression is not so much a technical one as a human one. It was brought on by the desire to get rich quick, by selfishness; a selfishness which engendered dishonest trading and unscrupulous greed.
"Apparently, statesmen were unwilling or else not qualified to give it serious attention, and thought to find an easy solution, only to ineffectually still deeper the desire to get money quick'ly and without effort; and so the slot machine and the pari-mutuel machine were legalized. Fed by this local method of trying to get something for nothing, 'Cuba' and 'Bollita,' children of the same type of parentage have been nourished into big clumsy offspring who will soon destroy their parents.
"The real campaign, of course, is one of educating the people; to awaken them to realize their foolishness in dropping coins and pumping the handles of slot machines and expecting to be satisfied nevertheless, the least the authorities can do to save these benighted folks in spite of themselves, is to see that the law is observed. At present it is flagrantly violated. The law specifically states that those who sponsor the machines shall not knowingly permit anyone under twenty-one years of age to play. The excuse that the sponsor does not know the age of everyone who plays is of no avail. Ignorance is not sufficient excuse to violate the law. It is obvious that even those who enacted the law specifically intended to forbid minors from playing, and the responsibility of seeing that this is observed falls entirely on the sponsor of the machine. And yet the slot machine fever is racing unabated among the children—not only among the youth under twenty-one—but among the small children of this community who are unquestionably under twenty-one years of age. That can be stopped.
"We heartily endorse and congratulate the Junior Chamber of Commerce and all law organizations that are trying to bring the citizenry of this community to a realization of their foolishness in pursuing the Goddess of Luck through gambling when actually they are deliberately putting out of circulation money that should go into the legitimate channels of trade.
"We sincerely hope that steps will be taken to enforce the law; and that the efforts of all organizations to educate the people of this community to the danger they are in by the continued practice of gambling, will bring results favorable to this city.
