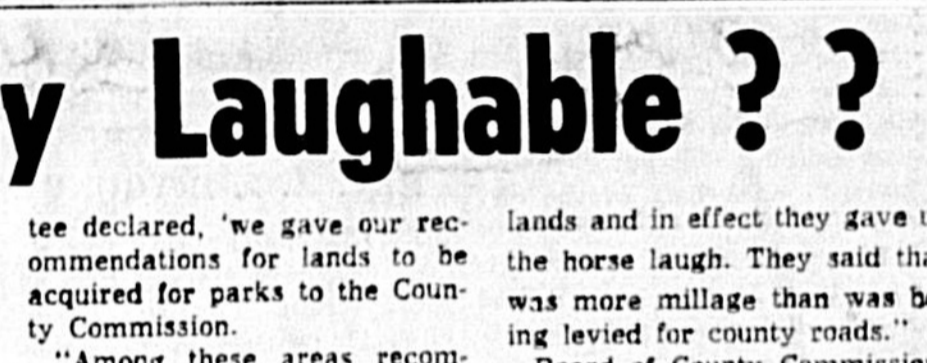

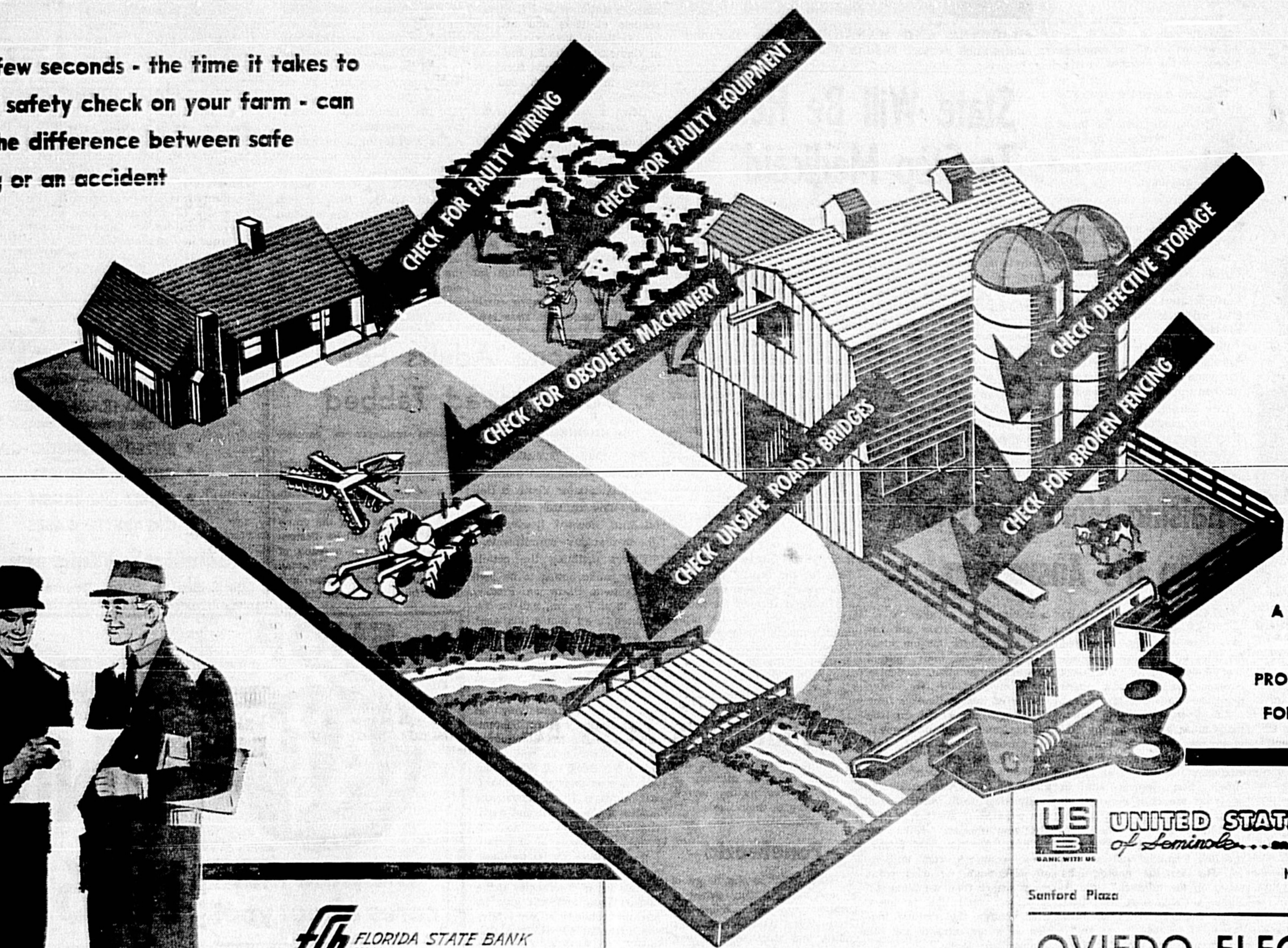

Nixon Calls For Farming Safety

President Richard Nixon is signing a proclamation designating July 20-26 as National Farm Safety Week, noted that although American agriculture has made great strides in production it nevertheless remains the nation's third most hazardous industry.

"Thousands of farm residents," he said, "are fatally injured each year and hundreds of thousands disabled. The dollar cost to the nation approaches \$2 billion, but the cost in pain, grief, and suffering cannot be measured.

"This terrible waste demands our urgent attention," Pres. Nixon said. "It can be sharply reduced if everyone working in agriculture makes safety an integral part of management planning, a part of every job and every activity, both on and off the job."

Mr. Nixon called on all farm families, and those persons and groups serving or allied with agriculture, to use all possible means for minimizing accident losses at work, in homes, at recreation, and on public roads.

The National Safety Council calls upon rural families to make "farm safety a moral and spiritual imperative." About 7,500 farm people died last year in work, home and highway mishaps. An additional 650,000 sustained disabling injuries, and many were permanently crippled.

Farm work accidents rank first in total occupational deaths and third in rate on a worker basis. This does not speak well for agriculture's safety record, says the council.

Accidents involve some human failure — improper attitudes, carelessness, lack of attention to rules and regulations. This means that the answer to the accident problem in a large part lies with each of us. We cannot escape it. Safety must be a moral and spiritual imperative.

Leon J. Urben, manager of the council's farm department, says the privately supported, non-profit organization has launched a nation-wide all-out attack on farm tractor upset accidents. The program is called TOPP — for Tractor Overturn Prevention and Protection.

Urban estimates that three of four persons now killed in tractor upsets could be saved if their tractors were equipped with protective frames or crush-resistant cabs and safety belts, which are now available for many makes of tractors.

He also recommends the following basic rules:

- Read and be familiar with the instruction manuals.
- Keep yourself in good physical and mental condition by getting enough rest and dressing comfortably.
- Avoid operating on steep slopes and stay clear of ditches and embankments.
- Keep children off and away from farm machinery.
- Don't use a "box-steered" tractor for a "man-steered job."
- When on the road, display the Slow-Moving Vehicle emblem.
- Reduce speed when turning or near ditches.
- Keep guards and shields in place, and shut off the power before unloading or servicing machinery.

Florida Cacti Come In Over 1500 Species

Small plants less than an inch high to tree-like forms 30 feet high. All cacti require full sun and some are fast growing, while others are extremely slow-growing. Cacti usually produce large, showy flowers and their fruit is an edible berry.

Many of the plants we call cacti are not. These include the aloe, agave, euphorbia and many others that resemble cacti.

Cacti may be grown in flower pots or ground beds. Regardless of where they are grown, they should be planted in a well-drained soil. Gravel, coarse sand or broken clay pots may be used for soil drainage in containers or outdoor locations.

Plants should be planted at the same depth at which they were grown. Deep planting may cause rot of the base of the plant.

Cacti do not require the amount of water given many plants. The most required varies with climatic conditions — a drier month here means larger amounts of water. Plants may be watered once every 2-3 weeks during the growing and flowering season and little water is required thereafter.

Mealy-bugs, scale and mites may become a problem and can be controlled with malathion. In general, cacti are fairly easy to grow in Florida compared to some other plants.

Earth, No Moon

"Uh, Charlie, the camera's on the earth now."

Local Youths Attend Florida Forest Camp

HIGH SPRINGS, July 21 — Eight Seminole County vocational agriculture students are attending the 35th annual Florida Forest Service Forestry Training Camp here at O'Leno State Park.

Selected as camper-delegates to represent their local Future Farmers of America Chapters, they are Larry Morris, Sanford FFA Chapter; John E. Brooks, Goldsboro; Larry Fields, Brooklet; T. Brown, Emoral Grant, and Reginald Smith, all of Crosson Chapter; James Morris and Paul Watson, both of Seminole Chapter.

A total of 230 FFA boys will attend the forestry camp which is the oldest and largest of its kind in the nation. Conducted by the Florida Forest Service and sponsored by forest industries, the camp is in two one-week sessions with attendance equally divided each week.

E. R. Howard, forest education director for the Florida Forest Service and camp director, explained that the youth attending would have an opportunity during their week to gain working knowledge of practical forestry and basic theories of forest conservation.

"Each camper is selected on the basis of aptitude, leadership and his interest in forestry," said Howard.

Qualified instructors at the forestry camp give specially adapted courses in forest management including forestry tools and their use, forest geology, forest ecology, gum farming, forest fire prevention and control, reforestation, tropical forestry, forest insects and diseases, and wildlife management.

A fast-moving schedule of class and field instruction climaxes with a final written examination for each youth attending. The plan for each day, however, includes recreational periods given to water sports, softball, table tennis, shuffleboard, horseshoes, volleyball and evening movies.

Concluding the week, four outstanding candidates are named by balloting among the boys themselves, and at a banquet before "breaking camp." Outstanding Camper Awards are presented.

Forestry Training Camp is staffed by personnel of the Florida Forest Service, Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission, the University of Florida, and from commercial forest industries. Vocational agriculture teachers serve as camp counselors.

'Unisex' Clothes Are Today's Real Fashion

The new "unisex," or he/she, garments make it even more difficult to tell which is which these days. Boys and girls can now have matching outfits. The sportswear enthusiasts make little distinction between male or female clothing.

New York clothing stores feature departments where male and female can shop together or separately for their clothes.

First, the girls stopped in men's shops for items such as sweaters, shirts, ascots, or scarves. Now, men are borrowing fashion, color and fabric choices that women's garments offer these days. Leather, plaid, imitations, deep root, and pleated slacks are among them.

Many clothing manufacturers are now offering wider ranges of sizes in sports wear, from very small to very large. But few companies can proportion their sizes to fit figure variations equally well in men and women. For example, some of the men's styles aren't designed for the carry-around. Most styles of men's shirts are best for the small to average-lusted woman. The tight-fitting, narrow-hipped pants accommodate women only when worn low on the hips like the boys wear them.

Stock Market Being Planned

GAINESVILLE — The board of directors of the Florida Farm Bureau Federation has given its approval for a plan to develop a livestock marketing program for beef cattle in Florida. FFBF officials have announced.

John C. Lynn, executive vice president of the 40,000 family member-farm organization and the board also approved expansion of the FFBF livestock advisory committee to include all segments of the livestock industry in Florida.

"Livestock marketing and the livestock industry hold great potential for Florida farmers and we feel that Farm Bureau can develop a plan in cooperation with State Farm Bureau organizations throughout the country unequalled to none," Lynn stated.

Lynn also reported that the FFBF natural resources advisory committee recommendation to the board had been accepted calling for research to determine the legislative and administrative situation with regard to water laws in Florida.

"Florida has no significant water rights law on the books designed specifically to meet the needs of Florida," Lynn reported.

"We hope to work with all water management district and organizations finding out what problems do exist in this area and make specific recommendations to the State legislature in the future," Lynn stated.

"Because we see so much water around us we often do not stop to realize that there is a shortage and the shortage will grow worse as years pass if we do not take some positive steps now," Lynn warned.

Mystery Noises
SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — More mystery noises floated into mission control Wednesday but officials said they apparently weren't from Apollo 11.

At about 10:30 p.m. EDT noises like a train whistle and a train chugging down the tracks came on the air and mission control told the spacecraft: "You might tell Buzz (astronaut Edwin E. Aldrin Jr.) not to exercise quite so strenuously."

Spacecraft: "What's the problem?"

Control: "Okay, that's one on us... Seriously, that comment was just aimed at your musical selection."

Spacecraft: "Okay."

Then there were more noises, like a rubber toy that gives off a whistle when squeezed.

But mission control later reported the sounds were not coming from the spacecraft.

The previous night, noises like a fire engine siren startled ground controllers. None of the noises has been explained.

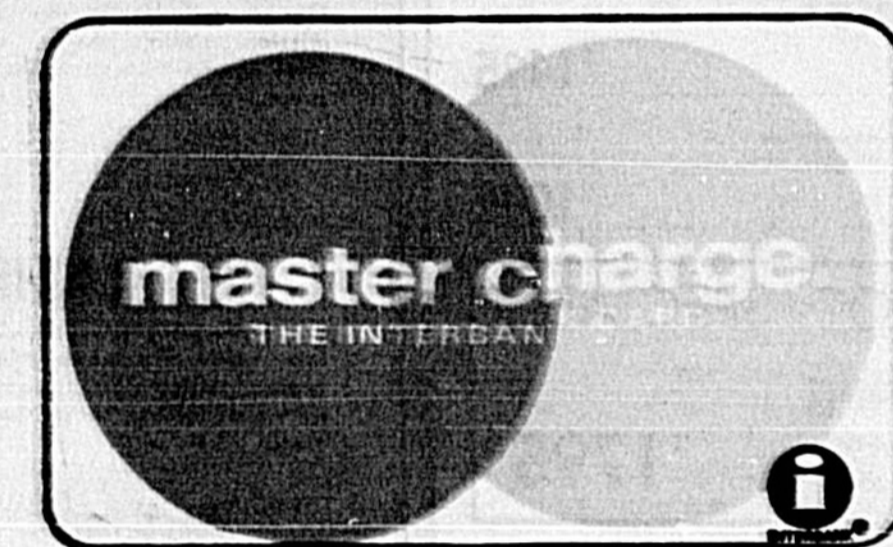

Ted Kennedy 'Adamant' In Pleading Guilty As Charged To Traffic Offense

EDGERTOWN, Mass. (AP)— Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, "Adamant" in his desire to accept punishment, pleaded guilty today to a charge of leaving the scene of a fatal accident and

was given a two-month jail sentence, suspended on probation. Kennedy's arraignment and disposition of the case took only about 10 minutes in the crowded second floor courtroom of the 180-year-old red brick court house.

When Judge James A. Boyle opened the session at 9:01 a.m., Clerk Thomas A. Teller called the Kennedy case first. Kennedy stood at the trial as Teller read the words of the complaint, the State's charge

that "Edward M. Kennedy of Boston did go away after causing injury to Miss Mary Jo Koppene without making known your name and registration number."

"How do you plead, guilty or not guilty?" Kennedy replied in a low but steady voice, "Guilty."

Astronauts Are In Better Shape Than Ever Before

ABOARD USS HORNET (AP)— Back from the moon but isolated from the world, the men of Apollo 11 today were pronounced in better condition than astronauts returning from previous flights.

After 11 hours of examining the specimens, Dr. William Carpenter said he found no evidence of contamination from the moon. Despite one man's minor ear inflammation "I think

they're in good shape," he said. The physician said Neil A. Armstrong, Air Force Col. Edwin E. Aldrin Jr. and Air Force Lt. Col. Michael Collins showed less deterioration in heart and blood vessels than other Apollo men have had. He wasn't sure why.

But he was sure that the inflammation in one of Armstrong's ears was not important. He said there may have been a buildup of fluid in the ear due to the pressures of re-entry and that the fluid was draining.

Mariners Pass Close To Mars

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)— While the nation celebrates the Apollo 11 moon mission triumph, two unmanned spacecraft, Mariner 6 and 7, are slipping toward Mars to give earth's television viewers another space spectacular.

Mariner 6 is expected to beam back pictures of Mars from 2,000 miles from the surface next Tuesday, images that will take 5 1/2 minutes to travel the 6 million miles.

Mariner 7 is to start sending pictures back on Aug. 3. The pictures are expected to reveal new details of the planet.

Nixon Looks To Allies 'Self-Help'

AGANA, Guam (AP)— President Nixon said today he will look to America's Asian allies to do more for themselves militarily in the future so that the United States does not get involved in any more Vietnam.

The President spoke to newsmen after a long day during which he greeted the returning Apollo 11 astronauts aboard the aircraft carrier Hornet south-west of Hawaii, then flew to this tiny U.S. island outpost in the Western Pacific.

After an overnight rest, the President said the United States, of course, will keep its treaty commitments in Asia and elsewhere, but hopes to cut back military aid, and particularly the supplying of personnel, lest it get caught up in another creeping involvement in war.

Viet Cong Shoot Down U.S. Chopper; 9 Killed

SAIGON (AP)— Seven Americans and two South Vietnamese soldiers were killed when enemy gunners shot down a U.S. helicopter in the Plain of Reeds along the Cambodian border.

The 2,878th helicopter reported lost in the war. U.S. headquarters also reported 17 enemy sniping attacks from 8 a.m. Thursday to 8 a.m. today. The command said eight U.S. bases and installations were hit, and 30 Americans were wounded, but no Americans were killed.

Meanwhile, American and South Vietnamese troops and American observation planes were searching a wooded area along the Cambodian frontier for Viet Cong who reportedly wanted to surrender to the Saigon government after crossing the border during the night.

Rezoning Eyed On Tank Farms

Sanford Zoning and Planning Commission at meeting last night set a public hearing for August 21 on a recommendation from the Scenic Beautification Board to rezone the city's oil tank farm areas from M-1 industrial to C-2 commercial.

The zoning adhered to a request from A. B. Peterson Jr., board chairman, that the tank farm areas west of Myrtle Avenue to French Avenue be rezoned to prevent the mostly vacant tanks from being used again by oil firms.

Unless the tanks are used within six months after the rezoning prevents them from ever being used again.

In a second zoning action, the commission prepared for civic clubs, labor unions, garden clubs and church groups to list their desires in what is most needed in the city.

The list could include a new zoo, city hall, etc. . . . and will be used by the group to test public sentiment before a possible December referendum is presented to the people on millage increase for 200.

Mark Glickman, planner with Gerald Duke Associates of Jacksonville was present for the meeting and asked the body to consider what type of capital improvements are most needed in the city.

Board will have a special meeting later on the problems of capital improvements.

Butting Head Against Proverbial Brick Wall

I write with the sincere belief that for the betterment of those concerned this should be publicized.

I have tried to bring logical and ethical reasoning to school system authorities, in hopes this reasoning would guide the judgments as to the best course of action. Needless to say, I have been butting my head against the proverbial "brick wall."

Those in authority and this individual differ as to what is the best course of action, yet all are in agreement—this is a dire situation.

I believe I have within myself the integrity and concern to meet any injustice I may confront, not with the "don't make waves" policy as I have often been instructed; but with a determination to exhibit and; if possible, correct them.

The maintenance department personnel are not only concerned with a wage increase, but also with the present maintenance administration.

Supervision within the maintenance department is almost non-existent—personnel are given no opportunity for advancement—there is no distinction in seniority (twenty year and twenty day personnel receive the same wages)—there is no apprentice or training program and the equipment used is sub-standard for an operation this large—personnel hired as laborers are required to operate equipment such as tractor and related components, loader, mowers, dump truck, sprayer, etc. at \$1.45 per hour.

To me, an injustice is being committed both to the maintenance personnel and the people they serve.

I sincerely believe these men should be afforded the opportunity to prosper as far as their abilities and intelligence allow. Any restriction placed on them should be their own doing.

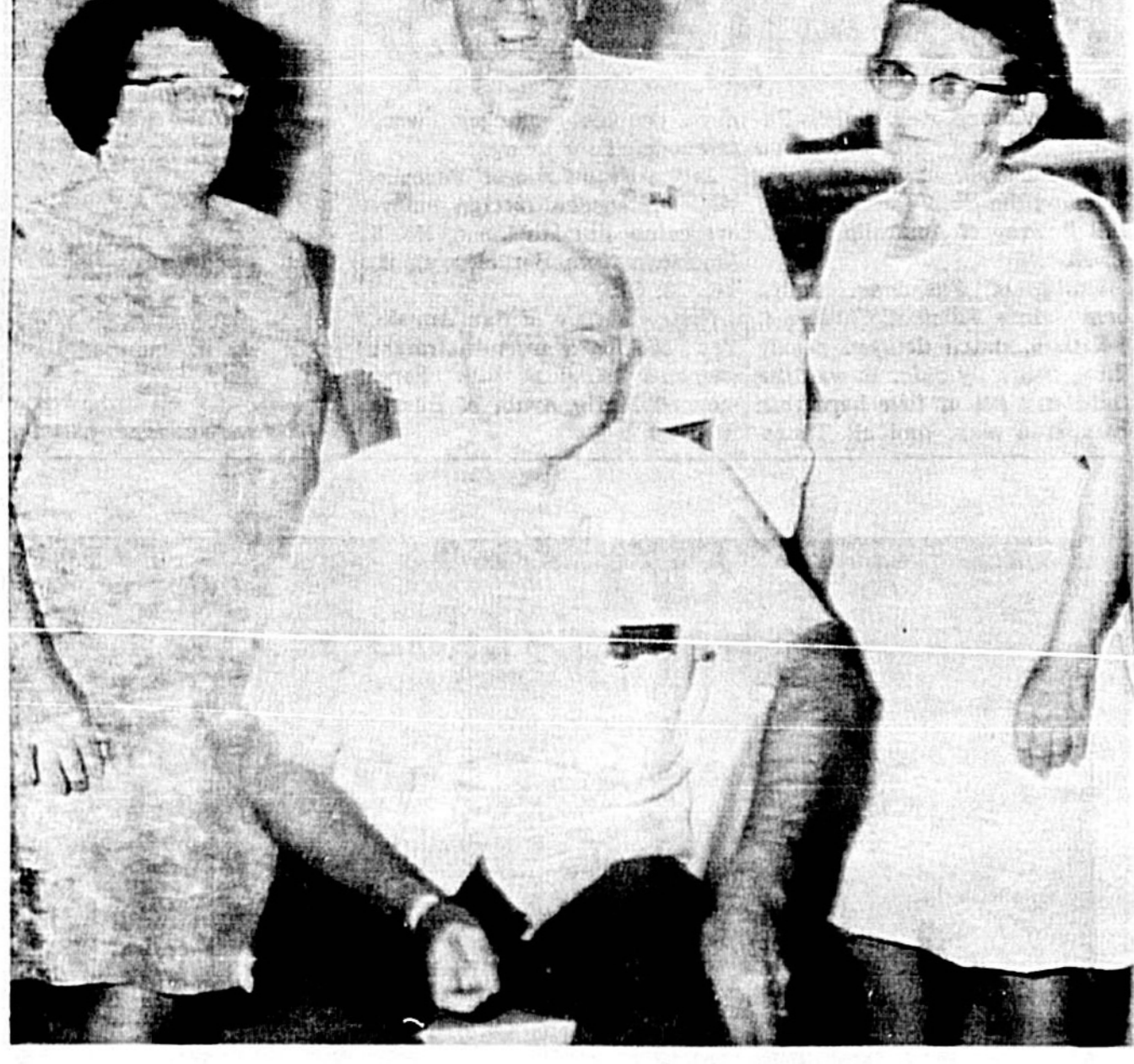

Sheriff Won't Appeal Budget

Seminole County Sheriff John Polk will not appeal his 1969-70 operating budget to Tallahassee.

In a statement this morning Polk said, "after carefully going over my budget during the weekend, I don't think I'll go to Tallahassee."

The sheriff went on to say the county commissioners were sincere in their efforts with the money they had available.

"It's a fair budget; it's not what I would like to have, but I can't hope for everything the first year in office," Polk commented.

The sheriff said he hoped that next year will see the tenure pay implemented for sheriff's department employees on a longevity basis. Polk ended up with \$890,618 of the \$485,000 he was seeking.

This is within \$42,178 of the amount he sought and included average \$68 monthly raise for deputies. New monthly salary hikes road deputies to \$477; detective sergeants at \$526; Lieutenants at \$552 and chief deputy's pay at \$776.

Skop Issues Points To City Fathers

Harry Skop, announced candidate for Mayor of Sanford, said he would bring five points before the city commission at tonight's 8 p. m. meeting in the city hall.

All will deal with the city's acquisition of the Sanford Airport from the General Services Administration and will follow the dispatch of a telegram from Skop to Vice President Spiro Agnew concerning the city's inability to get title to the former Navy base.

Skop informed he would request the commissioners to make the Lake Golden area of the airport a public picnic park; relocate the present site at intersection of 25th Street and Mellonville Avenue on airport property; reserve Building 109 for an annex building to be supported for the poor for Medicare and Public Health Service; release Building 289 for school board use either as classrooms or vocational use and lease Building Seven for \$1 year to Mother Wilson as a replacement for the Good Samaritan Home, present site has been deemed by the State Fire Marshal.

Skop said certain rooms mental health patients in order to keep from putting sick people in the county jail.

Skop also informed he was concerned over the reluctance of the General Services Administration to cut red tape that is binding the former Sanford Naval Air Station and has forwarded a telegram to Vice President Agnew about the situation.

The merchant said he advised Agnew, who he said was an acquaintance when he (Skop) was a Maryland resident, about the Nixon pledge to help Indonesia's economy.

Judges Get New Line??

County Commissioner Greg Drummond is expected to recommend an additional telephone be installed in the circuit judge's office at the meeting of the Board of County Commissioners tomorrow, July 28, to handle the city's financial problems.

The office which accommodates the five judges of the 18th judicial circuit is located at the intersection of Cornwall Road and Mellonville Avenue and west of Silver Lake rezoned from residential to agriculture use set for 11 a. m. The rezoning is being asked for by Boy Scout camp at the site. Adjacent property owners have protested the change.

Other hearings include requested rezoning from C2 to C3 for a portion of lot 3 and all of lot 4 in Forest City; rezoning from residential to R4, professional and multi-family dwelling district on a lot west of Hattaway Drive and SR 436 and vacating and abandoning of Violet Avenue between Bear Lake Road and Jimmie Drive in Holiday Bear Lake Subdivision.

Happy Day! No Raise In Taxes

No increase in ad valorem taxes for Seminole property owners is called for in the budget for 1969-70 tentatively approved by the Board of County Commissioners following four weeks of grueling hearings. Public hearing on the appropriation is set for 10 a. m., Aug. 5.

More than \$100,000 was cut from requests of department heads to retail the millage level for the fiscal year to begin Oct. 1 at 6.33, one of the lowest in the counties in Central Florida.

With the cutting and rezoning necessary to keep the taxes down, the board was still able to allocate \$23,000 for construction of a new courtroom expected to be portable buildings placed behind the courthouse; some \$28,500 to move the motor vehicle inspection station at site and \$17,800 for parks—miscellaneous and expansion as well as other new programs including a food stamp plan for the hungry and poor of the county.

One of the more interesting features of the budget shows the county at the end of the next fiscal year will have some \$32,410 in the bank to be applied to construction of the new courtroom and jail addition. Included in this amount is some \$20,000 for interest on time deposits and \$243,053 in taxes.

Complete budget in detail can be seen on Page 2A of today's edition of The Sanford Herald.

An idea of the chopping by the five-man governing body can be seen through comparison of current budget, requested appropriations and final approved amounts issued in order.

There's A Big Catch

Court cases brought by the State of Florida against three leading drug manufacturing companies could bring a windfall to Seminole County but . . . action in New York charging three nationally known drug companies with overcharging for certain anti-biotics brought an order to the firms to return some \$30 million at the rate of 30 cents on each dollar spent on the drugs to the citizens who purchased them.

The big catch is that the users must be able to verify their claims over the period from 1954 to 1965. In the event private citizens made no claims the city or county governments could make the claims on their behalf, it was reported.

In the last few weeks, Florida's Attorney General Earl Fierchick filed a similar suit against the companies.

Sanford City Attorney William Hutchison and Longwood Attorney S. Joseph Davis Jr. were queried by The Herald today if either of their municipalities had considered trying to recover the moneys on behalf of their citizens.

Both attorneys cited an interesting question, "What could the municipalities do with the moneys if they recovered any?"

It would appear, according to the legal aides, that the cities would have to find some method to return the moneys to the proper persons which would be a near impossible task.

And it would also appear that the moneys could not be spent on behalf of the citizens for a public purpose. Both said they would be happy to join as party complainants in the suits if authorized to do so.

Estimates of the overcharge to Seminole Countians are very difficult to determine. However, if each Seminole family spent only \$5 per year over the 11 year period for the drugs and half of that amount were recoverable, the sum would total more than \$500,000.
